#### The Story Behind The Cover

Early in June, 1965 an increase in UFO sightings occurred first in Europe and then in the United States. The sighting of strange objects increased with each day until the night of Sunday, August 1st, 1965 when several thousand unidentified flying objects were sighted over the central part of the United States.

Radio and television programs were interrupted as persons dashed outside to get a glimpse of the strange objects. Squadrons of eighteen disks were sighted over Brazil's Parana state and Tulsa, Oklahoma. Ten UFO's were sighted over Lake Superior flying in a V-formation at 9,000 mph. Four UFO's were sighted over Oklahoma City and Cape Kennedy flying in a diamond formation, 6,000 mph. Their origin was unknown.

The UFO's appeared to be bright lights, but when observed through telescopes had a large dome on top and were almost flat on bottom. They were estimated to be some 40-60 feet across and flying at altitudes of 10,000 to 22,000 ft. in close and loose formations. They flashed red, green, blue and white lights.

They were observed by thousands of persons over a nine state area. Almost every Oklahoma State Highway Patrol trooper on duty sighted one or more. For 7½ hours the reports came in from every city in the State of Oklahoma. No one panicked or drew premature conclusions. The UFO's had not been proven to be of extra-terrestrial origin, but it was apparent they were not earth craft.

The Air Force released a report completely discrediting the flying saucers. The objects that had been observed were "stars." During the next weeks several thousand more observations were made. There was no justification that the objects were hostile. Several landed in and around Oklahoma City.

Something out of a science fiction movie No, I was notified of the "invasion" by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol an hour after it started. There was no question that the objects were real. The only questions were, what are they, where are they from and why are they here?

The first wave of UFO's was detected and photographed by Astronaut James McDivitt during the GT-4 space flight. See story and photo page 13 and 14 of the July issue I.I.R.

1. An unidentified flying object was reported on June 18, 1965 over the Antarctic.

2. June 23, 1965, Capt. H. W. Haeger of the CAP sighted an object which faded out and reappeared over Oklahoma City. The UFO was white and traveling in a north south direction.


3. June 29, 1965. UFO landed in Valensole, France and was observed by Mr. Maurice Masse. As Masse approached the craft two "beings" were also sighted. The UFO was supported on girderlike legs. The ground was packed hard as concrete when the UFO took off. Full story in the July IIR.

4. July 3, 1965, Antarctic. Argentine, British and Chilean military and scientific personnel observed a UFO for approximately 20 minutes. The UFO was reported "glowing with a white light cruising in a northeast-southwest direction at a high rate of speed." The UFO flew a zigzag course and seemed at times to hang suspended in the air. British personnel reported the UFO was green.

5. July 3, 1965, Buenos Aires, Two multi-colored UFO's were photographed. Full story with photograph on page 15.

6. July 5, 1965, Fort Pierce, Fla. Undersea UFO was photographed by Dr. Dmitri Rebikoff. The pear-shaped UFO was sighted beneath several schools of fish. Full story in the July IIR.

7. July 9, 1965, Azores. Airport officials told of a mysterious UFO

that stopped all electro-magnetic watches at the Santa Maria airport when it flew slowly over. Full story page 15.

8. July 10, 1965. Portugal fisherman sighted a UFO that was shaped "like a deep dish turned upside down." Manuel Fernandes and his wife Laura sighted a cylindrical shaped object on July 11, 1965.

9. July 10, 1965, Buenos Aires. A policeman and his family saw a hovering blue-colored UFO hover in the sky before shooting off with a trail of flames.

10. July 11, 1965. Texas. A bright UFO was sighted over a Texas weather station. It hovered for several minutes and flew off.

11. July 11, 1965. Two UFO's were sighted over Oklahoma City at approximately 4 a.m. by an Oklahoma City teen-ager who last November observed and recovered the famous Oklahoma City meteorite.

12. July 12, 1965. For the second night in a row UFO's are sighted over Oklahoma City. Three objects were sighted about 1 a.m. by an Oklahoma City mother and her son.

13. July 15, 1965, Canberra, Australia. UFO sighted over airport

14. July 17, 1965, Flagstaff, Arizona. Mr. Allen Davis of Miami, Florida, sighted a bright "blue around the outside, yellow in the inside" UFO near Flagstaff. State Highway Patrolman Harvey R. Cassidy also reported the UFO.

15. July 17, 1965, Weymouth Naval Air Station reported several residents spotted two round, white discs flying together at low altitudes. The discs hovered over the base and then flew off toward Randolph.

16. July 17, 1965, persons in Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Maryland sighted unidentified flying objects similar to the sightings earlier over the Azores and Portugal.

17. July 19, 1965. Buenos Aires. A four armed object landed for two minutes in broad daylight on a beach just across the River Plats in Uruguay. The UFO shot sky-


wards in a blinding flash after a tug hooted a siren. One of several who claim to have seen the UFO said it had a circular center with flattened, oval extensions on either side. The landing occurred on Saturday, July 17, 1965.

18. July 19, 1965, Higham, Mass. A four-armed luminous object was sighted by five persons for nearly an hour. "It hovered low over the western horizon and seemed to have four arms of three lights each radiating from it. The object remained stationary for about 45 minutes.

