

Report Jet Chased Flying Disc--Washington (UP)--Unofficial flying disc investigators report that an Air Force jet chased a big and speedy "circular flying object" in the Far East last December. They said the jet got within five miles of the object before it flew off at a speed between 1,800 and 2,160 miles per hour. The report was made by the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena in its monthly magazine, "UFO Investigator." The Air Force had no immediate comment. The NICAP said a "Far East Air Force office" had advised that an unidentified jet pilot picked up the "UFO" as a strange "blip" on his radar screen, and started pursuit at more than 800 miles per hour. "At 8 miles range," it quoted the Far East report, "a large round object appeared directly ahead. By this time, the jets radar was in "lock-on" position, automatically guiding the jet toward the UFO. A moment later, the radar was jammed by a strong interference. Using anti-jam procedure, the pilot switched frequency. For ten seconds this eliminated the mysterious interference pulses, then they came again on the new frequency. But they were not strong enough to break the radar lock-on and the jet held its course. The jet closed to within 5 nautical miles of the object and could not close further." The NICAP said the pilot reported that the object was a golden tan in color and had the appearance of being circular on the bottom. It quoted him as saying it made a shallow left turn, then moved up and away at an estimated speed of between 1,800 and 2,160 miles an hour. (Source: Chicago, Ill., Sun-Times.)

Mystery Space Objects Puzzle New Zealand--Wellington, New Zealand, Oct. 8.--(INS)--Something queer is going on in space 70 miles above the southern end of New Zealand's South Island. Puzzled scientists ruled out the Soviet earth satellite. Dr. Michael Gadsen, an authority on auroral activity, said mysterious objects have been observed on International Geophysical Year radar screens near Ivercargill since June 20. He said the objects have been running about, first traveling north, then doubling back on their path. Gadsen said he believed the objects "could be a little man steering around up there or ionized articles rushing about. The fact is, we don't know what is going on up there, its something new." Snoopy UFO Gets Into Act--Washington, Oct. 7. (UP)--That shiny object an Alaskan scientist saw Sunday, Oct. 6 may not have been the Russian satellite or its launcher but a snooping UFO, according to "Washington UFO intelligence." Retired army Maj. Wayne S. Ahoe, head of the group of UFO enthusiasts, said this possibility will be discussed in the next issue of the publication "Little Listening Post." It will point out, he said, that "for years UFO's have been known to haunt atomic installations and follow rockets and missiles." As a result of Russia's startling success in launching a satellite, he said, "governments will now turn more openly to study of unidentified flying objects in hopes of learning the secrets of their mysterious powers." Ice-From-Sky Prober Is Irked--Reading, Pa.--There's one thing that bothers Malcolm J. Reider these days. After having examined half a dozen pieces of ice that fell from the skies in the general area during the last few weeks, Reider, a Reading chemist, resents being "brushed-off" by weather bureau officials in the research. "I can't understand why the weather bureau people in Washington are so interested in trying to ignore the whole thing." Having analyzed the contents of the ice he feels it is fused hailstones picked up by the jet stream and, for some unexplained reason, "dumped" in the area adjacent to the Lehigh Valley. Much of the material in the ice has proved to be typical organic forms found on earth, recognizable forms of pollen, algae, dirt. "It's almost as though you took a soda cracker and crumbled it before freezing it in water," he said. He did admit there were some elements in the collection with which he was not familiar. "It's possible, stretching things a bit far, to say some of those material come from outer space," he said, "although, frankly, we don't know. There are holes in our theory of fused hailstones on the jet stream." But the great interest shown by the weather bureau makes him wonder if they are keeping something on ice. "Is it a type of icing we are not totally acquainted with? Are they afraid to admit it? Or is it just that they don't believe ice has fallen on the area?" he asks. There are eight known instances of falling ice. Latest was in Mechanicsburg. Not previously reported was a "sheet" of ice measuring four feet by 18 inches and from 2 to 3 inches thick. It fell late in September near Annendale,

