BEAVER CREEK, Manitoba. 89-06-20

On 89-06-20 at 1010 hours, Oliver CAMERON (B.D. 52-04-20), contacted the R.C.M.P. Arborg Detachment advising he and his friends observed an object fly over them and observed RED, WHITE and BLUE lights. They heard no noise.

Investigation showed that CAMERON, accompanied by Delmar Wilfred CAMERON (B.D. 54-09-04) and Barney Maurice ROSS (B.D. 49-07-30) from the Peguis I.R., (ROSS is from the JACKHEAD I.R.), were driving down the Pine Dock Road at approximately 0030 hours and 0100 hours, 89-6-20. The area is mostly Crown Owned Land with intermittent farms. The subjects described the weather as CLOUDY with a wind blowing and a storm with lightning off in the distance. As they neared WASEAW BAY, they observed a bright white light to the west, below the clouds. This light was 500 - 800 meters above the ground and about 1/2 kilometer west of the road. CAMERON said the light lit up the field. They parked their truck at the junction of the Pine Dock Road, (P.R. 234), and another road (unknown) and observed this light. The light would come down and then go back up. They also noticed a red light. They said the light went right over them and they did not detect any noise. CAMERON describes seeing BLUE, YELLOW, GREEN and RED lights as it flew about 400 meters over their heads.

The light then moved very quickly towards Lake Winnipeg until it went out of sight.

They went down to the lake and observed a red light close to the water about 1/2 km. off shore. They watched this light for about 1 hour.

ROSS gave basically the same description of events. He describes the light as bright as "A LARGE CAR LIGHT". He further describes the lights as heart shaped, about the size of a vehicle. He confirms there was no noise.

Fisher Branch R.C.M.P. interviewed all three witnesses. Statements obtained from ROSS and CAMERON. No statement was taken from Delmar CAMERON as his story is much the same as his brother Oliver. Both statements are attached.

Fisher Branch member advises he felt all persons interviewed are sincere in what they saw.

This matter is being concluded at our point and forwarded to your department.

This is the statement of Oliver Charles CAMERON (B.D. 52-04-20) taken at Peguis Indian Reserve, Manitoba on 89-07-12 at 19:40 hours.

On the 20th. of June 1989 I, Barney ROSS and my brother Delmar CAMERON were on the Beaver Creek Road at approximately 12:30 - 1:00a.m. We were heading S. on the Beaver Creek Road, before the Washaw Bay Jct.Rd., when I spotted a light in the sky about 1500 - 2000 feet above ground and about ½ mile away. When I first saw it it looked like a large spot light shining on the field below. It lit up the field. We then parked at the junction and put the lights out in the vehicle. We got out of the vehicle and were watching it. It was moving and would come down quite low and go back up. It also had a red light. It looked really big from a distance and it went right over us. There was no sound at all. When it went over it must have been about 1000 ft. high. At this time I noticed it had different coloured lights. Blue, yellow and green., and the red light was also on. It looked a bit like a diamond shape. It moved fairly fast and when it came towards us we never had a chance to get in the vehicle because it happened so fast it came right over us. It went over the trees and headed for Lake Winnipeg. It was travelling east. The lights remained the same colours until it was out of sight. We then went to the lake and saw a big red light on top of the lake. The light was red at this time and it was going up and down with the waves. We observed that up to about 1 hour. We then left and came home. From start to finish it lasted about 2 to 3 hours. When we saw it on the lake it must have been about ½ mile off shore.

When we first saw the light above the field it was very bright. But when we saw it fly over us it lost some of the brightness. The sky at the time was cloud covered. It was blowing hard that night and the light was travelling in the same direction as the wind. It was also lightning as a bit of a storm was coming. We were not drinking that night. When the light was above the field it would stay in one spot for up to 10 minutes or so without moving. I have no idea what the light was.


This is the statement of Barney Maurice ROSS (B.D. 49-07-30) taken at Jackhead Indian Reserve, Man. on 89-07-11 at 19:30 hours.

On the 20th. of June at about 1:00a.m. I, Delmar CAMERON and Oliver CAMERON were hunting. We were near the WASHAW BAY junction on the Beaver Creek Rd. when we saw a light. It was like a car light. It was about $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile away to the west of us; near the fields. We were just coming home. We stopped on the corner and were just having some coffee and sandwiches. Then we seen the light. We were sitting there in the truck without lights. I seen this light and thought it was a plane. It was cloudy and the light was hanging below the clouds sitting in one place. Once in a while it would move back and forth. North and South. Once in a while it disappeared in that same area. So all of a sudden it came on again. It was closer even closer then a quarter of a mile. It was a white light. We sat there looking at it. Oliver CAMERON was pretty nervous. He thought he was spotted by someone who didn't want him hunting. He said lets get out of here; We've been spotted by the Conservation Officers. So when we were just going to take off and put the lights on the light kind of exploded and became blue in colour and kind of disappeared. We put the lights back off again and that light came back on almost right above us. It was about 100 yards above us. The light was white and about the size of a large car light and it had disappeared again when numerous other smaller lights came on in the shape of a heart. The lights were also white. The heart was about the size of a vehicle. It went by us and went N.E. and kept it's heart shape. There was no noise at all. As we watched it head away a red light appeared at the back and kept going. It went N.E. and disappeared into the trees with the red light on. The white lights kept it heart shape. As it disappeared into the trees we turned back towards Beaver Creek and we went right into the park near the lake shore. As we got to the lake shore we looked around and we saw it in the water or just above the water. We just saw the red light going up and down. It looked like it was in the water. We sat there for $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour to 45 minutes looking at it in the water. It was about $\frac{1}{2}$ ways between Beaver Creek and GRINDSTONE POINT, which is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles where the light was. We then left and went home. From beginning to end must have lasted about 2 to 3 hours.