19. July 19, 1965. A large red UFO was sighted over the Oklahoma State Capital. It was observed from the Lake View Tower apartments, remained stationary for several minutes and flew off in a NE direction.

20. July 20, 1965, Boston. A woman pilot reported sighting an unidentified flying object at 10:30 p.m. She said the UFO was large,

21. July 20, 1965, Elk City, Oklahoma. A UFO was observed at 9:00 p.m. over Elk City. "It gave the appearance of being a satellite looking like a fast moving star but its irregular movements dispelled this notion. It appeared to speed up and slow down, it made minor deviations from its southeastern course. Viewed through binoculars it still looked like a fast moving star."

22. July 21, 1965. Three persons enroute to Oklahoma City observed a very bright object traveling in a north direction. The UFO stopped hovering and flew to the south. The UFO was white, flashed a red light, moved up and down and flew off in a southerly direction. It appeared as a round object.

24. July 22, 1965. Framingham, Mass. About 20 residents reported a round silver-white UFO. The UFO traveled in a south to north direction and appeared to hover for about 20 minutes, then danced from side to side.

25. July 22, 1965. Pittsburgh, Penn. A flashing UFO which appeared as a silver circle with an orange tail was sighted over a three county area. It was also reported by many as being triangled shaped.

26. July 22, 1965, New Hampshire residents reported several UFO's "brighter than a star". The UFO's were described as red, and white lighted globes and brightly colored.

27. July 22, 1965. A bright light which faded out was reported to Tinker AFB at 12:15 a.m.

28. July 23, 1965, Altus, Oklahoma. An AF officer reported an UFO between 10:30 and 11:15 p.m. The UFO appeared as a bright light which faded out.

29. July 27 and 28, St. Petersburg, Florida. Many residents for two nights reported bright, blinking lights that hover and fade out. Moved fast and moving North to South.

30. July 29, 1965. A very bright UFO was sighted West of Oklahoma City by an employ of Tinker AFB about 7:35 p.m. The UFO was observed for two hours. It flashed lights and changed its position.

31. July 31, 1965, Sydney, Australia. A flying saucer was sighted hovering over a farmyard. The UFO had three rods protruding, one from the top and two from the bottom. It emitted two beams of light. The UFO remained stationary for about 15 minutes before moving off. The UFO was also sighted the day before but not reported. It was reported at Goonumbla, New South Wales.



34. July 31, 1965. At approximately 8:00 p.m. enroute to Oklahoma City several persons observed a bright light traveling north, toward Oklahoma City. The UFO was observed for about two minutes. During this time it flashed a red light several times.



### Wynnewood, Oklahoma July 31, 1965

At 1:05 a.m. on the morning of Saturday, July 31st the UFO's came back to Oklahoma. Wynnewood, Oklahoma police officer, Lewis Sikes, 29, reported an unidentified flying object approximately 30-35° NE of Wynnewood. Officer Sikes did not realize that the UFO was also being watched simultaneously by radar from Tinker AFB, Oklahoma City and Carswell AFB, Fort Worth, Texas. Officer Sikes observed the UFO with his wife for approximately 10 minutes in front of their home, when Officer Sikes drove across town and observed the UFO for another three minutes. His wife, Gail-Jean continued to watch the UFO until 2:30 a.m.

An "intelligent control" was indicated during the first 10 minutes of observation when the object abruptly gained 1000-1500 ft. in altitude (estimated by Sikes to be 10,000 ft., confirmed by radar at 8,000 ft.) The UFO remained stationary for several minutes and abruptly loss approximately 1500-

2000 ft. The UFO then moved to the west for approximately 1000-1500 ft. and returned to the original location, at which time it moved to the east for approximately 100-1500 ft. then returned to its original position.

The night sky was clear and many stars were visible. The UFO appeared to be three times as bright as the evening star and was estimated by Sikes to be five miles NE of Wynnewood. The UFO appeared as a "light" source. The UFO itself was white with a blue-green center, with a red rotating light circling the center.

At approximately 1.15 Officer Sikes drove across town and once again observed the UFO. His wife stated that while he was gone the UFO seemed to change colors and fade out. The UFO then reappeared and she watch it until she went in. Both Tinker AFB and Carswell AFB, tracked the object to a point 15 miles southwest of Tinker when it disappeared. A few minutes later, it was tracked to a location 29 miles south of Tinker when it was lost again. A Brainiff airliner in the vicinity of Wynnewood at 5,000 ft. was notified but the airline pilot said no visual contact with the UFO was made. Officer Sikes' mother, Mrs. Robert Sikes, also watched the UFO and reported that it faded out was gone.

I first learned of the Wynnewood sighting at 9:05 a.m. when Mr. Mike Buchanan of KWTW, Oklahoma City, called to see what I



## Bright Objects in Sky Set Phones, Nerves Jingling

Unidentified flying objects — many in brilliant technicolor and several flying in diamond-shaped formation — were reported sighted in Oklahoma skies Sunday night from Cushing to Muskogee and Tulsa to Chickasha.

Reports from police, highway patrol and newspaper photographers jingling. The alarm of colors was reminiscent of the Ocean View Navy invasion parade of Oct. 20, 1958.

