



## Skeptical Artist Changes Opinion After CE3 in Hungary

Gabor Molnar, a painter living in Hajduboszormeny, Hungary had a strange encounter one night in early December, 1990.

The event occurred on a section of Highway 35 between Debrecen and his home town, near the turn-off at Bodaszolo. The former geography teacher was driving a regular route on the highway. Before this encounter, he was not interested in UFOs. He has not read books or articles about this phenomenon. But, after it, his attitude totally changed - "Now I believe in UFOs without any doubt and I am willing to be taken again," said Molnar after the encounter.

Molnar did not recall the exact date. At that time, he only told his wife who did not believe him. The painter had not spoken about it because he did not want to make a fool of himself. He was sure people would not believe him.

The story would have remained a secret if he had not talked about UFOs with his journalist friend, Peter Tarczy, who is editor of the local newspaper in his home town, the Szabad Hajdu. Driving from Nyiregyhaza to his home town, they talked about UFOs. Tarczy's interest in UFOs impelled Molnar to tell him what happened.

"Peter," said Gabor, "a very strange thing happened to me one year ago. Please do not laugh if I tell it." Naturally, his friend listened to him with attention.

"I'll never forget that night. Last year, in the beginning of December, it happened. Do not ask the day because I do not know exactly."

"My daughter was perilously ill and an ambulance took her to the hospital at Debrecen. My wife was with her. I visited her several times a day. I was

concerned with my daughter's condition. I lost my sense of time. On that night, I remained in the hospital very late as usual until I was asked to go home. The time might have been about 10 or 10:30 p.m. Driving home just past Jozsa, my car stopped at Melyvolgy (Deep Valley) - I did not know why - and then the engine stopped also. I remember a little green being stood facing me at the roadside. His eyes were large - out of proportion. What happened after, I do not know. Only some fragments of memory remained in my mind. I have a dim recollection of a room with several windows and I lay on something. I suppose I was examined. I remember green beings bent over me who looked at me with large eyes that had no pupils. I do not know what they did with me nor how much time I spent with them."

### Opposite Direction

"When I recovered, I was sitting in my car. The car was in the middle of the road at an angle, facing Debrecen, in the opposite direction. I do not know the exact time. I started my car and I came home."

The section of Highway 35 mentioned, the Melyvolgy, leads along a depression, which is very rare in lowlands. The roadside is hilly, full of bushes and shrubs. This place is very suitable for a vehicle of an unknown civilization to land and stand unnoticed. Gabor was abducted at one end of this valley. Since this spot is close to two other UFO landing places (the distances are 1.5km and 3.5km, respectively) it seems possible that the cases might be related to each other.

### Three Dreams


We asked Gabor whether he could find some changes or traces on his body, but he did not notice anything. He said that before the encounter, he had no headaches, but since it, he has them often. Since then, he also has dreamt of these same little green beings three times and the dreams were the same in content. He remembered the dreams while he was painting, not just after awakening. It is possible that these memories are not part of a previous dream, but

are parts of a real experience.

One aftereffect seems most important. Since the encounter, his painting style has changed greatly. Formerly he painted landscapes and portraits. But recently, a cosmic landscape without any human being or organism — a stony, cold, brittle and strange world — can be seen in his paintings.

Peter Tardy, journalist and art critic, wrote an article in Szabad Hajdu on September 11, 1991, commenting on the new exhibition of Gabor's paintings: "Gabor Molnar has had a good reputation, but his new paintings greatly surprised his artistic friends too."

