UFO SERVEILLANCE LINKED WITH SPACE

CARR SUBPOENAED IN SAUCER SWINDLE

NEW YORK Aug 12 Otis T. Carr and the officials of OTC Enterprises have been summoned to appear here for questioning on September 26 in connection with the sale of allegedly fraudulent securities.

Louis J. Lefkowitz, State Attorney General, announced yesterday that he had obtained a court order summoning Carr and his associates as the first step in a crackdown on the promoters of a "flying saucer space ship" project.

The Attorney General charged in the petition for the court order and its accompanying affidavits that the "space age charlatans have victimized investors of more than \$50,000 in the sale of stock in OTC Enterprises since 1958."

The petition stated that "OTC falsely and fraudulently claimed that it had developed a miraculous motor capable of producing a perpetual source of energy. It claimed that the motor would be used in its OTC-X1 flying saucer space ship which could travel hundreds of miles in space with no danger and no need to refuel. It was represented that the flying saucer would make several trips to the moon and back".

The affidavit charged that "no motor developed by OTC Enterprises ever had such capabilities and no such ship was ever flown".

Washington Oct. 12 (NICAP) The Office of the Secretary of the Air Force has made two important admissions about UFOs, in a private "Policy Letter" to all AF commanders:

1. The AF maintains a "continuous surveillance of the atmosphere near Earth for unidentified flying objects- UFOs".

2. The Air Force's interest in space surveillance is related to this constant alert for UFOs.

The policy letter from Secretary Dudley Sharp's office dated Aug. 15, was signed by Maj. General Arno Luehman.

According to the letter the space watch is on a round-the-clock basis. Tracking of both known and unknown space objects will be carried out by the National Space Surveillance Control Center, Bedford, Mass. and by "a select scientific group under the supervision of the Air Force.

Recently, this same observation Center tracked an orbiting mystery object which also was seen by many observatories and Moonwatch teams. The director of the world renowned Adler Planetarium publically declared that the object was in fact a UFO, faster than any known satellite.

Although the Air force has publically declared that the purpose of these surveillance systems is the detection of secretly launched Russian space satellites, this is not the sole purpose. The private AF admission in the Aug. 15 policy letter strongly indicates another purpose: to detect machines emanating from some extraterrestrial source.

THE MYSTERY SATELLITE

Since 1st August, when Americans started gazing skyward for a glimpse of Echo 1, thousands have been puzzled by the appearance of another object, a strange red satellite traveling two or three times the velocity of our high balloon space probe.

On August 25, the Grumman tracking station at Bethpage, Long Island, after tracking Echo 1, picked up and photographed the elusive object. The photo, which appeared in Life Magazine did not shed any definite light on the identity of the strange vehicle.

The next day, August 26, Adler Planetarium director Robert Johnson and several aids viewed the object. In spite of their extensive astronomical knowledge the astronomers were equally perplexed. As the astronomer later pointed out, there are many reasons for this puzzlement: "It was faster than any earth satellite. And it orbited the wrong way--all our satellites are launched with the earth's rotation for extra speed to escape the atmosphere".

As yet, none of the experts have produced any suitable explanation of the enigmatic red object. However, the most plausible idea comes from Prof. Robert L. Brown, Director of Southern Connecticut State College Observatory. "Our civilization has made real progress only in the last 50 years", states the astronomer. "Isn't it possible then that a civilization on a distant planet, much older than ours, could have progressed far more?"

AF WRITES SAUCER BOOK

The Van Nostrand Publishing Company has announced that it will release "Flying Saucers and the U. S. Air Force" by Major Lawrence J. Tacker on October 15th.

The volume is intended as a refutation of the charges that the AF has suppressed information concerning unidentified flying objects. Major Tacker reportedly documents the extensive Air Force investigations and presents its conclusions about the enigmatic disks.

Word filtering out from those treated to pre-publication looks at the saucer thesis indicates that Tacker's material "is about as reliable as Soviet propaganda".
