

In my last article, I stated no one had as yet proved the impossibility of the interplanetary origin of the Unidentified Flying Object. Yet there is, to be perfectly honest, a great weight of argument against this theory. I should like to devote this column to a discussion of the difficulties of the interplanetary hypothesis.

To postulate this theory, one naturally assumes that UFO's are operated, controlled, or piloted by sentient or thinking beings. Yet the hard fact remains that the existence of sentient life on any other planet has yet to be proven. The probability of life on Mercury or on any trans-Martian planet is so slight as to not merit present consideration. The existence of sentient life on Venus is possible, but not probably; moreover, such beings, covered by a perpetual thick overcast, would almost certainly lack the curiosity about the stellar universe that has driven men ever upward since the days of the Icarus legend. Such beings could readily attain technological advance equal to ours in its general level, but be unaware of the existence of the stellar universe.

Mars presents quite a different problem; in September, 1959 based on thirty minutes research, I was able to write a five-page letter to the editorial staff of a national magazine on the riddle of Mars — the literature and evidence is that extensive. I do not have here the time or space to recount this data: but enough evidence has accumulated, especially in the past century, to make the possibility of sentient Martian life something that cannot be ruled out a priori. There is the great mystery of canals (an inaccurate translation of the cavalli or "channels"). Such great of Mars study as Percival Lowell and E. C. Slipher swore they had seen the canals. Others of equal repute deny

their existence. Both Marconi and Tesla believed they had received intelligent radio messages from the Red Planet. Mars' two satellites, Phobos and Deimos were discovered by Asaph Hall in 1877, as though they had never existed before; in 1959, D. S. Shklovsky, a soviet astronomer, stated that they were decaying in their orbits as de artificial satellites. Mars' elliptical orbit causes it to be nearest to Earth when it is in "apposition" — about every two years. At several of the appositions, UFO sightings have increased noticeably. Yet at others, including the very close apposition of 1956, no increase in sightings was noted. Mars is universally accepted today as being the home of vegetative life. Yet it could also harbor sentient life ifg one supposes such life to be vastly different from that on Earth. due to Mars' climate, its shortage of water and its lack of oxygen. Perhaps the July pass of Mariner IV will give further evidence on this matter.

The problems in postulating the origin of the UFO on a planet and outside the solar system, are, to the incredible distances involved, seemingly insurmountable. Such beings would have had to have mastered propulsion systems far beyond anything we can project today. They would either have to live in colonies with a complete reproductive cycle or else have life spans for beyond ours. Thus communication problems would be great.

An argument for the overcoming of every one of these obstacles can be made. I do not believe this to be a prima facie case against interplanetary UFO's. But it is well to give these problems serious thought before committing oneself to the interplanetary theory irrevocably.

Here are a couple of ideas I would like to put forth as to why UFO's sometimes fail to appear on radar screens, though visual sightings are made of the same objects. The first deals with plasma or ionization, the second phasing.

As you will recall during the Mercury program, communication with the capsules was blacked out during re-entry due to the layer of ions surrounding the craft during the period of maximum heat. This layer of ions acted as a shield, preventing the passage of radio waves. An ion, or plasma field of this strength would of course, show up on radar.

Now, let us consider a condition where the air surrounding an object is not so heavily ionized. In this case we will assume that the occupants of a craft are able to vary the strength of the ion layer at will. By adjusting the field to a low intensity, radio waves (radar waves are nothing more than radio waves pulsed at regular intervals) would be absorbed rather than reflected. If they do manage to penetrate the ion layer, strike the target, and exit they would be so attenuated that they would be so weak as to be below the threshold sensitivity of the radar scanning the object in question.

Now, let us regard phasing. A radar set "sees" objects by emitting short pulses of very short radio waves, which strike and are reflected from whatever objects (such as aircraft, buildings, missiles, thunderstorms, etc.) happen to be in the beam's path. The reflected waves are picked up by the same antenna that does the transmitting. The reflected waves are then

fed into a sensitive receiver, then displayed as a luminous spot on a screen. The number of spots, or pips as they are called, corresponds with the number of objects being scanned by the radar set. The farther an object is from the radar set, the longer it takes the reflected waves to return, thus the closer an object is, the closer it is to the center of the screen while the farther an object gets the closer to the edge of the screen the pip appears (this is for PPI scopes). That, in a nutshell, is how radar works.

