FROM THE EDITOR



The UAPA receives hundreds of clippings of UFO as well as other mysterious happenings from around the world.

Two very interesting reports brought to my attention through this situation are the Czech Republic sightings and the mutilated cattle in Alabama.

Vladimir Siska, a project director of the Czecho-Slovak Archeo-Astronomical Association (AAA) has been overwhelmed with reports, particularly in Moravia, the hilly eastern region of the Czech Republic.

Officials deny that reporting of UFOs were suppressed during the communist era. However, reported sightings have risen dramatically during the past two years.

Siska says there were 40 sightings of UFOs in the Czech Republic during 1991. In 1992, 101 cases were reported. Many of these sightings have been in or around the towns of Jihlava and Brno in Moravia. Now Siska says 10 sightings a month are reported to his organization.

The Prague branch of AAA holds monthly meetings for extraterrestrial enthusiasts. Anywhere from 50 to 100 people show up, from businessmen to students and Bohemian flower children.

On February 8, 1993 a Mrs. Anna Sitarova, a 43-year-old secretary from Jihlava and her friend were driving on a county road in the Moravian highlands east of Prague when what seemed like a brilliant star blazed over the hills toward them at an amazing speed. Within seconds the object was hovering over her car. The object was 5 feet long and 3 feet wide, and emitted a bright red light.

"My legs and arms began to feel stiff," Satarova recalls. "I couldn't stop the car. I felt like I was being compelled to follow."

She and her friend turned the car around and headed toward the nearby village of Rychnov, where they and an elderly woman watched the object from a distance.

The UAPA has in its files three other cases where the same stiffness is mentioned in similar instances.

Since October 1992 thru March of 1993, 26 animals - nearly all cows - have been mutilated in several small, rural communities on Sand Mountain in northeast Alabama, nearly all have been killed in the same manner, with precise, bloodless, almost high-tech surgical incisions that remove various animal parts: tongues, teeth, eyes, ears, hearts and excretory and sexual organs.

The mystery is enhanced by two factors: helicopters and UFOs. In 95 percent of the cases, reports of helicopters were seen with different colored lights on them. UFOs were seen in the other 5 percent. Many Albertville farmers reported seeing large helicopters with spotlights hovering above their pastures the night before the mutilations were discovered.

Now, animal mutilations are nothing new, but in Alabama, they are. The UAPA has hundreds of cases dating back to the sixties, where most of these mutilations take place in the western states.

As editor of FSD, I personally believe the government, CIA, FBI, NSA or AEC or still some unknown branch of security element is participating in mutilations.

I also believe that they are very much interested in some experiment with atomic, poison gas, or even agent orange or some other form of nerve gas, that might have been discharged as a test or some experiment that went wrong.

Well, what do you think? Let us know at FSD. All comments will be held in confidence if so requested.

Each year a convention is held in a different city, except that every few years it returns to Cleveland, Ohio, where it began so many years ago.

This year's Convention will take place on October 15th-17th at the Days Inn in Bordentown, New Jersey, just off Exit #7 of the New Jersey Turnpike. A press conference will be held there at 5 p.m. on Friday Oct. 15th, and speakers from all over the U.S. will be heard all day Saturday as well as Sat. evening, and also in Sunday morning and afternoon. The admission is \$40. per person for Saturday and \$35 for Sunday. The Convention rate at the Days Inn is \$45 per night plus tax. Reservations can be made by phoning 609-298-6100. Advance tickets may be obtained by writing local chairman Pat Marcattilio at 138 Redfern St., Trenton, N.J. 08610, phone 609-888-1358 (11 a.m. to 2 p.m. only). National Chairman Jim Moseley can be reached by phone at 305-294-1873.

Approximately 16 speakers are expected, of whom the following have already been booked: David Huggins, speaking on a lifetime of apparent abductions by aliens, most of which involve sexual contacts. Huggins, a commercial artist, will show slides of paintings depicting these highly personal experiences.

