Many hopes have been pinned on scientific analysis being able to provide the much-sought 'litmus test' to determine 'genuine' crop formations, and one of the flagships for this which has been much fanfared by CCCS this year is the work of ADAS (Agricultural Development and Advisory Service), a division of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (MAFF). ADAS, which can apparently be commissioned for outside independent projects - or so it seemed - was paid by CCCS in 1995 to examine soil samples

taken from several formations of the season. The hope was that the results might show up anomalous readings which could point the way to providing the elusive acid test.

As the year progressed, initial results released from ADAS did indeed appear to show chemical anomalies in the soil from formations. Despite some disquiet from some that the results were too vague to really prove anything conclusively (a doubt that still stands) and that some of the sampling methods were flawed (in some cases, control samples were unwisely lumped together), it did at least point towards the fact that whatever process laid down the crop appeared to produce changes in the surrounding soil. ADAS were reluctant to release exact details of what they had discovered in the (misplaced) fear that hoaxers might start trying to replicate the effects by spraying chemicals (!), however, they did state that unusual amounts of nitrates made up most of the anomalies. Unperturbed by sceptics who claimed that a similar effect could be achieved by urinating inside crop circles, Mike Foley and David Yarham, the two ADAS officials who carried out most of the testing, were sufficiently excited to continue the work.

From the very start, however, voices of concern were raised (not least within the pages of SC) as to how impartial the final ADAS report could possibly be, given that government departments, however independent, are not usually quick to announce proof of the paranormal. Mike Foley, speaking at the CCCS Andover Conference, was asked if there was not a risk that ADAS could be pressurised from 'higher sources' to come up with a negative result, but he was dismissive of the possibility. The fear seemed well founded to outsiders though, because of the recent 'Bodmin Beast' stories of large killer cats attacking livestock in the West Country. ADAS

was instrumental in 'scientifically' deducing that no such beast existed - despite the fact that it very obviously did, as many farmers and witnesses testified. Many of these same farmers were threatened by MAFF officials to keep quiet (see letter, SC 45).

END GAME

**The ADAS honeymoon comes
to a devastating collapse...
ANDY THOMAS reports.**

In the last two months, events have occurred which entirely vindicate those who advised caution regarding the ultimate outcome of the ADAS results. A chain of events was set into motion in September, with sudden and unexpected radio

bulletins which went out across the country, stating that ADAS had come up with data which proved that not all crop circles were man-made. ADAS deny releasing this story to the media, as do CCCS, and the source of the story is not known. The reports had an immediate effect and were certainly encouraging news for circle researchers - to begin with. One person who was not amused by the story was an MP - as yet unnamed - who either heard the story or was alerted to it by others. He or she immediately contacted the Ministry of Agriculture and demanded to know what such a high-profile scientific organisation as ADAS was doing wasting its time on such ridiculous and obviously man-made things as crop circles. Questions regarding the status of ADAS are now expected to be raised in Parliament in the imminent future.

Unless the following events were just unfortunate timing, the effect was immediate - the particular department of ADAS which had carried out the soil tests for CCCS was shut down and Mike Foley and David Yarham, both skilled and valued staff members, were instantly made redundant, their professional reputations severely undermined as a result. Most distressingly, a few weeks later, David Yarham and his family suffered a near-fatal car crash when the steering mysteriously gave out on his vehicle. He is currently hospitalised, in traction. This **could** all be coincidence, but the practical upshot is the same - ADAS testing, in any useful form, is finished. Never again can official channels be trusted to perform this kind of work, openly at least. It'll be interesting to see if any official final statement is ever put out with regard to the ADAS testing, if only to rubbish the previous news reports. Whether the story of the irate MP is the real reason for the shutdown is questionable although sceptic politicians probably aren't that keen on seeing

government workers investigating what they think is bunk. More likely, somebody in high authority realised that a Ministry department had committed a major faux-pas by releasing positive indications that the crop circles are a genuine phenomenon, and the source had to be quashed at once, **very** firmly. As to the car-crash...