The highway patrol said some of the sightings were confirmed by Tinker Air Force Base radar. A Tinker spokesman, however, said he could neither confirm nor deny the radar logs.

The objects were seen in diamond-shaped formations at Chickasha, Shawnee, Cushing and Chandler.

Three different Shawnee police cars watched the diamond formation for 20 or 40 minutes after 8 p.m. They were described as moving in a northerly direction and changing colors from red to white to blue-green. The officers said they moved from side to side at times.

Cushing police also reported the objects changed color and were in a formation of four. They were first spotted about 9:05 p.m.

First Cushing sighting was of two objects which moved out of sight to the south. As many as six were visible in Cushing at one time, with four seeming to be in formation.

Cushing officers reported the UFOs were red, blue and white.

In Chickasha, the first reported sighting came from

radio station KWOC. Jim Cline, police dispatcher, said C. V. Marshall, radio technician, reported the sighting.

He described the object as kite-shaped with a red revolving light on top. Cline said he moved from side to side at times.


He said the sighting was reported at from 11,000 to 20,000 feet and moving from west to east.

Brice said he could not confirm or deny the sighting.

"People are just excited to know what they are and we can't tell them," Brice said. "There has not been anything like this in Oklahoma for a long time."

knew about it. Within an hour my wife, Karon, DeWayne Critchfield, our photographer and Public Relations man were on our way. I was permitted to interview Officer Sikes for two hours. We returned to Oklahoma City and started putting the story on paper. Sunday afternoon with the help of W. F. Riefer, our Senior Director, we interviewed Officer Sikes again. Upon returning to Oklahoma City a full report was typed out.

At 9:00 a.m. the telephone rang and Mike Buchanan said that the Oklahoma Highway Patrol tower located near Edmond, Oklahoma had been receiving UFO reports since 8:08 p.m. So far they had received in the neighborhood of 25-30 reports. The UFO's were sighted from Purcell north thru Norman to Chandler and back south through Meeker and Shawnee. Shawnee reported that the UFO's were flying in a diamond type formation. Cushing reported four of the UFO's. Tinker AFB, stated they had four UFO's on radar at 22,000 ft. which coincided with visual sightings. The UFO's were all mult-colored. They hovered for as much as two hours, faded out or shot off.



As the night continued so did the UFO reports. Chickasha, Guyton, Moore, Tulsa, Purcell, Chandler, Gage, Del City, Midwest City, Edmond, El Reno and Oklahoma City. Then the reports came in from Texas, Pecos, Monahans, Odessa, Midland, Fort Worth, Canyon and Dalhart. New Mexico also reported UFO's over Hobbs, Carlsbad and Artesia. The UFO reports that came in from Kans. Oxford, Belle Plaine, Winfield, Caldwell, Mulvane, Liberal and Wichita also reported the UFO's as egg-or turtle shaped flying in formations, making sharp maneuvers and changing colors. By midnight UPI from Dallas reported that several thousand UFO's had been sighted over Texas and Oklahoma. I was at the all night. Reports came in faster than they could be logged. Ft. Sill, Harrah, Yukon, Pauls Valley, Strat-Oklahoma Highway Patrol Towerford, Lindsay, Pawnee, Ardmore, McAlester, Wewoka, Durant, Vinita, Miami, Sapulpa, Coalgate and Eufaula. Also all sightings were made by State Highway Patrol Units and police officers.

The Air Force in its announcement in Washington said initial study of the sightings were "astronomical in nature." "The objects observed may have been the planet Jupiter or stars Rigel, Capella, Betelgeuse or Aldebaran which were visible," the Air Force statement continued. "At the time of the reported sightings, the azimuth and elevation of the reported sightings supports this preliminary conclusion." It was also pointed out that the temperature,

distribution and variant wind speeds were favorable to "scintillation." "Scintillation" is a natural phenomenon which causes stars to appear to twinkle or distant objects to appear to dance when seen through layers of the atmosphere. It was also a possibility that the observers were seeing the Aquaiad, commonly called the Delta Meteor shower which is occurring from July 26 to August 6.

Dale Johnson, IIOUFO Scientific Panel member and Associate Director of the Kirkpatrick Planetarium located in Oklahoma City said it is a "mystery where the Air Force get its information." Robert Risser of the Oklahoma Science and Arts Foundation, Kirkpatrick Planetarium said observers certainly did not see the planets and stars the Air Force claim. "That is as far from the truth as you can get," Risser said. "Some one has made a mistake. These stars and planets are on the opposite side of the earth from Oklahoma at this time of the year.

About 9:30 p.m. one of the closest observations was made by a Air Force weather expert through a 40 power spotting scope when it flew over Norman, Oklahoma. "The thing was moving fast and was observed for less than five minutes. It was estimated to be 20,000 ft. up and pitched at a 45° angle. It was surrounded by a bluish halo, but the saucer shape was easy to distinguish. There were two sets of revolving, pulsating lights on its perimeter. The saucer was illuminated by the red lights. The lights were pulsating, dim to bright and then bright to dim.

## Flying Objects Zooming Over State

A rash of unidentified flying objects, confirmed at one point by officials at Tinker Air Force Base, "covered" Oklahoma Sunday night.

