SAUCERS TERMED SERIOUS

27 February 1960 The Air Force has sent its commands a new warning to treat sightings of unidentified flying saucers as "serious business" directly related to the nation's defense.

Issued last December 24 by the Air Force Inspector General, the regulations - updating similar ones issued in the past - outline procedures and said that "investigations and analysis of UFO's are directly related to the Air Force's responsibility for the defense of the United States".

The new orders are seen as an indication that the elusive disks are no longer completely a taboo subject in the five sided structure on the Patomic. Should these suppositions be correct, saucer researchers may look forward to a period of increasingly fruitful investigations.

COORDINATOR THANKS PRESS

10 March 1960 (L) Today, in a message to all members, co-ordinator Anthony Rudmann praised the excellent publicity given the Capitol District Saucer Council by the Schenectady newspapers.

Mentioning specifically the stories in the Schenectady Gazette and the Schenectady Union-Star, the statement called the articles a fine example of modern journalism.

Especially cited was Union-Star staff writer Larry Hart for a fine job of accumulating facts and excellent presentation thereof.

LIASION PROGRAM PLANNED

25 March 1960 (L) The Affiliation-Contact Committee announced late this evening a program to establish liasion with UFO research groups throughout the nation.

The committee, headed by Mrs. Mary Duckly and Anthony Rudmann, mentioned specifically such groups as Civilian Saucer Intelligence of New York, the Aerial Phenomena Research Group of Seattle, and the Intercontinental Aerial Research Foundation.

Also slated for action in the new future are organizations overseas, in the Mid-west, and on the West Coast.
