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## McCAMPBELL'S NEW BOOK IS REQUIRED READING FOR ALL

Before we give you my review of Jim McCampbell's new book, here is a fairly complete background on him. Mr. McCampbell served in the U.S. Corps of Engineers during World War II as a junior officer and parachutist. Subsequently, he entered the University of California at Berkeley where a broad education culminated in a bachelor's degree in Engineering-Physics. Extensive graduate studies in the following years focused on physics and mathematics. His early career was devoted to applied research on nuclear weapons and the theoretical aspects of designing nuclear reactors for submarines and electric generating stations. For ten years, he was engaged in technical management, specializing in planning and managing large-scale projects involving advanced technologies. He worked with Solar Energy Research Institute, environmental assessment for the Alaskan pipeline, test facilities for NASA, industrial plants, and expansion plans for national research centers. He also worked on economic development plans for foreign nations.

He has been recognized in American Men of Science, the International Who's Who in Atoms, Notable Americans of the Bicentennial Eve, and Who's Who in America. His professional association affiliations include the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Nuclear Society, in which he was elected Chairman for Northern California. He is currently devoting his efforts to real estate.

This is the equivalent of a university textbook for everyone --- ufologists, scientists, and the general public. The author was kind enough to send me a computer diskette for Windows 3.1. The entire book is on it. Since I have no computer, member Ray Borg kindly took time to print out the book for me on his computer.

This book has 18 sub-sections plus an introduction and acknowledgments. Headings for the four main sections are: "A Logical Perspective", "Vehicle Engines and Components", "The Human Body", and "Social Issues". The sub-sections consist of articles by him, all but one of which were previously published. So, basically, these are not new to most ufologists. Twelve were published in Skylook and the MUFON UFO Journal and MUFON Symposium Proceedings; one in the AIAA Symposium Proceedings, two in his first book, *Ufology*, one in Spencer, John and Evans, Hilary's "Phenomenon, From Flying Saucers to UFOs - Forty Years of Facts and Research", and one article whose publication history is not recorded. Publication years range from 1973 to 1989.

There are five graphs, figures and illustrations, extensive references, 12 Tables, five formulae, notes and three appendices. One sub-section has its own Table of Contents and a Bibliography including four former CUFORN members and associates.

I proofread the book and found 318 typographical errors and errors of omission, several of which are graphs. He has Medicine Hat, Alberta misplaced as being in British Columbia.

McC Campbell is Director of Research for MUFON and a member of their Board of Directors. Research is obviously his forte. This shows up in all sections of the book. He challenges any scientists who read it to follow up is work with experimental and independent verification of his various hypotheses and findings.

Ufology has progressed from a proto-science to a full fledged research topic. The logical next step is its emergence as a recognized branch of science.

Its value is that it requires data from many scientific disciplines. Discoveries in any one discipline can and should be used by the scientists who make up part of ufology, small as their number may be. This is McC Campbell's book's underlying message.

It would have been easier to read his book if his diskette has page numbers. As it is, one must assemble the pages in the correct order, not an easy task.

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**CO-DIRECTOR PLANS CD-ROM ON UFOs**

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Co-Director and Bulletin Editor Lawrence J. Fenwick is planning to market a CD-ROM with the subtitle "The History of UFO Reports in Canada." There is a main title which cannot be divulged yet as it has not been registered. It is all right to use, as a title search has been done through the local library.

The CD-ROM is still in the first stage of planning. All that has been done is the typing of the information.

One four-page section, "Government Policy on UFOs" has been omitted from the "Social Issues" section. I have placed it as belonging at the beginning of the section. It is also left out of the Table of Contents.

Quibbles aside, its price of \$10.00 in U.S. Funds is a reasonable one, given the superb quality of the book. The balance of the book between the scientific and academic of social issues is just right. Given McC Campbell's background in science, he might have been tempted to leave out much of the non-scientific aspects. To his credit, he resisted his bias and maintained an approach that should satisfy every reader. One of the strengths of "Ufology II" is its excellent use of pertinent case histories. Some of these are obscure but necessary to make his points. He does manage to include a few Canadian cases, which should be noted by CUFORN's Canadian members.

In short, if you ever want to refute a debunker or skeptic, this book will be of great assistance. I hail it as one of the best books ever written about the subject.

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He plans to market it through an Internet website obtained through a Toronto-area ufologist. Other marketing avenues will be through computer and electronics stores, UFO magazines, book store chains and the supermarket tabloid newspapers. Focus will be on the U.S. market.