The first report, at 8:08 a.m., led to a series of sightings that ranged from Purcell to Tulsa to Guyton. Sightings came less than 10 hours after a similar report from a police officer at Wynnewood. That object,

emitting red, white and blue light, was tracked on two radar screens early Saturday before it disappeared and then reappeared 29 miles south of Tulsa.

Sunday's sightings were first confirmed by the base security office, then officials refused to confirm or deny radar tracks.

One sighting, by Sherry Rutledge, 18, 322 SE 19, and Marybeth Tucker, 16,



2504 SW 54 Place, turned out to be a parachute flare which police confiscated.

The radar approach control tower at Tinker, using four radar scopes with a range of 40 miles, reported no contacts during the height of the local sightings.

City police dispatcher Lt. Homer Brice said "if we had one call, one had 100."

Most of the first reports were from law enforcement officers, especially in the Shawnee area.

The initial military radar contacted was of four objects flying at 22,000 feet. Later the Air Force said only that it would investigate the matter.

First report was of a "bright, shiny stationary object hanging in the western sky" between Norman and Purcell. Four highway patrolmen at Shawnee, less

than 30 miles from Tinker, watched four objects traveling in a diamond formation. These same patrolmen, in different areas near Shawnee, later reported the objects gone.

But new sightings in that area were not long in coming, again including the OHP units.

Patrol dispatcher Jim West said, "If there were just a bunch of people, I could say it was a crank. But when this many officers see something, then there's something there—I don't know what. It could be a string of balloons — but there's something there."

West also had reports from patrol cars in other parts of the state.

Most of the reports included the objects were generally traveling toward the

Shawnee-Chandler area. At one time four objects were reported stationary over Shawnee by the patrolman, with a "straggler" heading into the area from Tecumseh.

City dispatcher Brice said most of the local calls came from persons in the south and east of the city, with the reported objects generally traveling toward the

## Air Intelligence Staffs Plagued by 'Objects' for 20 Years

(Editor's Note: John Cassin Curvey, who prepared the following report, has an extensive background in aviation and military intelligence affairs going back to World War II.)

By John Cassin Curvey

The recent rash of reports on unidentified flying objects (UFO's) revives a problem which has plagued air intelligence staffs for nearly two decades.

During World War II, such reports came often from Sweden, or from underground sources near the Baltic line. Correlated with reconnaissance photos and other intelligence, they gave us early data on test flights of the V-1 and V-2 weapons, and on certain other experimental devices which did not get into production for the Nazi war machine.

After the war, reports of "flying saucers" over

Scandinavia were at first regarded as evidence that the Russians had taken over the Peenemunde experiments and were developing certain Nazi projects for their own use. Then there came the "flying saucer" reports and from Stockholm the locals shifted to Dayton, Fort Monmouth, El Paso, and Oak Ridge. Heretofore officials admitted these sensitive areas were too important to permit any possible reconnaissance to go undetected.

In the air intelligence areas were ordered to collect, correlate, and analyze the reports. One of the first officers added with this awesome chore was Maj. Gen. Robert H. Smith, USAF, who has just completed a tour of duty as director of intelligence of SAC and reports to the Pentagon this month for duty as director of plans, USAF. He was then a lieutenant colonel; his progress has not been reached by those seeking to explain the relatively small number of cases in which the object is

really unidentifiable. In the majority of cases, there are explanations, and they do not involve visitors from another planet, or even another continent. If you have seen what you think was a UFO, you are not likely to accept any of these explanations. I find, if I like most people, you see only what is necessary there when you look upward, these explanations may help.

She was picked up by ambulance and taken to an Oklahoma City, hospital. She had received third degree burns over 60½ of her body and her clothes had not been burned. I conducted a personal investigation with Major C. W. Durtrean, of the Oklahoma Civil Defense and located three witnesses to the pick up, but all Oklahoma City hospitals state that no admittance was made. I wonder who gave the "clam up" orders?

An Oklahoma Civil Defense officer sighted a UFO between 10:30 until 11:00 p.m. on Monday evening, August 2 while driving from Oklahoma City on Interstate 35 enroute to Norman. The object was NE of Norman. In a letter dated August 4, 1965 to IIOUFO headquarters "The craft was in the or over, the NE area of Norman. There was a quarter plus moon and the comparative size of the craft was almost as big as the moon would have been were it full. I saw four or six lights that were blinking regularly in rhythm; there was never any variance in the rhythm. I did not bother to count the lights because I was so startled, but half of them were red and half of them were either blue,


green, or blue-green; the colors were alternated and were arranged in a circle that in my view looked oval-shaped. The red lights blinked simultaneously, and then the other colored lights would blink simultaneously. All this time the lights were traveling in a counter-clockwise motion on the craft.

The astounding thing to me was that the lights traveled to a point east of Moore, or NE of Norman. Then it emitted a short brilliant white or yellowish flash and suddenly changed its direction and began to travel toward the southwest towards Norman. When it reached a point southwest of Norman it again emitted that white or yellowish flash and once again began traveling toward the NE of Norman. I will further say that this object was too clear, too rhythmical and too complex to be an illusion or a scintillation" (All information on file IIOUFO headquarters.)