Now, as previously mentioned, short pulses of very short radio waves are emitted by the radar antenna. While the pulses are only a few hundred per second, at very precise intervals, the radio frequencies are in the order of thousands of millions of cycles per second. A cycle is where a wave starts at zero intensity, increases its strength in one direction until it reaches a peak, falls back to zero and swings to a peak in the opposite direction, then back to zero. Now, let us assume again if we may, that as a radar beam strikes a UFO, the UFO immediately starts emitting radar pulses of its own, keeping in exact step with the pulses of the radar scanning it. But with this difference: the radio frequency waves are of opposite polarity from those of being reflected off the UFO, and precisely at the right intensity. Thus they would cancel each other, and nothing would be seen in the screen at that particular spot.

Regretfully, I do not have the facilities for checking the two above mentioned theories experimentally. I would appreciate hearing from electronics engineers and physicists on this matter.

The United States Air Force has the responsibility under the Department of Defense for the investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFO's). The name of this program, which has been operation since 1948, is Project Blue Book. It has been identified in the past as Project Sign and Project Grudge.

Air Force interest in unidentified flying objects is related directly to the Air Force responsibility for the air defense of the United States. Procedures for this program are established by Air Force Regulation 200-2.

The objectives of Project Blue Book are two-fold: first, to determine whether UFO's pose a threat to the security of the United States; and, second, to determine whether UFO's exhibit any unique scientific information or advanced technology which could contribute to scientific or technical research. In the course of accomplishing these objects, Project Blue Book strives to identify and explain all UFO sightings reported to the Air Force.

The Air Force no longer possesses and thus does not have available for distribution outdated reports on Project Sign, Project Grudge, Blue Book Special Report No. 14 and outdated Project Blue Book press releases. Non-military UFO publications should be requested from the publisher and, not the Air Force.

# AIR FORCE UFO CENSORSHIP?

## AF-UFO REPORT ORDERED DESTROYED

Evidence that the Air Force destroys some official UFO reports has been given to Prof. Charles A. Mearns, NICAP Board Member, by an AF source. The photocopy below reproduces the top part of an Air Intelligence Information Report, covering a UFO sighting by two AF officers. Though the report is not unusual, the "Destroy" order—which the source said was uncommon—indicates a form of censorship previously unknown to NICAP.

Key points of sighting:  
 AF witnesses: Capt. T. J. Pollack, USAF, Flight Commander, 56th Fighter Bomber Squadron; Lt. J. S. Belsham, USAF, Squadron Armament Officer.  
 Summary: Two glowing objects were sighted near the squadron base at Littleton, Essex, England, 9 Oct. 1956. Larger UFO was the size of a pea held at arm's length (about one-half the size of the moon, similarly measured). Object pulsated, emitting five or six rays, with smaller rays between. At times, a longer, broader ray appeared, possibly a trail or exhaust. Second object, smaller, disappeared approached the first one, then disappeared. Flight Commander Pollack was rated as "very reliable" by the Squadron Intelligence Officer, First Lt. D. W. Ketchum, USAF.  
 As stated above, it is the "Destroy" order, not this sighting, which is important. The destruction of similar, officially verified reports will reduce the number of AF pilots and other competent observers who are on record. Regardless of the purpose, deletion of such UFO records can only result in misinforming the public.

### UFO Investigator

The January issue of TRUE magazine carried an article entitled "U. S. Air Force Censorship of the UFO Sightings". The article stated the UFO's hit the front pages 15 years ago and have been with us since (which we agree), in spite of a massive Air Force blackout on facts. The article goes on to tell of the sightings on radar of four spacecraft accompanying the GT-1 launch of April 8, 1964, and this information was kept from the public. The following information was received from the AF by the Chief of Mission Support, Apollo Flight operations, NASA, Washington, dated January 18, 1965.


"No unidentified objects were observed accompanying or pursuing the GT-1 spacecraft launched into orbit on a Titan II booster on April 8, 1964.

Objects observed which were detected on radar, have been identified as minor structural pieces which routinely break free from expendable

booster portion in the spacecraft and booster separation process. There is no indication of the presence of any material which was not originally part of the launched vehicle".

This would explain why it was kept from the public.