The CD-ROM will have music from a member-composer, videotapes and audiotapes, photographs and drawings. A cover artist has been obtained, as has advice from one person and an offer of low-cost accountancy expertise. We will keep you posted.

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
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## HAS MIND CONTROL BEEN RESPONSIBLE FOR A CANADIAN SERIES OF ABDUCTIONS?

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The series of five abductions of the late Betty Stewart Dagenais of Bond Head, Ontario (which Whitley Streiber reported in his book *Confirmation with incorrect facts*) may have been the result of mind control experiments by either aliens, aliens working with the U.S. military intelligence, military intelligence working by itself, or a highly secret group of humans with unlimited funds and technology much advanced over current state of the art devices publicly known.

Certain items mentioned in the investigation of the Dagenais case taken together point to this possibility. Here are the items:

First of all, a technically superior person, David Sarnoff, former head of RCA Victor (and I believe NBC) was a school classmate of Betty Stewart Dagenais' father, Mr. Stewart (first name unknown).

Secondly, Mr. Stewart operated a Marconi wireless station of Port Burwell, Ontario, on the northern shore of Lake Erie in the 1920's. Betty was abducted at night beside the station twice within one week in 1925 when she was five years old. She compared the sound of the UFO with a heterodyning throbbing or pulsating, whining hum, "always leaving me with a feeling of panic," she said.

"After that I would not go near the engine room door of the station generator as underlying beat-upon-beat of the equipment elicited the same panic."

"The experience left me with precognitive abilities of clairvoyance, clairaudience, clairsentience, and telekinesis."

"I awakened one morning in 1969 with my left ear rim swollen and red. I thought that an insect had bitten me but could not find the seat of the bite. When the swelling subsided, the cartilage of my ear was considerably thickened."

"Some time after that I was receiving international radio code signals through my right ear. The signals were clear and strong. I blamed this on a possible new amalgam tooth filling."

"The signals have faded over the years but I can still hear them at times when all is quiet," she wrote in 1986. (She died of cancer in 1992, four years after the implant in her left ear was surgically removed. It turned out to have been a transducer, according to Antonio Fernandez of Matsushita Corporation's Panasonic Division in Mississauga, Ontario. He was asked by myself what the device could have been. I did not mention UFOs when I called him and gave him the chemical composition of the implant from an independent lab analysis.)

Betty was curious and said "I tried to enroll in a telegraphers course but could find none within commuting distance."

"In later years, the signals were overlaid with other signals at the same time, Very busy!"

"Since I grew or should I say lived for the first six years of my life on a wireless station, I wonder if "they" thought I would understand."

After her 1979 abduction near Newmarket, Ontario, she wrote about a round red mark which appeared at the base of her neck at the fifth cervical vertebra. It burned and itched for a while, then faded away.

She wrote "Do "they" really keep in touch one way or another during one's lifetime? Was I called up for a reprogramming?"

"After the (1979) incident, I experienced a strange reaction whenever I would see the large, dark-glassed Army vehicles from Camp Borden (Ontario)."

"As they approached, I would break out in goose-bumps, my spine prickled, I had stricture in my chest and breathing. My heart pounded."

In a letter to her friend Regina in England, she said (and this is out of context) "So for now, perhaps you will be satisfied with the implant incidents (the plurality is not a mistake)". This was a letter dated October 18, 1988.

She had hypnosis by a sociology professor at the University of Toronto, Ian Currie (now deceased). She told Regina "Under hypnosis I relived the implanting of a miniscule oval pellet with two wires extending from one end. I thought they were antennae, but now I believe they were merely to aid in attaching the pellet to the tissue by injection.

"I arranged for examination with the Agema heat-seeking equipment with interesting results."

The Masor Clinic in Tottenham, Ontario, where the Agema was used to detect heat within the ears, was owned and operated by

David and Judy Stewart. David is a Royal Canadian Navy veteran who helped develop sonar for submarines. Stewart noted that the Agema was useful, but first put a compass near the ear. It deflected the compass. I had the same result with her left ear in 1987 when I met Betty near her home in Bond Head, Ontario.

Betty visited a trance psychic for information. She said "he confirmed that my implant was a locator and was now obsolete. He told me that a subsequent encounter of the bi-location type had taken place after removal of the pellet and another implant had been placed in my brain as a locator for mutual exchange of information."