The following information was received from the Chief of Police, Sentinel, Oklahoma. "At approximately 1:15 a.m. this date (August 2nd) the officer on duty, called by public service to report that several police units around the area was observing UFO's. At approximately 1:20 a.m. I was picked up and went west of town 1¼ miles, turned off our lights and started observing. From reports from the Granite police unit, we got a bearing on the approximately location of the object, and at 1:30 a.m. observed it ourself. When we first observed the UFO, it was moving in a northeasterly direction at a rapid speed, appearing to change colors of amber, white and a pale

# UFO Facts Withheld, Group Claims

Hayden C. Hewes, a young leader of a 5,000-member citizens' organization, charged here today that the Air Force is "suppressing some information" about unidentified flying objects (UFO).

"If it is a secret government project," Hewes, 22-year-old Oklahoma City resident said, "this would explain their hohum attitude."

"But it would not explain the hundreds of sightings before 1947 and clear back to Biblical times," he said.

"OUR ORGANIZATION believes there is something real in UFO reports. Now what we are doing is trying to find out where they come from and what they are," he said.

Hewes, in Kansas to speak to UFO groups in Topeka tonight and in Wichita Saturday night, is convinced some of the objects sighted are from somewhere in space—probably another planet in perhaps another galaxy.

"I believe they are appearing

here for surveillance," Hewes contended. "There have been too many confirmed reports from reliable sources over the years," Hewes said, "to believe some of the objects are anything but alien in nature."

HEWES is director of Interplanetary Intelligence of Unidentified Flying Objects, a research, investigation and analysis organization with headquarters in Oklahoma City. He said there are 5,000 members with groups in 42 states and 28 foreign countries.

He said: "We are backed by a scientific panel of known scientists."

He named some of the panel as Maj. C. W. Dutreau, director Civil Defense, Oklahoma City; W. M. Green, astrogeologist, Huntsville, Ala.; D. Johnson, assistant director, Kirkpatrick Planetarium, Oklahoma City, and Prof. N. N. Kahanowski, geologist and mining engineer, North Dakota, among others.

Hewes said his activities with the organization are on a part-time basis. He is regularly employed with the TG&Y variety store chain.

TO BACK his contentions, Hewes said the Air Force has investigated 9,000 UFO reports of which 683 have not been identified as phenomena. He said the Air Force has a special division at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, to investigate UFO reports.

blue. The object stopped in the NE, between 60-85° angle from us. Could not tell the distance, but would say between 50-150 miles. We observed the UFO for 30 minutes. At about this time (2 a.m.) the Granite unit reported another object traveling in a northerly direction, being red in color and shooting red sparks from it. We went and tried to observe the object, but could not locate it."

Unidentified "blips" on the radar screen at the Wichita Weather Bureau confirmed the presence of unidentified flying objects around Wichita. (photo page 11)

Several attempts were made to photograph the UFO's but almost all failed. One photo was obtained by Junction City, Kansas photographer George Goodson who captured 8 ovals. The objects were not visible when the photo was taken. I was in Topeka, Junction City and Wichita during the weekend of August 3 and 7 and personally investigated the Junction City photo as well as several reports around Topeka and Wichita.

Widespread reports of unidentified flying objects over the world including several radar contacts stirred interest at the Daily Union office when staff photographer George Goodson photographed eight UFO's.

The photo was taken at 4:10 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, (August 1st) at the municipal airport. The photo was snapped to show the parachute descent of a member of the Junction City Sky Divers club, but after development of the negative on August 2nd, disclosed eight disks in the sky at the left center. At first they were thought to be either a flaw in the film, or possibly water or developer solution spots on the film. Then it was noticed that the parachute shroud lines crossed over the disks; they would have been obliterated if the negative had been spotted by solution. Goodson took the photo from the ground, facing northwest and said he had not seen nothing in the sky other than the 'chutist and the clouds.

IIOUFO Director Hayden Hewes interviewed Mr. Goodson on Saturday, August 7, 1956 while he was in Junction City.

Wichita, Kansas Weather Bureau radarscope showed unidentified flying objects Sunday night (August 1st) See circle blip. Other white dots show locations of earlier sightings as the objects moved across the scope.

Mr. John Shockley, Wichita weatherman, tracked "them" at different times betimes 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. "mostly on the south side of the city." The UFO's were about the size of a Cessna on the screen and were flying at altitudes of 6,000 to 9,000 ft. The Weather Bureau radar screen covers about all of the state of Kansas.



On July 23, 1965 at 3:30 p.m. the following photographs was taken by IIOUFO State Director August Powell while taking scenery pictures of the San Francisco peaks. The dark cylindrical-shaped UFO was moving West to East about 15° above the Southern horizon. Three photographs were obtained but only two came out. The UFO appeared to be 1/4 of an inch long at arms length. It was moving slower than jet speed and made no noise.

Note the 45° angle of the two UFO's. It was also described by many persons in Oklahoma.

## UFO'S PHOTOGRAPHED OVER BUENOS AIRES



**BUENOS AIRES (UPI)** — An unidentified flying object was spotted Saturday over the Rio Plata, the 28-mile wide river that divides Argentina and Uruguay.

