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EDITORIAL - 'NUFON Publications'

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 In the last issue of the newsletter a questionnaire was featured regarding the publications output of NUFON. I should like to thank all those who responded, which was certainly more than expected. Some useful suggestions materialised.

It was quite clear that most people felt it was essential that something be produced every month, although size could be variable dependant on data available. As for a separate publication a number of people did think this was worth considering. It was suggested that this be non-regular and sold on a single issue basis with fully detailed accounts of cases and research articles, as and when there is material to produce one. Suggested prices ranged from 30 - 50p, and certainly this would be economically viable within the present system.

As for the contents of this newsletter people seemed quite happy. The general concensus was that sighting data was THE most important thing to include, but that group activities ought to be publicised IF of general interest. There were interesting specific ideas for articles on individual researchers and what they are doing (anyone care to write one?), for a letters page (which has been tried with limited success) and perhaps the most easy to implement GUEST EDITORIALS. This latter idea would certainly give a fresh look to this front page and allow individuals to put forward views on any aspect of ufology. Any contributions on these lines will be gratefully received.

Of course many people said that they wanted MORE information and more detailed reports. This is only possibly, as they recognised, if the material is contributed.

At the last NUFON meeting it was decided to set up a publications panel to examine NUFONs publications priorities. It is of course an impossible task for your editor to produce EVERYTHING which could be produced. The idea of the informal panel was to share the load by getting a handful of people (with either experience or purely enthusiasm) to work on various publications projects. It is to be remembered that NUFONs publications are the one tangible outlet for what we are doing.

At the moment there are several publications projects which need considering:

- 1) The catalogue of historical northern cases, which a team of four is already working on. People to do local historical research (ie in press files) are needed.
- 2) The compilation of a special investigations publication, featuring specialist articles on types of cases (eg photographic, contactee) and checklists on suggested methods of investigation. This publication would also list all NUFON procedures, services and advisors.
- 3) The examination of the feasibility of producing a sporadic publication with more detailed reports, possibly professionally produced - and if it proves possible, the regular preparation of material for this.

Supplementing the above we would like to see more groups contributing research reports on any aspect of Ufology for possible publication as a separate paper.

It is obvious that with all this work, and other ideas which people might want to develop, at least half a dozen people are needed. The editor and treasurer would certainly assist on all publications (financially viability will always need to be considered) but it needs additional help if any of these things are to get off the ground. So if you are interested write NOW and offer, either in general or in specific terms. Not only do we need data compilers, typists, but printing facilities and distributors also. These publications are needed, but the regularity of the newsletter quite clearly must also be maintained.

GENERAL NEWS

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!! Plans are being made by BUFORA to stage a follow up to the highly successful scientific conference at Hanley in 1975. It is good to announce that one of NUFONs strongest supporters, UFOSIS, will be doing the organisational administration. The conference will cover a full weekend at a large hotel in the centre of Birmingham - it is hoped on October 9th and 10th. The programme will be not orientated towards the public and will consist of specialist lectures and seminars involving top researchers. More details as soon as they are available.

!! It has been noted that many people have been finding it hard to obtain copies of the excellent new American UFO publication 'Official UFO'. This is produced for the news-stands but is of good quality and has many fascinating articles by well known researchers. It is well worth 40p for its 64 pages. Since markets in the UK are limited and in order to ensure that the paradoxical situation does not arise where the distribution stops because people are not buying it, whereas there are those who would do but cannot get it, then NUFON has made some enquiries with a stockist. It is possible to arrange to obtain a copy for you if you are having any problems. Please let us know as soon as possible if interested. In the current (May 1976 issue) there is a real eye-opening article about the Centre For UFO Studies and Dr. J. Allen Hynek. No ufologist can afford to miss that. Also included are studies of UFO occupants, how to take photographs of UFOs and current sightings and photos.

!! It is hoped that the NUFON report on 1975 will be produced in time for sale at the Sheffield convention. Sale price will be about 20 - 25p.

FOREIGN NEWS

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As previously noted Mike Dean of WUFOS has been undertaking some foreign liaison work for NUFON. In an effort to improve contacts abroad he is now being helped by Bryan Hartley (of FAPURG). Bryan sends the following report from Russia.