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

This Easter, John III (who, among other things, is teaching English at the University of Minnesota, Crookston), my other son, Peter, a reporter for the Bismarck Tribune and I all junketed to southwestern Wisconsin where we again visited all the trails and sites relating to our very friendly and congenial 1988 close encounter with the ETs. We had a great time and it was tough to leave the scene of our 1988 memories and the beautiful geography and our several new human friends. Among other things, John III and I now realize, after having gone over the LaCrosse piece of things very thoroughly during this last trip, that things were more complex there than we'd realized: "high strangeness" had begun as soon as we hit the edge of the LaCrosse metro area, back in '88; after we left the Mobil station followed by the strange little man (whom we now believe may well have been an ET spotter or monitor). There was — still in LaCrosse - a stretch which I, driving, did not remember but which John III did; and then there was a stretch which I remember and he didn't, and then a long stretch in LaCrosse which neither of us remember — and then landmarks in the hills just beyond LaCrosse which we remember. Then, of course, shortly thereafter, only two or three miles beyond LaCrosse, gentle double-amnesia enveloped us both and we remained in that state until we hit the short stretch of four lane (on Highway 14) 60 miles hence. There, as you'll recall, the amnesia lifted — we feel to give us a touchpoint for future geographical and time reference; and then, of course, at the end of the two mile stretch of four lane, the amnesia gently closed in again for our almost 90 minute meeting with the friendly ETs on and off the rugged, lonely Pier Spring Road near Richland Center, Wisconsin. We conjecture that, in the LaCrosse setting, the ETs were adjusting their controls over our respective physiological "frequencies". John was "up" and I was "down" then I was up and he was down, etc.

### The Little Blue Book of UFOs: The Extra-Terrestrial in Canada

*This really is a little book: 4.25" by 3". Mr. Colombo, "Canada's Master Gatherer" of Canadiana, has compiled comments on UFOs "from men and women who are reporters, observers, commentators, researchers, investigators, collectors, witnesses, contactees, abductees, proponents, opponents, sceptics, psychics, astronomers, philosophers, etc." As with his earlier book on UFOs, UFOs Over Canada (excerpted in BAE Vol. 2, No. 6), all quotations have a Canadian connection of some kind. A delight to read.*

"On a per-capita basis, more Canadians report UFO sightings than do people of any other country." J. Allen Hynek, U.S. astronomer and UFO investigator, characteristic remark.

"It is probably sufficient to say that Canadian UFOlogy is not so easily pigeon-holed as American and European versions, and although we have certain traits of both groups, the "loneliness of the long-distance UFOlogist" has made us more loners, and hence more independent." Chris Rutkowski, Winnipeg-based UFOlogist, "A Canadian Perspective" International UFO Reporter, Jan-Feb 1990.

"Perhaps there is a hopeful possibility here in the conquest of outer space. Inter-

## If Bill Refuses to Spill the Beans, Maybe Perot Has Some Answers

WASHINGTON - Protestors plan to march on the White House Monday "to get Bill Clinton to tell the truth" - about UFOs.

Members of Operation Right to Know want the president to acknowledge that unidentified flying objects exist and to release government data documenting sightings. "It used to be that the UFO community was afraid of ridicule, and we were staying home. Now we're not staying home," says Elaine Douglass, a spokeswoman for the group, which has offices here and in Georgia and California.

"Our main goal is to end UFO secrecy," says Donald Ratsch, an organizer at Operation Right to Know, which counts about 150 subscribers to its newsletter. "This is a demonstration to end disinformation regarding government contact with other worlds."

The group claims that the U.S. government has had information documenting the existence of visitors from outer space since 1947. In a press release, the group contends that people claiming to have seen UFOs are everywhere. The release says, for example, that in Union Grove, Wis., a man was driving on Highway 11 and saw a very large UFO "about the size of three football fields."

About a half-dozen members of the group warmed up for the White House march with a protest yesterday outside offices of the Washington Post, charging that the paper's top editors and intelligence reporters wouldn't read their materials. Some carried signs saying "The Post has a flat Earth mindset on UFOs." But Washington Post Managing Editor Robert Kaiser says he did indeed read some of the material, adding that some of it was "provocative" and that the Post is "checking it out."

Various federal agencies have looked into UFOs over the years. But, says David D. Wippel, executive director of the Association of Former Intelligence Officers, "I see no reason why the government would withhold information, if there were any information."