Former NASA Mission Specialist Robert Oechsler will speak on "A Recent Landing of an Extraterrestrial Craft in Canada", with actual video of the craft on the ground! Timothy Green Beckley ("Mr. UFO") will recount little-known highly unusual UFO and "Fortean" cases; Dr. Frank Stranges will tell of his several personal experiences with a spaceman called Val Thor; Parapsychologist George Hansen will give a slide lecture entitled "Comparisons of Ufology to Parapsychology"; Tom Benson will give a lecture based on research and personal experiences, called: "Prelude to the UFO Abduction Experience"; Rick Hilberg of Cleveland, a co-founder of the NUFOC, will give a slide lecture outlining the highlights of the recent history of ufology; Jim Moseley, editor of "Saucer Smear", will speak on personal experiences in the field of ufology and parapsychology; Pat Marcattilio will show slides to illustrate his lecture, "Brain Scan Anomalies of Two UFO Abductees"; and Alice Haggerty will speak on her lifetime of UFO abductions & other unexplainable experiences.

Speaking of conventions, the Cleveland National UFO Conference is moving along nicely. We know that it will be held in September of 1994, and that advance tickets will be sold through Flying Saucer Digest starting in early 1994. All details will be worked out by the next issue. One thing for certain - this convention will be the largest UFO convention ever held in Cleveland. There will be more UFO related material in this one place than any time before. There will be UFO material given away valued to fifty dollars, just by being there. There will be special work shops never held before. There will be special UFO material that goes back to the fifties that will be given away just for attending. Sounds exciting? You bet, and FSD, the largest private all-illustrated magazine in the world, will be your host.

Three sailors were feared dead last night after their yacht disappeared on a voyage through the Bermuda Triangle.

AJM - I think you might be referring to a booklet UAPA put out in 1969-70 titled UFO Terminology. We sold that booklet until 1981. We never had a reprint, but I'll send you a xerox copy. Thanks for your letter.

By way of introduction, I am a writer with over 300 credits including The Atlantic, Newsday, Boston Globe, and Reason. Last year my book on Israeli political corruption was released in England and was reviewed by the Economist, Sunday Telegraph, New Statesman and BBC. I am currently editor of a newsletter called Inside Israel.

For the past 25 years I have been a keen observer of the UFO phenomenon. I have always wanted to cover a major landing and I hope you'll permit me to do so for you.

On March 20, Tziporit Carmel felt drawn to leave her bed and walk outside. About 150 yards from her home she saw a UFO shaped like "an orange storage tank," and beside it a seven foot humanoid.

She waited three days before telling her husband. He went to the landing site and saw three spiral imprints in an oat field, each about 15 feet in diameter. He was wise enough to contact Israel's UFO experts and over twenty began investigating. They discovered dozens of metal shards as well as several oil stains. Both have been studied by Tel Aviv University and determined to be of unknown origin.

This is a UFO incident where coverup will be difficult. The shards are in the hands of twenty people committed to UFO research.

Let me know if you'd like me to write a story on the Israeli landing. Thanks.

UFO RETROSPECTIVE



On August 5, 1963 at 11:30 p.m. Ronnie Austin and Phyllis Bruce (his Date) were driving home from a drive-in theater. They were on Route 15 traveling east. They had just passed the Mount Vernon, Illinois airport when they noticed a round ball of light at tree-top level. This strange fuzzily outlined ball of light was now keeping pace with the car. It had no distinct outline. When Ronnie would slow the car down, the mystery light would slow down. When he would speed up, the object did the same thing. The light at this time was about the size of an automobile. The light then went into a collision course with the car and then stopped within 200 feet. A few minutes later Ronnie was at his girl friend's house. The light stayed about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles away.

When Ronnie left to go home, the light resumed a position in front of his car. One mile later Ronnie pulled into a gravel road leading to his home. The light then dived straight at him and stopped within 100 feet of his car. The light then passed over his car, the radio had a burst of static and the motor sputtered and almost stopped. When he reached home he called the police. The news media picked up this story and relayed it around the world.