Meanwhile, I got colour printouts of the Agema test results. One was for her left ear, another for the right ear, and a third was of someone else's ear as an example of a normal ear. We had the left ear implant removed in an operation in 1988 at York County Hospital, noticing that it appeared that there were two implants in her right ear where she had gotten signals. The reason I did not bother looking at the right ear printouts is that there was no obvious swelling of the right ear. So we had an obsolete implant removed and left in the ones that had been working.

Betty died of breast cancer at age 74 in 1992. She was cremated according to her wishes. Somewhere those working implants are scattered amongst her ashes. I don't know where the ashes were put.

The Don Mills (wealthy Toronto suburb) location where she had the first implant inserted in an abduction is only a mile from the Royal Canadian Military Institute. Coincidence?

# RAF IN X-FILE ALERT!

ALIENS from outer space may be visiting Britain, the Government has sensationally admitted.

In an incredible letter obtained by The People, Defence Minister Earl Frederick Howe reveals that ALL RAF station commanders are under orders to report UFO sightings.

And he adds: "So far as the existence of extraterrestrial lifeforms is concerned we remain open-minded." The letter was sent to Don Valley Labour MP Martin Redmond, who is trying to break the MoD's veil of secrecy over flying saucers.

He is concerned about a UFO with a red and green rotating light that appeared over East Anglia last month.

It was tracked by radar at RAF Neatishead and RAF Northwood for several hours as it hovered in the sky before flying 50 miles down the coast.

It was also spotted by the crews of a tanker and civilian plane, while a video - now in the MoD's hands - was taken by police.

"It's incredible no aircraft were scrambled when a target was picked up so close to the coast," Mr Redmond told Defence Secretary Michael Portillo.

"This raises questions on the way we police the UK Air Defence Region."

Earl Howe replied that the RAF does not respond unless there is evidence UK air space has been "compromised". He added:

"To date no sighting has provided such evidence.

"We do not investigate further or provide an explanation for what might have been observed."

Mr Redmond is accusing the Government of covering up information on UFOs and says if there is no defence threat, there is no excuse for secrecy either.

"The answers I've been given lead me to think there is something more to this," added the MP.

"The only thing I know for sure is this whole issue is shrouded in secrecy."

Last week Defence Minister Nicholas Soames refused to reveal how many UFOs RAF pilots have spotted since 1966. He said the information would cost too much to obtain.

But he added: "Unidentified contacts penetrating UK airspace are identified by all available means including interception."

PASSENGER jet pilots may have to call in Mulder and Scully from TV hit The X-Files after air investigators failed to clear up a close encounter of the unknown kind.

Air investigators said they were stumped after failing to identify an object seen by two pilots over Hertfordshire.

But despite concluding the object "was not an aeroplane", the report did not speculate on what the object could have been.

Both pilots of the Stansted-bound BAe 146 reported seeing a red, blue and white striped object. The object appeared to be avoiding large clouds.

#### Stanford UFO conference

Laurence Rockefeller has long used his great wealth to fund UFO research. Last year saw the release of the Rockefeller Report, copies of which were sent to every government on the planet. This Spring he funded a conference on UFOs at Stanford University in California. Seven reputable scientific researchers in the subject presented their best available evidence to a scientific review panel. The UFOlogists involved were: Dr. Ulfobrand von Udoewiger of Germany, Dr. Mark Rodeghier of Chicago, John F. Schuessler of Houston, Dr. Erling P. Strand of Norway, Dr. Michael D. Swords of Eastern Michigan University, Dr. Jacques F. Vallee of San Francisco, and Jean-Jacques Velasco of Toulouse, France.

The conclusion of the review panel was that UFOs deserved serious research by government and academic. The topic of alleged alien abduction was not discussed by the final report. I'm a cargo pilot who flies a nightly run between MKE (Milwaukee) and EAU (Eau Claire), Wis. At 0040 central time. Jaime Maussan, Mexico's most famous TV reporter, began broadcasting these reports, which continue to the present day.

Washington State was the scene for literally hundreds of reports of green lights in the sky since this Summer. One observer reported that he studied one of these lights with a high powered telescope and that it resembled a meteor or other rock like item, however, it moved back and forth, up and down, and at times came to a complete halt in the sky.



