### **Symposium Attracts Large Crowd**

#### **Speakers Undaunted by Power Failure in Hotel on Second Day of Proceedings**

From July 5 to 7, one of the largest crowds ever to attend a UFO symposium heard a series of speeches in Chicago, Illinois.

An estimated 800 persons listened to the speakers, bought books and UFO-related merchandise, and mingled with the cream of ufology in the first MUFON convention held in Chicago.

As this reporter spent much time meeting other attendees, there was not much time to listen to all the speeches. One had to be selective. So the MUFON Proceedings, a pre-published book of the speeches proved invaluable in assessing which speeches to attend. One speaker did not show up. He was Professor Jean-Pierre Petit, CNRS Senior Researcher from Pertuis, France. In his place, a hastily organized speech was made by Forest Crawford, Illinois Assistant State Director. I did not listen to his speech, nor did I listen to four other speeches, three of them on crop circles and one on ancient astronauts. That left nine speeches to cover. Seven of these were outstanding, in my opinion.


Zecharia Sitchin's speech, entitled "The Twelfth Planet - Key to The UFO Enigma," was a masterpiece of carefully-thought-out and researched theory and validation.

For those of you who have not read any of his books, I recommend "The 12th Planet". With correct emphasis on his basic premise, Sitchin made his audience listen carefully to his words. He had no need to use rhetoric. The facts he has uncovered in his research were enough to convince his listeners of the sound reasoning he used.

His theory can be summed up as follows: The *Nefilim* of the Bible were "those who came or fell down to earth." They became known to the historians of ancient Sumeria (now known as Iraq) as the Anunnaki, literally "those who from Heaven to Earth came." They bred with Earth women and established the Sumerian civilization which was the first true civilization on Earth. According to Sumerian myth, the Anunnaki came to Earth from the solar system's twelfth planet, Niburu. Niburu orbits the sun in a large ellipse, and approaches perihelion (when it is closest to the sun) every 3,600 years. The sun and our moon were considered planets by the Sumerians.

Sitchin also says that man was created as a worker by the Anunnaki. He says that Mars may have been a base, and that the grey humanoids reported nowadays may be robots made by the Anunnaki, whose planet Niburu is now in a return orbit to our vicinity.

Michael Swords, PhD's speech, "Modern Biology and the Extraterrestrial Hypothesis" served as a partial refutation of Sitchin's ideas and those of Budd Hopkins.

Swords is a professor of natural science at Western Michigan University. His Saturday morning speech supported the ETH, but he pointed out that the basic incompatibility of human and non-human species precludes interbreeding, which is a main thrust of Hopkins' books. He had no real insight into why abductees see their sperm and ova taken by the humanoids, although he made several guesses. Maybe, the abductees is given a screen memory while he or she is controlled and is in an "altered state of consciousness." He said that "abduction researchers need to return to the primary data" to assess precisely what is known with any certainty and what the evidential status really is for specific claimed details. He said that we must express our

judgments on abductions in more "tentative" terms to have a hope of convincing skeptics.

One of his most impressive statements was when he pointed out that the aliens do not need to harvest any genetic material from us since they would be able to make anything they want in their own laboratories by merely rearranging gene stacks and rebuilding chromosomes.

The topic of the mysterious animal mutilations was dealt with by Linda Moulton Howe and John Altshuler, M.D. in a shared presentation of remarkable research which captivated the large audience.

Linda Howe's topic, "Further Evidence Linking Animal Mutilations and Human Abductions to Alien Life Forms," was punctuated by a series of slides and videotape segments from as recent as January and February of 1991.

She showed interviews with seven people who had seen alien creatures, and cattle being taken or mutilated by the creatures.

In one instance, uterus tissue and fluid were taken from a woman. In another, the abductees gave

Howe information about why the aliens are mutilating animals and abducting humans. Whether we can believe the information Howe presented in her speech is debatable given that, according to Thomas Bullard's study of information given by aliens in 300 abduction cases, the aliens lied 85 percent of the time. This was a point not mentioned in her speech, but it may have some bearing on the information. For that reason, we are not giving readers the information as it may be disinformation and we do not want to mislead readers of this Bulletin. If you want to read it, write to MUFON (CUFORN has the address) and they will send you a copy of the speeches given in Chicago, including Howe's (for a moderate fee, of course).

The rather gory but informative and scientifically correct evidence from animal mutilations was shown in slide form by John Altshuler, M.D., a McGill University graduate. His work with Howe for the past three years has paid off in terms of real scientific evidence of the non-human factor in the mutilations. He showed the audience that cults, predators and accidents did not cause the mutilations, and that high heat from an unknown source was definitely involved.

