SAVANT EMPHASIZES COMING OF SPACEMEN

Dr. George Hunt Williamson, who arrived in Japan on August 16, 1961 at the invitation of the Cosmic Brotherhood Association (CBA) of Japan, lectured on "Mighty Signs and Wonders" before a capacity audience at the Asahi Kodo Hall in Tokyo, Sunday afternoon, August twenty-seventh.

The lecture meeting was held in commemoration of Japanese-edition of his book... "Other Tongues-Other Flesh". He delivered the lecture after showing some 170 slides which illustrated the arrival of the UFO.

Dr. Williamson, who served with the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II as radio director, said: "I firmly believe in the existence of UFO and the arrival of space people. We must inform this to all the peoples of the world." "The Japanese people have had a great inheritance and the Japanese people originally came from outer space. So Japan has a most important role that is indicated by Japan's present contributions to science and industry. Japan has a divine destiny to fulfil", he said.

Williamson, who had traveled around the world conducting expeditions, researches and had given lectures in many countries, said: "I have discovered that there is a wonderful 'Plan of the Ages' which has operated on earth down thru time, and this divine plan is converging on our own day and age".

He pointed out: "I have never agreed with the materialist who says that 'man is only an animal with the illusion of a soul' and my research has

only convinced me that beyond any possibility of a doubt there is a creative intelligence in the universe and the 'Hand of God' has actually reached down and become an instrument in the affairs of mankind."

The author of many books (Saucers Speak; UFOs Confidential; Other Tongues-Other Flesh; Road in the Sky; Secret Places of the Lion) and other articles added: "There is abundant scientific evidence that this guiding 'Hand' has placed its visible 'signature' on the records and artifacts of all civilizations of the past and present. I also found that is a fantastic legacy for mankind today that comes out of the very beginnings of humanity on earth. The implications of such a heritage are staggering. Actual scientific discoveries not only prove that there is a God, but also prove that this God is bringing His Divine Plan to a magnificent finale in our time". Williamson's purpose in visiting Japan was to do research in Japan. He visited three parts of the country where he was able to discover many important things helping his scientific study about the past Earth. He called at the Ainu villages where he saw treasures and heard the legend of descent of the Sky-God. Also the giant Ainu in the deep woods reminded him of the Abominable Snowman. At Sayonara Party held Sept. 22, Williamson said: "I have found the Japanese man to be a strong, strange and wonderful man... he is unique in the world, a two-sided individual, yet, he is a perfect man."

MYSTERY OBJECT SEEN IN SKY AT HARTLAND

Fredericton, N.B. (Special) Residents of Hartland area are puzzled over the recent appearance in the sky of what was described as a light about "the size of a basketball" in the early hours of the morning. The object, white in color and tinged with red, stayed in the sky from about 3:30 a.m. until about 7 a.m. It was first brought to the attention of night employees at the Day and Ross Restaurant and the freight depot on the Trans-Canada Highway by an unidentified tourist from Saskatchewan. The tourist stopped at the Day and Ross establishment after seeing the light as he crossed the Hugh John Flemming Bridge. He reported the light as appearing to travel in the same direction and at the same speed he was. A Day and Ross mechanic, Wilnot Smith, termed it "very mysterious and made us quite uneasy." Mr. Smith described the light as "about the size of a basketball and glowed a whitish light which sometimes faded into a reddish color. It moved around a little and when it finally disappeared in the morning it seemed to go straight up." After some time the men called the RCMP at Woodstock. An RCMP spokesman confirmed the presence of the object but could offer no explanation as to what it was. Between 50-100 persons in the area reported sighting the object. 'SUPER NOVA' BELIEVED SEEN

A bright object spotted in the western sky last night may very well be a super nova, or exploding star "something which only occurs every 200 years or so," Frank J. DeKinder, Director of Observations of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada, Montreal Centre. Mr. DeKinder first learned of the object when he received a call from Dr. Henry S. SKY SCANNERS SPOT WEIRD FLYING OBJECTS

Sunset, Utah. -- Reminds A. Miskin, head of the Strange Aerial Sights Information Organization just being organized, has recorded several unexplained "sightings" of UFOs in the sky, but he got his information firsthand Sunday afternoon. Mr. Miskin had received a report late Saturday afternoon of some strange objects high in the sky from Mrs. Michiel Burson, 2446 N. 400 West, wife of Sunset's mayor.

She told him she had seen four white, circular objects, Saturday about 5:30 pm, travelling southeast. Her husband told her he had seen similar objects a few minutes earlier.

