My first sighting was on the 11th of April, and I had stepped outside into a beautiful starry night hoping to see the Echo I satellite which was due at 9.12 p.m. At about 9.10 p.m. I was looking in the general direction that the satellite would appear from, when I noticed what I first took to be the satellite, but this one was blinking! Or rather, not blinking in the true sense of the word, for it never really went out, just brightened and dimmed. It came rapidly towards me then turned away south blinking its light all the time until it finally disappeared.

Throughout the sighting (which lasted 2 minutes) there was no 'plane engine noise, and although I trained my binoculars on it I could see nothing except the white blinking light. Then Mr. Creighton went on to say how in North American legends there were reports of a murderous flying thing called a "Thunderbird", which carried off men. After explaining this he gave several more spine-chilling reports, including two from Russia. In the first of these a woman parachutist jumped from a 'plane and vanished. She reappeared three days later many miles away saying she had been taken into space by a UFO and had a message to give to the chief of police. This was in an envelope, and she gave it to him, but no-one found out what the message said. The other case concerned a Soviet 'plane found intact in a field with all crew missing. There was a similar report to this, where an R.A.F. aircraft in Iraq was found intact in the desert with its pilot missing. The pilot's tracks ended abruptly a little way from the 'plane.

After this the famous Ken Arnold sighting was mentioned. Apparently Arnold was looking for a missing 'plane when he saw his nine UFOs. This was later found crashed, but no bodies were inside it.

To end his lecture Mr. Creighton gave an account of the Fred Regan incident, where the pilot was found unconscious a little way from his smashed aircraft. When he came round he gave a story of how a "flying lozenge" had ripped his wing off while he was flying at 8,000 feet, and he fell out of his 'plane. Suddenly he stopped falling and hung suspended by a sticky, clinging force and was drawn into a UFO. He was held over the orifice, with the ground still visible below him, and saw strange shapes around him, like 3' stalks of metallic asparagus. One moved towards him and he fainted. When he came round he was lying on a substance which resisted his movements as if it was alive. He heard a click and a voice said, "How do you do, man?", and proceeded to give a message saying that they were sorry for the inconvenience and in return they had cured him of cancer. The message ended, "Think of us in kindness". A little later Regan died of brain degeneration due, it was said, to intense atomic radiation.

ORTHOTENY - A KEY TO THE ENIGMA? 22/5/65. Lecture by Michael Holt.

Until Autumn 1954 all UFO sightings were isolated occurrences, and it was this fatal "non-reproductibility" that aroused the scepticism in scientific circles. This, said Mr. Holt, was quite legitimate, for isolated incidents can never be studied by scientific analysis, they must be repeatable and show a pattern. Taking the evidence of witnesses, he said, could not be regarded as scientific study, because testimony is the field of the lawyer, not the scientist, and it was for this reason that science could not be interested in UFOs.

But on September 17th, 1954 the picture suddenly changed. Aime Michel made his revolutionary discovery of "orthoteny" (the word comes
