

IFOs AND HOAXES OUTNUMBER GENUINE REPORTS IN PAST TWO MONTHS

For the first time since CUFORN was founded in 1977, we have reports of items that turned out to be IFOs and hoaxes which equal the number of genuine UFO reports. We can attribute this situation to 3 causes: childishness, greed, and lack of funds.

The first of the hoaxes was definitely childish. In fact, it came in the form of a letter from a child in Kanata, Ontario. The young boy was one of several children there who decided to play a prank. They sent out letters to various groups stating they had seen a UFO. The 11-year-old boy, James Fok, ended his letter "I promise I'm not making this up."

Fortunately, we have a member in the vicinity of Kanata--Mrs. Teresa Fuller of Nepean, Ontario. Upon receiving the letter, I phoned her and asked her to investigate. She phoned back after interviewing James' mother. Mrs. Fok said she found out that he and a few friends played a prank to see if they could fool a few people. She told Mrs. Fuller, who informed me. The whole process took two weeks from the time we got the letter from James to the time Mrs. Fuller phoned me.

The second hoax appeared on the cover of the previous CUFORN Bulletin. Along with it was a story taken from a book. the supposed Canadian built saucer-shaped 'space vehicle" seen supposedly above RCAF Station Trenton in Vol. 17, No.4 and referred to in the story in the same issue on page 3 was a hoax in its entirety.

Thanks to member Stan Haswell of Toronto, we found out the truth about it. Stan contacted the Trenton Air Force Base and spoke to the Curator of the Royal Canadian Air Force Aerospace Museum there. The curator told Stan that he did not think that the editor of the book, entitled The History of 6 Repair Depot and the Aerospace Maintenance Development Unit. (We finally got the title right on the third try), had a look at what inspired the cover photograph. There was a saucer-shaped

vehicle involved all right, but it was made out of cardboard painted with the RCAF logo and other markings. It was small and was placed on a flatbed truck pulled along as a float in the Air Force Day Parade. It inspired an Air Force artist to draw a likeness of the model. The drawing was placed over an aerial photo of the Air Force Base and re-photographed to make it appear real. The actual story as it appeared in the book and later in our Bulletin was written by a serviceman on the base who sent it to the Editor, Major E.T. Karkut. We do not know the writer's name. So much for military history and journalistic ethics!

One good hoax deserves another, especially when you can make money from it. This is the credo of Bob Guccione, publisher of Penthouse Magazine in the U.S.A. We wasted pages 10, 11, and 12 of the July- August, 1996 issue of the Bulletin on the Penthouse alien photo hoax.

The actual color photos, as seen by those who bought Penthouse looked a bit familiar to me. It did not reproduce well at all in the Bulletin. Let me assure those who have not seen it that it looked exactly like the alien body seen in the docu-drama "Roswell". In fact, it was the same plastic model used in the film. It was used for the third time in another film, this one made for television in the U.S.A. recently. This was called "Night Visitors" and was shown on October 13 from 9 to 11 p.m. It was a fairly good film, but when one CUFORN member saw that the alien looked like the one on "Roswell", he realized that it was the same one and that Guccione had obviously borrowed the "alien" from the film producer, his conviction that the Penthouse photos were real was destroyed. So he when asked how he enjoyed the "Night Visitors" film, replied that it was terrible. He did not want to admit that he had been fooled. Wishful thinking is not what ufologists use in analyzing cases. Research is what we do.

POSSIBLE SEARCHLIGHT SIGHTING HAD ODD FEATURES

CUFORN's main source for reports, now that Downsview Air Force Base

has closed permanently due to government cost-cutting, is the federal government department known as Environment Canada. Here is one of the more recent ones: The night was Thursday, August 1, 1996. It was 9.30 p.m. A teacher her daughter and her two sons, were the observers; later on, I also saw what they saw.

Mrs. Jean Katz (a pseudonym) left her north Toronto, Ontario house to see what the weather was like. Her view was to the north-west in the residential area. It was cloudy, hot and humid as she stood on her veranda. She saw four circles of light, each the size of a frisbee held at arm's length. They were "murky white" she said. She went on to say "they were probably searchlights, but it lasted a long time, was only in one area and moving quite fast."

For between 30 minutes and one hour, she and her sons, whom she had alerted, watched the circles move inward toward each other, then back out to form a circular formation. This continued for a few minutes. She decided to call Metro Toronto police to ask if they knew what this was.

She called 32 Division Police Station. The officer who answered said it was probably lightning, and he hung up on her. She tried Environment Canada as she felt they would know if it were lightning. They gave her CUFORN's phone number, which is my wife's and mine. She described what she was looking at and how she found us. At this point, I took the opportunity to look to the northwest and I saw what she saw. It was a large circular murky white light moving swiftly in a circle. After a few seconds, the

movement slowed down, then speeded up, and continued'

alternately getting slower and faster. As it got faster, it got smaller in diameter. I could not see four lights, just one.