Mr. Miskin learned that the same objects had also been seen by Thomas J. Kay, 252 W. 2300 North and Kent Draper, 1704 N. 250 West, Sunset.

When Mr. Miskin arrived at the Burson home Sunday afternoon to question Mr. and Mrs. Burson on the matter, he saw Mr. Burson outside and asked him to describe what he had seen. The time was 4:20 pm. Mr. Burson looked up into the sky and said, "There's one of them coming now."

"It was the most amazing thing," Mr. Miskin said. "There were several, but they had no definite shape. They were rather puffy and irregular, like puffs of cotton. They were moving at a high speed in the same line of flight as the objects seen Saturday, coming from the northwest to southeast."

"Then another came, with a definite shape to it. It was round and looked about like the moon does in the daytime, but of course was much smaller."

Mr. Miskin said he notified flight operations at Hill Air Force Base of the sighting.

Mayor Burson said two of the objects, which had the general appearance of "angel hair" seemed to be attached together with "long, stringy stuff." Viewers heard no sound, but said the objects moved at "terrific speed." Mr. Miskin said he would appreciate receiving reports from others who may have seen such objects. Phone number is TA.5-4077. MUSINGS By Leslie Smith

In saucerdom so many put forth the argument that the writers, lecturers, contactees, ad infinitum, make no great financial gain, a statement which is doubtful in itself, so it follows, they believe, that what these people claim must be true. Why? With some, financial gain may not be the only consideration.

One of man's basic drives is recognition by others. Some people feel they must be noticed and will go to great lengths to achieve this. They do it in various ways..

In the every-day down-to-earth world some men accumulate money to gain this end. But money isn't the only way to gain recognition.

Some more unconventional people talk to spacemen, even travel to other planets. All this gives an otherwise drab personal life sparkle and adventure in the eyes of themselves, and, they hope, others.

A strange, frightening phenomenon was witnessed a week ago Wednesday evening, May 10th, by Richard Vogt who resides south of Eagle Bend, Minnesota. The incident, which as yet has University of Minnesota Scientists baffled, occurred at about 11:30 pm about 1½ miles south of Osakis, Minn. In an interview with the individual involved, the newspaper learned that Vogt was enroute home from a business trip which had taken him several miles south of Osakis. When enroute to his home, Vogt noted what he described as a ball of fog approx. 3 ft. in diameter and somewhat elongated, descending toward him from a perfectly clear sky at about a 45 degree angle. It approached with such rapidity that Vogt was unable to take any evasive action & the mysterious object struck the auto on the upper section of the hood and in the windshield. The sound of the impact of the strange matter with the vehicle Vogt describes as he imagines it would sound if driving at a high rate of speed into a thrown shovel full of fine gravel. A tremendous amount of heat was generated and the interior of the car was heated almost instantaneously to a near unbearable heat, and the windshield which received full impact of the fog "mass", was extremely hot to the touch. It was so hot in fact, that to have held the hand in contact with the glass for more than a very brief moment would have resulted in a burn. Mr. Vogt was so startled by this unusual happening that he first envisioned an atomic blast, a dis-

integrating rocket or nose cone, or perhaps even some other newer and more deadly weapon as the result of scientific research. He admitted having felt very uncomfortable as a result of his experience. As proof of his harrowing experience, Mr. Vogt has his Chevrolet automobile. The pit marks which were burned into the windshield, the circular cracks in the glass which resulted from the intense heat, and the burned specks in the finish of the hood are all there to corroborate his story.

This strange phenomenon has been reported to the U. of M. scientist, W.J. Layten after discussing it with several colleagues, seems to have no definite answer as yet. His personal feelings are that it might have been either a collection of small meteorites, surrounded by some gas, produced when they came through the atmosphere, or that it was something that is what is sometimes called 'ball-lightening'. The latter is, however, usually a very dangerous affair, and if it hits anything such as the windshield of a car, the object that it struck usually disintegrates. UFO RESEARCH COMMITTEE 'RELEASE'

The United States Air Force continues to research flying saucer reports... of course now...the term flying saucer...or even U.F.O. is outdated... all such reports concern what the Air Force terms...unidentified aerial phenomena.