"An expedition from the Tomsk University in Central Siberia will this Summer continue the cosmO-chemical survey of soil in the area where the Tungus 'Meteorite' fell on June 30th 1908. It contradicted the classical laws of the science of meteorites. It was destroyed when it exploded some five kilometers above the ground and fell on the Taiga Forests over an area of some 2200 Sq. Kms. The shock wave caused seismic disturbances all over the world. In spite of the enormous mass of the body (according to latest calculations it weighed 100,000 tonnes) not a single splinter has been found in the area of the explosion. Soviet scientists discovered that the natural rate of change of heredity in plants in the region speeded up about 12 times. This MAY have been caused by hard radiation (which affords with the hypothesis that it was a nuclear blast), but it may also have been a consequence of the forest fire and strong magnetic storm in the centre of the catastrophe. The new comprehensive expedition has been set the task of finding the answer to what happened in the forests of Siberia on the day the Tungus meteorite fell."

INVESTIGATIONAL ZONING:!

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An interesting possibility now that NUFON has stabilised itself is a clear demarcation amongst groups of investigation zones. Already certain 'agreements' exist between local groups close together (eg in Greater Manchester) where overlap is avoided but there could be definite advantages from making a determined effort to negotiate a structured understanding over the whole NUFON region. Obviously it is of paramount importance that there be no duplication of investigation. It is vital that groups establish clear and working arrangements with their neighbouring organisations. There must be AT LEAST regular phone contact to ensure each is aware of the others current batch of cases, and it is a very good idea (as is operated elsewhere) to ensure that groups meet together quite frequently. This latter can be very useful for pooling of ideas on evaluation. It ought not to be difficult at all to clarify definite 'areas' of coverage so that when a report is received there will be an automatic transference. This would facilitate work at NUFON also since arbitrary judgements about which of one or two possible groups to pass on a report to would be un-necessary. Perhaps the aspect which is most important, however, involves outlying regions. Groups tend to exist in urban areas and it is known that these are LESS productive of hard core UFO reports than countrified ones (Think about it. UFOS land in open land not on a motorway!) Groups should carefully consider 'spreading' their areas out of their bases and taking in those not previously covered by ufologists. Letters and articles in local press, isolated individual members (at a reduced membership fee because of travel problems) may bring great dividends in discovering important cases. It should not be hard to devise a system of coverage for all the north, utilising the current associate groups. Think about it, and if you have not already contact your neighbours NOW.

Whilst working on the NUFON 1975 report I inevitably came to the section dealing with statistics and looked with interest at the figures for reports per month of the year. Not unexpectedly there were trends visible. I will not go into them here as they will be included in the report but the question remains as to how real they are. It is interesting to note that we are going through the traditional 'low' period in the year (February - April) which is being borne out by the level of reports this year. Then again August is virtually guaranteed to produce a sudden burst of activity. Do we accept that there is an inherent problem within the mechanics of ufology which causes this inconsistency of level, or is it a sociological or psychological factor? The latter must have something to do with it. August nights are warmer, people are apt to look at the sky more, there are rich meteor showers then, and so it is not altogether unexpected that this 'high' and 'low' should occur. What is more difficult to explain is the peak around October/November which has been very apparent in recent years. I recall a study in one of the first issues of this newsletter (two years ago) which contrasted the level of sightings reported with publicity given to the subject. Correlations certainly existed, as we would anticipate, but not to the degree that one might think. It would appear that we have yet to solve the problem as to whether waves are an inherent ufological phenomenon, and further research is needed. Trevor Whitaker has commented before on the need for a comprehensive public opinion survey. As he says we need to know what percentage of the population who see things actually report them. This is very true, but I suggest we need to know much more. We need, for example, to know about people's viewing habits. When, and for how long, are they in a position to see anything unexplained in the sky. There would need to be a great deal of thought put into a survey, not only to make it comprehensive but to ensure that data of value came out of it. It would be no good concentrating on one geographical area since accusations of local anomalies could always be levelled. Quite probably the involvement of statisticians and computer facilities would be needed - and these ARE available for UFO work, provided it is the right work. Consequently I would urge those people who are thinking in terms of 'opinion surveys' (and I have heard of one or two) to sit down and think first. We need to combine ideas, plan thoroughly and initiate a major project. Ufology will never be solved by half-baked attempts. If something is to be of any value then it has to be done thoroughly.

MORE REPORTS FROM IRELAND:: BUFORA (Ireland)
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Both these cases, supplied by Miles Johnstone and John Hind, are from long ago. Perhaps those interested in optics and astronomy can comment on possible explanations.

ABOUT 1965:: Two senior citizens driving along the Bangor-Belfast road had stopped to repair a puncture. They saw two faint white discs, larger than the apparent size of a car wheel (distance unknown). They had raised portions on top. Seen through the windscreen the two objects approached each other from opposite sides of the window. As they met they merged and disappeared with no sound or other effects. The total duration was estimated as five minutes (probably in excess) $\frac{1}{2}$. The investigators believe this may have been some form of illusion, possible reflection through the screen.