Dr. Altshuler said "extraterrestrial factors must be considered as a plausible explanation of the ever-increasing numbers of unexplained animal mutilations."

The most convincing speech given at the symposium was the one entitled "The Reality of The Abduction Phenomenon," by John S. Carpenter, M.S.W. The Menninger Clinic-trained hypnotherapist has a very fine speaking voice which proved to be effective when combined with the statistically and case-based evidence which proved his point and effectively silenced critics of the abduction scenario.

Carpenter delineated all the skeptics' explanations for the phenomenon and utterly destroyed them. He pointed out the physical evidence and the

scientific correlations produced by reputable researchers over the years.

He quoted "Susan", an abductee, as saying after his speech at the SHO-ME UFO Conference in St. Charles, Missouri on October 13, 1990, the following:

"I had no desire or interest in this subject but I am glad for the experience. I felt like I had tunnel vision until this experience opened my mind to consider a much greater set of possibilities in this universe. I have grown as a result."

"Susan" was one of hundreds of abductees who have been studied by researchers. Carpenter pointed out that the only way to find out about abductions is to study the collected data and thus understand the patterns describing "a shared reality by those witnesses."

Carpenter answered all the skeptics' explanations. Abduction reports are not made by people who suffer from schizophrenia or any other psychosis. They lack all the symptoms that are part of psychotic behaviour, he said. Moreover, the psychotherapist stated that he had never come across anyone who came up with an abduction story amongst the several thousand hospitalized psychiatric patients he had worked with in the last 12 years; none at all among those with hallucinations or delusions. "The elements of a hysterical personality are rarely a contributing or pre-existing condition of the witness — and, therefore, not seen as a source for the abduction reports," he said.

He said mass hysteria could not account for waves of sightings. For example, in the Gulf Breeze, Florida wave, "many of the initial reports were collected privately without opportunity to influence or copy each other. Mass hysteria requires some form of shared contact or close proximity to spread effectively," he pointed out.

As for dissociative states prevalent in people with borderline personalities, he said most abductees are not under great stress either externally or from within before the event. They have not history of traumatic childhood emotional disturbance or symptoms of personality fragmentation. Nor are they paranoid prior to their abduction. Abductees are not sociopaths, he emphasized. They do not lie, prove delinquent, show disrespect for authority figures or rules, prove unreliable, use charm to manipulate people, seek publicity, or personal gain or try to use people for personal profits. They do not promote themselves or try to prove anything.

The credible abductee, according to Carpenter, fears ridicule and, at the same time, is looking for understanding, answers and acceptance. He may rationalize his experience, often denying that it was unusual and making up irrational and creative explanations for it out of desperation.

Hoaxes account for about five percent of abduction reports, he said. He said the Gulf Breeze sightings could not have been hoaxed as there were

hundreds of observers, none of whom had ever broken down under questioning. Even "Ed Walters photographs proved genuine." Publicized challenges to them "have been all but disposed of completely by similar investigative efforts within just weeks, thus indicating that the hoax proponents themselves appear to be guilty of falsifying claims." The fact that Ed Walters insisted on complete anonymity at first and did not try to sell his story to the National Enquirer speaks for his case being genuine. He and his wife only wrote their book after the skeptics both within and without the UFO community began accusing them of a hoax.

Hypnosis itself is not responsible for abduction reports. One quarter of all the abduction reports are made without hypnosis, with the same details emerging as those which come out as a result of hypnosis. The short gray creatures had been reported for years before abduction reports surfaced. Crash-retrieval data from military and government sources mentions the "grays". When a hypnotherapist uses leading questions, the real abductees do not respond the way the therapist wants — so leading questions


are not an influence on abduction report contents. This, of course, is only the case when the hypnotherapist suggests options other than the expected detail and implies activities and processes that would be more credible. Carpenter said that therapists do not always find abduction reports emerging from hypnosis, contrary to the skeptics' theory that whatever one expects is what one will produce under hypnosis. He gave several cases as examples.

"Media or reading influences on the production of abduction reports is not a factor," Carpenter said. First, most of the cases he probed were with people who had not read any UFO books, read tabloid newspapers, or seen UFO TV shows or documentaries. "Many abductees have come forth instead with data which matches the unpublished data of other cases. I believe this could only happen among persons who have actually shared a similar experience — not from credible coincidence or from the infinite realm of creativity," he added.