Once again, it would seem the frontiers of science are being very firmly held in check when it comes to

Last year, the CCCS 1995 Crop Circle Calendar was universally welcomed with open arms in that, as well as helping one get through the year datewise, it was the perfect pictorial round-up of the previous year's best formations. No matter what fascinating information one may disseminate about the circle phenomenon, what people really want at the end of the day are good visual references, usually aerial, of the actual formations themselves. The 1996 Crop Circle Calendar is clearly aware of this fact, and it proclaims itself "a celebration" of the phenomenon - yet everything about it seems to frustrate the purpose of its existence.

Let's start with the good points. It has a lovely cover with which to attract potential buyers (although its symbolism is perhaps a subtle warning of the disappointment to follow: darkened storm clouds roll ominously towards a ground shot of the Beckhampton spiral formation); there are one or two excellent photographs inside the calendar (but only one or two); and, blessed be, this year there is actually room to write something in the date blocks of the calendar itself.

However, the first thing alert buyers will suddenly realise, is that there are only six formations featured in the whole of the calendar. Including the cover, the first three pages are given over solely to the Beckhampton spiral. From there on, the routine is usually one aerial shot of a formation, followed on the next page by a ground shot of the same. The next thing these potential customers will ask themselves is: Where are some of the other 120 or so formations England had in 1995 - including most of the best ones? Where are the asteroid belt formations? The orbiting planets at Longwood?

researching anything which those in power would rather we didn't poke our noses into. Any further investigation into soil samples will have to take place in the private domain, although even private laboratories may have to watch their backs: a colleague of Colin Andrews, running some sample tests, recently had his workplace burnt down, with many research papers lost.

Mulder and Scully, where are you now? **AT**

The crescents at East Meon? The Kings Clere rape formations? The hypnotic rings at Cissbury?

At this point, if they have not already parted with their hard-earned £750, they may place it back from where it came, and carry on their lives in the hope that a proper celebration of the 1995 formations will appear in the not too distant future.

The point is this: if one is going to select only six formations to show the world just why the crop circles are a phenomenon worth getting excited about, they had better be good ones, and the photographs had better be stunning. However good the intentions behind it, the 1996 calendar doesn't fulfill this criterion.

With the exception of, as I said, one or two excellent pictures, the quality of the original photographs on offer here and the so-so colour reproduction are simply not good enough to justify such a narrow selection. Chosen more for their subjects and not their graphic qualities, the ground shots in particular are largely mundane and the printing has noticeably dulled some originals which were bright and vibrant. (The other five formations included are the Telegraph Hill quintuplet set, the Alfriston 'Catherine wheel', the Stratford 'eye', the Cowdown 'speaker cone' and the Kings Clere 'buzzsaw'. Last year's calendar had **sixteen** different formations.)

Why then such a restrictive choice? Credit must be given for the brave attempt to do something a little different and include some ground shots, but is this really what people want to put on their walls? Another factor is that CCCS have been openly defiant that the selection was made from only those formations which, in their minds, they could be sure of as being 'genuine' - one must presume ADAS,

dowsing and rumour-listening played a large part in this selection process, all methods which have as many cons as pros. This was to ensure there could be no risk of a 'hoaxer' subsequently coming forward to claim a formation which had been publicised by CCCS. How awful that would be. How silly we would all look. But did any of these frightening scenarios come about from last year's calendar which simply chose the **best** looking formations? Of course not. And if they had, one could always point to the (unnecessary anyway) 'disclaimer' which was printed on the front, saying that the origins of crop circles were not known. A crop formation is a crop formation, whatever created it.

If no pronouncements are ever made with regard to the status of individual formations, there can never be a problem. CCCS is showing an unhealthy tendency towards pronouncing and the calendar selection could be construed as just such an endorsement process and the beginning of CCCS censorship; we only get to see what we are allowed