The light was fuzzy-edged. I watched at a 25 degree angle, whereas she said she was watching lights which were 70 degrees above the horizon. After looking for a few minutes, I returned to the phone and told her what I saw. We both agreed that it could be a searchlight, but that the size increase and decrease and inward and outward movement made it unusual. I later thought it may have been some unusual atmospheric phenomenon which mimicked searchlights.

Mrs. Katz said one of her sons drove a few blocks away and videotaped the lights when he saw them. I have not seen the videotape yet. I feeling that we do not have sufficient information to make a judgment as to what we saw. There I shall call this a multiple witness ID, or insufficient data, report.

ONE OF THE STARS BEGAN TO MOVE

"As I stood staring at the night sky, I fixed on a group of about seven stars. I was drawn to observe this particular section of the night sky by a flash of sharp light that caught the periphery of my vision. As I stood there for about five minutes nothing happened and then one of the group of stars began to move at high speed and traveled across about three quarters of the remaining sky. I lost it in a cluster of clouds,



i.e., at about 120 to 140 degrees from the perpendicular."

The description was given in a sighting report form filled out by one of my fellow employees. We had discussed the UFO topic once at coffee break in late September, 1996. On October 11, I asked him if he had ever seen anything in the sky that he could not identify. When he said he had, I asked him a few questions which he answered satisfactorily. I brought a sighting report form to work the next day. He took it home and filled it out. He returned it to me the next day.

The observer is 45 years old, with a university education. He lives with his mother in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, has good hearing and fair vision. He had not told anyone else about his sighting prior to my hearing it. We'll call him Leonard Baril, a pseudonym for his real name.

The sighting occurred at 9 p.m., October 5, 1996 at Point Au Barn, Ontario, 40 miles northwest of Parry Sound, Ontario, on the shores of Georgian Bay. Georgian Bay is part of the North American Great Lakes Waterway. It lasted "five to ten minutes",

He said the night was "windy and cool". There were "a few clouds, but on the whole it was clear". There were many stars visible in this rural "cottage country" area. This was his first sighting, Leonard said. The light's edges were sharp. It was the size of a dime held at arm's length, and was seen at about a 45 to 50 degree angle by the observer. It was a bright white light. His frames of reference were trees, water and islands in the bay. He was outdoors standing beside the bay. He said the light was high up, and moved straight. This in contrast to a slight downward-curving flight path in his drawing of the incident. ⊗

**SOUTHWESTERN U.S. MYSTERIES PROBED
IN INTELLIGENT BOOK BY NEW UFOLOGIST
BOOK REVIEW OF
THE MYSTERIOUS VALLEY**

Colorado and New Mexico provide the settings for a new book by Christopher O'Brien; the settings take second place to the wide range of events explored by this erudite author.

Much of what he writes has been covered to some extent by the TV series "Sightings" and the American television channel TNT's special show "UFOs: Interrupted Lives". This book takes you beyond the superficial media coverage and into areas that make the reader do some serious thinking. And that's what a book should do if it has merit. This book is 300 pages in length; when you finish it, you wish it had been longer, especially some parts which reveal some of the hidden depths of the UFO phenomenon.

O'Brien uses a time frame of datelines such as would be found in newspaper accounts. It makes the items in it more immediate and keeps you reading to see what the author will uncover next. In fact, he seems to be on a quest of immeasurable significance. He has also given ufology a new acronym for the unusual animal mutilations which some writers have associated with UFOs. The acronym is UAD: unusual animal deaths.

Another unique aspect of the book is his "Suggested Rules of Investigation". These are given in detail at the outset. He invokes them throughout the book. It's a four part book, including a prologue.

David Perkins does the Foreword, and there is a three chapter introduction, which in itself, is unusual for most works. Linda Howe, Tom Adams, Jacques Vallee, John Keel, and Dr. John Altshuler are among the persons acknowledged at the beginning. They are essential to understand what he is getting at. For example, in the San Luis Valley, the focus of this book, there are possible abductions, scores of

cattle mutilations, nocturnal lights almost every night, ominous rumbling noises coming from beneath the ground, and a "mysterious crystal skull found in the Baja" section of the valley.

The writer came to the Valley and lived in the Crestone area, having originally been drawn to it by a compulsion to explore Native American myths flowing into the local cultural milieu. He has not found many answers, but he does raise many questions. If there is one mark of the impact of The Mysterious Valley it is that once you have finished it, you can actually wish that you could find the time and money to move to the area just to find out for yourself what is going on. The local residents open up to him gradually as to their experiences, but it took some time. Once he was accepted as a 'local', he got more and more people talking to him.

His bibliography at the end includes 66 books and articles. He calls it a combination bibliography and suggested reading. He mentions many names famous in ufology, among them John Lear, Dr. J. Allen Hynek, Tracy Torme', and former CUFORN member George Andrews. The book lacks an index, photographs and drawings, so it's not perfect by any means.