Aside from this point, many reports come from remote areas where there is little or no media; other abduction reports come from children too young to read or understand what they hear well enough to create accounts so alike with extreme accuracy.

Abduction reports lack the rich quality and inventive diversity one finds in folklore, according to Thomas E. Bullard, who studied 300 abduction reports worldwide to see if they fit a pattern that would prove them part of folklore rather than real. Not only that, but the reports cannot be fantasies as they consistently lack emotional response to the awareness that they are without their clothes and cannot escape. They feel drugged, indifferent or sedated. When physical exams take place in abductions, basic medical procedures are never reported.

The subconscious can, he said, occasionally make up a report from subtle suggestions, personal feelings and data seen, heard or read by chance. However, it does not explain every abduction. It does not explain reports from abductees who had no previous interest in UFOs, and/or were completely unfamiliar with UFO stories and/or still have no

wish to be a part of the phenomenon or discover anything more, and show no wish for attention.

Carpenter mentioned that one would expect that, if abductions are real, there would be witnesses. There have been observers to at least six abductions, he pointed out. He gave details of these, but left out the names of the people concerned, except for the Travis Walton case.

Physical evidence adds to the proof of the reality of abductions. He described more than a dozen such cases — cases with marks on people's bodies, dehydrated soil, radiation, the appearance and disappearance of physical objects, and the missing fetus syndrome (a direct challenge to Michael Swords' theory about interbreeding being impossible).

Carpenter mentioned that Dr. David Jacobs, PhD, a professor at Temple University, has accumulated "a refrigerator full" of substances allegedly related to reported abductions. After careful analysis, the American Bureau of Testing Standards has been unsuccessful in identifying these materials — partly because of the small size of each substance.


Three supposed implants have been proved using electron-scanning microscopes by physicists at reputable institutes with no conclusive results other than the fact that the features of the objects are strange and the objects are still unidentified.

Probably the most significant part of his speech was his stress on the data being alike in basic themes and in complex and unexpected ways. These provided correlations, i.e. relationships, which could not occur if the reports were creations of fantasy, media influences, or psychological needs of individuals. He gave as an example, an observation of a winged serpent emblem on a humanoid's uniform. This was the same emblem seen by Police Chief Herbert Schirmer in Nebraska, an event of which the other person had never heard. A total of 21 correlations were mentioned by Carpenter. In one case alone, there were 40 correlations between the details mentioned under hypnosis by two women who were abducted at the same time. The hypnosis was conducted separately for each woman. Details of their abduction matched some unpublished accounts of other cases.

Carpenter's closing statement is typical of his powerful speech: "the disruption of human lives by an extraterrestrial presence is slowly revealing itself. It is a silent epidemic that is pleading for understanding and begging for acceptance."

When Stanton Friedman makes a speech, everyone listens. He is clearly the best speaker on the UFO phenomenon in the world today and has been so for the past 21 years. With his topic "Update on Crashed Saucers in New Mexico", he captured everyone's attention in Chicago. His Saturday night speech dealt with the famous Roswell (or Corona), New Mexico crash-retrieval of July 1947, and with reports of at least two other such incidents in 1947 in that state.

For the first time, he gave us a complete historical background on the New Mexico investigation, his own ufological history and that of William L. Moore. He correctly criticized the book "The Roswell

Incident" and pointed out that Moore had also done so. Friedman managed to promote a book about the Corona C/R which he has co-written with aviation writer Don Berliner, published by Paragon Books and due out in late 1991. (Meanwhile, fiction author Sidney Sheldon has come out with a book "The Domsday Conspiracy" which describes mysterious deaths following the discovery of a downed weather balloon/UFO, published by Macmillan and number 10 on the best seller list in Canada as of October 12, 1991.)

Friedman took the opportunity to condemn Bill Cooper's book, "Behold a Pale Horse" in which Cooper said Friedman took money from the general funds of the Fund for UFO Research. As a contributor to the Fund, I know that a specific fund was set up within FUFOR to pay for Friedman's year of research on the MJ-12 papers. So Bill Cooper was lying, as Friedman stated. Friedman, a nuclear

physicist, who was born in Elizabeth, New Jersey, now lives in Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada. He said that Moore and his associate Jaime Shandera were "hooked" by the mysterious "Condor" and "Falcon" insiders "despite their failures to deliver the goods" in terms of more information about the government's involvement with UFOs.