Colin Andrews' latest video venture UFOs, Crop Formations & The Paranormal is a joint effort with his two chums Busty 'pilot extraordinaire' Taylor and Reg 'The Troggs' Presley. But wait a minute, get a look at that subtitle: "The Secrets Unfold, As Time Runs Out". Wow! Obviously the contents of this video are going to be a blockbuster, so your intrepid reviewer hurriedly throws it into his video recorder, ASAP. Oh dear, oh dear, what a disappointment. This extremely low-budget film has been put together at a single location in the countryside around a picnic bench with virtually no extra cut-ins and contains nothing apart from general chit-chat with the three boys. OK, so there's a shot of Busty's infamous jelly (a substance found in a crop circle) and a few seconds of this year's formations but beyond that the content ranks as very undramatic. Each of the boys does a fifteen minute dead-pan resume of who they are followed by twenty-five minutes of around-the-picnic-bench general chatter. It's a bit like our chats over the Potters Arms after CCCS Sussex branch meetings but the beer, atmosphere and joviality are missing.

It's not immediately obvious who this video is targeted at. Colin introduces himself as if this is the first time you have ever laid eyes upon him but then drops in buzz words all over the place which newcomers would simply not understand. For seasoned croppies there is nothing new here, no revelations and nothing of substance (apart from Busty's jelly). The ending is so dire and stretched out that my wife actually left the room, she could bear it no more. There is no way you would show this film to your friends as it is, quite honestly, an embarrassment. You will watch it once and then never again, unlike, for instance, Crop Circle Communique which is eminently rewatchable and extremely good for lending out to sceptical friends. Clearly, a lot of effort has gone into releasing this calendar, with personal finances having been donated to enable its publication, and the thinking behind it obviously has the best interests of the CCCS at heart. However, something seems to have gone slightly awry somewhere, and it must be viewed as a heroic failure at best, a noble experiment. The CCCS, in its current state of flux, should be aware that such a high-profile piece of merchandise invariably reflects the condition and aspirations of the entire organisation behind it: if the calendar is seen to fit this model, people may not like what they find. **AT**

24 minutes and counting...

What might have been a beautifully presented video record of recent events in cerealogy, became a textbook degradation of the crop circle phenomenon by ABC television's 20/20 programme producers in the US. For three days in July 1995, while taping views of crop circle designs and

recording the sincere comments of American and British researchers in south-western England, the 20/20 producers put together the elements of what could have been an excellent twenty minute segment for worldwide broadcast later on October 20th. But, something happened on the way to the studio...

Contributions to the production were made in July by some of the world's most experienced crop circle researchers, who, as they assisted, thought that their information was being accepted with the same sincerity in which it was being presented. In July, no-one knew that by October every positive comment made about the crop designs was to be negated by the clever cutting and trimming of the audio strip by editors over the next ninety days. Why was this done?

Quite evidently, some agency within ABC, or possibly from elsewhere, felt that it was time to dust off the Doug and Dave caper of 1991. Recall that it was in '91 that these two elderly sceptics were taped while crudely forming a crop design. The two were presented to the worldwide press as the hoaxers responsible for all the crop circles of the previous thirteen years, and the public bought the ploy. For many, this was the end of the story. To listen carefully to hostess Barbara Walters at the beginning of the programme one would suppose that there had been no designs formed between 1991 and this past summer. Her opening comment "They're back..." of course gave her away as ill-informed. However, to anyone who had heard nothing at all about the designs since '91, she must have sounded plausible. Her mis-information, however, set the pattern for the remaining nineteen minutes of tape which opened with a replay of the four year old Doug and Dave story.

Some agency, somewhere, does not want the news of hundreds of new crop circles to spread beyond the fields of southern England. The effort to spike this news has been very effective where only

newspapers have been involved. But when hundreds of Americans, Germans, Japanese, etc, flew to Britain to see for themselves what this phenomenon was all about, someone decided to renew this spiking technique that had been so effective years earlier.

THE ABC OF DEBUNKING

ABC television's 20/20 programme in the US is one of the highest profile news bulletins in the world. All the sadder then that its recent report on crop circles was so disappointing, as DOUG ROGERS recounts...