# Aliens in America

## Conspiracy Cultures from Outerspace to Cyberspace

An interview with Jodi Dean, author of *Aliens in America* Questions by David E. Caywood, Editor-in-Chief, Michigan MUFON Newsletter, From their November, 1998 issue, pp.9-10



**A**liens have invaded the United States. No longer confined to science fiction and tabloids, aliens appear in *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and *The Wall Street Journal*, at candy counters (in chocolate covered flying saucers and as Martian melon-flavored lollipops) and on the Internet.<sup>4</sup>

Aliens are at the center of a faculty battle at Harvard. They have been used to market AT&T cellular phones, Milky Way candy bars, Kodak film, Diet Coke, Stove Top stuffing, skateboard accessories, and abduction insurance. A Gallup Poll says that 27 percent of American believe space aliens have visited Earth. A Time/CNN poll says 80 percent of its respondent believe the U.S. government is covering up its knowledge of the existence of aliens. Sixty-five percent believe a UFO crashed in Roswell in 1947.

In a provocative and sophisticated analysis of public culture and popular concerns, Jodi Dean examines how serious UFO-logists and their pop-culture counterparts tap into fundamental phobias, paranoia, conspiracy theories, and mass skepticism of the public sphere. What does the widespread American belief in extraterrestrials say about our society? How common are our assumptions about what is real? Is there any such thing as "common sense"? Aliens, the author shows, provide cultural icons through which to access the conditions of democratic politics at the millennium. The technological complexity of our age has created a situation where political choices and decisions are virtually meaningless, practically impossible. How do we judge what is real, believable, trustworthy, or authoritative? When the truth is out there, but we can trust no one, Dean argues, paranoia is indeed the most sensible response.

Jodi Dean and I spoke on several occasions. I found her to be insightful, highly intelligent and ingratiating. The following is a compilation of my conversations with Jodi Dean about her ideas, views and work as they relate to her spectacular new book, *Aliens in America, Conspiracy Cultures from Outerspace to Cyberspace*.

**David:** *What influenced you to write this book? Isn't the subject of UFO's and Alien Abductions academically dangerous and seemingly out of left field for a Political Science Professor?*

**Jodi Dean:** "When I heard that Dr. John Mack, Harvard Chair of Psychology, had written a book and was speaking about alien abductions as real, I knew that there had to be something to this and not just fantasy on the part those claiming abduction experiences."

Surprisingly, Phillip Klass had influenced me as well. When I read his abysmal accounts and ludicrous explanations against UFO's and abductions in *Abductions: A Dangerous Game*, I knew I had to counter his rhetoric and provide a more democratic view of the subjects. Especially, his overtly anti-woman, "Queen-Bee" comments and how come the aliens didn't choose someone like Dolly Parton to mother the new hybrid species, etc..."

DEC: *What do you believe about the ET question?*

JD: "Honestly— I don't know. I do at a fundamental level have some beliefs, but nothing concrete."

DEC: *Using any adjective you'd like, describe your view of consensus reality in America today.*

JD: "Exclusive! Exclusive on many levels. There are views in America which present themselves as consensus and broadband but are actually exclusionary. Example: Mainstream Science says to Ufologist and abductees alike:

You don't share our view of reality so therefore we can't take you seriously or investigate your experiences let alone talk to you.

This type of consensus reality is not only "not consensus" but undemocratic and unscientific as well. Exclusions are necessary and not all them are evil, but one has to be careful of the exclusions one chooses to have. Seemingly in America today we have moved from consensus reality to virtual reality"

DEC: *What criticisms if any, have you faced from your academic colleagues?*

JD: "Some people have become unsettled by my unwillingness to decide whether I believe the abductions are or not. They wanted to pin

me down to one side or the other. It has been my experience that they are doing this to see on whose side of the consensus reality fence I fall. Mainly so that they can use the before mentioned criteria mainstream science uses when deciding to listen to, and/or investigate UFO/Abduction claims. The want me to share their consensus reality. Otherwise they feel they can not talk to me. The truth is they want to listen to what I have to say, not so that



they can understand but rather, to respond with their next thought or argument. I won't play that game."

Jodi Dean teaches political, feminist, and cultural theory at Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, New York. She received her BA from Princeton University in 1984 and her Ph.D. from Columbia University in 1992. She is the author of *Solidarity of Strangers: Feminism After Identity Politics* (University of California Press, 1996) and the editor of *Feminism and the New Democracy: Resiting the Political* (Sage 1997). Her current projects continue to address conspiracy and cultural studies. She is editing a collection, *Political Theory and Cultural Studies*, to be published by Cornell in 1999, and working on a new book, *Three Fables of Conspiracy*.