He also came down hard on the 1988 U.S. TV show, UFO Cover-Up? Live! He said he had a difficult time getting money from the show's producers to pay for his travel to Washington for the show. He said that he, Moore and Dr. Jesse Marcel were given only their parts of the script — a script for a live TV show? And they had to read from teleprompters. He said Moore and Shandera knew there was disinformation on the show from "Falcon" and "Condor" yet they still agreed to have the two anonymous men on it. I personally know that Bill Moore is, like your Editor, an ice cream aficionado, because Moore told me so in 1982. So I was not surprised to hear from "Falcon" that the aliens love strawberry ice cream. Now we know where that came from.

Friedman told us that the payments to him for travel to Washington would be coming from Gray Advertising of New York, which has been involved with the C.I.A. for years. So we know who was behind at least part of the show. When Robert Emenegger appeared on the show, he sat beside a man who said he worked for Gray Advertising and together they vouched for the authenticity of the so-called UFO landing at Alamogordo, New Mexico and of the motion picture film of the landing — a film which Linda Howe was told about by Richard Doty.

Friedman said he had tried to get Leonard Stringfield to assist him, but "Len refused to assist me or to do the work himself," for an item on the Corona C/R for the television show Unsolved Mysteries. Stringfield, he said, "had advised Sappho" Henderson, widow of "Pappy" Henderson, who had flown some of the saucer wreckage out of Roswell to Wright Field. "not to be on the show."

Friedman also mentioned that the nurse who was based at Roswell and who was friends with town mortician Glenn Dennis, described the dead aliens. She said they had "fragile skin like an old oriental. the bone between the shoulder and elbow was longer than the bone between the elbow and wrist, and they had four fingers."

Gerald Anderson, an observer (at age five) of the crashed UFO at the Plains of San Agustin in July 1947, was interviewed by Friedman about the incident. Eventually, he was able to get Anderson to undergo hypnotic regression by John Carpenter to recall more about the scene. In 1978, copies were made of Anderson's father's diary which Anderson had obtained at his father's funeral. An account of Anderson's testimony was published in IUR's (International UFO Reporter) March 1991 issue.

Anderson's lady cousin, who wants to remain anonymous, says her father and brother died because they knew too much about the incident, whereas Anderson says they died when their car was hit by a car driven by a drunken man. Was this item in Friedman's speech seen by Sidney Sheldon or someone who knew him and gave Sheldon the idea for the

Friedman said he is now investigating a few other reports of UFO crashes. One supposedly happened in December 1947, near the Roswell Army Air Force Base; other crashes have occurred in 1948 and 1949 in New Mexico, with a few humanoids still alive and the saucers and humanoids taken to Nevada.

C.B. Scott Jones, PhD, International Studies, is former Special Assistant to U.S. Senator Claiborne Pell, a retired U.S. Navy Commander, MUFON Consultant in International Relations, former naval intelligence officer and President of the Human Potential Foundation. That is quite a prestigious background for this soft-spoken man who gave his speech, entitled "Government UFO Connections" in the parking area underneath the hotel's swimming pool.

His Sunday morning speech was rather dull as he is essentially a conservative person, a function of his maturity more than anything else. He had to speak in the basement because at 7:15 that morning, lightning hit the hotel's electrical system and knocked it out of commission until late afternoon. So a cool speech site was needed and found. He had to speak loudly as there was no microphone and we had trouble seeing him as there was only one fluorescent light bulb in the basement. Hotel guests, all 1,500 of them, including MUFON people sweltered in the heat with no microphones or lights (therefore no slides or videotapes could be shown until power was restored).

What Jones had to say told ufologists little that they could call new. He mainly reported on his own liaison with Soviet and Red China ufologists and government UFO researchers. He criticized former President Ronald Reagan's speech saying it was "frightening and dumb," in reference to alien intentions.

There is nothing like repetition to make a point, but it does make a speech hard to take — especially if the audience has read much of what the speaker is saying in articles in magazines and books. This was

the case with the speech by David Jacobs, Temple University history professor, entitled "What Can We Believe in Abduction Accounts?"

His written speech was fine, but when he was half-way through his oral version, it became tiresome to hear him repeat admonitions to researchers to be cautious when investigating abduction reports and to hypnotherapists to also use caution.

He spoke about confabulation, alien appearance descriptions, the recounting of alien communication, channeled communication, the interpretation of alien thoughts and the problem of alien images. He noted that aliens will "purposely place images in people's minds. It is very easy for abductees to confuse these images with an objective reality. The purpose of these mental procedures is, presumably, to investigate the (human) emotional reaction to the scenes." So, when an abductee sees a scene of worldwide disaster or catastrophe, it is placed there by the aliens to see how we react to the scene.

