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+ BALL OF WHITE LIGHT SEEN OVER ASH VALE +  
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A brilliant white light was seen in the sky over Ash Vale in mid-May by Mrs. White. She saw it between 3 a.m. and 4 a.m. one morning from her house in Homely Crescent, Frimley Road.

Mrs. White said: "I looked out of the window and saw a brilliant light in the West over the "George Inn". It was visible for only a few seconds. It was round and made no noise".

This sighting was investigated by S.I.G.A.P. Chairman Omar Fowler. He says in his investigator's report:-

"When I interviewed Mrs. White several interesting facts came to light not directly connected with the sighting in question. She told me that her husband died some three years ago. About six months after his death she had a peculiar dream. In this dream she saw a saucer outside her house. The occupants came inside and took away her children. She was so alarmed at this that when she woke up she went into her childrens' bedroom to see if they were still there. Mrs. White also mentioned that she had never believed in the 'Lord' but after dreaming that he was in a triangular cloud looking down at her she looked out of her window and saw such a cloud. She now believes in the 'Lord'.

"As regards the May sighting, Mrs. White emphasised that the light was so bright that it was impossible to describe it and then in a flash it was gone.

"Mrs. White appeared quite genuine during the interview".

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
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+ UFO OVER GUILDFORD +
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An orange UFO shaped like a half-circle was seen over Guildford one night in June by Miss Dorothy Raggett. Miss Raggett is unable to give us the exact date of the sighting but says it was around the middle of the month. She saw the object from her house in Worplesdon Road, Guildford.

Says Miss Raggett: "It was sometime after midnight. I was in bed looking out of my window when I suddenly saw a very bright orange object. At first I thought it was the moon, but then it dawned on me that it was the wrong shape and colour. I quickly put on my glasses and hurried to the window to see it better. I listened, but all was quiet, not a sound anywhere. It was a very dark night with no stars. The object was moving very slowly from the Guildford direction towards Woking. It was a most brilliant orange and looked about ten inches along the top and five to six inches in depth in the centre. I watched it for about five minutes I should think, then it suddenly vanished and all was darkness. I am most interested and should like to know what it was and if anyone else saw it". S.102

She works for some friends of mine, Captain and Mrs. C. C. Dingle of Worplesdon and it was to Mrs. Dingle that Miss Raggett described her experience. The Dingles took the first opportunity to mention it to me and arranged for me to meet Miss Raggett at their home. She strikes me as a reliable and truthful person".

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+ BIGGIN HILL UFO +  
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A mysterious circular light passed over Biggin Hill, Kent just after midnight on July 17. It was seen by Mr. and Mrs. S. V. Russell, of Sutherland Avenue, Biggin Hill.

Said Mrs. Russell, a secretary: "I was awakened at 12.45 a.m. by a stillness and smell, which I assumed was from the cesspits. But as it wasn't a warm night I thought it unusual. Then I heard a sudden short burst of a light aircraft engine. It was unusual because I did not hear it approach or recede. From my bed I saw a large circular light travelling at excessive speed. It was so unusual that I went to the window and called my husband. We watched it travelling in the direction of Surrey. It was not an aeroplane as it was travelling too fast. On the other hand it wasn't going fast enough to be a meteorite and it kept at a very regular height. The colour of the light was apricot".

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+ BALL LIGHTNING IN NORMANDY HOUSE +

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Ball lightning is a rare atmospheric phenomena and when seen can be confused with globular UFOs. Most members will probably not have heard of the report of ball lightning in a Normandy house early last year. Mr. and Mrs. Johnston and their two children were in the sitting room of their bungalow on the afternoon of Sunday, February 19, 1967. It had been raining for some time. David Johnston decided to use the telephone which is situated in a recess by the stairs. After a little while the silence was shattered by an explosion, later described by Mrs. Johnston as a loud popping followed by a clap of thunder.

At that instant the telephone went dead and from the telephone protector appeared a ball of fire.

It was the size and shape of a narrow light bulb and had a yellow-orange colour, surrounded by a "fuzzy blue edge". It travelled slowly behind Mrs. Johnston who was sitting with her back to the telephone protector box, scorching her neck and singeing her hair. Later she complained of headache. The fireball then crossed the room in silence towards the fire, then changed direction and headed towards a power socket on the skirting board. At that moment the fireball increased in size and changed shape. It was now "more octagonal with jagged edges". On reaching the power socket the fireball shrunk until it disappeared. Later investigations by a maintenance telephone engineer showed that the telephone earth wire had become disconnected at some time in the past.

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Up to a few years ago I had no reason to believe or disbelieve in the existence of "flying-saucers". About seven years ago on a fine clear October night I was entering our drive with the family in the car when we all spotted in approximately the North West, at a height I should have accessed as 2,000 feet, a very bright stationary light.