Six persons walking on a deserted beach near Colonia,

Uruguay, spotted the object at 8 p.m. Houston time. The spotting of the object from Uruguay followed by 15 hours sightings of several unidentified flying objects over Buenos Aires, the Argentine capital situated across the river from Colonia.


Members of the staff at the Santa Maria Airport in the Azores, said that for 45 minutes Friday they observed an unidentified object of an altitude of 33,000 feet. The deputy airport manager was among those reported seeing it.

Airport authorities said electro-magnetic clocks stopped for 10 minutes while the cylindrical white object was overhead. A plane was sent up to observe the object, but it reported no success.

Several persons reported spotting unidentified flying objects over Buenos Aires shortly after sunset Friday. They described the objects, some of which were photographed, as cigar shaped and emitting colors ranging from reddish greens to blues. All said the intensity of the light the objects emitted was very bright.

During the period that the flying saucers were seen over Buenos Aires, the broadcasting of one of the city's television channels was interrupted because of atmospheric interference.

The government observatory of San Miguel reported, however, that it had not recorded any atmospheric disturbances at that time.

**COCOA, Florida:** Four city policemen reported observing mysterious colored objects over the city about 15 miles from Cape Kennedy, on Tuesday night August 3rd and Wednesday night moving in a diamond formation. Lt. James C. Wade and Lt. Gene Powers reported that one of the UFO's was yellow or orange in color, appeared to hover over the city police station for several minutes and then move away.

**BRAZIL:** Also on Tuesday night August 3rd, observers in Curitiba, Brazil reported seeing a squadron of 18 flying saucers flying over northern Brazil's Parana State. (Still in the straight line, Brazil is SE of Cape Kennedy.)

**MICHIGAN:** Personnel at the Air Force radar base in the Keweenaw Peninsula reported "Solid radar contact" with seven to ten unidentified flying objects moving in a V formation over Lake Superior on Wednesday, August 4, 1965. The UFO's were moving out of the southwest at 9,000 miles an hour and were 5,200 to 17,000 feet high. Seven other UFO's were spotted over Duluth and jet interceptors gave chase, but were easily out-distanced.

**TULSA, Oklahoma:** A formation of "17 or better" unidentified flying objects were observed by a group of Tulsa church goers on Sunday about 12:30 p.m. "They were moving fast, then they stopped just like they were watching us and then they started moving again, very slowly." "It's odd, they would go a distance, then stop, the color would change slowly from white to green to red," then they went on." IIOUFO Tulsa Office investigated.

# UFO Creating Signal Static For Mariner?

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — A mysterious glowing object — hovering near Canberra airport while the U. S. Mariner space probe was taking pictures of Mars — has baffled experts in Canberra.

Air traffic control officers and their expert aircraft observers said they spotted the object Thursday.

Six members of the traffic control tower crew said it hung suspended at about 5,000 feet for 40 minutes. When the sun glinted off it, it became clearly visible, they said. It disappeared when an air force plane was sent out to identify it.

Experts are now wondering if it was coincidence that the object was sighted shortly before nearby Tidnibilla tracking station was scheduled to pick up Mariner signals. The station had unusual difficulty in locking on to Mariner at the time.

The sighting also came at Goldstone tracking station received irregularities in messages while Mariner was photographing Mars.

This was the fifth reported sighting of a mysterious object recently.

## Flying Saucer Crew Member Leaves Card

SAN PABLO, Brazil (The Press) — Juan de Silve was spreading Saturday evening to small fishing in the river near his home when he saw the flying saucer.

Juan, described as a simple house worker in the national railroad car factory at Cruzeiro, said that on his last fishing he was aware he was not alone.

The 40-year-old spokesman standing there introduced himself and instructed Juan to tell the world his story. As proof of his visit he handed Juan a visiting card, a piece of "unearthly" metal and then vanished.

The car factory is studying the "unearthly" metal.

# UFO's Sighted

On September 6, 1956, the red planet Mars made its closest approach to the Earth since 1924. Not until August, 1971 will it again be so close.

Mars is probably regarded as the most unsolved riddle in the annals of historical astronomy. "Is there life on Mars?" If so what is it like?"

Earth-Mars oppositions occur about every two years and two months apart, only once in 15 years does an especially favorable approach come about.

During the opposition of 1877 Giovanni V. Schiaparelli focused his 8.75-inch reflecting telescope on the planet and saw several long and narrow lines, which he called canals. By the time of his death in 1910, Schiaparelli had recored a total of 113 canals.

These canals were thought to be artificial waterways built to irrigate the dry planet by the work of intelligent beings.

Unquestionably the foremost observer of the continually changing surface of Mars was Percival Lowell. In 1894, Professor Lowell built the Lowell Observatory at Flagstaff, Arizona. During the opposition of 1877, Asaph Hall, of the Washington Naval Observatory, announced the discovery of two satellites, which were named Phobos, and Deimos. Several Russian scientists believe that they are artificial.