In this vein, would you be willing to place a small notice in your bulletin/correspondence for me? You see I am currently collecting cases of two kinds:

Autopsy or Fraud-topsy?

A "documentary" about a purported alien stirs the liveliest debate of any home movie since the Zapruder film

ON AN OPERATING TABLE IN A small white room, a naked humanoid creature lies supine and inert—its stomach bulbous; its six fingers slightly curled; a deep, 30-cm-long gash in its right leg. Two humans in white contamination suits circle the creature, slicing its chest, sawing its skull in half, removing internal organs. A third takes notes on a sheet of paper. Behind a window, a fourth person watches, hidden by a surgical mask. The only identifiable figure is the humanoid. Its face shows strain, perhaps pain. When the camera recording the event catches the creature's sightless gaze, an eerie poignance fills the chamber.

The 17-minute film, silent and in muzzy black and white, has enough implicit melodrama to fill a satisfying sci-fi epic. But some people believe, or hope, that it may be genuine—evidence of an alien life form on earth, conceivably connected with the report (and alleged U.S. government cover-up) of a UFO crash near Roswell, New Mexico, in 1947. Professional skeptics find the film a clever or clumsy hoax. Others believe it's real, but not from Roswell. The ufological combatants duel it out in magazines and on the Internet while poring over the footage with an intensity not lavished on

any home movie since the Zapruder film of President Kennedy's assassination.

The controversy has created a hot little industry. Ray Santilli, the Englishman who is peddling the footage, says it has been seen in 32 countries. Britain's Channel Four aired a documentary on the subject. In the U.S., an hour-long show called *Alien Autopsy: Fact or Fiction?* has become a staple of Fox TV—the *X-Files* network—and has been among the top 25 sellers in U.S. video stores. Before the end of the year, the tape will be offered in 35 catalogs, including the Publishers Clearing House mailings.

The Fox show, with Jonathan Frakes of *Star Trek: The Next Generation* as host, debuted to surprisingly high ratings in late August. It was hastily scheduled to play again a week later with some un-aired footage. The program will air a third time on Saturday, with clips that may reveal hints of the alien's spacecraft and language. Says executive producer Robert Kiviat: "We're approaching it like a detective story." By doling out a few new clues in each episode, *Alien Autopsy* could end up running more times than this season's drama *Murder One*.

Santilli says that on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio, in 1992, he met an elderly man who identified himself as a former U.S. Army photographer present at the autopsy of the Roswell alien, performed

at Fort Worth Army Air Field. This man, says Santilli, offered to sell the movies he made there. Says the entrepreneur: "The whole thing was just way too fascinating to let go." The mysterious cameraman still declines to reveal himself, though Santilli says, "I think he will step forward within the very near future."

He will have a few questions to answer from a host of instant film critics. Why does the film go so conveniently out of focus at crucial moments? Why is the camerawork so jumpy, in a modern fashion, instead of having the smoothness that even World War II combat cameramen aimed for? Why hasn't the original film stock been submitted to Eastman Kodak, which has a standing offer to do a chemical analysis that would verify if it was indeed manufactured in 1947? Why are there film cuts, suggesting a lapse in time, that return to the same continuous incision? Judging by shots of a wall clock, an autopsy of this importance took only 2½ hours? It's no wonder that nearly all special-effects artists think this is bogus. Says Toronto-based Gordon Smith (*Natural Born Killers*, *JFK*), thought by some pros to have built the "alien": "A lot of us think it came out of England, from a B-grade studio."

Part of the show's appeal is its pretense of objectivity. "We remain skeptical," Frakes intones, summing up the opinions expressed by a number of expert pathologists and cinematographers. But the evidence is loaded to suggest that the film is genuine. At least two experts insist that their critical observations were deleted. One is Kevin Randle, whose investigations into the 1947 event inspired last year's provocative Showtime cable network film *Roswell*. Randle believes that extraterrestrials did land there but that "the alien-autopsy film is a hoax"—a suspicion the Fox show doesn't make clear. Steve Johnson, a movie-effects designer who created the aliens in *Roswell* (and worked on *The Abyss* and *Species*), viewed the autopsy footage at the Fox producers' request and told them it looked "pretty phony." His comments were not used. Says effects expert Stan Winston (*Aliens*, *Jurassic Park*), whose on-camera interview suggests otherwise: "Do I think it's a hoax? Absolutely."

