GUEST ARTICLE - Moon River by Paul Braczyk...

The lunar landscape is riddled with an assortment of gouges, depressions, and deformations. Under certain lighting conditions, and with close-up photos, what appears to be meandering river beds can clearly be seen. These channels, known as rilles, are spotted over the surface, with particularly dense concentrations around the northern extremities of Oceanus Procellarum and Mare Imbrium.

In 1964 Dr. Donald H. Menzel stated the contention that these rilles appear, "where the surface has apparently cracked to produce a sharp ravine." W.H. Pickering, on the other hand, said in 1903 that they actually were grooves capable of transporting water. In recent years, with the advent of the Lunar Orbiter photos, renewed interest in the rille system has developed. At the meeting of the American Astronomical Society in December 1968, Dr. Stanton J. Peale backed up this water-course theory. Based on a methodical hunt made at the University of California on Orbiter-4 pictures, Dr. Peale said, "Sinuous rilles offer the least ambiguous of all evidence for water on the moon."

Contrary to the belief that, "Water could not exist in the liquid state owing to the lack of atmospheric pressure", liquid water, if made accessible to the almost vacuum situation encountered on the moon, wouldn't instantaneously change into mist. It would first boil, then form ice. Before freezing, however, the pressure might have been great enough to force the water some distance from the source. The water could have existed trapped beneath the surface, being released in this manner when the outer crust or permafrost layer was broken by a meteor, lunar volcanic activity, etc.

Large amounts of lunar material could be transported by this water, due to the low gravity which exists. In time, the ice and water would evaporate, leaving the river beds.

NORAD Sighting Query in No.2:

First confirmation of three orbiting UFOs was made by Dr. Carlos Estrada, Director of Mexican Celestial Observatory at Tonantzintla, Mexico. It was detected by telescope in May 1966. NASA confirmed these three UFOs in its Special Bulletin of Space Flight dated October 15th, 1966. Nothing is mentioned however about these three unknowns in the Satellite Tracking Situation (International Report).

The original sighting was made on February 25th, 1962 at Kotzebue, Alaska of two objects by six civilians and one member of the military. In the evaluation which was made by the Intelligence Office (Executive Intelligence - Alaska) the words are, "Possible classified ESV - Earth Satellite Vehicle". The FAA and Alaskan NORAD region reported negative air traffic. In the Bluebook files it is stated - "Objects viewed by witnesses display characteristics of aircraft and probably were. However, in view of facts that reporting officer reported no air traffic, this case is classified as Unidentified."

1967 UFO Havn:-

I would like to thank all those who took the trouble to answer my enquiries re the 1967 sightings in the United Kingdom. I have been working for over a year on collecting these reports and have now got catalogued a total of 721 reports for 1967 in the U.K. alone. I am still happy to receive any reports that anyone may think has not been published anywhere before I have the final report printed later in the year.

This report will be mainly factual with tabulations of sightings in relation to geographical dispersion, shape of object, time object seen, most popular sighting days, etc.

If anyone has information that they believe would help in providing an extensive coverage of probably the greatest concentration of sightings ever made in the United Kingdom, please write soon.

I would be particularly grateful for any photographs taken of UFOs in 1967 and would give full acknowledgement to the photographer.

UNITED KINGDOM SIGHTINGS.

June 7th. 1969, Higham Kent.

A strange light was seen in the Higham and Shorne area of Kent, moving very swiftly and silently from east to north-west. At 9.50 p.m. on Saturday June 7th., a spherical white light appearing as about the size of a tennis ball, with a cone of red (flame?) behind it, moved horizontally about one hundred feet up in the air. There was no noise at all, from traffic, or the air.

Gravesend Reporter. June 13th. 1969.

June 12th. 1969, Clifton, Bristol.

Mr. Colin Taylor and his family of Clifton, Bristol reported observing a strange wobbling light in the sky at 2.45 a.m., on the 12th. of June. Alerting Police "Panda" Patrol Cars, a mobile observation was instigated for forty-five minutes, but without success.

Zenith. (Bristol Contact).

June 12th. 1969, Warrington Lancs.

It was reported that a P.C. Sydney Edwards, had observed an unusual light in the sky at 1.30 a.m. on Thursday, June 12th. He was alerted when, retired inspector Alan Machin, saw a light travelling across the sky in a jerky motion. Mr. Machin rang the Warrington Police. The light was also seen by P.C. Michael Conduct.

Air Traffic Control centres in the locality were baffled, as the only aircraft flying in their vicinity was as far away as Lichfield, Staffordshire.