Find a copy of, or imagine, this TV show and follow these notes along, as one by one, each participating crop circle researcher is compromised or discredited through clever commentary by the programme moderator. To discredit the designs and downgrade any possibility that they might have been made by other than human hands, the editor used every diversion available to compromise the ongoing circles phenomenon

in the eyes of his late evening viewer:

- 1) The opening Doug Bower statement that he and his partner created the first circle in 1978 after a night of drinking at a pub, set the stage for further video shots of today's circle researchers enjoying a pint at a popular inn. The impression on a 20/20 viewer: several mugs of ale have helped move the circles phenomenon along from summer to summer.
- 2) Sharp observations on the complexity of the designs made by Michael Glickman, introduced as a businessman, were followed by the commentator's remarks concerning a book Mr Glickman plans to publish shortly. The implication: money is to be made by keeping the phenomenon alive. Books, journals and various publications were shown to press home the idea that there were economic pluses to "the industry".
- 3) Biologist Dr W C Levengood displayed plant malformations retrieved from inside circles in fields where all other indications pointed to the 'genuine' status for the design. The 20/20 viewer, briefly holding some respect for Dr Levengood and his research team, was then presented with words by the ABC commentator to the effect that "...all the scientists we talked to found the Levengood team theories implausible... full of holes". Who these scientists were or when they were asked for their opinions, was not considered important to the programme. What was important to the tape editor, however, was the development of the im-

pression on the 20/20 viewer that anything said by Dr Levengood might be suspect.


4) The deceptive discrediting technique continued. Peter Sorenson made a comment early in the tape that everyone enjoys a good mystery. Toward the end of the programme Doug Bower mentioned Sherlock Holmes and "...the good mystery no-one really cares to solve". Picking up on these similar comments, the commentator proceeded to compare the two, thereby raising the credibility of Bower to a level never intended by Sorenson.

5) There was much made of the fact that more people each year visit England to see the designs. Richard Andrews was queried about this growth in numbers of visitors, creating an entree for this remark once again from the commentator "...the phenomenon won't quit. It survives on a measure of human nature... a model of how irrepressible a phenomenon can be once it's caught the fancy of enough people."

6) And finally, what better way to compound confusion in a viewer's mind than to mention the Loch Ness Monster as a similar mystery? The tape editor, with a few seconds still available, managed to introduce a farm manager who refused to accept

the notion that anything other than a human trespasser could have laid a design in his field. When he asked to be convinced of an alternative possibility, iyles (US researcher, with a small 'i' - Ed) proceeded to show the man a deformed grain-plant taken from a design in his own field. Malformations are commonly found in plants which have been forced to lie flat to the ground by a momentary exposure to heat, part of the vaguely understood design-making process. The farm manager heard this, but the 20/20 viewer did not. The tape was cut immediately following the farmer's invitation to "...convince me".

What was ABC trying to accomplish by producing this twenty minute segment to be seen by millions of people? The photography, the videotape of aerial views of designs supplied by Sorenson, the comments offered by the researchers... all first rate. But if the word "mystery" had to play a prominent role in the commentary, why wasn't it left at that? ...A mystery!! One might make the point that ABC went too far in this put-down, only to confirm that there is much more going on in grainfields worldwide than the populace should be allowed to ponder... DR



BEFORE AND AFTER...

In 1976, Colin Bloy, master dowser and healer, discovered by psychic means the Cather Grail Stone in a cave at Andorra, near Arinsal. Grail Stone is usually a crystal and acts like the memory of a computer, having been programmed with certain esoteric information. To extract information it has to be channelled by a medium or a skilled dowser. This stone, when dowsed, gave information from the Elohim (creator Gods) concerning Ley Lines or Telluric Earth Energy lines that cover the surface of this planet. It also told of the bringing in of an eighth energy band to replace the old seven band system which went to make up a complete Earth Telluric energy line - also there were single lines, triples, 6s, 7s, 14s, 21s, 28s, 42s, 49s, but NO 35s (don't know why). These lines can also narrow to a point, leaving a blank area.

