





## EDITORIAL

Dear Readers,

Pressure of work, and a birth in the family have completely prevented me from finishing the magazine on time, and has also meant that the Special "Great Wave of 67" has had to be completed after this issue of the magazine has gone out. Please accept my apologies but it will be on its way as soon as I have caught up. If any readers are too impatient for me, I will be happy to refund their money. I hope you will bear with me.

And now on to other things. I can let a little out of the bag from the "Great Wave of 67". In the last issue of Pegasus (Vol.2 No.1.), and I quote - "Of all the years. 1967 must stand as the major contributor to the files, though only detailed analysis will show whether, in fact, the wave of reports indicates an increase in the number of UFO events or an upsurge in mass media interest during the year."

There were only two significant periods of coverage of UFO sightings in the National Press during 1967. Those beginning October 16th, and October 25th, both incidentally resulting from West Country reports. An analysis of the 766 reports in our files shows that in fact 379 reports had already been made by October 16th (leaving 387 to take place). 54 reports came in between this publicity and the next main coverage on October 25th. At that date 433 reports had been received for 1967 (leaving 333 to take place)

On the strength of these figures (Remembering that the M.O.D. state that the highest in one year since 1959 was 95 in 1966, and our files show that 97 had been made by June 25th, 1967), I think we can rule out reports generated by publicity. It is interesting to note that the Ministry received only 362 reports for 1967.

## A FOSSIL FROM ANOTHER WORLD AND ANOTHER TIME

NUIC has the fossilized remains of an alien spacecraft with its crew and operators fossilized intact, the tiny beings crashed here on what is our Earth long, long ago. B O O K   R E V I E W S

In response to a reader's letter suggesting that we should have book reviews, and the opportune supply of three new UFO paperbacks by Belmont Books, New York, we have pleasure in presenting our comments on the following books. -

Menace Of The Saucers by Eando Binder at 60 cents. (500-01050-060)

For those who do not know already, Eando Binder is a pen name for Otto Binder, and several well known Ufologists also under thinly disguised names appear in this book.

Although I did not take well to the idea of a fictional vehicle for reiterating some authentic sightings, one has to acknowledge Binder's adeptness in incorporating plot that brings in every major contradictory facet of the UFO Enigma and produce plausible whole.

To say anymore would spoil the impact of the plot. I wouldn't put it at the top of my list of required reading but it is a book worth looking at.

Flying Saucers Are Watching Us by Otto Binder. 75cents. (B75-218)

A well documented discussion of the many theories that prevail as explanations for the UFO Mystery.

Many fascinating explanations are offered in response to the frequent questions - what are they? Where do they come from? Is intelligent life possible elsewhere in the universe?

The major criticism of the book, unfortunately applies to most UFO books. A non-existent index to either sightings mentioned, or important items of interest.

Flying Saucers: Hoax Or Reality? by L.J. Stanton at 50cents. (B50-761)

A very good, no nonsense approach to the modern era of UFOs. Excellent coverage of the period since the war, but occasionally misses identifying some sightings by date and year.

Would be an excellent introduction to the problem, but as it again suffers the same drawback as the last book mentioned, namely no index, it doesn't offer much help to the more experienced researcher.

## U K S I G H T I N G S

March 9th, 1970, Cork, Eire.

(DRS Code: 70-68-2315-Cork,Eire-.-III)

Four men working in Cork, Eire, saw a large, white light suddenly appear in the sky at about 23.15 hours. Mr Eddie Burke, a foreman, said it came from the Togher direction, adding "It was like a smaller version of the moon. The outer edges were glowing, and the middle was a dullish blue. It hung in the sky at a height of from 400 to 600 feet. It then moved backwards towards the Togher after and disappeared.

Feb. 20th, 1970, Billericay, Essex.

(DRS Code: 70-51-20.00-Billericay-..IV)

When Mr Julian Giles of Billericay, Essex, looked out through a window of his house he saw a bright white light in the sky that was surrounded by a halo. The time was just 20.00 hours and he continued to watch it for a further five minutes, before it finally disappeared behind trees on the skyline.

Mr Giles wife was walking to St. Andrews Hospital at the same time and she also claims to have observed the light, saying "I saw this bright light moving rather slowly. It caught my eye because it was so unusual."

Feb. 13th, 1970, Portsmouth, Hampshire.

(DRS Code: 70-44-2130-Portsmouth-S-III)

Several stationary "yellowish" lights in the southern sky were spotted by R. Beavan, of Paulsgrove, Portsmouth in Hampshire, at about 21.30 hours. He stood watching them for some minutes, noticing also that two people about 30 yards away were gazing in the same direction as himself.

The lights, numbering approximately 6 to 10, neither moved nor varied in their intensity and were grouped roughly together, though not in any particular geometric pattern. They appeared sharply defined in the clear evening sky at an angle of 35-40° degrees above the horizon.