Since mans history on the planet Earth he has looked up into the heavens and sighted stranged objects. These unidentified flying objects (UFO's) are called and known as "flying Saucers" the world over. What are they and where do they come from? No one knows. Are they alien vehicles under intelligent control? Time will solve the UFO mystery and explain the sightings made by many scientist.

On the night of December 7, 1900, Professor Lowell sighted a shaft of light project outwards from the disk of Mars. The brilliant

beam appeared to be hundreds of miles in length and was observed for seventy minutes. Professor Lowell believed they could have been signals, while the eminent Professor W. B. Pickering (now Director Jet Propulsion Lab., Pasadena, California).

On May 20th, 1903, a "dust-cloud-like" object was observed near the terminator of Mars by Lowell, which remained visible for several days.

Martian clouds are generally white and dissipate rapidly, but in December 1911 a "yellow cloud" appeared south-south-east Syrtis Major. It changed in shape and size.

From October 10-12, 1924, clouds appeared to project from the Martian surface and covered the large region known as Hellas.

On June 4, 1937, Japanese astronomer, Sizuo Mayeda observed an "intense flare spot" near Sithonius Lacus on Mars. Meyeda observed this phenomenon for a full five minutes at 500 magnifications through his 8-inch reflecting telescope.


The American Philosophical Society met in April, 1938 and Dr. V. M. Slipher, told the gathering that he had found "evidence of changes in the canal system of Mars."

On December 9, 1949, Tsuneo Saheki sighted a luminous yellow cloud, 700 miles in diameter and 40 miles above the planet's surface. It was followed by a "brilliant glow" lasting several minutes. Saheki's next sighting came on December 8, 1951. This time he saw "a sharp, glaring spot suddenly appear on Tithonius Lacus." A third sighting occured in July, 1954 when the Mars observer saw Edom Promontorium suddenly brighten for about five seconds.

A one second "flash of white light" was sighted on the eastern edge of the Martian disc on August 25, 1956.

On August 30, Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper reported that a "dust cloud" invisible the night before, took a form 1000 miles in length and 30 miles wide. The following day, the cloud elongated to a length of 3000 miles and had a width of 250 miles in the strange shape of the letter "W."

If Mars is inhabited are the 700 canals used to irrigate a dying planet? Were the martians forced to construct these canals to retard the water-vaporation process and consequently to preserve their civilization.


A large unidentified flying object was photographed near Sherman, Texas. The UFO appeared as a large light.

## THE ALIENS?

Early in the Spring of 1949

Almost 16 years ago an unidentified flying object landed on a ranch near Aztec Mexico. The thirty-six foot saucer one member of the two man crew was found lying dead across the sill of the door which he had apparently opened on landing. Death seemed to have been caused by the "Bends" that affliction which has agonized deep-sea divers and upper stratosphere flyers in the past when they moved suddenly from one air pressure area to a greatly different one. The other spaceman was dead by the ships' instrument panel.

Within three hours scientists from Denver were on the scene and shortly transported, marked as "amunition" on army trucks to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.

What did the scientists find out? The saucer was propelled by electromagnetic power and traveled at the speed of light, 186,000 miles per second.

## Man Says He Saw 'Flying Saucer'

A trained Air Force weather observer using high-powered binoculars and a 40-power spotting scope, saw over Norman Sunday a light object he described as a "flying saucer."

Despite an official statement by the Secretary of the Air Force Office of Information, the veteran weather officer backed up his contention with a thorough physical description of the UFO—the only one received from hundreds of Oklahomans who made similar sightings from Shawnee to the greater Oklahoma City area.

The observer, who preferred to remain anonymous due to the Air Force position, said he spotted the UFO

about 9:30 p.m. Sunday, approaching from the northeast and "arcing" in a direct line to the southwest. He alerted a neighbor (senior Tinker Air Force Base employee), who provided the field glasses and telescope.

"The thing was moving quite rapidly. We observed it a little less than five minutes before it went out of sight. It was about 22,000 feet up, pitched at about a 45-degree angle."


"It was shaped like a flying saucer, and through the 10-power binoculars took on the appearance of being quite large. There were two sets of revolving, pulsating lights on its perimeter. They were surrounded by a bluish halo, but were bright enough so the saucer shape was easy to distinguish," he said.

To guard against the possibility of letting their imaginations run away, they set up the 40-power telescope and "took a fix" on several planets and stars.

"The planets and stars when magnified should change color and appear to be bouncing a little. But they certainly were not moving—not like that thing. As a matter of fact, the saucer passed several stars we had taken a good reading on."

"There also was a jet aircraft in the area flying about the same altitude—either a KC135 or Boeing 707. It was emitting a flickering white light. There was no comparison between it and the UFO."

"The saucer was illuminated by its red lights, much like a floodlight on the Wash-

## Air Force Doesn't Believe in Flying Saucers

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) — The air force doesn't believe in flying saucers — even Oklahoma ones.

That's not just a snap conclusion, but is based on the investigation of more than 9,000 reported unidentified flying objects by project "Blue Book," the air force's — and in fact the government's — agency charged with analysis of aerial phenomena.

"There is nothing to indicate that any of these phenomena is of extraterrestrial nature," said Maj. Hector Quintanilla Jr., a serious, 42-year-old physicist in charge of the project.