This weekend, perhaps somewhere in England, a small group of effects artists could be having a quiet giggle and counting their cash. But it's a big universe out there, big enough to harbor canny hoaxers, true believers, wily debunkers—and lonely time travelers. So in some alternate universe, Marvin and Mindy Martian just might be sitting down to watch *Human Autopsy: Fact or Fiction?* —Reported by William Tynan/New York

NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL SPENDING CUTS MEAN CANADA NO LONGER HAS GOVERNMENT STORAGE SPACE FOR UFO REPORTS; REPORTS WILL NOT END UP IN NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Ottawa bows out but mystery lingers on

Reports of strange flying objects in Canadian skies are soaring.

But the government agency that has collected information on such strange sightings for the past 30 years says it's now officially out of the UFO business.

"Budget cuts," explains Folke Creutzberg, a geophysicist with the National Research Council in Ottawa.


His job has been phased out and he says the NRC wasn't doing anything with the UFO reports, anyway.

The NRC took over responsibility for UFOs in the late '60s after a Canadian Forces headquarters study determined the sightings didn't pose a threat to national security. It was suggested back then that these flying objects might be of some scientific interest.

But the council decided it would study only those UFOs that turned out to be meteors. It simply stored reports on any mysterious sightings, sending them to the National Archives in Ottawa at the end of each year.

"It's too bad the NRC lost interest, especially now that so many people are coming forward saying they've seen things," says Chris Rutkowski of the University of Manitoba.

He has been collecting the information from the NRC since '88 and adding it to reports made to UFO researchers across Canada. Each year, he compiles a complete Canadian sightings report.

"The interest in all this is so high. I'm constantly getting E-mail from people or calls and requests that sightings be investigated . . . it's too bad there isn't more official interest."

The mayor of the tiny Northwest Territories town of Fort Resolution agrees.

He called the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the military and York University astronomy professor Paul Delaney after people began seeing strange lights.

According to Delaney, the Fort Resolution sightings aren't UFOs. They're the planet Venus and the star Sirius.

But townsfolk aren't satisfied. "That still doesn't explain the other lights that at least five people have been seeing near the highway," says a baffled mayor Euan Hunter.

"It's a real mystery . . . It's

got everybody out looking . . . When I first saw these lights it blew my socks off."

Hunter isn't sure where to go next with his story. The federal defence department was interested when the sightings began. Col. Pierre Leblanc travelled to the town of 500 people, though cloudy skies prevented him from seeing anything.

Leblanc filed a report with his superiors in Ottawa, but that's as far as it is expected to go.

"Why isn't there more official interest in all this?" wonders Errol Bruce-Knapp of MUFON Ontario. MUFON, the Mutual UFO Network, is a Toronto-based UFO research group, affiliated with MUFON, an international organization with 5,500 members worldwide.

MUFON takes about 50 calls a week from people who either want to report UFOs or talk

about other aspects of the alien-UFO phenomenon.

"There is so much semi-concrete evidence . . . So many people who talk about their experiences . . . So many people talking about sightings . . . These are not anomalies that are easily explained as geomagnetic disturbances," he says.

Could there be a cover-up? Bruce-Knapp is among many in the UFO field who believe it's likely.

"It's a cosmic Watergate," charges Stanton Friedman, a nuclear physicist and UFO lecturer based in Fredericton.

Creutzberg says he hears this conspiracy theory all the time and knows of no evidence to support it.

Not only is nobody hiding anything, but nobody is even interested in UFOs, he says.

HOW A COMPUTER WOULD ASSIST CUFORN

Members of CUFORN who have visited my apartment have seen a large file cabinet filled to the brim with data on UFOs. What they do not see is a computer. The only way to organize the current and future data is to put it onto a diskette. We could develop a data base, establish patterns, and possibly predict waves of sightings from this data.

Member Raymond Borg and others previous to him have allowed me to use their PC's to turn out the Bulletin. For that we are eternally grateful. Only one member has contributed more than the usual amount over the years to our funds. We still do not have the \$3,500 needed to buy a computer. This would include a color monitor, fax, laser printer, modem, mouse, etc.

One of several projects that could be included in computer records is the 2,000 landing cases now on index cards. Other items suitable for it are a complete list of all reports in Canada in recorded history. A preliminary list has been done in my spare time. At the moment, it is written on paper. Part of it has been taped into a loose leaf binder.

Another item is the Project Blue Book list of UFO photographs which I bought from the U.S. government some years ago. This could be added to my own compilation which covers hundreds of pages.

CUFORN statistics on the reports we have investigated over the years would be of value. There are over 200 on file. Another is the mailing list for the Bulletin.

Many of you may have wondered why we have recently published photocopies of newspaper and magazine articles. The answer is simple: we are short of articles from CUFORN. We could publish articles based on computerized data previously stashed in my file cabinet.

We could also interface with other groups and individual researchers and get stories from them.

I could also publish the Bulletin at home in my spare time. This would save me the time and gasoline money spent going to a member's residence to do the Bulletin.

All the time saved in the long run would enable me to spend time trying to get new members. We are very grateful for the efforts of a few members who have aided us in this regard. More needs to be done, however.