New Jersey, in the Clinton area. "Earlier a similiar piece of ice had fallen near Camp Hill in the Harrisburg section and we were about to admit it had been planted," Reider said. "Then the same kind of sheet fell near Annendale and another one at Mechanicsburg." He said the three were definitely not fused hailstones, at least in the pattern of the other ice which has fallen. "These looked almost like a handful of frozen cigars crushed together. They had a crystal structure almost prismatic and the ice was rod-like." (Source: Allentown, Pa., Sunday Call-Chronicle. Scientist Proposes H-Bombs Be Tested on Moon--Barcelona, Spain, Oct. 10. (AP)--A United States scientist proposed making the moon the world's testing ground for H-bombs. Prof. S. Fred Singer of the University of Maryland told the International Astronautical Federation that photographs of H-bomb explosions on the moon would tell man a lot about the universe and at the same time eliminate the danger of radioactive fallout on earth. Russian scientists at the meeting seemed interested. One wanted to know if the United States had made preparations to photograph H-bomb explosions on the moon. Singer said he didn't know. Space Travel Predicted By Rickenbacker--St. Petersburg, Fla., Oct. 12. (AP)--Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker predicted that within 50 years interplanetary travel will be common in atomic-powered luxury spaceships carrying 2,000 persons. And by the year 2007, some spaceships will be "semiself-sustaining planets within themselves," Rickenbacker added. Rickenbacker, president of Eastern Air Lines, made the predictions at the dedication of a new terminal at Pinellas International Airport. (Source: Seattle, Wash., Times.)

X Claims Contact With UFO Occupants--St. Joseph, Mo., 9/26/57--Flying discs controlled by men living on planets both in and out of our solar system, have appeared over St. Joseph at least four times in recent years, Arthur Campbell said. "This may be beyond comprehension, but that does not mean it is not true," the St. Joseph man told members of the Kiwanis Club. Mr. Campbell for the last ten years has studied the field of unidentified flying objects. Some of the flying objects are 14 miles long, three miles in diameter, and have a speed which has been estimated at 18,000 m.p.h., Mr. Campbell said. "I've been in contact with the people who make and control these flying objects," Mr. Campbell said. "This communication is through mental telepathy. I've found out people on seven different planets are making and controlling these objects." (Source: St. Joseph, Mo., News-Press.)

Reports Of Aerial Phenomena--Santa Barbara, Calif.--10/1/57--A red-colored object zoomed over Santa Barbara for 15 seconds at 11:10 a.m. H.F. Hoag, who said this was his third "sighting" reported that two other witnesses saw the object while they watched a jet plane's vapor trail. The "thing" was described as being about 100 feet in diameter, but Hoag said it was difficult to make out shape or size, because, he estimated, it was traveling in excess of 1,500 miles per hour. Making no sound or trail, the object sliced across the heavens from south to north, Hoag related, adding that it covered a 90-degree arc in the sky within about 15 seconds. It crossed over Santa Barbara as the large jet plane crossed over Carpinteria. Both were very high. (Source: Santa Barbara, Calif., News-Press.)

Monterey, Calif.--10/7/57--A mysterious white light, brilliant in intensity, was reported off the big sur coast by four residents of the area. The light appeared to hang motionless above the ocean for more than 45 minutes and then disappeared in a westerly direction, the four said. The four sighted the light separately and then later confirmed what each other had seen. They first sighted it about 6:45 p.m. and continued to watch it at intervals until about 7:30 p.m. when it appeared to move westerly over the horizon. It shimmered brilliantly, slightly above eye level in a general southwest direction. The four said the light was neither a star, nor a flare nor a ship. Visibility over the water was clear and there were no ships in sight. They said the light disappeared briefly twice and then reappeared with fresh intensity.

X Cocoa, Florida--10/7/57--Air Force officials said that continuing reports of an unidentified flying object near the Cape Canaveral guided missile test center are under investigation. The object, a whitish light, oval in shape, showed up for the second time last night. At least a dozen persons at a nearby roller skating rink reported seeing it. One of the observers was Al Leonard of radio station WKKO. "I hate to say this, but it sure looked like what you might call a flying saucer," he reported. Leonard estimated the height of the object at 5,000 feet. He said it changed directions at least twice and was visible off and on between 10 and 10:15 p.m. The radio station received hundreds of calls from persons who sighted a similar object on Oct. 4th between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 12:20 a.m. A check with Patrick Air Force Base at Cocoa Beach, Leonard said, indicated there was no guided missile testing underway at the time. Ketchikan, Alaska--10/9/57--A great number of Ketchikan residents reported sighting a bright star-like object in the sky over the city about 6:30 p.m. The light traveled rapidly and disappeared over the horizon. Harry Cowan, his wife and daughter all saw the object in the sky at 6:33 p.m. The object, seen with the naked eye and with binoculars,

appeared to be eight inches in diameter. (Credit: Mrs. Ivan Jones, Staff Correspondent.)