As an Air Force UFO Censorship of information, the HIOUFO would have to say "No". We have received no censorship of information. If there is a censorship why was I permitted by the Pentagon to visit Wright-Patterson AFB, to see and question the AF Project Blue Book files? All questions that I have ever asked have been answered as well as all files I have requested I have received (both while I was at Wright-Patterson and since my return to Oklahoma City). The photo below shows an Air Force file we requested on their investigations into the 4 December 1952 Laredo AFB, Texas sighting which is "Unidentified". This is one of several on file at HIOUFO headquarters. If there is a censorship of information it is not to the degree that many research claim. It is suggested that if you have a copy of AF regulation 200-2 to go back and read it carefully.

## Flying Saucer Mystery Still Unsolved

Today, as we explore outer space, leading astronomers agree that billions of other planets exist—and that some may have civilizations further advanced than our own.

Many people consider the phenomenon of unidentified flying objects (UFO's), commonly called "flying saucers," to be a manifestation of other civilizations. Others, with equal sincerity, contend that the explanation for UFO's lies in the realm of the natural sciences.

The whole debate centers around the degree and type of proof needed to establish—with certainty—either of these answers.

What is a UFO? According to air force regulation 200-2, pertaining to unidentified flying objects, it is any airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics or unusual features does not conform to any known aircraft.

The most common characteristic of a UFO is a "saucer" shape. Considering that all variations have been reported, worldwide, since man started recording history, it is not unusual to read about "a large, round, silver-like disc which flew slowly over" the town of Byland Abbey in Yorkshire, England. What is unusual is that this happened in 1290 AD.

Where do UFO's come from? Why are they here? Colonization? Attack? Reconnaissance from a planet many light years away? Or could they be manifestations of a subterranean race here on Earth?

One afternoon several years ago, I noticed an article which was to be the beginning of one of the strangest activities I would ever encounter: "Strange Light Flashes

Across California Sky." A few months later, I noticed an article entitled "Mystery Planes Over Gulf." In the following weeks and months, I read still other articles such as "Air Force Admits Canadian Light Real Mystery" (11-5-57), "Texas Sees Mystery Object" (11-6-57), "Two Illinois Troopers See Flying Whizz" (8-9-58), "See Objects Hover Over Alamoquitos," "Huge Object in Minnesota Sky Sighted," "Bright Object is Spotted Over Nevada," and "Wagoning Sees 'Em. More Flying Saucers' (4-10-64). These were but a few of many which came to my attention.

In August, 1958, with the help of William F. Rafter, we organized Interplanetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects (IOUFO) for the purpose of scientific investigation of these strange objects. International headquarters is at 3035 W. Eubank, Oklahoma City. Eight years later, we have well over 4,500 members world-wide, with state offices in almost all the 50 states. An official publication, "The Controversial Phenomena Bulletin," is published in Massachusetts bi-monthly.

All in all, there are over 100 civilian UFO organizations. There are located in Oklahoma City. One of them, the New Age Center, sponsors UFO lectures. The IOUFO is working hand in hand with the Governmental Aerospace Phenomena Researchers, also located in Oklahoma City.

Last September, by special authorization from the Pentagon, I visited the air force UFO investigation headquarters at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio. Between 1947 and the beginning 1965, the

U.S. Air Force (Project Bluebird) investigated 8,908 reported sightings. Of these, 665 are listed as "Unknown."

According to the January, 1965, Project Bluebird report, "There are no films, photographs, maps, charts or graphs of unidentified flying objects. The only photographs that have been submitted have been determined to be a misinterpretation of natural or conventional objects or hoaxes."

The files of the IOUFO show that Oklahoma has been visited by these strange objects on many occasions—and photographed at least once:

January, 1924 — A white, oval-shaped object lit up the horizon before moving east of sight over the horizon.

June 23, 1947 — A shiny, silver, round object, very large and very high, was reported traveling in an easterly direction at approximately 1,200 miles per hour. This was at 8:30 p.m. At 10:30 a.m., two UFO's were reported over Oklahoma City. Pilot Byron Savage reported sighting a disc that sailed over the city and out of sight.

Early 1950 — A brilliant object was sighted in the sky about 3:30 a.m. by two Edmond police officers. It was described as "white with a long, white tail."