Members of Operation Right to Know sent a letter to President Clinton, asking him to meet with the group and to disclose what he knows about UFOs. Ms. Douglass says the president did respond with a form letter saying he will take the group's ideas into consideration and keep them close to his heart. But Mr. Clinton declined to attend a meeting.



## STRIEBER ENDS COMMUNION WITH UFO SUBCULTURE

Betty Hill is not the only leading light of the alien abduction movement to have become disillusioned. So has Whitley Strieber, whose bestsellers *Communion* and *Transformation* acquainted many with the subject.

In a letter sent during March and April 1991 to subscribers of his now-defunct *Communion Letter*, he wrote: "I am not a UFO researcher and do not wish to endure the continued media attack that is associated with being involved in this field. In addition, the so-called 'UFOlogists' are probably the cruellest, nastiest and craziest people I have ever encountered." He complained that the ufologists' interpretation of the visitor experience is incorrect. He said the abduction reports were "artifacts of hypnosis and cultural conditioning."

He still claimed that the visitor experience is a perceptual anomaly which "is the cause of religion, of mythology, of folklore" and, of course, presently the abduction enigma. He characterized the phenomena as "a human thing" which shows how strange the world really is.

The phenomenon, whatever its nature, has netted him a fair amount of money, and may continue doing so. His publisher advances for *Communion* and *Transformation* were substantial, and he and his production company Phesantry Films, Inc. were awarded a \$113 million dollar default judgment on September 5, 1990, by a Texas judge as a result of a lawsuit against Virgin Vision, Inc., the distributor of the home video version of the movie *Communion*. Since *Virgin Vision* and its parent Management Company Entertainment Group are reportedly not in good financial shape, Strieber and his associates may never be paid the judgment.

The film *Communion* did a mere \$2 million during its 1989 theatrical release, but was said to have done far better on home video.

Given Strieber's present opinions, will any follow-up to the movie, such as a film of his novel *Majestic*—at one time announced as being in preparation—be made with his participation?

## BETTY HILL LEAVES UFOLOGY: TOO MANY "FLAKES"

Betty Hill is retiring from UFO-related public appearances. With husband Barney Hill—since deceased—she was, during the mid-1960s, hypnotized by Dr. Benjamin Simon, uncovering "memories" of being abducted by aliens in New Hampshire in 1961.

Ever since John G. Fuller's book *The Interrupted Journey* and the TV-movie adaptation *The UFO Incident*, Betty Hill has been a celebrity of sorts, and has continued to see innumerable "UFOs." Disturbed that too many "flakes" are now reporting UFOs, she has decided to distance herself from the subculture.

Dear Friend:

Every so often an especially good idea for UFO research comes along that deserves our all-out support. Something that promises to pay large dividends for all of us who are seeking the truth about UFOs. One of those is Dan Wright's exciting proposal to establish a national computer data base on UFO abduction cases. Let me explain why this is important.

Although abduction reports are being made in record numbers, and are increasingly being taken seriously in the news media and professional circles, we know very little about what is going on. Actually we don't even know whether the reports are increasing, or only becoming more visible.

Despite the excellent work of major researchers and authors, we have no complete overview of the numbers, the substance, the frequency, or the distribution of abduction reports.

Typical news media questions asked of researchers are: How many abduction reports are there in the U.S. or around the world? What is the most common description of the aliens? Is the phenomenon becoming more common? Are there new trends in what is being reported? The honest answer to all these questions is, "We don't know."

Actually, we have no way of knowing because each researcher (no matter how many abductees he or she has interviewed) sees only part of the picture. And other than Eddie Bullard's catalogue of cases compiled over five years ago, no one has combined the information obtained by major researchers into a single large data base for study.

Now, thanks to Dan Wright and the Mutual UFO Network (MUFON), a project is underway to lay the groundwork for a study of all the data available. A proposal for support of this project has been approved for funding by the National Board of the Fund for UFO Research. It is also endorsed by leading UFO researchers whose statements are enclosed.