Mr Beavan (23), who is something of a keen amateur astronomer, was puzzled for they bore no relationship to anything he could identify and said they "certainly did not originate from shooting stars, an aeroplane, or rocket stages etc." Keeping an eye on the lights he commenced to walk in a westerly direction and halted briefly at every spot which afforded him an interrupted view. Gradually, lights began to disappear from among the cluster, until quite soon there were none visible at all.

Feb. 11th, 1970, London.

(DRS Code: 70-42-745-London-W-III)

It was just after dawn, at about 7.45 am, when Mr Arthur Hayward looked out through his kitchen window and noticed two bright lights, one above the other, low in the sky almost due west. They remained stationary while he watched for a few moments and tried to determine if it was an aircraft, but the lights bore no resemblance to one at all.

Calling both his wife and son, the family continued to observe from an upstairs window of their home at Abbey Wood, a London suburb bordering on Kent.

After what they later estimated was a minute or two, the Haywards saw the pair of lights move in unison very rapidly towards the south-west. Becoming occasionally obscured by small patches of cloud from time to time, until they finally disappeared from view.

C O N T I N E N T A L     S I G H T I N G S

November 25th, 1969, Koekelberg, Belgium. (DAS Code: 69-329-pn-Belgium-...III)  
An oval shaped object was seen on November 25th at Koekelberg, NW suburb of Brussels. The sky was cloudy and the UFO appeared motionless as a black metallic object. Being investigated by Groupe D.

September 24th, 1969, Zellik, Belgium. (DAS Code: 69-277-20.10-Brussels-N-IV)  
This aerial phenomena took place on September 24th at 20.10 hours. Mr Camille Treceus, a 65 year old architect from Zellik, a NW suburb of Brussels, went for a short walk with his dog near his home.

While looking at the sky and the stars he saw suddenly coming from the northern horizon, a noiseless and luminous object. The thing which was like a Delta wing, stopped not far above the house. The object was a mixture of blue and white colour like phosphorescent at night.

Shortly after this first apparition a second object, same as the first, appeared from the same direction. This one stopped on the left of the first Delta wing. After some minutes the last apparition went out as if "switched off".

The body of the first UFO was of a reddish-yellow colour and emitted a shower of sparks from the back. Numerous fine lines, phosphorescent too, ran the whole side from front to back. Concerning the second, the illumination covered two thirds of the body. One third, which was the middle part, was as black as night.

The estimated altitude was 2000 metres and dimension at arm's length about two metres.

September 26th, Calella, Spain. (DAS Code: 69-279-...Calella-...III)  
While on holiday on the coast of Spain, Mr and Mrs A.F. Astridge of Reigate, Surrey observed a UFO for nearly two hours.

"We were in a crowded thoroughfare running parallel to the coast when our attention was drawn to the object: dozens of people were pointing to the sky, and on looking up we saw a shining metal object in the cloudless sky. It was completely stationary, and in shape and size was almost identical to that in the photograph on Plate 3 of the book "Challenge To Science". The object we saw shone like burnished silver in the reflected sunlight, and appeared very high up. The edges were a little blurred.

"We continued walking towards the beach, while keeping the object under observation, but it did not move. On reaching the beach promenade, we tried to observe it through one of the coin operated telescopes, as it was over the sea, but the instrument wouldn't elevate sufficiently: several other people had the same idea and some were watching it through binoculars. We then sat on a seat, and lined it up between the cross-spars of a telegraph pole, and for the next one and a half hours it did not shift its position.

"As dusk descended, the whole object began to glow with a brilliant white light, until it looked like a gigantic star in the sky, then it slowly changed colour into a vivid ruby red; shortly after this it moved, completely soundless, streaking across the sky in an easterly direction at a speed far in excess of that of an aircraft, dwindling into a tiny speck within seconds, and rising away from the earth."

NORTH AMERICAN SIGHTINGS

Feb. 10th, 1970, San Mateo, California. (DRS Code: 70-41-20.30-San Mateo-NE-III)  
The first flying saucer report of the young year in this area was filed when Laurie Walther of 1514 Mt. Diablo Avenue, San Mateo said she saw a saucer over Coyote Point about 8.30 pm. Miss Walther, 15, said she was standing at the corner of Ottawa and Mt. Diablo when she spotted a flash of light in the sky to the north east. Then she saw what appeared to be a saucer about 25 feet in diameter hovering some 50 feet in the air above the electrical transmitters located there.

The saucer had red and blue lights outside but she couldn't distinguish the colour of the craft itself because of the glow, she said.

Jan. 29th, 1970, Deland, Florida. (DRS Code: 70-29-...-Deland-...-IV)  
James K. Pendarvis of Highland Park Road, a fruit driver, and his brother Glenn, a high school student, reported an object in the vicinity of Cassia. The object was described as being about 40 feet long, shaped like one saucer inverted over another. The object made a whirring noise and emitted a variety of flashing coloured lights.