In 1951 — Mrs. Hugh Ellis, Midwest City, reported a small, bright disc moving parallel to the ground at a high speed.

June 30, 1953 — A highway patrol dispatcher saw something that looked like a

## Flying Saucers Called Real, Explanations Pure Fiction

EDITOR OF THE TIMES:

I refer to the article published in the Oklahoma City Times of June 19 on Page 18, headlined "Saucers Explained," with a subhead "Exploding Comet in Control."

This article is the worst bit of hogwash pertaining to UFO's I have ever seen, and I have seen some duds. I will now place this article into so many pieces it will be eligible for classification as a jigsaw puzzle.

First, what does a weather researcher (meteorologist) know about astronomy? Being a meteorologist does not make him an expert on meteors. The study of meteors is known as meteoritics.

None of the chemistry books I have consulted make any mention of nitrogen burning green. The

only substances I know of that burn green are copper and sulphur. Besides, it is presuming on fact to assume that comets have nitrogen in them.

I am writing Mr. Robey, who propounded this hypothesis, asking him that question, and during him to prove the existence of life in comets.

Another hole in the story is this: what comet gives off this silvery light? The type of objects Robey tries to explain are known as "green fireballs"; such objects have been reported continuously since 1844, when they were seen over Scandinavia and called "blue rockets."

Mr. Robey's claim of a 500-mile-per-hour speed

for the "green fireballs" is absolutely ridiculous. The U. S. Air Force set up a special project known as "Project Detachable" to study these objects. "Trials" consisted of three planned cine-theodolite stations to triangulate on these objects, and secure as much information on them as possible.

Due to limited USAF budget, they established only one, at Holloman AFB, New Mexico. There they saw nothing, but when the rig was moved to Vauxhall, N. M., they saw several, and tracked on at 42,000 miles per hour.

I will not attempt to explain the workings of a cine-theodolite, but anyone familiar with such instruments knows that its accuracy is beyond question. Mr. Robey claims that the green glow given off by these objects is due to the friction of the atmosphere. He then states that the hovering might be caused by "auxiliary jets" of nitrogen which glow down and stop the "comets." If the movement of the "comets" was stopped, then you would have no friction; hence, no glow.

I am deputy director of the Interplanetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects, a group which studies these phenomena with a goal of determining the nature of these objects.

IOUFO does not, as a club believe that UFO's come from outer space; we are open-minded, and will accept any theory which is backed up by facts. Personally, I believe that UFO's, or "flying saucers," are intelligently-controlled craft with a base of origin on another planet in our solar system.—JAMES MANEY, CH.

Late 1949 — Highway patrolman in southwest Oklahoma reported a strange object in sky.

Feb. 20, 1959 — Four lights were sighted by many Oklahoma City residents including a radio-TV newscaster. Objects were reported over Duncan minutes later.

April, 1959 — Otis T. Carr attempted to launch an "electro-gravitational" flying saucer. The OTC-X1 was six feet in diameter, four feet high, weighed about 600 pounds and cost over \$25,000. It never got off the ground.

May 26, 1959 — An object described as "shaped like a lightbulb, but much bigger," was sighted at 8 p.m. over the Arkansas-Oklahoma border.

July 29, 1960 — A 14-year-old boy reported a "saucer" over Oklahoma City.

Aug. 31, 1960 — Deputy Director James Maney of IOUFO and at least two other persons spotted object over Oklahoma City.

Aug. 3, 1964 — Countryside near Hugo lighted up when a UFO passed overhead. This was seen by many persons.

September, 1964 — UFO sighted over Oklahoma City at 10,000 feet. It was silver in color. This was only known UFO to be photographed over Oklahoma. Picture was taken by D. Birmingham.

Sept. 9, 1964 — Red object sighted traveling west to east over a hill at approximately 10,000 feet.

Sept. 28, 1964 — Car almost hit by "flying saucer" while en route to Ponca City.

Oct. 26, 1964 — A blue-white, round flying object with a ring of fire around it was reported to El Reno police at 3 p.m.

Nov. 6, 1964 — A round UFO was sighted over southwest Oklahoma City by many persons. It landed and was recovered by Rick Barren. After an intense investigation by the Kirtland, Placitamus and the HOAIFO, the meteorite was identified as "amorphous melaphyre," the second of its kind ever recovered.