Kemmerer, Wyoming--10/10/57--A drilling crew working the night tour on the Great Lakes rig on the Pomeroy ranch was astounded at 4:02 a.m. when they observed a flying object spouting red and blue flame, headed south at about 500 feet from the ground. "What is it?" they asked each other, now that flying saucers and earth satellites monopolize the conversations. M.L. Simpson, along with his crew members, L.R. Zelenka, L.T. Bland and E.M. Robertson saw the object in the sky and watched it for about three minutes between Fontenelle and La Barge. Simpson described it as a whale-like looking object with a rounded nose and fins flaring out from it, and a broad tail. It was spouting red and blue flames from its rear. Denver, Colorado--10/10/57--A huge unidentified flying object streaked across Western skies, narrowly missing a Navy transport plane with 20 persons aboard. Lieut. Comdr. W.F. Norris, the pilot, reported to the Naval Air Station at Alameda, Calif., that he was all "shook up because the fireball came so close." Norris said he saw the UFO crash to earth near the Colorado-Utah boundry. Another report said the UFO crashed east of Myton, in East Central Utah. Several reports of a bright light in the skies followed by an explosion were received by Sheriff A.B. Ritter at Steamboat Springs, Colo. Ritter said a motorist identifying himself as W. Bennett of Sacramento, Calif., told him the fiery object gave off so bright a light that he stopped his automobile, jumped out and hid under trees. He said this was 15 miles south of Steamboat Springs. (Source: Seattle, Wash., Times.)

Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin--10/10/57--An unidentified flying object hovered over this area for more than an hour during the evening. It was first reported about 7:00 p.m., and was estimated by police to be about 150 yards above the Congregational Church. Seen through binoculars, the object was described as having four red stars arranged in a square on the lower rim. A light flashed intermittently from the center of the bottom of the object when it was first seen. A half hour later the light blinked out for 20 minutes. Then it began flashing again, dimly at first, and gradually grew brighter. At about 8:30 p.m., after bobbing in the area above the church, the object suddenly moved in a northwesterly direction and disappeared. Police said the object moved away horizontally and did not gain altitude. It disappeared in about three seconds. Police attempted to locate the object again on the northwest side of the city but were unable to spot it. Police illuminated the object with a spotlight and estimated its height by the length of the beam. (Source: The Janesville, Wisc., Daily Gazette.)

Tacoma, Washington--10/11/57--A reddish object with glowing tails streaked through the heavens sometime between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. Mrs. Raymie Koehn and daughter, Gloria Wolover, watched the bright object for 30 seconds at 5:36 p.m. It was traveling northeast, they said. Mrs. John Vukovich said "the whole neighborhood saw the ball." It was trailing reddish tails, she said. At about 6:20 p.m. the UFO made another pass over the city. A Firecrest resident said it looked like "20 stars" all together. The Edwin Rath family saw through binoculars and object "bigger than any star." At first it looked like a star, then it took on a reddish glow, Mrs. Rath reported. Mrs. Rosella E. Anderson gave the following account of what she saw: "It was about 7:30 p.m. I was on my mothers front porch. Then I became conscious of a humming noise. The noise increased. I collected my wits and ran to the edge of the porch as the object passed overhead. Leaning over the support I saw this round disc, humming, and moving away from me in jerking motions like it was being pulled by an invisible string. Seattle, Washington--10/11/57--An unexplained brilliant light was observed in the sky southeast of Seattle by many persons at night. (Source: Seattle, Wash., Post Intelligencer.)