"What the hell is he talking about?" I hear you scream. Okay, it works like this: a main Telluric earth energy line (some call them 'leys') is, or was, made up of seven 'Courier' lines, each of which can be subdivided in multiples of 14, 28, 56 etc. The word 'Courier' is my own way of describing lines that give and receive information. Each line is aligned to the chakric energy centres in the human body, every line/chakra having a different function, ie. the Base Chakra (bottom of the spine) is for self-preservation, grounding and procreation. The second chakra, going up the spine, is the Sexual centre. The third is the seat of the emotions and the Will. The fourth is the Heart Chakra, the great balancer and where unconditional 'Love' dwells. The fifth is the Throat Chakra, the place of communication. The sixth is the Third Eye Chakra for clairvoyant sight, also for releasing pent up emotions and negativity. The seventh is the Crown Chakra, the flowering lotus that opens, processes and releases information from the other six. Is that a little clearer?

All that makes human beings what they are is contained in an earth energy line and vice versa. Now the bringing in of an eighth energy line/chakra means that the universal Cosmic Overself has greater access to the Earth, bringing in more information capable of being utilized by human beings whose Eighth Chakra is now in place but not

necessarily activated.

As many of you know, the earth energy grid is made up of these energy lines which usually 'flow through' or 'flow from' a Sacred Site such as a temple or church (usually pre-reformation, though many later ones erected on prehistoric sacred sites were put there because the 'energy' ambience was right for religion), also wells and monuments of great importance. Not forgetting places like Avebury in Wiltshire. As the human body has what acupuncturists call meridians, the natural flow of the body's energy system, so then does the Earth have meridians too. If there is a blockage in the human system then a needle is inserted at a certain point to release the blockage. So it is with the Earth. The Earth's energy lines are usually kept clear by Site Guardians (see 'Transmission From Sirius', SC 34) but are

also cleansed and dusted by ceremony, usually performed by an unsuspecting Christian priest as he stands before his altar to perform Mass (where he also participates in the consumption of human flesh and blood, chanting, the burning of incense, the ringing of bells... all symbolic of course, and not a bit pagan! But I digress). Some pre-reformation churches have an energy line going right through the altar and the font. The priest accepts that there is something special about standing at the altar/energy point (if you dowsed the east end of a church on a Saturday there are usually a few 'laterals'. Dowse again after the Sunday service and the laterals are countless, the congregation having built up energy by thought), something that can only be experienced there... unless he or she were to visit an ancient stone circle and compare 'feelings' with the stone circle's altar stone!

So what am I getting at, where is all this leading? It was on top of Cissbury Ring, the ancient Sussex hillfort, when I made contact with the being known as Jeuz and my Eighth Chakra was activated (see also SC 34). I could not have made contact with a being outside of this solar system unless it was in place. That is why I had never experienced such energy before, because it was DIFFERENT!

Then I received information, thrust upon me before sleep, that in 1999 the eight line system would go up to a nine line system. This Ninth Chakra is

multidimensional and will allow higher beings even easier access to Earth. It was suggested that more UFOs will be seen and many more will land. It would be well into the next century, maybe beyond, but the Courier line system would eventually rise to twelve, enough for us to cope with for now. Colin Bloy had dowsed out as many as sixteen, but this is the stage by stage process back to the source. As it turned out, the ninth line information was not quite accurate and events dramatically changed.

The aura of a human being is the reflection of the physical, mental and spiritual aspect and can be 'read' by the colours that emanate from the aura plus the 'feelings' one gets from being close to a person. Similarly, the aura or personality of, say, a town, is made up of the collective thoughts and feelings of the people who live there and these thoughts and feelings are caught up into the earth energy grid thereby giving out the 'feeling' or 'personality' of that town. Not only that, but the whole personality or persona of what makes us English, for instance, is expressed in the same way. In other words our essential 'Britishness' is held in these lines in much the same way that an object that has been in the possession of someone will hold all the information about that person, which can be tapped by means of 'Touch Clairvoyance' or psychometry. Just as one's emotions can be tapped or one's sexuality, creativity and spirituality, so then do the Courier lines, opening up to what is happening at any given time. A harpsichord player friend of mine once gave a recital. Before he started to play I dowsed around him seated at his instrument. I found nothing. Within minutes of his playing, a line was dowsed that went right through my friend and his harpsichord which remained for three to four days before fading. His own personal built-in line of musical inspiration reached out to the nearest earth energy line, or Courier line, a Courier line of inspiration and creativity... Or did the line reach out to him?