Feb. 2, 1965 — An object seen hovering high over the northeastern part of Oklahoma City at 7:30 a.m. was described as a silver ball, appearing about the size of a pool field at men's length.

I have never sighted a "flying saucer." They have been sighted, however, by air force and civilian pilots and navigators; by army, navy and marine corps personnel; by aviation experts, by scientists and engineers, as well as by ordinary citizens.

Motion pictures and still photographs have been taken of UFO's. They have been tracked on radar, chased by jets, and observed by as many as a thousand witnesses at a time.

What are they? Where do they come from? Time will tell. When I first started investigating UFO reports, I wondered if "flying saucers" were real. But, piece by piece, the evidence has crystallized until now I have no doubt as to their existence.

To me, the available evidence indicates an "intelligence" behind their control. The belief that their control is interplanetary, and that the earth has been and is under surveillance, is no longer incredible.

Aug. 28, 1954 — A formation of 14 saucers, in triangle formation, was observed by hundreds of citizens at 8:30 p.m. It is reported that Tinker AFB made radar contact. (There's no record of the sighting at Wright-Patterson.)

August, 1959 — M. M. Bulla, attorney, and his family spotted an object while driving along U. S. 70 west of Lawton.

Sept. 18, 1959 — Dr. Felix Schwartz and his wife worked with other Stillwater residents on a brilliant object with an unusual light traveled back and forth over Stillwater at enormous speed.

Oct. 28, 1957 — Oval shaped object, moving across the dry west of Oklahoma City, was reported by a manneer.

In 1947—UFO sightings were reported all over the state. Seminole and Oklahoma City sightings were dismissed as F-100 jet fighters. Bethany sightings were passed off as the planet Venus.

Nov. 9, 1957 — Durant, Madill, Ada and Altus sightings could not be identified.

November, 1957 — Glenn Northcutt, University of Oklahoma board of regents member, sighted an object "like Mars magnified 100 times" while traveling between Blanchard and Chickasha.

March 5, 1958 — Strange lights sighted over Lake Hefner by many Oklahoma City and Bethany residents at 9 p.m.

Early 1958—Lawton and Clinton residents reported a strange light overhead.

Nov. 12, 1958—UFO's again returned to Oklahoma City—reported as "lights."



# ANATOMY OF A PHENOMENON

Review of Jacques Vallee, "Anatomy of a Phenomenon." By James Maney.

Of the many books on the subject of the UFO, only a few have been of a level to be considered "scientific" or "scholarly": the most important of these are the two works of the great French ufologist, Aime Michel, "The Turth About Flying Saucers", and "Flying Saucers and the Straight-Line Mystery". In a sense, Jacques Vallee has written Aime Michel's third book.

Vallee's book briefly reviews the history of the UFO phenomenon; probably every sighting of importance found in Ruppelt, Michel, Keyhoe, et alii, is repeated in these pages, along with a discussion of pre-1947 UFO reports. There are some reports here that are new to this reviewer. One of the most interesting involves the Kansas farmer who, in 1897, swore that one of his cows was kidnapped (cow-napped?) by a UFO and was later found butchered.

This entire book, as stated above, closely follows the style of Aime Michel, to whom Vallee acknowledges his debt; this similarity goes all the way to the use of long humorous analogies to prove the author's point. It is written in a dispassionate, lucid style, although it is in parts on such an intellectual plane as to be a bit tedious to the reader who lacks a background either in the UFO field or the physical sciences.

Vallee reserves his strongest language for three parties: he berates his fellow scientists (he is a trained astronomer and a consultant to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration) for their wholly close-minded attitude to UFO's since the phenomenon became "tainted" in the late 1940's; he makes much of the limitations of the Air Force investigations in this area, making clear a point

long known by us at HIOUFO, but ignored by many UFO groups, that Air Force interest in the matter is limited only to its relevance to the security of the airspace of the nation: and the harsh words for private UFO groups, especially those in the United States. He states that very few private UFO groups have risen above a level he describes as "generally hideous."

This reviewer with seven years of background in UFO's, is frankly forced to admit that this book has little of value to the experienced researcher, save on some lesser, more specialized point; moreover, a person whose mind on UFO's is a tabula rasa could readily be lost by Vallee's presuppositions of familiarity with much of the basic material of this field. The book, however, is ideal for one who is a novice in ufology. Vallee makes a very strong case for the scientific respectability of the UFO, but I doubt this volume will be read by many most in need of his sage advice.

