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## Watching Earth Satellites Over Toronto

A college educated lady of 34, whom we will call Elise Brown, reported a series of sightings from her home in Toronto. Not UFOs, unfortunately, merely earth satellites.

Elise said in her sighting report form that she sits outside in nice weather in her back yard. Since July, 1991, she has seen many of what she calls "moving stars". She says they appear "roundish" and have "the same colour and appearance as an average star". Like most people, she is not aware of the large number of American and Russian Earth satellites circling our planet. She says she can see "up to 15 within a two hour period". "At most," she said, "I can see two at a time."

They move "in a straight path, in various directions" - most commonly north to south or south to north. She said each one she sees appears for an average of one minute. There is no sound.

She said that in early July 1991, she saw that when a plane crossed an object's path, the object appeared to be lower than the plane.

Since your editor has observed earth satellites more than once, I knew, when I read the sighting report form, that Elise was describing satellites.

Here is Elise's description in her own words: "If there is a clear sky, I can begin observing these objects as soon as it is fully dark. They appear out of seemingly nowhere and travel in a straight path. They appear to look just like a star moving across the sky. On average, they are the same in colour, size and shape as a star. On occasion, one will increase in size, appear larger and much brighter-white intense light, and then resume its size and original

brightness after 4-5 seconds. They vary in brightness and, after observing one for approximately 20 seconds, it will suddenly fade or disappear from sight. I have seen a few that will appear, become increasingly brighter, travel or move for only a second or two and disappear."

"Where there are a few thin clouds present, I have waited for one to intersect the cloud's path. The moving star does not dim or lose its brightness, and actually appears lower than the cloud. I have, however, never seen any during an overcast night."

**Editor's Note:** The word "appears" is significant in her description because the light she sees can seem to be lower than the cloud, but actually is not.

"Recently, I spotted one of these moving stars and a jet at the same time. The plane was quite high - 20-30,000 feet (average jet, I am assuming) and travelling south-east. The moving star was travelling north-east. When they crossed paths, it was easy to judge the moving star as being much lower."

"I have not heard any accompanying sounds with these sightings and with the exception of them occasionally increasing in size, they seem quite consistent in their paths across the sky, and appear and disappear in a very abrupt manner."

I would advise our readers to further check into the Earth satellite IFO by reading the MUFON Field Investigator's Manual or by consulting NASA or a local university astronomy department. For those of you who are fairly new to ufology, you should be sure to get a basic grounding in various IFOs. Only then can you eliminate such reports and concentrate on those which do not fit the IFO (identified) category.

## Lack of Detail Clouds Two Toronto Reports

A man who works in the printing trade reported two sightings to CUFORN on May 28 of this year, both of which lacked enough information on which to base a conclusion. The major factors are that these were night sightings, and that one had no other reported observer.

The man, age 31, lives near the intersection of Yonge Street and Eglinton Avenue in mid-town Toronto, Ontario. We use the pseudonym Charles Jones for him here.

Charles' first sighting came sometime in August of 1990 in Toronto on Melrose Avenue near the intersection of Avenue Road and Lawrence Avenue West, with exact time unknown. He said, "at first I thought it was a meteorite due to the speed. Then I realized that, not only did it lack a trail, but did not fade out nearly as quickly. In fact, it seemed to cover 2/3 of the sky before it faded quickly and briefly. Then to my disbelief, it continued, but now at a 90 degree angle perpendicular to its previous direction, than vanished. The sighting occurred at about 11:00 pm, with no other witnesses. I would guess that the object travelled south over Mississauga, paused briefly over Lake Ontario, then continued east over the lake."

**Editor's Comment:** August is the month for the annual Perseid meteor shower. Not all meteors have trails. It is possible that he saw two meteorites and thought that it was one which somehow faded out and returned in brightness at a different angle. No firm conclusion as to what he saw can be made as there were no other observers, as far as we know.

Charles' second report was in the area in which he now lives, occurring on May 24, 1992 at around 9:00 pm. The night was clear, with a few stars and no moon showing. The evening was cool.

Let's let him tell it in his own words: "Duration of sighting was very brief: two seconds or less. The object travelled north in a straight line and disappeared. My view and that of my lady friend 'Jill' was obstructed by apartment buildings to our north."

