


DURATION OF OBSERVATIONS

 135 IFO reports --- (.)



CHARACTERISTICS OF UFO'S REPORTED

(* - indicates most commonly reported)

The UFO:

- moved slowly, changed altitude and then moved erratically(20% of the reports contained these characteristics).
- hovered in area, dropped altitude and took off(15% of the reports contained these characteristics).
- hovered in area , suddenly disappeared (*)

Characteristics cont't

- hovered over water. (*)
- hovered and moved quite fast. (*)
- hovered in area/moved in circles and changed colour.
- movement - stop - turn - movement.
- hovered in area - then joined several other objects.
- moved very fast - zig zagging across the sky.
- rotating
- objects left vapor trails * (5% of the 114 reports were of this type)
- descended towards ground but did not land (*)
- several objects hovering around a central object
- hovered - interfered with automobile (*)
- moved in a bobbing (upward downward movement)
- swooped down - then took - off upwards
- wobbled - losing altitude
- lit up area
- changed colours - emitted rays of light
- moved slowly (*)
- landed, then took off
- moved in a straight line (*)

SPECIAL REPORTPART 2 Hypnogogic and hypnopompic imagery

Psychologists have long been aware of a type of "imagery" which is self-generated within the human mind. It is the perception of something which is not input through the normal (eyes, ears etc.) sense organs, although it is encountered in normal, healthy people in the period between sleep and wakefulness. The intermediate state between wakefulness and sleep is termed hypnogogic and between sleep and final wakefulness, hypnopompic.

Hypnopompic images most often occur with eyes closed, but may also occur with the eyes open in a darkened environment. Their content is visual or auditory in the main but may also include sensations of heat/cold, smell or touch. They may be reproductions of the events of the day or strange, foreign or bizarre images, which can be at times pleasing or frightening. A person has little control over the appearance, departure or content, and one of the most basic auditory image is of 'hearing' one's name

being called, bringing one's full senses. The images range from simple to truly integrated scenes. The most common visual images is "faces in the dark".

Very often the images are vivid and realistic, and there is an unusual clarity of detail. Durations range from a few seconds to minutes, and persons experiencing these images comment on the unusual quality of the colour and lighting, using phrases such as "strange luminosity".

The incidence of some kind of imagery amongst healthy individuals has been found from surveys to range from 51-77% of the population, and because of its sometimes bizarre nature, it can be related to supernatural causes by some people. As an example of just how real these images can be on a normal person, I will relate one such account. A young couple had a routine of the wife getting breakfast ready for her husband, and then seeing him off to work.

One morning she recalled getting out of bed, washing, dressing, preparing breakfast and then kissing her husband goodbye. At this point she "woke up" to find her husband kissing her goodbye. She was still in bed, and had been all the time, while her husband had gotten up and made his own breakfast.

To her, her image was real, coloured and three dimensional and could not be told from reality until she really woke up. The couple went to see a psychologist because they thought there was something wrong. You may recall hearing of people who woke up, then really woke up, a sort of false awaking.

REPORT OF INTEREST

February 20th, 1978 - 1800z
Hwy #7 - near Flaxcomb, Saskatchewan
File no. C78/064

While driving on highway #7, Mr. A. (name being withheld by UFO CANADA), sighted a round object flying over an approaching truck, bobbing up and down. As the two trucks approached, the UFO flew over the oncoming vehicle, passing between both trucks. The UFO was about the size of a large car. It appeared dark, probably brown with an orange multi-colour glow around it. A fairly loud sound probably high pitched, was reported. Mr. A. further added that when the UFO passed above him, his radio stopped working.

The UFO continued on the path of the other truck. When it was approximately 2 blocks away, the trucks electrical equipment returned to normal. Duration about one minute.

Note; The other driver involved could not be located. Also it is interesting to note a similar report from B.C. January 5th, 1977, published in UFO CANADA vol. 1 no. 1 .

IFO REPORT FROM MANITOBA

October 22nd, 1978 - Winnipeg International Airport, 9:20 p.m. local.

The crew of an Air Canada flight from Ottawa/Montreal, reported the observation of a mysterious red light while on the aircraft's final approach. The pilot radioed the control tower requesting information on the light. Apparently, the control tower acknowledged observing the light but could not identify it. Furthermore, the radar scope did not register anything. Also it seems that two loud explosions were reported by local residents at approximately the same time.

INVESTIGATION:

Local police and the R.C.M.P.'s investigation into this report revealed that; the explosions were caused by two garbage bags filled with helium, argon and acetylene gases. Attached to these bages were road flares. Eventually, the flares burned through the bages which caused the explosion and the disappearance (and appearance) of the red light which, "exploded and disappeared" described one control tower official described. Two Winnipeg men have been arrested and charged with possession of an explosive substance and intent to cause an explosion.