Alone among UFO books, Vallee makes an attempt at documentation. He has a 196-item bibliography to which he refers within the text by a confusing system of quasi-footnotes. The bibliography is extensive; however, much of it is material which is either yet to be published, or is out of print.

Jacques Vallee is the first new figure to publish a UFO book of substance in some years. By securing publication by a national publisher, Vallee has brought UFO's to the light of day in the nation's bookstores once again. He has other more specialized material in preparation which should raise him quickly to a high rank among serious saucer researchers. 210 pp., \$4.95.

# "UFOs" Watch GT-4 ?

On June 3, 1965, GT-4 Pilot Major James McDivitt and U.S. Major Space walker Edward White were launched into orbit from Cape Kennedy.

Edward White in the opening orbits got out of the GT-4 and walked through space for 20 minutes, twice as long as Alexei Leonov did for the USSR.

In a letter from Major McDivitt to Hayden Hewes, dated April 22, 1965, Major McDivitt relates that he has seen a great number of peculiar lights and objects in the skies at night and even in the day. However, in almost every instance he was able to identify these objects. As for sighting an object that he for certain identify the shape and size of and not be able to explain, "I'm afraid I just haven't seen this sort of thing." But he added "However, I know that there have been many reports of UFO's, and I just cannot speak for the other people."

Major McDivitt sighted three objects while in space during the four day space flight.

McDivitt said the first object was a cylindrical object sighted over Hawaii. He took five frames of movie film of it, but officials said all it shows is a unidentifiable white dot with a tail of light and a fanlike glow. (Cover photo)

The GT-4 went into its 21st orbit at 6:55 p.m.

MsDivitt spotted the second object during the 20th orbit, as the Spaceship was whirling across the United States.

Gemini control asked McDivitt: "You still looking at that thing up there?"

McDivitt replied: "I've lost it. It had big arms sticking out of it, it looked like."

He said he had only seen it for about a minute, and had taken pictures with a movie camera although the position of the sun prevented any recognizable photographs.

There was some speculation it was the Pegasus 2 meteoroid detection satellite launched May 25, 1965.

Space agency officials ordered an immediate check by space tracking agencies to see what the objects were.

The Air Force tracking center at Colorado Springs, Colo., which keeps track of man-made objects in space is currently following 1,391 objects. Object No. 1,390 is GT-4 and object No. 1,391 is its burned out second stage rocket booster.

The Pegasus 2 was about 1,200 miles from the GT-4. Dr. Dwayne Catterson, flight medical expert, said he did not know if an object within 1,200 miles could be identified by the human eye. "But certainly if the contrast was great enough between sunlight on the object and background he could see an object there and he might well see reflection giving shape from the arm."

The third sighting came on the 38 orbit, officials said McDivitt described the object which was sighted over China as looking like "a bright star moving fast." He did not attempt to make pictures of it. The space flight took them 62 times around the globe, a total of 1,609,684 miles.

**UFO SIGHTED IN THE ANTARCTIC**

Argentine, British and Chilean military and scientific personnel in the antarctic watched what they called a curious celestial body for about 20 minutes on Monday, July 5, 1965.

Air Force headquarters released a copy of a report from the Air Force commander at Pedro Aguirre Cerda base in the antarctic saying that personnel there saw an object "glowing with a white light cruising in a north-east-southwest direction at a high rate of speed. The report said the object turned, flew a zigzag course and seemed at times to hang suspended in the air.

**STRANGE OBJECT SEEN IN WATER, PHOTOGRAPHED?**

A marine scientist planning to explore the gulf stream's depths says he detected and may have photographed a fast moving, unidentified object on the bottom of the warm-water stream that flows from the Florida Keys north to Newfoundland.

Capt. L. Jacques Nicholas, said Dr. Dmitri Rebikoff of Chicago conducts one-man submarine operations at 90-100 foot depths.

The pear-shaped object was sighted beneath the various schools of fish moving at approximately the same speed as the stream (3½ knots). At first from its size it was thought to be a shark, however its direction and speed were too constant. It may have been running on a robot pilot since no signals were received from it.