SUMMER 1966: Mrs T is a housewife. At the time she was 34, and at home with her 70 year old mother. They lived in a bungalow which afforded a marvellous view over the lough at Belfast, with a wide horizon. It was a warm afternoon with the sky 'duck egg' blue. The object first appeared at a low elevation and moved slowly across the horizon. It was shaped like a rounded egg and was the same colour as the moon when seen in the daylight sky. Consequently it was hard to pick out against the sky and Mrs T's mother was unable to see it. The object was the apparent size of an egg at arms length, and it moved towards Bangor at a steady and silent pace. At first the witness thought it to be an optical illusion, but it remained in view for more than five minutes. On one occasion it passed behind a tree and eventually it was lost behind other objects on the horizon. The witness is still not of the opinion that this was anything strange and displays the usual 'need' to find a rational explanation for it. She was quite happy to accept the theory, put forward by a friend, that it was a satellite, although in actual fact considering the description of the event this is most improbable. It seems reminiscent of several observations made by nineteenth century astronomers. Any suggestions?



HISTORICAL CASE REVIEWS: Ian Cresswell

Tribute must be paid to Ian, who does much work for NUFON typing up historical cases for inclusion in the files. Although it is not possible to do his reports justice, and indeed we would not wish to plagiarise since mostly they come from older UFO journals, they are an invaluable asset to the growing research bank.

An interesting report comes from FSR Case Histories, and involves a case investigated by DIGAP. Can they throw any further light onto this investigation please:

"February 12 1972 at Haydock. Several teenage girls and a 31 year old housewife were witness to a glowing ball of blue light, surrounded by a white flare. It was about 6 feet in diameter and about 60 feet up. It made a noise like a police car siren and not only was distressing to the human ear, but effected animal life also. The police were called but refused to believe the story. Time 18.30. It seems possible that this was an electrical phenomena akin to ball lightning. Any comments? "

NOTES ON PREVIOUS CASES:

Thanks again due to Ian Cresswell for bringing our attention to a report from Runcorn, as featured in the local newspaper of July 6 1967. It concerns a young married couple and family who observed a glowing oval shaped firey object hovering over their roof at about 2am. It was making a whirring noise, which was plainly audible. Ian notes this in connection with the 'Hough Green Sound' (see Issue 22), both temporarily and geographically (Hough Green is quite close to Runcorn).

Report 7616 (UFOSIS) : The investigators would like to make it clear that they are still pursuing this case, and hope to be able to answer shortly some of the questions posed last month, along with certain discrepancies which have materialised since. One additional fact to note is that a back up witness was allegedly in existence BUT on checking the address UFOSIS found that these people did not know anything about the sighting.

Report 7622 (MUFORA) : Considerably more data is to hand on this case from Winsford dated March 31st 1976 (see issue 23). As previously noted no aircraft were in the vicinity and the wind was at a bearing of 270 degrees at the time. The drawing as included last month is in error. A corrected one is shown opposite. The arrow indicates the object which broke formation. The other objects flew into cloud, came out again, and then turned a SHARP RIGHT ANGLE to pursue the other. Eventually, after about 2mins, they all disappeared into cloud. The objects were "moving erratically as if piloted by a group of maniacs" and the one which left the main formation did so with tremendous acceleration. One of the objects seemed to drop something during its flight, though this was only seen by one of the teenage children. The two children and the aunt saw the objects again about 50 minutes later moving in the opposite direction. Although principally only a LITS case no explanation comes readily to mind, and comments would be welcome on any possibilities.



Report from 1968:

It is interesting to include this case, since the witness was NUFON Treasurer, Peter Warrington, and it was the event which really set his involvement going in the UFO phenomenon. It occurred sometime during the Summer of 1968, at Higher Disley in Cheshire. The time was about 21.30 and Peter was looking out of an open cottage window towards the west as he listened to an aircraft making a landing approach to Manchester Airport on his small radio. About one mile behind the aircraft, at a height estimated to be around 2000 feet, he saw a red/orange oval shape which was either stationary or moving very slowly. It was in view for about 45 seconds, and disappeared when he looked away momentarily. He thought he may have seen it shoot upwards, but cannot be certain. The apparant size was that of a pea at arms length and no sound was heard, although there was considerable distance between the place of observation and the object. Nothing unusual was reported by the airport, and the object was definitely a physical object and not a reflection as Peter took steps to check for this. As he says it is not a report which would be treated as highly significant nowadays, but it was unexplained and worth recording.

