DETAILS ON THAT CALIFORNIA BALL OF FIRE

Greenfield, California- December 14th, 1962 - (LS) - The UFO sighted over several California communities on December 14th and reported in last weeks Look-See was well covered by our member-groups. A detailed report of the events in one of these towns follows: On the morning of the 14th a mysterious "ball of fire" alternately red and white, hovered over Greenfield, California, and gradually soared upwards and out of sight. The first person to see the object was police officer Nick Heinz, a former U.S. Air Force Sergeant. He saw the object at 4:30 A.M., at an estimated altitude of about 10,000 feet, heading South. A newsboy saw the same sight at 6:00 A.M. It changed from bright red to white, rising gradually higher as it slowly moved South. At 7:00 A.M. Constable and Mrs. Ted Miller saw the glowing object through binoculars. It had reached 60,000 feet by that time. There were several others who saw similar phenomena, including a military policeman at nearby Fort Ord who reported a "flash of light" at 4:15 A.M. So far no explanation has been offered.