Efforts were made to take pictures. The film was not processed immediately.

IIOUFO's East Coast Headquarters located at St. Petersburg and under the direction of Mrs. Joan Whritenour is conducting an investigation into the sighting. There was some speculation that it may have been a Russian submarine, since the area is a frequent route of heavy-instrumented Russian fishing and hydrographic vessels.

# Interplanetary LLRV or Coleoptere

On April 24, 1964, at Socorro, New Mexico, Mr. Lonnie Zamora reported an object on the ground a mile south of the town at approximately 5:30 p.m. Lonnie Zamora said the object was white egg-shaped and supported on four girlerlike legs.

The Air Force sent investigators from Whight-Patterson AFB, Ohio, to Socorro. After a detailed investigation of the sighting, the following conclusion was released, "unknown". (Vol. 1, No. 1, May, 1965 IIR)

"It has been argued, and even categorically stated, that the Socorro object was not interplanetary, but very probably one of the experimental devices recently developed by the U.S. for the exploration of the moon and planets". (Taken from page 138 "Anatomy of a Phenomenon" by Jacques Vallee)

The Lunar Landing Research Vehicle (LLRV) will be used to study the piloting and operational procedures that will be involved during the initial portion of the lunar takeoff. The LLRV is slightly more than 10 feet high with three four aluminum truss legs spread 13.39 feet. A General Electric CF 700 turbofan engine is attached to a gimbal system at the apex of the legs. The complete LLRV weights about 3,600 lbs. (See NASA photo).

**French Investigate Phenomenon****A Flying Saucer Or A 'Beatle?'**

PARIS — A flying saucer landed last Thursday on the plateau of Valensole, in the southeastern department of the Basses-Alpes, put one passenger aground, and scooped him up and took off again undisturbed.

Anyway, that's what farmer Maurice Masse, 41, the sole witness says.

On the basis of Masse's description to the local gendarmes, French scientists said that the only known phenomenon with which his account coincides is the one which brings monsters up from the depths of Loch Ness and little men down from the skies about the season when news becomes scarce and temperatures high. It was a sultry oppressive day Thursday.

They also remarked that every similar report in the past—and there have been several circumstantial ones in France—had turned out later to be either a hoax or a hallucination.

However, the gendarmes took the story

seriously enough to make an official investigation and report on the traces left by the supposed landing. They described Masse as a sober, level-headed person, unlikely to deceive himself or others, and unlikely also to mist curious crowds to be tramping down the lavender in his field.

The general opinion among those in the region who don't know Masse is that he saw a military helicopter in the uncertain 5 a.m. light, since several of them are known to be maneuvering in the region. Masse apparently thought that's what it was, at first.

Then he saw it wasn't a helicopter. When reporters caught up with him Sunday, he corrected the gendarmes' earlier report of a military. The corroborated version is like this:

The flying object was the size of an automobile, shaped something like a rugby ball, supported on six crutch-like legs and a central pivot. A door slid aside, and a

human form appeared, about 3 feet high, fat, and dressed in what could have been a space suit, while at least one other person was discernible inside. (Masse was 60 or 70 yards from the object—far enough to account for error in judging the height of the picture he saw.)

As he approached, the figure on the ground scuttled back into the object, and it took off obliquely with a whistling sound.


Masse insisted that the object had no rotor and "looked like a spider." On the basis of this description, it is being suggested that what Masse saw was an improved version of the coleoptere, a vertical landing plane with which the French army is believed to have been experimenting in deep secrecy for several years. Coleoptere means beetle, and the craft, which lands on thin spidery-like legs, does look something like an insect.

There may be some discrepancy, since the gendarmes reported that the ground

where Masse said the object landed had been scooped out in a shallow depression with four cross-shaped prints and a central hole. The gendarmes said Masse had earlier reported four crutch-like legs instead of six.

But it may well have been the coleoptere. The army had been reported having difficulty with the craft, but if this is what Masse saw, success might seem to be closer.

This explanation seems strengthened by the military authorities' refusal to comment. If no military craft had made a landing in Masse's lavender field, it would seem reasonable that the army should say so. The fact that it refuses to talk is therefore being interpreted as evidence that Masse did see some secret military plane, which took off hurriedly at his approach because of the bush-bush nature of the craft.