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
Unfortunately there were no new reports of importance or enough substance to warrant a special supplement. Naturally these will be included as and when appropriate.

7461 December 10 1974 Inverness, Scotland Investigation: Edinburgh UFO RS

At 17.30 Mr Mudd, who is 24, was returning home. He saw two bright stars in the sky. One was identified subsequently as being the planet Jupiter, but the other was firey red in colour and was no known stellar phenomenon. He called to his wife and they both now saw two balls of light moving NW on an undulating path. The upper one was a transparent yellow. They remained in view 4-5 minutes, moving in and out of cloud, and alternating positions. Finally they disappeared behind houses. It is thought possible that this might have been ball lightning, as the area was very stormy at the time.

7462 August 5th 1974 Birmingham Investigation: UFOSIS

This case is of interest for several reasons, as UFOSIS point out. It is a great pity that the two known witnesses have only come forward with their story recently. It was about 22.50 and two men were walking towards a bus stop. An aircraft was seen on the horizon going into Birmingham airport. A few degrees further along several large oval objects appeared in a formation (see report 7622). There were between 9 and 12 and the size was something akin to a tennis ball. They moved exceptionally fast and with no sound across the horizon in a matter of seconds. Two objects broke the formation briefly and then returned to their original positions. The following day one of the witnesses contacted Birmingham airport. After being passed around he spoke to the duty officer who proffered several ridiculous explanations, eg that they were migrating gese!!! The officer said that many people had reported this sighting and if the witness called back he would check it out. When he tried to do so the officer in question was repeatedly 'unavailable' and no information was forthcoming.



75123 December 13 1975 A61 (Leeds- Maltby) Investigation: SDR UFORA

The witness is a salesman. He was driving along the road at 21.25 when he saw a ball of light in the sky with a green middle and a feathery tail coming out of the back. It appeared suddenly, as if from nowhere, and disappeared within a matter of 3 seconds. The apparent size of the object was 2 1/2 inches at arms length.



On its own this would be of little importance, quite probably relating to a fireball of some description. It is interesting to note it in connection, however, with the several sightings made on that weekend (as noted in previous issues) especially the important cases from Swinton in Greater Manchester (see Special Supplement Number 2- Feb 1976)

This weekend seems to have an extraordinarily high concentration of reports worldwide.

7623 February 1976 Nottingham Investigation: NUFOLS

This reports seems to have been conclusively identified. It was made, probably, on February 29th and concerns lights seen in the sky over the Park in Nottingham. The concensus of opinion seems to have been that they were flares or distress rockets from the nearby Ruddington Army Camp.

7625 March 20 1976 Bridlington Investigation: Derick Shelton

At 22.35 25 year old Mr Fargus was out in his garden. He saw a white ball of light which he at first took to be a meteor. However, he noticed that it did not burn out but continued to fly steadily in a NE direction for about one minute. He went indoors to find another witness, but the object had gone. About one minute later two further similar objects appeared travelling side by side. These moved in the same direction and were surrounded by a reddish glow. All three objects were silent.

40 year old Mrs Oxley and her 13 year old daughter were taking the dog for a walk at 21.40. Behind some houses and in the sky they saw two white lights very close together and stationary. There was an indistinct dark mass in between. The object remained for several minutes hovering in this position, below 1000 feet and quite close to the witnesses. Then it began to head towards them slowly and descend. There was no sound. Despite its proximity. Both women were now very frightened as it appeared to be approaching them. They called to a neighbour who was passing. He looked up and then hurried home also frightened. The two witnesses went to the house of a friend and she and her mother came outside and saw the object moving slowly away to the south east. At this point a reddish glow surrounded the object and a deep humming sound began to build up. Become intensely frightened and confused. Now the object was lost into the distance. The incident was reported to the police, who had received other sightings. They subsequently 'explained' it as a light aircraft, although the investigator has checked and feels that there is little likelihood of this being the case. The story was reported in the Hull Daily Mail the next day, and there were definite errors in this report. It is still not certain whether the object moved eastwards or south west, but the press description that Mrs. Oxley reported an 'engine' noise does not at all correspond with her personal testimony as to the nature of the sound (which was NOT heard when the object was closest)

THE FOLLOWING TWO REPORTS DATE FROM MARCH 22 1976. READERS ARE ASKED TO REFER TO REPORT 7621 (April 1976 issue) WHICH RELATES TO A CASE AT 22.02 ON THE SAME NIGHT.

