THE U.S. AIR FORCE'S REAL INVESTIGATION  
OF UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

For many years, it was believed that Project Blue Book was the U.S. Air Force's only official investigation of UFO's. However, new evidence has come to light that seems to rule this out. In fact, this new evidence seems to indicate that Project Blue Book did not investigate UFO's at all, other than to operate as a public relations program for the Air Force on UFO inquiries. The Air Force's real investigation of UFO's was conducted by the Air Defense Command. To wit: the 4602d Air Intelligence Service Squadron (AISS).

The 4602d AISS has been known by many names over the years. It has been known as the 1006th AISS, 1127th USAF Field Activities Group, 7602d USAF Field Activities Group, and is currently known as the U.S. Air Force Special Activities Center at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. This unit has a wartime mission, "of exploiting downed enemy people, papers, and hardware." This unit also had/has a peacetime mission of providing intelligence teams to, "recover or perform field exploitation of unidentified flying objects, or known Soviet/Bloc aerospace vehicles, weapons systems, and/or residual components of such equipment."

In order to form some kind of understanding of the 4602d AISS's involvement in the Air Force's UFO investigations, we need to look at some early Air Force documents. The first of these documents will be Air Force Regulation (AFR) 200-2, dated August 12, 1954, entitled Unidentified Flying Objects (short title: UFOB).

Air Force Regulation 200-2 is an interesting document for many reasons. One it was an Intelligence Regulation other than a Research and Development Regulation (AFR 80-17), as it would become after the formation of the Condon Project. Two, it defined what the Air Force's definition of a UFO was, separating UFO's from what was called "familiar objects". This was to change also, as a result of the formation of the Condon Project, as shall be shown later in this report. Also, it outlined responsibilities for the investigation of UFO's or UFO Reports. This changed too, with the introduction of the Condon Project. AFR 80-17 required UFO Reports to be forwarded to the University of

Colorado, while at the same time admitting some reports would be classified and not fully available to the Condon Project. In cases such as these, according to AFR 80-17, as much of the information as possible was to be provided to the Condon Project. Here we have another problem.

Many of the documents released under FOIA clearly show classifications higher than Secret for which the Condon Project was cleared. Those cases classified at the Top Secret level and/or restricted under such programs as SCI would not be available to the Condon Project. This required someone to review UFO reports before their transmission to the University of Colorado. Once again, that job fell on the 4602d AISS (known as the 7602d USAF Field Activities Group by this time).

As stated above, the definition of what was considered a UFO had also changed. AFR 200-2 defined a UFO as, "any airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics, or unusual features does not conform to any presently known aircraft or missile type, or which cannot be positively identified as a familiar object." AFR 80-17 defined a UFO as, "any aerial phenomenon which is unknown or appears out of the ordinary to the observer."

We can see from these two definitions that one is serious (AFR 200-2) and the other is no more than a joke (AFR 80-17). The AFR 200-2 definition assumed that the observer was factual in their reporting and the object was real and unknown based upon certain features of the object reported; while AFR 80-17's definition made the assumption that the observer did not know what he/she was talking about and no unknown objects were involved.

According to AFR 200-2, the Air Force's interest in UFO's was twofold. These were; "First as a possible threat to the security of the United States and its forces, and secondly, to determine technical aspects involved." The regulation was quick to point out that to date no UFO had imposed any threat to the security of the United States. However, it pointed out that, "the possibility that new air vehicles, hostile aircraft or missiles may be regarded as flying objects by the initial observer is real." Surely this would hold true even in this day and age regardless of what the U.S. Air Force might wish us to believe.

AFR 200-2 made it perfectly clear that the Air Force was not looking for space vehicles from some other world. This, to me, is interesting in light of the fact that the Air Force always concluded there had been no evidence indicating sightings categorized as unidentified were extraterrestrial vehicles. Of course, the U.S. Air Force's most unscientific and official stand on extraterrestrial vehicles has always been that they cannot exist, therefore, they do not exist.

Air Force Regulation 200-2 also made it clear the the Air Defense Command had a direct interest in the facts pertaining to UFO reports and had, "in the 4602d Air Intelligence Service Squadron (AISS), the capability to investigate these reports." All Air Force activities were authorized to conduct preliminary investigations that might be required for reporting purposes; however, "investigations should not be carried beyond this point, UNLESS SUCH ACTION IS REQUESTED BY THE 4602D AISS." It is important to note that the base Project Blue Book officer, at the base receiving a UFO report, would conduct the initial preliminary investigation into the report. However, any other contact or follow on investigation into the case required the 4602d's direct approval and not that of Project Blue Book Headquarters at Wright-Patterson. To be sure, the Air Technical Intelligence Center (ATIC) was not to become involved in any case until, "after the Air Defense Command has exhausted all efforts to identify the UFOB (UFO Report)."