## Mariner 4 Photographs to Shed Light on Mystery of Mars

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — One of the most exciting mysteries of space — does intelligent life exist, or has it ever existed on the planet Mars? — may be answered this week.

The U. S. spacecraft Mariner 4, now a record 131 million miles from earth and at least 100 million miles from Mars, is scheduled to fly past Mars about 4 p.m. (Oklahoma time) Wednesday mapping pictures 100 times better than any ever made with telescopes.

Scientists say these photographs, outlining details as small as 1.5 miles in diameter, could show whether the long dark lines on Mars really are canals and whether the seas — like canals at their intersections — are complexes of structures like our cities.

But the pictures most likely to show such details may not be released to the public for weeks or even months.

### FROM RANGER TO MARINER

The photo of the moon taken by Ranger IX is one of 26 on file at HIOUFO headquarters.

The Development of the U.S. Space Program will be carried in future issues of the IIR under "Terra Space Explorations". Today all is well on the Mariner 4 spacecraft scheduled to take 21 photos of the planet Mars on July 14th. We considered delaying the July issue so they could be included, but decided to wait and include them in the September issue if all goes well.

There is always the chance, of course, that mounting pressure may force earlier release of pictures. Especially if word should leak out that the photographs, indicated as they may be contain evidence of tool-using beings.

Dr. Robert Leighton, California Institute of Technology physicist and chief of the team chosen to study the photographs, says the first one or two may show only the "limb" or edge of the planet, at the start of a 4,000-mile-long sweep from north to south.

These would be taken from a height of about 7,000 miles, at an angle.

The left photographs, snapped 1,000 miles closer to the surface with the camera pointing nearly straight down, would be withheld from immediate publication.

If the first-released pictures are as meager as Leighton expects, about all that the world will glean immediately from the 1900 million mariner program will be some scientific tidbits about the density of Mars' atmosphere and the intensity of radiation trapped in its magnetic field, if the planet has one.

That radiation, incidentally, may become a hazard in the final hours of Mariner 4's approach to Mars.

Mars' atmospheric density — a key clue in determining whether life could exist — will be measured by calculating changes in radio-signal strength as Mariner 4 swings behind the planet. The signal, aimed at earth, will have to go through the Martian atmosphere. The denser the atmosphere, the weaker the signal would be.

Mariner 4 will record its pictures on tape and replay them slowly after it emerges from behind Mars.

All the pictures will be taken within 20 minutes, but it will take 8 1/2 hours for each one to be transmitted. They will come in so slowly that only pieces of pictures will be received at each of three tracking stations around the earth.

First piece of the first picture will be received at a station in Johannesburg, South Africa. As the Goldstone, Calif., station comes into view of Mars, it will receive most of the remainder. The final piece of the first picture may be received at another station near Woomera, Australia.

After all the pieces are received here from around the world, they must be patched together and run through a device which filters static out of the signals. This could take

hours.

It will take 12 minutes for a radio signal to travel from Mariner 4 to earth Wednesday, and another 12 minutes for a signal from earth to get back to the spacecraft.

If something were to go wrong during the fly-by, it would take at least 24 minutes for earth scientists to receive warning and transmit corrective commands — and that's all the time Mariner 4 has to take pictures.

Anticipating this possibility, scientists have decided to try to take over control early from the automatic timer now set to start the camera when the spacecraft is 8,000 miles above the Martian surface. By direct command, they will start the camera a few seconds later and this means the camera will photograph a different set of targets from a lower altitude, starting at a height of about 7,000 miles.

The spacecraft will be in the dark at its closest approach, about 5,000 miles. Best photographs should come about midway during the run, possibly over more cluttered-up with camera pointing straight down from 4,000 miles and covering an area 100 miles square.

# Two - UFOs Photographed

"The exact day the photo was taken is not remembered. It was, though, sometime during the first week of September, 1964.

We then lived at Black Hills Army Depot, Igloo, South Dakota. It was a very cloudy day with high winds, about 11 o'clock in the morning. My mother was looking out of the window, when she sighted two objects. From the position, of the objects above the trees, I would say they were about 15 degrees above the horizon. She then photographed the objects with a Brownie Hawkeye 620 camera. It was very stormy out, so she did not see the objects and does not know what direction they were traveling."