7626 March 22 1976 Harborne, Birmingham Investigation: UFOSIS

The witness is a former police officer well acquainted with the passage of normal night time phenomena, eg aircraft. She reports seeing a white light, about the magnitude of a bright star, with a hazy reddish tinge underneath. It moved rapidly across the sky on a course ENE to East, at a speed in excess of a normal aircraft. No sound was heard by the witness, but as the object passed overhead many dogs in the neighbourhood began to bark furiously. This began at the nearby Police-Dog training centre! Time 20-50

7627 March 22 1976 Hall Green, Birmingham Investigation: UFOSIS

Mrs W, an elderly housewife, went out into her garden at about 22.20 (time uncertain) to look through her sons telescope. He is an amateur astronomer and often out at night. Whilst he was getting it set up she glanced upwards and saw at an elevation of some 70 to 75 degrees many lights flying in formation. There were at least twenty, though possibly more. They kept a tight formation of most unusual description throughout the duration of the sighting (which was simulated by UFOSIS and the witness as 6 - 8 seconds) Their colour was yellow and they appeared somewhat spherical, with several points (five or six) around each light. They moved silently south to east, very fast. Mrs W's son did not respond to her call quickly enough to see the objects, since they dimmed momentarily and then just went out 'as if switched off'. UFOSIS are checking for other witnesses to this unusual observation, but the local ATC were unhelpful in checking aircraft flight paths.



7628 March 24th 1976 Arbroath, Scotland Investigation: EDINBURGH UFO

Nothing more than an LITS report, of a white light moving SE. In view one minute and too dim to be seen with the naked eye (8 x 40 binoculars used). It disappeared by just going out. The witness is acquainted with astronomical observations and said it moved too slowly for a meteorite and too quickly for a satellite.


7629 April 9 1976 Bolton Investigation: MUFORA

There were several reports of this sighting in the Bolton Evening News. The witness as featured therein has not been traced, but a Mr Taylor was interviewed. His description tallies well with the newspaper reports, except that there the trail was reported as being red and green. The time was 21.45, location Tonge. A bright blue ball of light with a whitish trail streaked across the sky from south to north in about five seconds. It appeared to be self luminous. It seems possible that this report refers to some type of fireball. Is anyone aware of any recorded on this date?

This report came to MUFORA via the Oldham Chronicle. It had been reported to them, and to the police. The story was not printed by the paper, but MUFORA agreed to pass on any interesting details. It concerns three girls (aged 15 and 16) although there were reputedly other older witnesses which MUFORA are trying to track down. At 21.20 the girls were

walking towards the bus stop looking towards a church. One of the girls pointed out the object, which appeared as a reddish oval the apparent size of an orange. It was fuzzy in outline and had a yellow/orange centre. As they watched it hover it grew brighter and started to flicker. It appeared to grow larger and slightly alter shape, though

maintaining a tilted angle. It then started to move to the north west and downwards. One of the girls felt that it moved faster at first and then slowed down. They started to run to try to follow it but it passed out of sight behind a building. The story remains unaltered in statements to the press and to MUFORA, excepting the time factor which would appear to be only 1 - 2 minutes rather than 3 - 5 minutes as quoted to the reporters. As stated MUFORA is still pursuing investigation into this case, although no explanation for it has materialised so far.

Investigation: MUFORA

Mrs Ellis was sitting in her living room with a neighbour when they saw a green/turquoise light moving steadily and silently across the sky on a north to south course. It remained in view for two minutes and then seemed to drop from the sky and land in some fields. Some local children went to investigate but found nothing. On investigation it would appear possible that the apparent landing was illusory since the fields over which it was seen have been recently excavated and mounds of earth make the skyline very uneven. However, further investigation into the case is being made.

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April 23 1976

Haslingden

Investigation: RIGAP

At 02.32, Tim Evans of RIGAP observed the passage of a yellow white starlike object with his father also as witness. The light was moving through layers of cloud in a southerly direction, at an elevation of 5 degrees. It appeared between the stars Castor and Pollux and was in view two minutes, possibly exhibiting a slight bobbing motion (although this may have been due to cloud cover). At the same time an aircraft was in view heading towards Manchester airport, but this was quite distinct and was the only traffic. Tim is of course familiar with astronomical phenomena, being in charge of the Rossendale Astronomical Society and no bright satellites have been traced to account for the observation.

NB: AT 4.30 pm ON THE ABOVE DATE A REPORT HAS JUST COME INTO THE HANDS OF FAPURG, FROM SAMLESBURY, NEAR PRESTON. MORE DETAILS ON THIS NEXT MONTH.