Major Robert Friend... of the Aerospace Technical Intelligence Center (ATIC) at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton Ohio...told a radio interviewer of his departments work. When asked how many sightings the base receives reports of...the Major revealed that 224 sightings had been received this year...this he stated was approximately the same as last year at this time. His office handles four to five hundred such cases a year. When asked if any sightings this year could not be satisfactorily cleared up...the Major confirmed that there were normally 2% per year...said however that he could not cite the exact number...that the statistics were being readied for Major Coleman's office...(Pentagon P.I.O.) and that the Major would release the statistics some time after the middle of the year.

The Major also offered the first Air Force pat on the back to a citizens "saucer" committee when he praised the UFORC of Akron, headed by George Popowitch. The Major said: "I believe that Mr. Popowitch and his group are conscientious people and are dedicated to their attempts to give the public an education in aerial phenomena and unidentified aerial phenomena. Major Friend also was asked whether persons reporting sightings could be considered crackpots...the Major said...no, to the contrary...we don't feel anything like that about people who make reports. 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MODERN MISSILE PAINTING FOUND IN RUINS OF HOME BELONGING TO AUGUSTUS

Rome (AP) -- Sleek, interspace missiles in the days of Caesar Augustus? Impossible. Yet new diggings on Rome's famous Palatine Hill have uncovered a painting that could easily depict a Titan or an Atlas missile.

The yellow ochre art work decorates the wall of a room that archaeologists think may have belonged to Augustus himself. The modern-looking cylinder stands vertically on slender fins on some kind of pad. Its needle nose points skyward, as though awaiting the push of a button.

The mysterious object has been dubbed the missile of Augustus. Scientists say that whatever the symbolism the painting had undoubtedly is lost forever in obscurity.

More important than this one object, however, is the fact that the ancient hill may be yielding still another treasure--the house of Augustus, first Roman emperor. (The Owen Sound Sun-Times, Aug. 10, 1961)

WEIRD GREENISH GLOW RACES OVER VANCOUVER, B.C.

A UFO burning with a weird green glow flashed across the sky over Vancouver Tuesday night. An official at the Dominion Observatory, Victoria, said the object was probably a meteor, but its green color was unusual. Meteors normally emit a white light, he said. The object was reported from Vancouver to Seattle and from Points on Vancouver Island. It was seen locally at 9:30 pm. (The Vancouver Sun, September 13, 1961; Credit: June Larson, Seattle, Wash.)

ARE MARS CANALS RAILWAYS?

Washington (AP) A research chemist said today the canals of Mars are so like a man-made rail network and so unlike ordinary geological cracks they raise the possibility the planet may be inhabited. The chemist, Wells Allan Webb of Berkeley, Calif., said that because the canals raise the possibility of a prior civilization, any attempt to send manned expeditions to Mars should be preceded by unmanned probes that could "provoke a reaction" and detect any form of intelligent life that may exist. FORT HOOD SIGHTING

Thirty-six personnel on simulated reconnaissance out of Fort Hood, saw, on the 21st of December, 1958, a round, flat, dark object having a brilliantly lighted dome situated in the center top. At the time that this object was spotted by one of the men, it was in a hovering position, motionless. It was observed for 22 minutes, during which time three things occurred: 1. from the bottom center of the object, there issued forth an extremely bright shaft of white light, almost blinding the men. This light was shot to the earth from the object's estimated height of about 300 feet. The light was on for about 4 or 5 minutes, remaining steady throughout; 2. as this light suddenly went out, or was turned off, the object was surrounded by a pinkish coloured glow, which lasted until the object departed. During the glow, the half round dome on the top of the object flashed red and green, "like two opposing lights revolving on a center pole." 3. the object then began to sway back and forth, about 2 or 3 minutes before departing, while maintaining previous altitude. It was at this time that the pinkish glow seemed to be drawn into the object from underneath. An instant prior to it's departure, it again stopped all motion, and then recoded toward the northwest at such tremendous speed that some of the men thought it was shrinking in size while in the same spot. However, when it had 'shrunk' to about the size of a pea, the object veered to the southwest, and then was not seen, though the men watched for over an hour. The size of the object when first seen would be comparable to a "Nash Rambler" car. No protrusions or apertures were discerned. No sound was heard at any time, and a quick search of the area where the light-shaft appeared to 'hit' the ground produced no discernable evidence. It was observed in the afternoon.