If a terrible deed has been done at a certain place, like murder or rape, or a battle site, the vibrations generated there are held in the energy grid until such time as they fade or are 'cleared out' by a Guardian or a human trained in this art, or indeed by time itself. A skilled person with an iron will and total positivity will just 'ask' and it will be done.

After receiving the information concerning the Ninth Chakra, I told David Russell, dowser extraordinary, and he said "But Paul, there has been a ten line system in place since 1987 after the World

Harmonic Convergence". I was flabbergasted. Why would I receive information like that, without asking for it, if it wasn't true? Up until that time all information that I received like that turned out to be very accurate, ie. the information concerning Cissbury Ring, the information regarding the 1993 Sussex crop circle experiments (See SC 24) and recently information regarding the late Peter Cushing, who told me (via channelling) that everything Michael Bentine had told him was true! Mike Bentine confirmed afterwards that he had only met Peter once and all they had talked about was LIFE AFTER DEATH!

What to do? I was so embarrassed. I contacted a well-respected dowser, who had no axe to grind concerning energy lines, and asked her to dowse these ten Courier lines and report back. Three hours later she told me that all the lines were in place and working, all except nine and ten! Number nine was in place but only working at 20% whilst ten was also in place but not activated. I checked this with two other dowsers who came up with the same information. But I needed to hear it from David Russell. I phoned him: "I'll check right away" he said. David confirmed everything that we had found except for one small detail. He found that number nine line was working up to 25%, maybe a little under, and not 20%. That was good enough for me!

Further information was then given that by the end of August and the beginning of September '95, number nine line would rise a further ten to fifteen per cent. (After the 'Wolstonbury experiment' - see SC 44 - on June 28th 1995, the number nine line rose from 25% to 47%.) But by 1999 it would be fully operational, giving multiples of 18, 36, 72, etc. Again depending on the type of information given... and received.




SUSSEX CROP FORMATIONS '95: 9) SHOREHAM



For those unaware, although a publication which covers crop circle events everywhere, SC is produced by members of CCCS Sussex, whose task it is to investigate and survey all crop formations which appear in the counties of East and West Sussex in England. SC can never hope to include full surveys of all the many formations across the country so it is continuing its tradition of featuring detailed reports of the formations on its own doorstep. Reading these are a useful exercise for all readers, however remote from Sussex, because surveys of any formations in this amount of detail are very hard to come by. We hope that these on-the-spot and in-depth reports give a good idea of the nature of the circle phenomenon across-the-board and all the many facets involved, such as important geometries and correlations, which often go unreported with the simplified news of major formations elsewhere.

This formation appeared in the same field as the half-insectogram of 1993 (ref. Sussex 1993/07, grid ref. TQ 213067) and the three circles of 1990 (ref. Sussex 1990/02, grid ref. TQ 216068). Not only was this formation within a hundred feet of both these sites, it was also extremely similar in design to the 1993 formation. Both consisted of a dumbbell (with the bottom circle ringed) with uneven boxes either side of the shaft and both had a triangle nearby on the east side. The only significant difference was that the 1993 formation had an 'antenna' coming out of the east side of the top circle whereas the 1995 formation had an extremely intricate 'clover leaf' pattern of three standing semi-circles close by and to the east. (See diagrams.)

The formation was very visible from the road which crosses the A27 up to Mill Hill and many people hopped into it from the nearby footpath - this could account for several scrappy additions of uncertain shape which appeared later, not pictured here. It was far more impressive close-up than it looked from a distance. The lay of the formations were advanced, especially the 'clover leaf' shape which was very beautifully swirled and quite complex in construction. The swirl of the triangle was also impressive and had a standing clump of crop at its centre, as did both circles of the dumbbell. The formation lay almost at the lowest point of the two slopes (steeper than they look from the road) which

make up the field and thus could not be seen from the A27, despite its close proximity.

Along the bottom of the field, approximately 150ft from the formation, animal rights protesters had daubed "BAN LIVE E POI" (sic), c.f. "BAN LIVE EXPORTS", several weeks previously in regard to the exporting of live calves for the veal trade through Shoreham's sea port.