Among the many startling statements found in The Mysterious Valley I feel you should know about are the following: a reported aerial battle between two UFOs, resulting in the crash of one and its retrieval in 1975 by American Military "troops", just north of a ranch owned by a Mr. Taylor. A thwarted abduction by aliens on November 18, 1993, at 1 a.m. by a healer, Kimmy Martin. She told a group of about 20 or 25 "visiting greys" to "go away, and let me sleep". It worked and they left the Baca chalet in which she lived. One other incident: a dozen U.S. Air Force jets escorted a 200-yard-long saucer flying over the town of Antonito near

the Colorado-New Mexico border on Sunday, November 6, 1993. Among the observers who numbered eight, was Deputy Sheriff Steven Gottlieb of Conejo County Colorado.

The Mysterious Valley is a soft-cover book published in September, 1996 by St. Martin's Paperbacks. It sells for \$6.99 in the U.S. and \$7.99 in Canada. It's worth the money. ☒

RESEARCHER'S NEWEST BOOK PROCLAIMS NEW HYPOTHESIS

A Book Review of *The Watchers II, Exploring UFOs
and the Near-Death Experience*, by Raymond E. Fowler

This the fourth book about the Betty Andreasson Luca series of abductions by the same author. Although his fifth book on the case is due out in 1997, he would be hard put to outdo this one for sheer excellence. Without giving away his basic hypothesis, it is

safe to assert that he may very well be correct in assuming that

the near-death experiences reported by some people may hold a clue as to where the "grays" originate.

He gives the reader much to contemplate. If you read the books he has used in writing this one, you may see that he has a valid point to make. This is as near as anyone has come to writing a scientific book about abductions. He uses a variety of writing tools to give us his point of view. Much of this is transcribed regressive hypnosis session tapes with various abductees, not just Mrs. Luca. Admittedly some of the Luca hypnosis statements are repeats of what was in the first three books. He does this to familiarize those who have not read them before with the Luca case. For the person who's already read them, it's a useful reminder of the background we need to know it to evaluate it properly and place it in the context used by Fowler!

Fowler cautions us to read another book before reading his. He says, on page 275 "every researcher or interested reader should read, Dr. Ring's book for

the details of his study", most of which directly

confirms the majority of what Fowler has to say. Dr. Kenneth Ring's book, The Omega Project: Near-Death Experiences, UFO) Encounters and Mind at Large, published in 1992 in New York, by William Morrow and co.

This book and *Communion* were instrumental in Fowler's writing *Watchers II*. Further evidence of Fowler's literary achievement; is the glowing reviews given by Dr. Barry H. Downing, John S. Carpenter, Dr. Ring, the NAPRA REVIEW, Richard J. Boylan, Ph.D., and John Alexander, Ph.D.

The book has two appendices, a biography of Fowler, a bibliography, a list of figures (or drawings), and an index. The Foreword is by

Whitley Strieber. One flaw in the book is that in the acknowledgment he mentions "Armen Victorian", whose real name is Henry Azadehdel, a convicted orchid-smuggler, who also uses the names "Julian Philips", "Mr.

Scanlon", "Dr. Allan Jones", adds "Dr." to "Armen Victorian", "J. Brown", and "Cassava N'Tumball. Fowler should have done some research on this man;

and not accepted any information he gave him as true. Anyone who uses a series of pseudonyms like that is living in a dream world and is not to be trusted as far as any information is concerned. Also, in the Acknowledgments, Jenny Randles last name is misspelled "Randels"

There are nine hypnosis sessions transcriptions in the book, all but one done by Fred Max, B.A. .S., former lecturer at Boston College. Southern Connecticut State University, the University of Massachusetts,

Westchester Community College, the American Cancer Society, and other area universities and organizations. For the reader's use, Max's address and telephone number are mentioned in Appendix B.

Fowler sets himself against Budd Hopkins interpretation of ufology: without criticizing it. He merely says his viewpoint is not the same. And your viewpoint may not be the same after you have read this book. It's published by Wild Flower Press, Box 726, Newberg, Oregon, U.S.A. 97132. It is priced at \$26.75 in Canada and it's soft-cover ⊗

DAYLIGHT DISC REPORTED IN JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA

SAfrica UFO - Reports of UFO sightings in Johannesburg suburbs - JOHANNESBURG, Nov 25 93

Residents of Johannesburg's northern suburbs called a local radio talk show Thursday to report an unidentified flying object.

About half a dozen callers from the Rivonia area said it was around 5:00 p.m. (1500 GMT) Thursday when they saw the UFO, emitting "a whooshing sound" as it headed south at the altitude of "a landing aircraft." They described the object variously as "round," "bullet-shaped," or "diamond-shaped," with "flashing red lights." A spokesman for the private Radio 702 station said Thursday's calls followed a similar one Wednesday from a resident of Kyalami, venue of the Formula 1 South African Grand Prix. The spokesman said most of the callers "sounded like fairly intelligent people." The calls stopped after one listener, who identified himself only as Russell, brought a political dimension to the sightings: The UFO landed in his back yard, he said, little men stepped out and said, "take us to your responsible leader."

"I told them we had no responsible leaders, and they climbed back into their machine and left," Russell reported.