The Gazeta de Noticias (Rio, May 23/61) tells that on one of the days of the last week, the civil cargo plane DC-3, PP-VUA with the pilot Darre, co-pilot Correa and radio officer Nascimento had the flight of the plane accompanied by a flying saucer during more than 1 hour, on the route from Florianopolis to Rio de Janeiro. Darre saw a luminous disc circling at sea level and thought it the projection of a floodlight. Moments later the strange object ascended with incredible speed until the plane's level, siding with it. Without hiding his nervousness, Darre contacted the station of the tower of Porto Alegre immediately, but his message was heard also at Rio and an uninterrupted radio contact was then established, when Darre reported that the saucer made a revolution around the plane. The plane kept its course unaltered and at the level of the Port Paranaguá, the saucer moved away to the horizon leaving a luminous trail, and vanished in a short time.

Folha de Sao Paulo, July 25, 1961 reports that Commander Jose Guilherme Sae when in flight from Rio to Sao Paulo, with his passenger plane PP-SQT, saw at 8 pm a luminous (bluish light) object that revolved around another plane, but later around his own, so that all the crew and also the 13 passengers could see (with delight) the strange movements of the object, which did describe curves but would also move suddenly in angles moving from one side of the plane fast to the other and so it couldn't have been another plane that was making acrobatics around the PP-SQT. Johannesburg, S. Africa -- An object crashed in the remote range of Zoutpansberg in the northern Transvaal on Oct. 10, 1961, about 40 miles from Pietersburg. Noise of impact was heard by farmers 15 miles from the scene. Officials at Cape Canaveral phoned the U.S. embassy and said the object was not one of theirs (Globe & Mail, Wednesday, Oct. 11, 1961)

'SAUCER' SOARS IN SALT LAKE CITY SKY Disc Eludes Pilot After Fast Chase

Officials of the U.S. Air Force launched an investigation late Monday on reports of an unidentified object in the sky resembling a "flying saucer."

The object was sighted first by a pilot Waldo J. Harris, Salt Lake City, as he was on a takeoff at the Utah Central Airport, 3200 W. 2100 South.

Seven other persons at the airport also said they had seen the "saucer" and watched it for about 15 minutes. The object was seen about noon Monday.

Air Force officials who began investigation of the sighting said that it was "undoubtedly the best report we have had of 'unidentified objects' in the area—one not identifiable as either an Echo satellite, a meteorite or a manned aircraft."

Mr. Harris told Hill Air Force Base security officers that "At first I thought it was another plane south of the field, but when I was airborne I was surprised to find the object was still in the same position as when I first sighted it."

"I changed my heading and flew toward what appeared to be a large disc hovering with a rocking motion at an altitude of between 6,500 and 7,000 feet," he declared.

He estimated the distance between the object and his plane as about five miles and that it appeared to be a light gray disc at least 50 feet across and four feet thick.

Mr. Harris said the object hovered for a time over the Utah Lake Omni station and then began moving west "at an extremely accelerated rate of speed" and disappeared.

All the other persons who said they saw the object agreed that it traveled at what appeared to be a high rate of speed.

Mr. Harris said there were no openings visible, no vapor trail or exhaust smoke, yet he was sure it was a controlled craft from the performance during his observation. The pilot followed the "saucer" when it began

its flight and then was able to observe it again when it suddenly halted and began hovering at a point almost directly over the Utah Lake Omni station.

"After hovering there," Mr. Harris said, "it moved straight up, then began to move west at an extremely accelerated rate of speed and disappeared within a few seconds."

During his entire flight, Mr. Harris maintained radio communication with both the Utah Central Airport and the Provo Airport.

In addition, he relayed the information to the FAA communications tower at the Salt Lake Municipal Airport.

Seven witnesses at Utah Central Airport reported sighting the object from the ground.

Virgil S. Redmond reported that "whatever it was seemed to be rocking while hovering almost stationary just south of the field. At times, as it turned, it almost looked like a zppelin."

"We passed the field glasses around," Mr. Redmond continued, "and all of us had a good view."

All the witnesses agreed that when the object moved, it was at a terrific rate of speed.

The Air Force said late Monday an investigator from Hill Air Force Base security division had conducted a routine investigation of the reported sightings of an UFO Monday noon.

The findings will no be forwarded to Air Force headquarters in Washington, D.C., for evaluation. (The Salt Lake Tribune, October 3, 1961. Credit: Mr. James D. Wardle, Salt Lake City, Utah.)