Link-Up. (Sunday Mirror, June 15th. 1969).

May 18th. 1969, Blackwater, Hants.

Two brilliant golden balls of light were seen over Blackwater, Hampshire, in the early hours of May 18th., by Miss Dorothy Watts, of Vicarage Road, Blackwater.

Miss Watts said she saw the lights at approximately 1 a.m. She said: "I was in bed. They lit up the room so brightly. They were like two big golden head-lamps, very bright. There was no noise at all. They were coming from the Yateley direction, going fairly slowly. I saw them for about 15 seconds, I don't know what they were, I've never seen anything like it. They were too bright to be aircraft, and they didn't leave a vapour trail".

Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena...

May 13th. 1969, Yately, Hants.

Mrs. Dorothy Mead, of Frensham Close, Yateley, saw a U.F.O. at 4.20 a.m., she described it as a huge glowing ball of light in the sky, from which a white beam was coming. Said Mrs. Mead, a 43 year old widow: "My dog woke me to go outside, I went into the kitchen and there shining on the floor was this beam of white light.

It was like a searchlight, but very narrow, only about six inches across. Through the window I could see this red glowing ball. It was hovering backwards and forwards. The white beam was not visible from outside and may just have been a concentration of the light from the object by the window. The U.F.O. moved around the sky very slowly as Mrs. Mead watched it, making no noise. Then, after about 20 minutes, it moved at a snail's pace towards Blackwater and Hartley Wintney.

"No-one can convince me it was an aircraft and it was obviously not a flare. I know flares". She concluded: "It must have been out of this world".

CONTINENTAL SIGHTINGS...

May 13, 1969, Etterbeek, Brussels.

At 11.30 p.m. Mr Patrick Ferryn saw an object, electrical blue in colour in the south. It was only seen for a few seconds as half the size of the full moon. For a few moments a light luminous tail was seen, which was the same length as the main body.

BUFOC Information Sheet, No.53.

May 13, 1969, Schaerbeek, Brussels.

At 10.45 p.m. Mr Jean Louis was walking to the railway when he saw a light blue luminous spherical object to the south. The object passed slowly to the east near the zenith. It was seen for two minutes, for a path of 90 degrees on the horizon.

BUFOC Information Sheets, No.33.

May 13, 1969, Weert Saint George, Belgium.

At 9.50 p.m. Mr J. Hoogstoel saw a circular shaped object with the speed of an aircraft, at high altitude. (Angular displacement approximately 10 degrees to the north.) After moving through ten degrees it stopped behind some clouds. Then it came back on its path to the south. During this new movement, the object was seen as a swift light. Time of observation about 20 seconds. Apparent size of Venus. Orange n colour with a more luminous circular body. During the second movement the object had more luminosity outside the beam it made.

BUFOC Information Sheets, No.33.

April 26, 1969, Woluwe Saint Pierre, Brussels.

At 10.50 p.m. a cigar shaped object was seen at high altitude in a starry sky. It was dark blue in colour with five portholes in a rectangular frame. Seen in the NNW horizon its apparent size was six centimetres. Its speed was slow and regular from WNW to ESE. It had no wings or protuberances and was noiseless.

BUFOC Information Sheets, No.33.

March 17, 1969, Pihtipudas, Finland.

Mr Pesola and his girlfriend had left at about 8 p.m. from Aane-koski by car when they noticed to the left of the front of the car, a round disc, which was about the size of the Moon. Near the disc they saw a cigar shaped phenomena, which was about five times as long as the diameter of the disc. The objects were turquoise green and very brilliant. When they first noticed it it had no effect on their car, but as the objects approached the motor began to miss. The objects flew behind the car to the other side and nearly landed, coming very close, and the engine misfired more. The objects followed the car for about 45 kilometres and disappeared in a curve behind the forest. Mr Pesola noticed a very high sound during this phenomenon. When they at their friend's house in Pihtipudas, he said that just before they had arrived there had been very unusual interference with the TV transmission. Mr Liljeblad irrationally asked had a UFO followed them, which astonished them even more.

NORTH AMERICAN SIGHTINGS.

April 22nd. 1969, Ottawa, Ontario.

At 8.30 p.m. on April 22nd. 1969, a dark and rainy night, an Ottawa man and his family, while driving along a deserted stretch of road, saw a strange object in a field. He stopped the car and they witnessed a 30ft. diameter, saucer-shaped craft, with two huge spotlights and porthole-shaped windows through which red lights could be seen inside. It rose and flew across a 20 acre field of swamp and brush. It then hovered above high tension wires, following along the wires, rising and falling with them and seeming to draw power from them. The U.F.O. then flew towards their car, lighting it up like a "Sunny day", before disappearing.