MANY SEE LIGHTED OBJECT IN LOUISIANA

Mindy Wilson of the Monroe News-Star reports on this December 24th multiple witness case:

Linda Dicks wasn't sure whether she was seeing Santa Claus or an alien spacecraft in the night sky over southwestern Ouachita Parish.

But she was convinced the red-and white-lighted object flying just above the tree line wasn't an airplane. And whatever it was, she wanted to take a ride on it.

"If it's only got two seats, me and my son are going first," said Dicks, 48.

The West Monroe woman and her 27-year-old son Butch were among a group of skywatchers who gathered on Philpot Road after hearing on their police scanners reports of unidentified flying objects. The objects were apparently sighted in southwestern Ouachita Parish between about 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. Thursday.

"Deputies saw it first, and then we started getting calls," said Cpl. Sandy Pfeiffer of the Ouachita Parish Sheriff's Department.

In radio communications, deputies talked about seeing a lighted object bouncing up and down above the tree line and disappearing, and seeing objects with multiple lights and lights that changed colors.

A deputy who wouldn't give his name said an object with flashing red, white and blue lights flew over his head as he spoke to a Jackson Parish sheriff's deputy near the Jackson Parish line.

"It flew almost over that Jackson Parish deputy and I, and there was no noise whatsoever," he said.

"I've never seen anything like it before in my life," the deputy said.

Richard Antley of Bawcomville said he used a rifle scope and binoculars to view an object with "twinkling lights, best I can describe. It looked like something pointed with two tails coming off it and sparks flying off," he said.

West Monroe and Monroe police reported no calls of UFO sightings.

Deputies checked regularly with air traffic controllers at Monroe Regional Airport's control tower for planes in the area.

One private plane was sightseeing over the city during that time and several passenger planes flew overhead, said Mike Riley, an air traffic specialist.

But the control tower's radar likely wouldn't detect anything flying low in the sky, he said. Deputies reported many of the objects were flying just above the tree line.

HIGH STRANGENESS IN NORTHEAST ALABAMA

This "mini-flap" has caused quite a stir in Alabama in recent months. Our first report is by Darrell Norman of NYT Regional Newspapers, and has a dateline of February 7th:

A week of reports of strange lights over DeKalb County has police officials building a file on the county's latest encounter with UFOs.

Sue Johnson was drying her hair about 5 a.m. Jan. 28 when a noise she cannot describe brought her to the kitchen window of her home in Dogtown.

What she saw practically in her backyard was some sort of airborne object, covered with glimmering red, green and white lights, and moving slowly below the treetops.

It was just after 8 p.m. Saturday when Karen Twilley got a call from her mother-in-law across the road in Lickskillet, telling her to go outside and look at the strange lights.

When she, her husband and son got outside, they were shocked by a different kind of light show. In one direction they saw three triangle-shaped objects covered in red and white blinking lights, in the other a single large globe-shaped white light.

Then Tuesday about 9 p.m. Susanne Austin and Ernest G. "Gene" Mooney, both of Geraldine, saw a strange light in the sky from different places but in the same direction.

"It's been going on a week now," Sgt Ron Ogletree, commander of the Gadson trooper post, said Wednesday. "We are investigating each reported sighting and trying to put together a complete file.

"We are treating all of them seriously because these are serious people. They are not publicity seekers who made all this up to get their name in the papers."

It was in 1988 that huge crowds of people flocked Fyffe after numerous reports of UFO sightings. Streets of the Sand Mountain town took on a carnival atmosphere.

Johnson, 29, said she first thought the object out her window was a helicopter, but she could see no longer hear the sound that attracted her. Opening her door, she said, she saw an array of lights about 50 feet straight ahead and could make out its shape.