Jacobs mentioned his forthcoming book, Secret Life: The Structure and Meaning of UFO Abductions, scheduled for publication by Simon and Schuster in January 1992.

Bruce Maccabee's speech, "Gulf Breeze Without Ed" was presented on the Sunday in an auditorium next to which a religious group was having a session of hymn-singing. Since the room was lacking air-conditioning, the doors had to be left open. So the sound of music mingled with the speech to MUFON and, with no microphone, we think it was a tie between the two as to who heard what sound.

Nevertheless, Maccabee's speech was excellent (at least the part I heard).

A full appreciation of Maccabee's speech is gained by reading the printed version of the speech, however. In it, he describes UFO sightings in the Pensacola - Gulf Breeze area from 1973 to April 19, 1991. There were 270 reports with a total of more than 500 witnesses. 188 of these sightings were investigated. There were also 14 days on which there were more than two reports.

EDITOR'S COMMENT:

What is especially important for those who doubt Ed Walters' photos' reality is that a large number of people who reported UFOs in the area said, after they saw Walters' photos, that they had seen the same object as he had seen. Many of these were sightings that occurred before Walters had taken his photographs. It's easy to look at Walters' photographs and say, "They just don't look right" or "They look fake." It is less easy to actually do an investigation with a complete knowledge of physics and photography and to speak in person with all the people in the area who reported UFOs. That is what Bruce Maccabee and other MUFON members have done. None of the debunkers including Philip Klass have actually done any investigation and yet they continue to proclaim the Walters photos as hoaxes. Anyone who does less than what MUFON has done and still doubts Walters should get out of the UFO field now.

Only a small percentage of the UFO sightings in Gulf Breeze involved Ed Walters and his family. More than ten percent of the local population were observers. Many of them had close encounters,

some in broad daylight, and on November 25, 1990, three people with 35mm cameras and two with video cameras photographed one object. One videotape by Bruce Morrison lasted 70 seconds. In other cases, MUFON members were observers and took video and 35mm film of the UFOs. Maccabee has actually listed all the details of all the UFO reports in the 1974-91 period in a Table at the end of his written presentation, including the names of the observers in many instances.

A young boy named Tommy Smith had claimed that Walters had hoaxed his photographs in his presence in 1987. Maccabee very effectively showed that Smith had not been telling the truth. Smith had taken six UFO photographs and shown them to Police chief Jerry Brown. The objects in them were, according to Maccabee, "identical to what appears in many of Ed's photos." Yet Smith said that these photos were faked by Ed. Maccabee's analysis showed that "there is no evidence that the pictures were faked." The model UFO found in one of Ed Walters' houses was not used by Ed to fake photos, according to Maccabee.

It was made with drafting paper and a styrofoam plate. The drafting paper had a house plan on it and two numbers which show that it was for a house designed in September 1989, well after Ed's photos were taken. Ed himself said he hadn't make the model and others pointed out that it would not be likely that a hoaxer would be so stupid as to leave such incriminating evidence around if he did it. Ed also passed a stress analyzer lie detector test. Aside from that, the house was unlocked and anyone could have taken the model inside and planted it one night when no one would see.


The other speakers at the Symposium did not speak directly about UFOs as such so your Editor did not attend their speeches. Here, in an abbreviated form, is who they were and their topics:

Gene M. Phillips, J.D. (a lawyer to those of you unfamiliar with American university abbreviations) spoke on "Insights Into The Ancient Astronaut Theory."

"Theses for a Pre-Paradigm Science: Cereology" was the topic for Michael M. Chorost, M.A. Crop circles or agriglyphs to most of us is now known as cereology to Chorost. MUFON Journal Editor Dennis Stacy spoke on "Crop Circles: Brief History and Overview." while Colin Andrews' topic was "English Crop Circles." Chorost had to shout his speech in the hotel's parking lot on the Sunday morning due to the power failure in the hotel.

The speaker who did not show up was Professor Jean-Pierre Petit of Pommerousse, France. His speech was entitled "Has Science Anything To Do With UFO's?" In the published paper submitted, he included radar details on the two F-16 jet fighters that encountered UFOs in Belgium in November, 1989. He also described the current primitive nature of Einstein's General Relativity Theory and gave basic ideas about the magnetohydrodynamic model of UFO propulsion theory.

Next year, MUFON's symposium will be in Albuquerque, New Mexico.