All UFO reports of any intelligence value were to be submitted to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington, D.C. by the 4602d. Also, all UFO reports from outside of the United States were to be directly submitted to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF prior to their transmission to ATIC. Once again we know that many of the overseas cases never made it to Project Blue Book after receipt by the Director of Intelligence, United States Air Force.

Now one might say that all this is well and good. However, the fact remains that if the Air Defense Command was unable to identify any UFO reports, then those cases were to be turned over to Blue Book for analysis according to AFR 200-2. While this is in fact true, one needs to keep in mind several points. One, while the Air Technical Intelligence Center, Foreign Technology Division housed the Aerial Phenomena Branch (Project Blue Book), it also housed a unit of the 4602d AISS. Today this unit is known as Detachment 22, U.S. Air Force Special Activities Center and reports directly to its Fort Belvoir, Virginia headquarters. Secondly, we are aware of reports that never made it to the Blue Book files. Some of those reports have surfaced in current years from the Office of the Director of Intelligence, U.S. Air Force indicating that the 4602d AISS was aware of these cases and did not forward them to the Blue Book Office as required. To be sure, the existing group still analyzes and evaluates those UFO reports considered to have some form of vital intelligence interest to the United States.

Suspected or actual items of material from alleged UFO's were to be collected and safeguarded in such a manner as to prevent any defacing or alteration which might reduce its value for intelligence examination and analysis. AFR 200-2 and Intelligence Collection Instructions (ICI), dated June

1954 delineated this task to the 4602d AISS. Also, an Air Force Intelligence Memo, known as the Betz Memo, made it clear that the 4602d AISS was the only unit in the Air Force capable of this mission.

#### CONCLUSIONS

The 4602d AISS carried out the U.S. Air Force's real investigation of UFO's. Those cases which contained vital intelligence of interest to the U.S. Government were routinely sent forward by electrical means to interested intelligence agencies, bypassing Project Blue Book. Should the public or media become interested or have any knowledge of any of these cases, then only enough information (sometimes disinformation or out-right lies) would be provided to Project Blue Book to satisfy the media's questioning. AFR 200-2 states, "Headquarters USAF will release summaries of evaluated data which will inform the public on this subject." AFR 200-2 further states, "In response to local inquiries, it is permissible to inform news media representatives on UFOB's when the object is positively identified as a familiar object.... For those objects which are not explainable, only the fact that ATIC will analyze the data is worthy of release, DUE TO THE MANY UNKNOWN INVOLVED."

Over the years, many documents (raw intelligence data) have been released indicating the 4602d AISS's involvement with UFO's. While these documents reflected such units as the 1127th, 7602d, and USAFSAC they are all the same unit and carry out the same mission; just different names. Many of these documents show that this unit had an interest in UFO's long after the closure of Project Blue Book, such as the documents concerning UFO sightings in the USSR and in Belgium. Also, these documents clearly show that the U.S. Air Force still has an interest in UFO's today and that that interest is highly classified for whatever the reason.

It has been said that we have enough evidence to prove the existence of UFO's in a court of law. However, UFO's are not a legal problem but a scientific one. Therefore, we must approach it in that light. A scientist must have concrete evidence before he is willing to offer an opinion and absolute proof before he is willing to offer any conclusions. I believe that evidence and proof can be found in the classified vaults of the U.S. Air Force Special Activities Center at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. The unit that to this very day carries on the Air Force's real investigation of Unidentified Flying Objects, classified to the extreme that the Air Force may neither confirm nor deny the existence or non-existence of many programs apparently related to UFO recoveries, in the interest of national security. Programs concerning the existence of much of the

evidence for UFO reality.

The United States Air Force changed the code name to Project Moon Dust once it became compromised. This took place sometime between 1980 and 1985. However, as of March 1991, they had not changed the code name to Operation Blue Fly. One needs to keep in mind that the change of a project's name does not do away with the intelligence mission requirement. It only serves to conceal its existence. Both Project Moon Dust and Operation Blue Fly dealt/deals with only two items of intelligence. These were/are the recoveries of objects of unknown origin or known Soviet/Bloc space debris and these two programs remain highly classified by the U.S. Air Force to this very day.