Bethlehem, Pa.--10/13/57--A Lehigh University professor reported a phenomenon he regards as just as "interesting" as the Soviet satellite. It was the appearance over Bethlehem of two multi-colored "fireballs." They were observed by Jim Frey, a Lehigh senior, and his wife, Elsie. Prof. Ralph VanArnhem of the university's astronomy department did not see the "fireballs" himself, but he gave support to the Frey's view.

"From what Jim (a former astronomy student) tells me, it wasn't a meteor, but has to be either a plane or a 'flying saucer'." This is what Fryes saw: "The first green fireball came out of the west at about 8:40 p.m. It crossed the sky in about a minute turning bright white and then light red as it disappeared. The second came out of the east during the first one's flight. But it stayed around about 40 minutes. The last 25 minutes it appeared to rise about five degrees. When I came out of the house after putting the baby to bed about 10 minutes later, it had disappeared. The second one blinked a greenish-red and white." Prof. VanArnam, who termed Frey "a reliable observer" said there was no doubt the Freys saw what they said they saw. And, he added, Frey wasn't likely to confuse an airplane (which has red, green and white lights) with the "saucer" object because the student served three and one-half years on an aircraft carrier. "Besides, the object hurtled along too fast to be a plane. It couldn't have been a star, either," VanArnam added. VanArnam and Fry agreed that the lights the second object gave off might have come from refraction of gases from the Bethlehem Steel Co. But that doesn't explain the first one's colors. Further, the professor said, it couldn't have been a fireball. "They appear to drop--the first one stayed on the level--and they couldn't persist that length of time." Could they have been flying saucers? "Unfortunately, most of what Americans hear about saucers is cornball stuff, because the mystics and the seers have muscled in. But there's a hard core of truth to 'flying saucers.' I've seen pretty much the same thing Jim describes twice myself in the past few years," VanArnam said. (Source: The Bethlehem, Pa., Globe-News. Merced, Calif.--10/21/57--Police, fire department and radio station telephone switchboards were flooded with calls when a bright object high in the sky blew up at 5:25 p.m., scattering red and green sparks in all directions. Before it exploded the object had been observed by hundreds of people moving steadily eastward in the rays of the setting sun, glowing a bright blue. A Castle Air Force base spokesman said the exploding object must have been a balloon but had no explanation for the fact that the helium with which it was filled is a non-combustible gas and could not have contributed to the explosion. X London, England--10/28/57--(UP)--Intelligence agents of the Royal Air Force investigated a mysterious "unidentified flying object" that doused its light and sped away when spotted over one of Britain's atomic-bomber bases. Arthur Brenard, Sunday Express aviation writer, said it was spotted by a night fighter pilot and picked up by radar crews on the ground. (Source: Seattle, Wash., Times.)

The Brazilian UFO Review, by Olavo Fontes--Av. Atlantica, 1588--APTO. 901--Rio de Janeiro, Brazil--South America. (Continued from Sept. issue.) A few hours later, at 9:15 p.m., another alien object was observed over the city. When first seen, it was hovering over "Jardin America". The witnesses were Dr. F.A. Rogick, a chemist working for the State's Government, who lived not far from that place; and his two sons, Marcio, 15, and Marilda, 17. The object was shaped like a saucer, but appeared to be slightly flattened in the center. It hovered over the city for three or four seconds. Then, with the UFO's unexpected readiness, it suddenly rushed up at an angle of 45 degrees and was gone. In this maneuver, it pulled away from a stationary position and climbed at a tremendous speed. Its acceleration was far beyond the power of any man-made aircraft. It was a rotating, orange yellow UFO. But this was not the end. Just a few minutes later, at "Pinheiros", another district of Sao Paulo city, a luminous sphere was sighted by an amateur photographer, Mr. Victor Favezi. He was going home when he saw it. The strange object hovered motionless in the sky--as if watching the sleepy city below. It was a sphere, encircled by an eerie glowing, bluish-green halo. Favezi had his camera at hand and lost no time. He took two shots of the UFO before it disappeared into the darkness, in a flash of speed. One of the photos was printed by "Diario da Noite", a Rio newspaper, on November 7, 1954. I saw it. The picture was somewhat blurred, but showed clearly a luminous, circular object with a strange-looking protuberance or projection at the bottom. Favezi had also turned over the films to the newspaper. After a careful analysis, the "Diario da Noite" stated that the photos seemed authentic enough to be printed, showing obviously an "unexplained aerial object". According to the witness' written report, the UFO was at an unknown height and made no sound when moving, or hovering. A metallic-grey, oval-shaped object; A rotating, orange-yellow, saucer-shaped object; A luminous, bluish-green, spherical object; Three different kinds of UFO's, all of them sighted over Sao Paulo at short intervals--the same day. Why this