The project involves transcription of hundreds and hundreds of audiotaped interviews and hypnotic regression sessions with abductees, and encoding of the data in a computer for retrieval and analysis. For the first time, we will have a sufficiently large computer data base to begin getting some answers to vitally important questions.

---

Here's how it works. Cooperating abduction researchers (including Budd Hopkins, David Jacobs, and John Carpenter) submit their audiotapes--or already completed transcripts--to Dan Wright. Dan has already organized and has in place a network of MUFON members who are skilled transcribers. They operate under a strict code of confidentiality and a quality control system.

The tapes are transcribed, the transcripts archived by MUFON, and the tapes and a copy of the transcript returned to the researcher. This saves busy researchers a lot of time and money for transcription costs. And furthermore, MUFON even refunds the postage costs! This part of the program is well underway; tapes are being transcribed and the information is being compiled.

The next step--a vital one--involves obtaining the computer equipment and a system to input all the descriptive information from the transcripts into the data base and to provide for its retrieval and study using standard indexing methods and analytical programs. The equipment would be maintained and operated by Dan, but would revert to MUFON for use elsewhere if for any reason he were unable to continue the program.

As another step toward implementing the full program, MUFON recently contributed a laser-jet printer for Dan's use. Other equipment needed includes a computer powerful enough to handle large amounts of data and an optical character reader to accelerate input of the data.

In order to process and analyze the information and make the results available to all researchers and to the public, however, we need contributions to acquire the necessary computer equipment.

We hope to raise \$3,000-\$4,000 for the abduction data base program before the end of 1993. The Fund has already committed about \$1,500 from contributions earmarked for that purpose by contributors. That leaves only about \$2,000 to go.

Your tax-deductible contributions for this project can put it over the top, and you will be able to take pride in the accomplishment you have made possible. At last we will be on the road to learning more about the nature and meaning of UFO abductions.





## Researcher Battles Military UFO Censorship -- with First-Amendment Lawsuit . . .

When CAUS official Larry W. Bryant began submitting UFO-related letters-to-the-editor to several military "commercial enterprise" newspapers in the national capital region, he fully expected that the letters would be published. After all, it was his ground-breaking efforts several years ago that freed up the advertising pages of those newspapers for his series of "UFO-coverup whistleblower ads" aimed at ferreting out hidden official information about the Cosmic Watergate.

That victory -- achieved by a "consent judgment" in Count No. 1 of the lawsuit Bryant v. Weinberger, et al.\* -- reinforced the access of such "message" advertisers to the ad pages of weekly newspapers like the Pentagram.

Government-published and government-owned, but printed and distributed under contract by a local commercial printing firm, the Pentagram professes to be an unofficial medium of communication between the commander of the U. S. Army Military District of Washington and his assigned military and civilian personnel.

"Ironically," says Bryant, "my UFO-related ads containing editorial views now can be printed without the previous interference from the MDW public affairs office. But when I convert or expand such an ad to the format of a letter-to-the-editor, the P.A.O. insists he has a right to censor or otherwise reject it. My latest lawsuit seeks to end that censorship, on the grounds of First-Amendment, free-speech access to the Pentagram's 'designated public forum' called the letters column. What's more, this arbitrary censorship serves to deny full freedom of press to me and to my fellow readers of the Pentagram."



The lawsuit, captioned Larry W. Bryant v. Secretary of the Army, includes as a defendant the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. "The center's newspaper, the Stripe, has refused to print my letter seeking whistleblower testimony and 'UFOrensic' evidence surrounding retrieval and autopsy of the occupants from two 'flying discs' that crash-landed near Roswell, N.M., in July 1947," Bryant says.

Accordingly, he has retained the services of Washington, D.C., attorney James H. Heller, who filed the suit June 23, 1993, as Civil Action No. 93-1289 in U. S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

Bryant hopes the suit "will counter this prior-restraint censorship" as well as encourage current and former government officials to join the movement for greater freedom of UFO information/discussion.