On or about the 24th of February 1992, Senator Bingaman's Office requested that the U.S. Air Force Special Activities Center release the files in its possession concerning the alleged UFO crash in the Roswell, New Mexico area on the night of July 2, 1947. Now, more than seven months later, this agency of the United States Air Force has yet to respond to Senator Bingaman's request. However, when I requested this same information, that agency was to reply that, "We may neither confirm nor deny the existence or non-existence of any information" concerning these projects or operations as any other response would reveal classified information. I guess the real question that remains unanswered is, what constitutes a national security interest when the item in question is not considered a threat to our national security by our own government? When it comes to national security, what does our Government consider as reality?

### Unidentified Flying Objects Reporting (Short Title: UFOB)

**1. Purpose and Scope.** This Regulation establishes procedures for reporting information and evidence pertaining to unidentified flying objects and sets forth the responsibility of Air Force activities in this regard. It applies to all Air Force activities.

#### 2. Definitions:

a. *Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOB)*—Relates to any airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics, or unusual features does not conform to any presently known aircraft or missile type, or which cannot be positively identified as a familiar object.

b. *Familiar Objects*—Include balloons, astronomical bodies, birds, and so forth.

**3. Objectives.** Air Force interest in unidentified flying objects is twofold: First as a possible threat to the security of the United States and its forces, and secondly, to determine technical aspects involved.

a. *Air Defense.* To date, the flying objects reported have imposed no threat to the security of the United States and its Possessions. However, the possibility that new air vehicles, hostile aircraft or missiles may first be regarded as flying objects by the initial observer is real. This requires that sightings be reported rapidly and as completely as information permits.

b. *Technical.* Analysis thus far has failed to provide a satisfactory explanation for a number of sightings reported. The Air Force will continue to collect and analyze reports until all sightings can be satisfactorily explained, bearing in mind that:

- (1) To measure scientific advances, the Air Force must be informed on experimentation and development of new air vehicles.

- (2) The possibility exists that an air vehicle of revolutionary configuration may be developed.
- (3) The reporting of all pertinent factors will have a direct bearing on the success of the technical analysis.

#### 4. Responsibility:

a. *Reporting.* Commanders of Air Force activities will report all information and evidence that may come to their attention, including that received from adjacent commands of the other services and from civilians.

b. *Investigation.* Air Defense Command will conduct all field investigations within the ZI, to determine the identity of any UFOB.

c. *Analysis.* The Air Technical Intelligence Center (ATIC), Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, will analyze and evaluate: All information and evidence reported within the ZI after the Air Defense Command has exhausted all efforts to identify the UFOB; and all information and evidence collected in overseas areas.

d. *Cooperation.* All activities will cooperate with Air Defense Command representatives to insure the economical and prompt success of an investigation, including the furnishing of air and ground transportation, when feasible.

**5. Guidance.** The thoroughness and quality of a report or investigation into incidents of unidentified flying objects are limited only by the resourcefulness and imagination of the person responsible for preparing the report. Guidance set forth below is based on experience and has been found helpful in evaluating incidents:

- a. Theodolite measurements of changes of azimuth and elevation and angular size.
- b. Interception, identification, or air search

action. These actions may be taken if appropriate and within the scope of existing air defense regulations.

c. Contact with local aircraft control and warning (AC&W) units, ground observation corps (GOC) posts and filter centers, pilots and crews of aircraft aloft at the time and place of sighting whenever feasible, and any other persons or organizations which may have factual data bearing on the UFOB or may be able to offer corroborating evidence, electronic or otherwise.

d. Consultation with military or civilian weather forecasters to obtain data on: Tracks of weather balloons released in the area, since these often are responsible for sightings; and any unusual meteorological activity which may have a bearing on the UFOB.

e. Consultation with astronomers in the area to determine whether any astronomical body or phenomenon would account for or have a bearing on the observation.

f. Contact with military and civilian tower operators, air operations offices, and so forth, to determine whether the sighting could be the result of misidentification of known aircraft.

g. Contact with persons who might have knowledge of experimental aircraft of unusual configuration, rocket and guided missile firings, and so forth, in the area.