Take, for example, the numerous sightings in at least eight states — mostly in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas — earlier this month. Quintanilla claims the many persons who reported seeing UFOs actually were looking at the planet Jupiter and four prominent stars. He said atmospheric conditions "gave them a scintillating effect" and made them appear close together and in formation.

What about reports that Tinker Air Force Base at Oklahoma City and the weather bureau at Wichita, Kan., spotted the UFO's on radar?

"They never said they had spotted these particular UFO's," Quintanilla replied. "They said they had sighted something they couldn't identify and since everyone was seeing things, people put two and two together."

"The radar sighting at Tinker was on the opposite side of the spectrum as the reported UFO sightings."

Fine, but what was it radar had fixed on? "A building, we think at this point. An inversion (an atmospheric condition brought on by the moving of fronts and varying temperatures) caused the radar beams to bounce off and fix on something on the ground. The Tinker fix remained stationary on the radarscope for 40 minutes, indicating something not moving. Don't forget, the sighted UFO's were reported as moving."

The major explained that inversions are responsible for many UFO sightings involving radar. If the tracked radar beam fixes on a truck or a train moving

away from the radar facility, he said, it gives the impression of a high-flying unidentified object.

"The first thing I do when I get a reported sighting is check the weather in the area and my eyes."

His universe is a large, round, movable map-like affair on which all the planets and major stars of the universe surround the earth. It can be moved so that the position of any planet or star can be set in show what area it was visible from at any given second.

He said his universe and the weather

by the sun after the sun had set on the ground.

THREE — Nightly "fata morgana" type refractions in the atmosphere of distant light sources on the ground.

FOUR — Satellites, both U.S. and Russian.

FIVE — Meteorites, fireworks, flares, chaff and pieces of satellite debris. "Satellite debris," he said, "is a recent addition. These are pieces of junk from satellites that fall back to earth from space. As they pass into the atmosphere and burn up, they give off a red-hot glow which lasts several minutes. We have often found pieces of this debris shortly after it was sighted, have analyzed it and identified it as from earth satellites. These look similar to meteorites, but travel much slower."

SIX — Birds.

SEVEN — Planets Venus and Jupiter, or other astronomical bodies.

EIGHT — Searchlights illuminating off cloud layers.

NINE — Jet engine exhausts, condensation trails.

TEN — Hoaxes or mirages. "So far this year, there has been only one reported hoax."

Quintanilla admits there are 1000 unsolved UFO sighting cases — nearly half of them in the peak year of 1952. But he adds: "None has even given any indication of being a threat to our national security . . . of being beyond the range of present day scientific knowledge . . . or of being extraterrestrial."

Although Project Blue Book is the only governmental agency of its kind in the country, there are 67 known private groups dealing in unidentified aerial phenomena. "Most of these," the major said, "advocate the theory that at least some of the UFO's are from other planets."

Some of these private groups and publications have accused Quintanilla of withholding UFO information from the public, he said, adding, "this is absolutely not true."

Information received from one of IIOUFO's Scientific Panel members states "None of these features can be satisfactorily (numbered) explained by terrestrial geologist (such as myself). The two long parallel rills are probably settling cracks parallel to walls of the crater and very much similar to the so-called "ring dykes" of the terrestrial geology."




## Zond 3

On October 4, 1959, the USSR launched a 614 pound satellite named Lunik 3, which photographed the back side of the moon for 40 minutes from a distance of 37,000 to 43,000 miles. For the first time in history man was able to see what the other side of the moon looked like.

An inquiry was directed to N. Khrushchev by the IIOUFO and seven months later we received a reply. We received photographs, illustrations of the Lunik 3 and flight plans.

The USSR did not photograph the moon again until July 20, 1965 when Zond 3 was launched on July 18, 1965. The new photos will permit mapping the whole of the moon, front and back. The photographs were taken from a distance ranging from 7,200 miles to 6,500 miles, about the distance Mariner 4 photographed Mars. The photos were taken as the vehicle approached the moon a slight distance to one side. That permitted pictures of the hidden side. Features of the moon showed up with shadows caused by sidelighting from the sun. The vehicle traveled on another nine days, until July 29, before signal was given to transmit the pictures back to earth.

# AIR FORCE UFO INVESTIGATION

## PROJECT BLUE BOOK

The United States Air Force has the responsibility under the Department of Defense for the investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFO's). The name of this program, which has been in operation since 1948, is Project Blue Book. It has been identified in the past as Project Sign and Project Grudge.

Air Force interest in unidentified flying objects is related directly to the Air Force responsibility for the air defense of the United States. Procedures for this program are established by Air Force Regulation 200-2.

The objectives of Project Blue Book are two-fold: first, to determine whether UFO's pose a threat to the security of the United States; and, second, to determine whether UFO's exhibit any unique scientific information or advanced technology which could contribute to scientific or technical research. In the course of accomplishing these objects, Project Blue Book strives to identify and explain all UFO sightings reported to the Air Force.

The Air Force no longer possesses and thus does not have available for distribution outdated reports on Project Sign, Project Grudge, Blue Book Special Report No. 14 and outdated Project Blue Book press releases. Non-military UFO publications should be requested from the publisher and, not the Air Force.