Did the circlemakers respond to the protesters or would the formation have appeared anyway? Notice how this is the reverse of the Saltdean formation (Ref. Sussex 1995/07) where the circlemakers did their work first and humans added graffiti. Here the humans did the graffiti first and then the circlemakers added their bit. Symbiosis?

Either the circlemakers were adding their support to the protest, or, as some have considered, the formation was placed there to balance the negative energies (however well intentioned) which the protestors may have been giving out when pouring their chemicals on the crop to create their lettering. Fascinatingly, the same scenario was to occur at Upper Beeding later that same month, when a very similar, but bigger formation appeared there... but more on that when the survey appears in a later issue.

The diameters of the 1990 formation are unknown but it is worth comparing the 1993 and 1995 formations as they are so similar (see table opposite).

The main Centre For Crop Circle Studies really seems to have sunk to the lowest level of awfulness. Accusations and counterclaims. Letters and resignations. Worst of all, hatreds and terrible insults.

How has it come to this? Most of us, though there are exceptions, believe that we are dealing with a spiritual phenomenon. Many of us feel that the crop circles are teachers. How have they allowed us - how could we allow ourselves? - to sink so low?

We must remember the privilege of our involvement with the circles. Like all privileges, it carries obligations.

I could not help thinking, during the last horrible weeks, that this - in a perverse kind of way - is the ultimate victory for the Dougs and Daves, for the Schnabels and Irvings, for the whole unpleasant crew. And, imagine the nightmare if the tabloids got hold of it. 'Crop Circle Cranks Squabble', 'Crop Circle Club Splits'. CCCS. I offer a prize for the best tabloid-style screamer.

Last year, the most difficult part of the work on the calendar was the selection of images from the riches of the 1994 season. Lucy Pringle and I did our best but, predictably, when our list was presented, certain members of Council were most concerned. They felt, as usual without a shred of evidence, that some of the chosen circles were suspect. We were required to print a silly disclaimer on the cover. (Disclaiming what? Our contention that all circles are caused by the spirits of dead turkeys?)

This year's calendar is, sadly, a terrible disappointment. With thirteen full-colour pages, it shows no more than six formations from this brilliant season. The omissions are shocking and, once again, I find myself asking if someone knows something that the rest of us don't.

And then it was whispered to me that several of the six included were ones that were ADAS-approved. Ah. That's alright then.

I must remind readers that, when Dr Mike Foley of ADAS (this column was written before the news of

Mike Foley's dismissal - Ed) discovered that there was a tangible change in soils inside formations he said: "Hoaxers might be thinking two steps ahead of us and are doing something to create a biological difference inside and outside the formation" (Western Daily Press, 24/9/95). He did not go on to share with us exactly how hoaxers might create this "biological difference".

ADAS, you will remember, were the people who let us know, to howls of derision from the Exmoor farming community, that there really was no beast there! What had been seen was a large domestic cat. The photos, films and videos were, likewise, a very big kitty. The savage mutilations of farm animals were the work of scavengers, after death had occurred by natural causes. Once again, it's business as usual. We are not to worry our little heads.

It helps to remember that science has become the most powerful religious orthodoxy on the planet. Like all religions, it serves to comfort us in the face of the fearfully unknown and inexplicable. Its main weapons are exclusion and denial. It solidifies and consolidates the existing acceptable world view and scoffs at all challenges.

Those most aware of and damaged by this denial are those scientists who have themselves dared to venture a slightly unorthodox idea. Can anyone imagine a mechanism more impossible to breach, more efficiently committed to the prevention of imagination and change, than 'peer review'? Would Einstein's Theory of Relativity have survived peer review?

We might have our knowledge and understanding increased by the work of committed, individual scientists such as Jim Lyons or Dr Levengood. To expect a scientific institution to grant us the comfort of their seal of approval is folly.

The circles draw me once again to America where I am doing a few lectures on the 1995 season. I have spent several days hunched over a light-box, selecting and arranging slides. What I find astonishing is that, after all these talks, these beautiful images remain enchanting and mystifying. The people who will see these photographs will be delighted. To a greater or lesser extent, they will be changed.

I remain convinced that we are in the presence of magic. **MG**