Topside, Quebec, Canada...

March 20th. 1969, Nr. St. Louis, Missouri.

On March 20th 1969, Mr. Lindwedel, and his son Carl were driving home from St. Louis under clear skies. They were on a stretch of straight highway, going downhill toward the Meramec River, when both saw erratic lights, moving up and down in a jerky motion, and at times standing still. Carl, being the passenger, rolled the window down, to listen for any noise, but there was none. Red, white and blue lights appeared to be revolving on the top of the object and they seemed to be set at an angle, aimed at about 30 degrees. The object, in sight for about two minutes, took off suddenly with rocket-like speed, and disappeared from view.

Skylook, Stover, Missouri...

March 19th. 1969, Nr. Arnold, Missouri.

Mr. & Mrs. Lindwedel, and their son aged 19, and their daughter aged 18, live near Arnold, Missouri, a mile and a half from the Union Electric Power Plant.

The night of March 19th, 1969, was clear and star lit when their daughter Carol, went to the window at ten o'clock. The house is situated so that she was looking north up a sloped hill, towards the highway, where traffic could be seen. She was surprised to see a large object above the horizon at about 45 degrees elevation. The curved bottom of the object was visible and there were two bright lights on the top and two more on the bottom. Between these lights a string of horizontal lights were going on and off in sequence, from right to left. The object disappeared below the horizon, Carol said all the lights were white and the object was in sight for about ten seconds.

Skylook, Stover, Missouri...

March 12, 1969. Newburyport, Massachusetts.

At 6.30 p.m. while driving west on Route 113 two UFOs were observed. One was hovering and was white. A second steady red light approached the hovering one. It then appeared to flash or blink red, and the other object also turned red and blinked. The second object swooped underneath the stationary object - and moving south over the Artichoke River - they went out...

May 7th, 1969. Nr Palermo, Maine.

At 10.30 p.m. a carload of people were driving along a deserted stretch of road between Palermo and Weeks Mills. They saw an enormous inverted pan-shaped vehicle hovering above some trees at low level, about 1,000 feet distant from the road. It rotated, had large lighted rectangular shaped windows, and emitted no sound that the witnesses could make out. They got out of the car to watch; as the object hovered, it made a rocking motion. Shortly the object sped off to the North West.

SOUTH AMERICAN SIGHTINGS

February, 1969, Ancon, Peru.

Hundreds of people, among them two reporters and a police officer, watched a UFO for over an hour while it hovered in front of the beach at Ancon, near Lima, causing great excitement.

Understanding Vol. 14 No.4.

Nov. 1, 1968, Guarulhos, Brazil.

A luminous, orange-coloured UFO was observed for 15 minutes at low altitude over the town. Cumbica air base said the unidentified object was picked up on its radar, then suddenly disappeared.

UFO Potpourri, Missouri.

Nov. 16, 1968, San Jose, Costa Rica.

Traffic jammed solid on San Jose's main streets as hundreds of people stood staring up at what appeared to be two silvery flying saucers clearly seen crossing the cloudless morning sky.

One of the unidentified objects flew across from east to west, the other from north-east to southwest.

UFO Potpourri, Missouri.

Nov. 8, 1968, Brasilia, Brazil.

The fabulous inland capital of Brazil reported one of the discs over that city. Several residents of the suburb Taguatinga reported seeing an object which was round and looked like "two overlapping plates" which flew over the army radio control tower and the city's water reservoir. The bottom "plate" they said, was rotating rapidly and was lit by a twinkling red and green light. When first seen the object was hovering over the army radio station, then it circled the town a few times and took off at great speed.

APRC via Saucer Magazine.

S.E.Asia and South Pacific

January, 1969, Palmerston North, N.Z.

Two Palmerston North men recently watched a noiseless cigar-shaped object with bright white lights at each end hover over a paddock near the city. They said that the UFO hovered no more than 100 yards off the ground for up to 10 seconds before moving away toward the Tararua Ranges.

The front light was as bright as a searchlight and the rear light was slightly dimmer. It seemed to be about 30 feet long and they were satisfied it was not an aeroplane. The object was last seen heading north over the ranges. About 20 minutes later the men saw another intensely bright light flitting from the top to the bottom of the ranges. They watched it for about five minutes when it suddenly disappeared.

Ohakea air base reported that its weather balloons were not sent up before 5 a.m. and that radar had not picked up anything at the time of the sightings from 4.20 to 4.40 a.m.

There has been a spate of New Zealand sightings during the past month.