"It was bigger than an automobile, and it was thicker in the middle than it was on the ends," Johnson said. "I tried to make a drawing of it for the troopers, but I couldn't get on paper what I saw with my eyes."

She said the object moved laterally so slowly that it appeared almost stationary. The lights that covered it did not actually blink on and off, but glimmered or shimmered "like a bunch of gnats."

"I was really frightened," she said. "I wanted to keep seeing it, but I wanted to get away from it at the same time."

The object disappeared while she was moving from one door to the other. She said she had it in constant sight for about five minutes.

The objects seen at Lickskillet lingered longer. Twilley, 29, said they were visible for a total of about 45 minutes, counting the time of the first sightings by her in-laws.

The three triangular objects were high in the sky, and each was larger than an airplane.

"They were in constant motion, but there wasn't any sound," Twilley said. "The red and white lights kept blinking. My in-laws saw the other source of light move in and later just vanish, but I only saw it when it was shining constant.

"I felt shock and excitement, but they were too far away for me to get scared," she said. "The first thing I thought of was those cows that had been mutilated. We have cows around here."

Her reference was to recent reports of cattle found dead in Marshall and DeKalb counties with their teeth and sexual organs removed and the blood drained from their bodies.

Then Tuesday night, Austin, 24, said she watched a strange light in the sky for about 45 minutes beginning about 8:45.

Austin, chief dispatcher at Geraldine Police Dept., lives at the Geraldine city limits to the east. She said her and her husband went outside after hearing chatter about lights in the sky on a scanner.

"What we saw was definitely not a falling star," Austin said.

Austin said that by looking back toward Crossville and Kilpatrick, she watched a light source high in the sky that was "shaped like a spinning top. It did not have defined edges, but had instead a misty blur around it."

Mrs. Austin said she took some pictures, but was not optimistic that the film captured what she saw.

"It was a cheap camera, and the light was pretty high," she said.

Mooney, 59, who lives on the south city limit of Geraldine, was returning home from a restaurant with sandwiches about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday when he saw a bright light in the sky ahead.

"It was still at first, then it took tail over the top of the trees and stopped again," Mooney said. "It never did move again, but it stayed there, shining bright."

Mooney said the light appeared in the direction of Albertville. It was about the size of a dinner plate, and it had a reddish glow. It was first at a 45-degree angle from the ground, but moved down to about 10 feet above the tree line.

Mooney does not discount a connection between the sightings and recent cattle mutilations on the ground.

Ogletree said the aerial sightings and reports of cattle being mutilated are "both interesting and important stories," which were being pursued independently, but said he had no reason to connect them.

FOLLOW UP ON ALABAMA "MINI-FLAP"

Laurie Cornelison of the Fort Payne Times - Journal filed the following report on February 20th:

Now they're in Fort Payne.

Baffling bright lights that have appeared on Lookout and Sand Mountains for the past month have been caught on video from South Grand Avenue.

Susan Eads of Grand Avenue South and Pine Hill on Thursday night took what State Troopers feel is the best film of the UFO to date.

Sgt. Ron Ogletree of the Attalla Trooper Post said Friday that at least four TV stations and three newspapers had visited the post to view the video. It was scheduled to appear on TV Friday night.

"Ms. Eads used a zoom lens camcorder, and you can see the object in relation to her house. It's the best video I've seen of the UFO,"

Ogletree described the UFO as "a fat Batman emblem. It's disc-shaped, with an indentation at the bottom; and wide on the sides like wings."

Speculators have dubbed the UFO an alien ship, a weather balloon, a star, and even a Stealth bomber.

The object was seen Thursday night in other places. Police and deputies spotted the strange lights over Skirum, where Times Journal photographer Gary Coker captured the object on still film. He shot the film on a tri-pod outside his home. His zoom lens reveals a "red glow coming from it, and four round lights inside the large glow...I have no idea what it is."

LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY POLICE AIRCRAFT CASE

This fascinating case has yet to be explained one way or the other, as after the following version was published a local man came forward and claimed the object sighted by the officers was merely a small hot air balloon he made out of candles and a plastic bag. And while this might well be a solution to the sighting, local residents and the news media have cast some doubts about his reputation and sincerity. So there the matter rests for now.

Anyway, here's what Gardiner Harris of the Louisville Courier - Journal had to say in the paper's March 4th edition:

Two Jefferson County air unit police officers - described by their lieutenant as "solid guys" - swear they had a two-minute dogfight with a UFO during a routine patrol Friday.

Two officers on the ground said they, too, spotted the object.

The UFO - a pear-shaped object about the size of a basketball - literally flew circles around the helicopter, even though the fliers say they were approaching 100mph.


In one blinding moment when both craft were hurtling toward each other, the UFO shot three baseball-size fireballs out of its middle, all three officers said. The fireballs fizzled into nothing.

Officers Kenny Graham and Kenny Downs haven't talked much about their Friday night flight over General Electric Appliance Park because they fear few will believe them. But they are convinced they weren't hallucinating.

Officer Mike Smith, in his squad car below, said he saw the object for only about a minute, but confirmed the UFO shot three fireballs into the air and then disappeared.

Officer Joe Smilenski said he tried for more than a minute to catch up to the object in his squad car. "I've been looking for 'em for 14 years, and I guess this is the closest I've come to something I can't explain."

The night started out like every other night. Graham and Downs got to



work around 6 p.m. and were soon in the air flying a routine patrol.

While in the air, they received a call about a possible break-in near Sanford Ave. and Bank Road. They flew off and quickly reached the area, which is near Appliance Park, around 11:50 p.m.

As they circled, Graham saw something that looked like a small fire off to his left. Dozens of bonfires had been lit by revelers delighting in the new snowfall.

But Graham soon decided it wasn't a fire. Downs shined his 1.5 - million-candlepower spotlight on the object, which began to drift back and forth like a balloon as the light washed over it. Then it gradually floated up to the helicopter's elevation about 500 feet above the ground, where it hovered for a few seconds.

"Then it took off at a speed I've never seen before," said Graham.

The object made two huge counter-clockwise loops and finally approached the helicopter's rear.

Graham, afraid the object would ram his tail rotor, pushed his speed above 100 mph. The UFO shot past them and instantly climbed hundreds of feet in the air. It descended again and flew close to the helicopter. Graham tried to close the gap with the object, and it again flew away. As the UFO approached the three fireballs burst out of its core.

Scared, Graham banked away from the object.

"When we came back around, it was gone," Graham said.

When the two returned to their base, Graham called the control tower at Stanford Field to ask if their radar had spotted anything unusual. It had not. County radio dispatchers had nothing reported either.

WEIRD DOLOGY

"WILD MEN" IN PAKISTAN

Roger Highfield, Science Editor of the London Times filed this: Nasty smells, guttural sounds and eyewitness accounts of "wild men" have led two French researchers to make the extraordinary claim at a meeting in Cambridge today that there may be primitive humans living in Northern Pakistan.

Evidence to support the existence of "living unknown hominids" in these remote regions will be presented today by Dr. Anne Malassé and M. Jordi Magraner, of Paris, at the 8th meeting of the Language Origins Society in Selwyn College, Cambridge.

But Dr. Chris Stringer, of the Natural History Museum, London, yesterday said he was highly skeptical. He said: "We need hard evidence such as bones or tissue that we can analyze."

Eye-witnesses shown pictures of a selection of human and human-like creatures, consistently selected the image of a primitive man found preserved in ice some 20 years ago by a Belgian team, said Dr. Malassé.

He had a low forehead, lacked lips or a chin, and was covered with hair, but was not a great ape, Dr. Malassé said.

On one expedition Mr. Magraner heard unusual guttural cries, she said, which could have been made by the vocal box of the primitive man found by the Belgians.

He plans an expedition to Pakistan in December, and will use infra-red cameras to look for the wild men.