**6. ZI Collection.** The Air Defense Command has a direct interest in the facts pertaining to UFOB's reported within the ZI and has, in the 4602d Air Intelligence Service Squadron (AISS), the capability to investigate these reports. The 4602d AISS is composed of specialists trained for field collection and investigation of matters of air intelligence interest which occur within the ZI. This squadron is highly mobile and deployed throughout the ZI as follows: Flights are attached to air defense divisions, detachments are attached to each of the defense forces, and the squadron headquarters is located at Peterson Field, Colorado, adjacent to Headquarters, Air Defense Command. Air Force activities, therefore, should establish and maintain liaison with the nearest element of this squadron. This can be accomplished by contacting the appropriate echelon of the Air Defense Command as outlined above.

a. All Air Force activities are authorized to conduct such preliminary investigation as may be required for reporting purposes; however, investigations should not be carried beyond this point, unless such action is requested by the 4602d AISS.

b. On occasions—after initial reports are

submitted—additional data is required which can be developed more economically by the nearest Air Force activity, such as: narrative statements, sketches, marked maps, charts, and so forth. Under such circumstances, appropriate commanders will be contacted by the 4602d AISS.

c. Direct communication between echelons of the 4602d AISS and Air Force activities is authorized.

**7. Reporting.** All information relating to UFOB's will be reported promptly. The method (electrical or written) and priority of dispatch will be selected in accordance with the apparent intelligence value of the information. In most instances, reports will be made by electrical means: Information over 24 hours old will be given a "deferred" precedence. Reports over 3 days old will be made by written report prepared on AF Form 112, Air Intelligence Information Report, and AF Form 112a, Supplement to AF Form 112.

a. *Addressees:*

(1) *Electrical Reports.* All electrical reports will be multiple addressed to:

(a) Commander, Air Defense Command, Ent Air Force Base, Colorado Springs, Colorado.

(b) Nearest Air Division (Defense). (For ZI only.)

(c) Commander, Air Technical Intelligence Center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

(d) Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C.

(2) *Written Reports:*

(a) Within the ZI, reports will be submitted direct to the Air Defense Command. Air Defense Command will reproduce the report and distribute it to interested ZI intelligence agencies. The original report together with notation of the distribution effected then will be forwarded to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C.

(b) Outside the ZI, reports will be submitted direct to Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C. as prescribed in "Intelligence Collection Instructions" (ICI), June 1954.

b. *Short Title.* "UFOB" will appear at the beginning of the text of electrical messages and in the subject of written reports.

c. *Negative Data.* The word "negative"

in reply to any numbered item of the report format will indicate that all logical leads were developed without success. The phrase "not applicable" (N/A) will indicate that the question does not apply to the sighting being investigated.

d. *Report Format.* Reports will include the following numbered items:

- (1) Description of the object(s):
  - (a) Shape.
  - (b) Size compared to a known object (use one of the following terms: Head of a pin, pea, dime, nickel, quarter, half dollar, silver dollar, baseball, grapefruit, or basketball) held in the hand at about arms length.
  - (c) Color.
  - (d) Number.
  - (e) Formation, if more than one.
  - (f) Any discernible features or details.
  - (g) Tail, trail, or exhaust, including size of same compared to size of object(s).
  - (h) Sound. If heard, describe sound.
  - (i) Other pertinent or unusual features.
- (2) Description of course of object(s):
  - (a) What first called the attention of observer(s) to the object(s)?
  - (b) Angle of elevation and azimuth of the object(s) when first observed.
  - (c) Angle of elevation and azimuth of object(s) upon disappearance.
  - (d) Description of flight path and maneuvers of object(s).
  - (e) Manner of disappearance of object(s).
  - (f) Length of time in sight.
- (3) Manner of observation:
  - (a) Use one or any combination of the following items: Ground-visual, ground-electronic, air-electronic. (If electronic, specify type of radar.)
  - (b) Statement as to optical aids (telescopes, binoculars, and so forth) used and description thereof.
  - (c) If the sighting is made while airborne, give type aircraft, identification number, altitude, heading, speed, and home station.
- (4) Time and date of sighting:
  - (a) Zulu time-date group of sighting.
  - (b) Light conditions (use one of the following terms): Night, day, dawn, dusk.