"Since we can see many airplanes on any given day from our apartment, their velocity and the intensity of their lights are well known and easily recognized. The very bright nature of this light and its apparent speed, therefore, was quite obvious in contrast to the airplanes. I have also seen orbiting satellites and can conclude with certainty that it was not that. More closely than anything it resembled a meteorite, but without the 'trail' and with much greater intensity."

"I would guess the object travelled north over Bayview Avenue, perhaps farther east (Don Valley?)."

What he saw was a round light at an angle of 60 degrees above the horizon. It was white with fuzzy edges and was the size of a dime held at arm's length. It moved at the speed of a meteorite. His friend and he were inside at the time of their observation. At most, this was a nocturnal light, at the least it was a report which could be an IFO of the meteorite variety.

# Multiple Observer Daylight Disc Reported Over Lake Ontario

A writer and producer whom we will call Hal Wilson and a neighbour we will call Mary saw what may have been a large UFO at a distance on June 30, 1991 in Toronto, Ontario.

We will let "Hal" tell of the sighting in his own words here: "It was 9:05 pm. I was sitting in my neighbour's back yard. We were talking and I noticed a jet (DC-9, I think Air Canada) flying due east, low in the sky. I had seen another jet on the same flight path moments earlier, and had commented to my neighbour that it seemed odd for jets that had taken off from Pearson to still be at such a low altitude at this point. (NOTE: I saw only those two jets during the two hours or so that we were outside.)"

"As the DC-9 passed by, I noticed an object beyond and well above it. I immediately said, 'what is that?' There were no stars out yet and the object clearly was not the moon. It appeared to be hovering at a very high altitude, but I could not have discerned a low rate of speed if, indeed, it was moving at one."


"I pointed the object out to my neighbour and she agreed that it wasn't a star or the moon. It appeared slightly smaller than a dime held at arm's length. There was a discernible 'roundness' or

depth to it, ie: it was not flat. We agreed that if the object were at as high an altitude as it appeared, it would have to have been very large to be seen from the ground."


"At this point, say 9:10 pm, thin clouds partially obscured our view of the object. I sat down and noticed its position had changed in relation to the top of the back yard fence. The object had moved southward, and now a high rate of speed was apparent. I'd say it passed through 15-20 degrees of arc in about 20 seconds. I looked away from the object for no more than five seconds to comment on the object's motion. When I looked again, it was gone. There was some cloud cover over the lake, so perhaps the object moved behind it, if it continued south. (NOTE: At the time of the sighting, I wondered if perhaps there might have been a weather balloon launched from Toronto Island Airport. If it was a weather balloon, then I guess it could have been much lower than suggested above.)"

Hal noted on the CUFORN sighting report form that the wind that night at ground level was practically non-existent, at 0-5 mph. He also noted that the weather conditions were excellent, warm, but not too humid. He said his vision is 20/25, with excellent hearing. Hal said the object was white/silver. He was not sure if the object's edges were sharp or fuzzy as it was too far away to tell.

The ten minute observation occurred as the sun was about 20 minutes from setting and was fairly low in the west. The sky was clear with occasional high thin cloud. Hal is a college graduate from the Canadian province of Quebec.




This perspective is fairly accurate - 9:05 p.m. - from a sitting position in my neighbor's back yard



## Orange Nocturnal Light Reported Over Toronto by Private Pilot in 1991




It was 7:24 pm on the night of March 12, 1991, when a trained private pilot and ham radio operator, now working in the computer field in Toronto, Ontario, saw a large, oddly-shaped orange UFO speed across the city. Max Flint (a pseudonym) was standing still in a semi-trailer parking lot next to a high-rise apartment. He was looking up to see if he could find the Soviet Mir space satellite.

He saw a light estimated as the size of a dime if held at arm's length. It was "bright orange" and moved in a clear night sky with visibility unlimited. The sighting lasted an estimated one minute and 45 seconds. There were a few stars visible, but no moon in view. It was a calm night with good weather. He said it moved at about 1,000 km per hour and changed direction. He said it appeared to be 8 to 10 kilometers high.

Flint said the light had sharp edges and was at a 75 degree angle above the horizon. He also reported that its brightness was equivalent to a star of Magnitude 1.

## Abduction Account Kidney Infection Healed by "Greys"

Alvina Scott is a soft-spoken and very modest lady in her thirties who resides near the coastal city of Vancouver. To the best of her conscious recollection, she had a series of direct encounters with aliens beginning in 1985. During that year Alvina was living on the outskirts of the city in a populated area only a few hundred feet from a hydroelectric power substation on the ground floor of a three level apartment building. A small craft landed in the back alley near her window two hours before sunrise. Mass autosuggestion was apparently used on the drivers in the area not to park their cars nearby and to keep others in a sleep holding pattern so they would not wake up. As she was taken out of the window, Alvina was told that she was being placed into a black limousine; however, this automobile "took up two parking spaces and made a whooshing sound".