RECREATION DIRECTOR SEES SPACE JUNK IN SKY

Pembroke, Ont. A UFO was reported passing through the sky late Wednesday night by a Metcalfe Street resident. H.G. Wilson said he saw a bright spot in the clear night sky at 11:20 pm. Wednesday when he was getting out of his car. The spot, he said, moved slowly from a point directly overhead in a north easterly direction to the horizon. "It was bright just like the stars," Mr. Wilson said. "It moved slowly across the sky towards the horizon and appeared to stop about midway. After a few minutes it moved again. The whole thing took about 10 minutes." Mr. Wilson said he called a neighbor out to watch the thing with him. The pair phoned police at 11:30 pm. but police said no other reports of the object had been made. Mr. Wilson suggested that the object may have been one of many pieces of "space junk" floating around from satellite launchings. (The Pembroke Observer, August 10, 1961. SOVIET PHOTO SHOWS NEW OCEAN CREATURE

London (Reuters) Pravda published a photo of the ocean bed showing what it called "a gigantic trace of an animal so far unknown to science." Tass reported. It was taken nearly 10,000 feet down by the staff of the research ship Vityaz. The ship covered 30,000 miles in the Indian Ocean and was now on its 33rd cruise. SPACE CREATURES MAY EXIST

London (AP) Space travellers reaching the moon and other planets may find living organisms that have been lying dormant for millions of years, says a British medical scientist.

Frozen by the tremendous cold, they could be brought back to earth, thawed and returned to life, writes Dr. Audrey Smith of the National.

Reviewing current techniques of cooling men and animals to temperatures around the freezing point, she wrote:

"We now have to distinguish between clinical death and biological death." Clinical death means that animals can now be frozen so that their heart beats, circulation and brain activity stop. But they can be thawed out and brought back to life unharmed. The time limit so far is about 2 hours. In support of her theory, Dr. Smith made these points:

Many animal tissues can be frozen into indefinite suspended life after treatment with glycerol or other substances. Glycerol is produced internally by some insects and enables them to survive temperatures of 80 degrees below zero. There are insects and shellfish that can survive repeated freezing and thawing.

Scientists discovered recently that the larvae of an African insect survives complete drying out and then revives again when moisture is present. In its dried-out state it can stand immersion in liquid nitrogen at minus 300 degrees or five minutes exposure to temperatures of minus 400 degrees. On some planets, said Dr. Smith, extremes of temperature and drought may have developed over millions of years. Living creatures could, during this time, have evolved ways of surviving these extreme conditions in a state of suspended animation.

In more favorable surroundings, with higher temperatures and with moisture present, as on earth, they would come to life again, she said. (The Vancouver Province, October 10, 1961.)

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PENTAGON CALLS UTAH SAUCER 'BALLOONEY'

Air Force officers in the Pentagon said Wednesday they believed the UFO seen over Salt Lake valley last week was either the planet Venus or a research balloon.

Advised of the Pentagon's report, Waldo J. Harris, 531 Garfield Ave., a pilot who first spotted the UFO over Salt Lake Valley last week, snorted.

"If the Pentagon thinks I have eyes good enough to see Venus at high noon, they are really off the beam," he said.

"The object I saw was saucer shaped, had a grey color and moved under intelligent control. I got within three miles of it and that is a lot closer than Venus is," he added.

Mr. Harris said, "I have seen a lot of balloons too, and this was no balloon. It just doesn't make sense for the Pentagon to make such statements. Balloons move with the winds and air currents. This thing flew directly against a 10 mile per hour wind and at a terrific speed.

"I'd like to talk to that Pentagon spokesman," Mr. Harris added.

Investigation of the sighting was still under way by the Air Force UFO team at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

The Pentagon spokesman said saucer sightings were given high priority by the Air Defense Command as long as there was any chance that they were hostile.

Later investigations to identify precisely what was seen were given much lower priority.

12 LOOK TO VENUS FOR END TO "N" THREAT

Okehampton, England. (AP) High on a windy peak 12 people sat down, closed their eyes and raised their hands toward the planet Venus.

That is the way, they said, to rid the world of the threat of nuclear war. They tramped through bogs, heather and across rocky outcrops Sunday to the summit of 2,028 foot Yes Tor to make their weekly obeisance to the planet-- and the friendly people they say live up there.

"It will combat evil energy in the world and prevent future warfare," said Peter Lawless, a 32-year-old salesman. He and the others are members of the Aetherius Society, who say they can "absorb the goodness" which beings on Venus direct toward Yes Tor. The society is making a big push now because of the Soviet nuclear weapon tests. "Their evil influence has already been made manifest by meteorological disturbances like the Tristan da Cunha upheaval," Lawless said, referring to the recent volcanic eruption on the south Atlantic island.