Jan. 10th, 1970, Myrtle Beach, S.C. (DRS Code: 70-10-20.00-M.Beach-NE-IV)  
Several people reported strange lights between 8 and 9.30 pm in the crisp clear night sky. Mrs Betty Vinson and her nephew, Timmy McMillan, both from Surfside, were driving home when they sighted what appeared to be an unusually bright and very low star.

"We watched it a few minutes and it seemed to be moving slowly and was much lower in the sky than any of the other stars," Mrs Vinson said. "We gradually gained on it and caught up with it, then moved ahead of it". They watched it for about 15 minutes she said. "It looked like a big star but it was continuously changing colours and moving."

Louis Pawloski and Ben Guise were waiting in front of a theatre for the next movie to begin, when someone pointed out a strange light in the sky. Guise, a former air traffic controller, said the lights appeared to be about 10,000 feet and within radar range. Pawloski said at first there were only three of the brightly lighted objects moving across the sky, but as two of them disappeared from view, six more were visible. Guise said the last group appeared to be gaining altitude as they moved slowly across the sky, in a north-northeasterly direction. "The last one of the six was sort of a straggler and then it suddenly disappeared off the horizon as if it went down." The lights were described as round and very bright.

Jan. 6th, 1970, Duncan, BC, Canada. (DRS Code: 70-6-23.15-Duncan-...III)  
Mrs G.C. Drinnen said she was looking out her window in her home at 11.15 p.m. when a red object appeared at a high distance from the direction of the British Columbia mainland. She thought it might have been a meteorite or satellite re-entry at first.

"The only thing was it hovered for a while and then went straight up instead of down which is what I would have expected it to do. It revolved toward the island in a counter-clockwise direction and dripped sparks." It had no definable shape and seemed darker on one side than the other, she said.

S O U T H E R N H E M I S P H E R E S I G H T I N G S

Dec. 7th, 1969, Windsor, Australia. (DRS Code: 69-341-15.00-Windsor-...I)  
The latest sighting in Windsor, South Australia occurred on Sunday, December 7th at 5 p.m. The craft was seen from a dirt road off the Port Wakefield Road and was hovering about four feet off the ground some fifty yards away.

It was watched by John Hurst, a student, and some adults for a while. Taking off it changed shape and size. The grass was flattened all around and indicated a diameter of about thirty feet.

Nov. 3rd, 1969, Windsor, Australia. (DRS Code: 69-307-16.30-Windsor-NE-I)  
On the 3rd of November, Trent Baker, his brother and a friend saw a UFO in their scrub at about 4.30 pm. Trent's brother first noticed the object and thought it was a helicopter, but when they had another look they found it was not. When they first saw it, it was a quarter of a mile north of Windsor, flying close to the ground. The object was flying round in circles, and then flew north east for about a quarter of a mile to their scrub. From here it went south for half a mile, then back to the scrub and repeated this four or five times, before it appeared to land on an old back road. Their dogs were running over close to it, and then it took off and rose very rapidly in a vertical direction and disappeared.

As it was flying it was changing colour from white to grey and then became invisible. It repeated the colour changing four times before it finally disappeared.

They walked to where they thought it landed and found the shape of a diamond dug in the surface of the ground to a depth of about an inch. There were three holes about an inch round in the centre of the diamond. On one end of the diamond there was a small diamond shape about two feet long that was not dug out. There was a line about three long which curved away from this end of the diamond. There were three of these shapes in different places, one of these was smaller than the others.

Oct. 5th, 1969, Fort Glanville, S.A. (DRS Code: 69-278-21.55-Fort G.--...IV)  
Three Tasmanians state that at 9.55 pm on the 5th of October, they saw a bright white object over the Gulf from Fort Glanville, at 35° elevation. At first brighter than a star, it formed into an oval shape moving at jet speed, apparently moving away from the observers. This is one aspect of the report which seems paradoxical. The object formed into an oval, implying its shape became evident (from a point source of light) on approach, yet at the same time they state it receded. However, through binoculars, an oval shape was picked out with two lights on the edge connected by a beam; this may have been what was meant by that statement. The object accelerated over the horizon and disappeared. Duration 6-7 minutes. Later a silvery blue object flashed across the sky, hovered in clouds for about two minutes, then returned to its original position.

Sept. 27th, 1969, Glandore, S.A. (DRS Code: 69-270-23.31-Glandore-NW-IV)  
A Mr P. Crawley of Glandore reported that he saw a blue-white crosslike object with a glowing trail for 45 seconds moving from a position in the NW to the NNW. The trail was yellow, speed estimated as "slightly slower than a satellite" and course was perfectly level. The moon was above the object, which seemed to come from nowhere in the cloudless sky, move a short way, then "switch off".