Alvina had a kidney problem at that time. The pain was so bad and the organ was in such poor shape that her own physician wanted to remove it. The "aliens" removed eggs from Alvina telling her that they merely wished to examine them. At a later date she discovered this was not entirely accurate. "They" also performed an operation on her kidney, cutting between the cells and leaving no scars. An implant, which later showed under ultrasound to the astonishment of the attending medical technician, was left inside to ease the pain. It later flushed out through the urinary tract and was lost in the toilet. She was led to believe that the visitors were human looking, but later discovered that they were the so-called "greys" (large bald craniums, short stature, large wrap-around eyes) who were projecting a telepathic illusion. She was able to recall events con-

sciously without the aid of hypnosis as a result of a traumatic miscarriage.

On the craft, Alvina was shown full adult bodies which were grown from a fetal state in four days and were floating in tanks. She was told that they were cloned from the occupants to transplant organs and prolong their own lives. The bodies contained no essence or spirit. Alvina did not feel comfortable with this information and the response was that we do it to animals. During her first encounter, Alvina had a discussion with a female who did not understand why we "spill or waste our seed, why we pollute our atmosphere, and treat our fellow humans with such disrespect". In the second encounter which took place during my investigation, there were other abducted Earth humans both male and female having their eggs and sperm removed. This took place in a much larger vessel in space.

The abductee was shown the products of conception, three children in all. One was human looking "with a badly misshapen mouth" and the other two were cloned "grey" twins who asked her to teach them everything she knows in case some time in the future they had to live amongst us. She refused to cooperate or acknowledge they were her own. After her experiences Alvina Scott became a part-time minister (Christian), her religious beliefs and lifestyle completely changed and she quit eating meat.

## The Long and Winding Road: Investigators and Instigators

In the past 15 years as a co-director of CUFORN I have had the great opportunity and learning experience that comes from dealing with a diverse cross-section of the "come and go" variety of researchers and investigators. My experiences with the many personalities who gravitate towards this rich field of study have been both rewarding and disappointing, but nevertheless always enlightening. Apart from the actual case studies and witness reports, the people who have been either mildly or obsessively attracted to the actual field of investigation could constitute a volume of research in itself, and in many cases far surpass the "strangeness factor" of the actual UFO reports themselves.

The "staying power" of individuals who enter the field has always been of great interest to me from a psychological point-of-view and I have often been surprised at the apparent pattern that emerges once one has had the opportunity to view the situation from the larger perspective. For instance, people who have been suspicious over some period of time about a latent UFO abduction experience but can never quite put their finger on it will develop strong subliminal tendencies to hook up with UFO research networks and offer their services. At the same time, these same types may be fearful of discovering their own possible role in the very phenomenon they have volunteered to help research. An odd paradox indeed, but ultimately the necessary regressive hypnosis required to open up mental blocks tends to frighten them off and some prefer to deal with the subject on a conscious and disassociative level. Quite often they make fine investigators, and their own suspected continuing abduction experiences tend to prolong their staying power. However, on the negative side, their investigations have tended to take on a subjective approach due to their own subconscious impulses and we are always left wondering if the results of their case investigations on others will reveal a clear, untainted picture of the relevant events. On the other hand, perhaps their own experiences actually enhance the relevant data. Either way, we win. The cases always produce a wealth of information.

Another type of individual who turns up in this field quite often, is the apparently well-intentioned methodical skeptic who wishes to approach the phenomenon from "his own angle". He or she claims to be fairly well read and arrogantly thinks they can ignore past history and precedent and "solve" the cases with not a great amount of difficulty. After all, he or she is operating on the basis that they are totally "objective" and that most other researchers are too prone to be "believers" and have done everything wrong in the past 40 years. Here comes the crunch. When you take the time to "discover" these individuals (and sometimes this is no easy task since they protect their privacy) one finds astonishing evidence that these people have done no more homework than cursorily reading some snippets from magazines and journals, have rarely ever completely read a single recognized and credible book on the subject, and overall have deep emotionally-rooted biases on the subject in general. If pushed, they will reluctantly admit that they do not for one second accept even the remote possibility that alien spacecraft exist and that abductions occur. If you are currently trying to work with such a person, you are wasting your time and resources and will inevitably be steered in the wrong direction. To what end? To the ultimate amusement of the so-called unconventional investigator. The truth in almost every case is that the background research this person has done is entirely selective, not overall and his mind is already made up. They will always tell you to your face that they are entirely objective and are only looking for the truth. The truth in this case is always pre-determined and totally subjective.