- (5) Locations of observer(s). Exact latitude and longitude of each observer, or Georef position, or position with reference to a known landmark.
- (6) Identifying information of all observer(s):
  - (a) Civilian--Name, age, mailing address, occupation.
  - (b) Military--Name, grade, organization, duty, and estimate of reliability.
- (7) Weather and winds aloft conditions at time and place of sightings:
  - (a) Observer(s) account of weather conditions.
  - (b) Report from nearest AWS or U. S. Weather Bureau Office of wind direction and velocity in degrees and knots at surface, 6,000', 10,000', 16,000', 20,000', 30,000', 50,000', and 80,000', if available.
  - (c) Ceiling.
  - (d) Visibility.
  - (e) Amount of cloud cover.
  - (f) Thunderstorms in area and quadrant in which located.
- (8) Any other unusual activity or condition, meteorological, astronomical, or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
- (9) Interception or identification action taken (such action may be taken whenever feasible, complying with existing air defense directives).
- (10) Location of any air traffic in the area at time of sighting.
- (11) Position title and comments of the preparing officer, including his preliminary analysis of the possible cause of the sighting(s).
- (12) Existence of physical evidence, such as materials and photographs.

e. *Security.* Reports should be unclassified unless inclusion of data required by d above necessitates a higher classification.

**8. Evidence.** The existence of physical evidence (photographs or materiel) will be promptly reported.

a. *Photographic:*

- (1) *Visual.* The negative and two prints will be forwarded, all original film, including wherever possible both prints and negatives, will be titled or otherwise properly identified as to place, time, and date of the incident

(see "Intelligence Collection Instructions" (ICI), June 1954).

- (2) *Radar*. Two copies of each print will be forwarded. Prints of radarscope photography will be titled in accordance with AFR 95-7 and forwarded in compliance with AFR 95-6.

b. *Materiel*. Suspected or actual items of materiel which come into possession of any Air Force echelon will be safeguarded in such manner as to prevent any defacing or alteration which might reduce its value for intelligence examination and analysis.

**9. Release of Facts.** Headquarters USAF will release summaries of evaluated data which will inform the public on this subject. In response to local inquiries, it is permissible to inform news media representatives on UFOB's when the object is positively identified as a familiar object (see paragraph 2b), except that the following type of data warrants protection and should not be revealed: Names of principles, intercept and investigation procedures, and classified radar data. For those objects which are not explainable, only the fact that ATIC will analyze the data is worthy of release, due to the many unknowns involved.



8. (U) MR BRENIG HAS SINCE ASSURED THE COMMUNITY THAT HE IS PERSONALLY ORGANIZING A NEW UFO OBSERVATION CAMPAIGN AND SPECIFICALLY REQUESTS THE HELP OF THE BELGIAN MOD.

9. [REDACTED] RELATED A SIMILAR UFO SIGHTING WHICH APPARENTLY HAPPENED TO A BELGIAN AIR FORCE OFFICER IN THE SAME AREA NEAR LIEGE DURING NOVEMBER 89. THE OFFICER AND HIS WIFE WERE ALLEDGEDLY BLINDED BY A HUGE BRIGHT FLYING OBJECT AS THEY WERE DRIVING ON THE AUTOROUTE. THEY STOPPED THEIR CAR, BUT WERE SO FRIGHTENED THEY ABANDONED THE VEHICLE AND RAN INTO THE WOODS. THEY COULD NOT PROVIDE A DETAILED DESCRIPTION BUT WHATEVER IT WAS DEFINITELY APPEARED REAL TO THEM. [REDACTED] UNDERLINED THEIR CREDIBILITY AS SOLID.

COMMENTS: 1. [REDACTED] COMMENT. HE COULD PROVIDE VERY LITTLE CONCRETE INFORMAITON EXCEPT TO VERIFY THE LARGE VOLUME OF SIGHTINGS AND THE SIMILARITY OF SOME DURING NOV 89. [REDACTED]

2. [REDACTED] THE BAF HAS RULED SOME SIGHTINGS WERE CAUSED BY INVERSION LAYERS, LAZER BEAMS AND OTHER FORMS OF HIGH INTENSITY LIGHTING HITTING CLOUDS. BUT A REMARKABLE NUMBER OCCURRED ON CLEAR NIGHTS WITH NO OTHER EXPLAINABLE ACTIVITY NEARBY.

3. [REDACTED] THE BAF IS CONCERNED TO A POINT ABOUT THE UFO ISSUE AND IS TAKING ACTION TO INVESTIGATE INFORMATION THEY HAVE. [REDACTED] DOES ADMIT, HOWEVER, THAT HE IS NOT OPTIMISTIC ABOUT RESOLVING THE PROBLEM.

4. [REDACTED] FIELD COMMENT. THE USAF DID CONFIRM TO THE BAF AND BELGIAN MOD THAT NO USAF STEALTH AIRCRAFT WERE OPERATING IN THE ARDENNES AREA DURING THE PERIODS IN [REDACTED]

QUESTION. THIS WAS RELEASED TO THE BELGIAN PRESS AND  
RECEIVED WIDE DISSEMINATION.