abundance of shapes, suggesting different types of craft? Was it needed? Why? Still, on that same night, a solitary cigar-shaped UFO was operating in northern Brazil, hundreds of miles away from Sao Paulo. Again, the sighting was over a State Capital--Belem, Para. The strange flying cigar was spotted in the sky at 7:30 p.m. It was brightly luminous, emitting a white-bluish glow which surrounded it entirely. It looked like neon-light. This "unknown" was described as cigar or cylinder-shaped, with no windows or projections, about 30 centimeters in size (angular size) and leaving behind a fiery, phosphorescent trail, one meter long. It flashed across the skies at high speed, but no sound was heard coming from it. The observation lasted approximately 7 seconds and was witnessed by fifteen persons at least. Among the witnesses were Mr. Jarbas Pereira, engineer; Mr. Nestor Bastos, farmer; and Mr. Raul Braga, lawyer. They reported the sighting to the press.

The aerial object involved in the last sighting described above, might have been, perhaps, a meteor. The high speed with an apparently linear course, plus the phosphorescent trail, suggested the possibility. And the time recorded for the sighting (7 seconds) doesn't speak against it. On the other side, it might be a UFO with certain aspects, which are more commonly observed on meteors and meteorites. The other sightings, on the other hand, were obviously caused by alien crafts, or devices. No other explanation can be accepted. Unless we believe the persons who saw the UFO's were all suffering from mass-hallucination. Or perhaps the newspapers through the country made up the cases, just for nothing. I dismissed, of course, any of these "scientific" explanations. Here, it may be useful to remember the words of the world-famous Swiss psychologist, Dr. Carl Jung: "So-called "scientific" explanations, such as the theory of reflections, by Dr. Menzel, are not possible without abstracting, for convenience sake, any reports which fail to fit in." In our case, it is easier to recognize UFO's as real objects, than to believe that such extraordinary sky phenomena can be dismissed using so widely different preconceived explanations-- a new one for each "epedemic" of sightings. Despite all of this, the skeptics will continue persistently believing that they can explain realities by creating and analysing artificialities. Its a pity, but we can do nothing about this.

After reviewing the sightings included here, it seems to be clear that --since the beginning of the second stage of their aerial survey of Brazil--they had shifted their interest. Now, they concentrated their scout-craft's attention towards Brazilian cities and towns of medium and large size, outside the State of Rio Grande do Sul. But the growing tide of alien crafts which was, day after day, spreading through the country, seemed to be moving not at random--but on a planned direction: from the south toward the north. In the next article of this review, the reader will know something about the country-wide UFO-reconnaissance which developed through November-December, 1954, and January, 1955; about this second stage of UFO's aerial survey over Brazil when their activity multiplied. It is a good time, now, to analyse the sightings already reported here--as a whole--and take from it a few partial conclusions which, as I believe, might be of some help in the understanding of UFO's problem. The material to be considered in the analysis includes the 29 sightings published since the beginning of this review. All of them could be classified as "Unknowns", excepting perhaps the sighting of a UFO landing at Sao Paulo City, on November 2nd (Hoax?); and the sighting over Belem, Para, on November 6th (Meteor?). The remaining 27 sightings were classified as "Good Unknowns", fitting the requirements listed in the beginning of this article--regarding the reliability of the sightings. In all, the reports, the observations had been accurate or detailed enough to eliminate the possibility that the sighting could be ascribed to a familiar object, or to a known natural phenomenon. The general shape of the objects described and the maneuvers they performed in the sky fitted the general pattern which has been ascribed to the "unexplained aerial objects". Of these 27 "Good Unknowns", a special group of 15 sightings could be chosen as "Very Good Unknowns." They are the sightings in which the accuracy of the observation, the quality of the description and the reliability of the observers were such as to prove beyond a doubt they were really sightings of alien crafts.