A litmus test of a good investigative group is basically how people relate to the "belief structure" in this field. The most meticulous researchers often have an immediate idea of what this syndrome means and will immediately substitute this commonly misused word (belief) for "acceptance after overwhelming circumstantial evidence". These people know only too well, both instinctively and from the sheer weight of 40 years of good work from people smarter than themselves, that not only should one not delude oneself into believing that there are any cases that rate 100%, but also that the many "dead ends and false leads" in a legitimate case are not only consistent arrow-guides but also indications that the intelligence behind the phenomenon is not ready to give up its covert operational secrets.

We may never actually nail it down to the satisfaction of the masses. We may most likely satisfy only ourselves, since only those who have unpretentiously looked hard at the bulk of evidence will know the undercurrents that work to keep the truth from the public mind.

In all, we need not only to look carefully at the case studies but just as carefully at the self-professed investigators who reject all past testimony and are only concerned with "solving the mystery".

In the final analysis their "staying power" is directly proportionate to the time it takes to expose them and their personal agenda. A plaque can be earnestly dedicated to these people and the motto will always apply... "it can't be, therefore it's impossible". An extraordinary little curio is that these types of investigators are often not even aware, consciously, that their "mind has been made up" and therefore much of the data they accumulate becomes subconsciously irrelevant. Interesting? Yes, but the problem compounds when witnesses and groups are conned by such individuals. The ultimate result is that research is set back and a lot of good data is tossed out, ultimately creating a false impression to a curious but skeptical public.

Those of us who have taken the time to look at all aspects of this phenomenon are acutely aware that serious research will only bring us closer but the ultimate truth of it all will only emerge through an "accident" planned or otherwise, and so it's absolutely essential that we align ourselves with those who can work on this level.



## What Ever Happened to Investigative Journalism?

The electronic media, by its very nature, is a hindrance to the spread of any information which falls outside the narrow field of our everyday experience. Radio and television are concerned mainly with maintaining and reinforcing the rituals of our daily life, not with expanding cultural horizons or promoting even casual investigation into the world around us.

For instance, a short time ago radio news programs were reporting a somewhat fantastic story unfolding on a Northern Manitoba Indian Reserve.

Over the course of five or six days, natives reported a blurred vision of the Virgin Mary developing across the outside of a homestead doorway. Excited locals reported a bright pulsing light hanging directly over the doorway at night. According to the newscaster, no explanation could be given for these phenomena although it was suggested that the unidentified light was extraterrestrial in origin.

The context that this story appears in and what that context tells us about the attitudes of the media towards this kind of subject should be of interest to us. This story was broadcast as a 7 second sound bite buried in the corpse of a 30 second news block. It ran in between ads for running shoes and songs which in themselves are ads for even more shoes, jackets and hats.

From this background and from the tone of the announcer's voice we are given the behavioural cues which tell us how to respond to the context of the piece.

The message carried by the newsman's voice is not the story of the unexplained in Manitoba, but is the suggestion that stories of this nature are unbelievable, are nice filler, good entertainment, but little else. A 7 second report on an event which, if verifiable, would radically alter all of our cultural parameters is ridiculous. The length of the piece tells the listener to immediately disregard it. Nobody in their right mind would file a report that was so incomplete and so sensational about a legitimate issue.

Semantically, the story of the doorway Virgin Mary and the irregular supernova is an interesting comment on the attitudes of the broadcast community. The incident described takes place in an isolated community. The fact is that this tale has nothing whatsoever to do with our daily lives here in the big urban sprawl. Religion in general and the Virgin Mary in particular, have long since lost any relevance to the hustle and economic worship of the downtown streets. To a typical apartment dweller she is no threat at all, no threat to our firmly established scientific order, no threat to our tightly wound social spheres.

Sadly, such a news piece is indicative of what people want to hear. Radio stations, after all, are a business like any other. Certainly no call to research or curiosity will come from outside the ufological community. Instead, as always, investigation must come from within.
