UFO BREAKTHROUGH IN SWEDEN -- Military authorities have turned over their complete UFO files to the Swedish UFO Research Society. The Swedish government said the UFO's are not hostile; Commander-in-Chief of Sweden's armed forces announced there is no reason for secrecy. Top government officials stated openly that it is possible people on other planets may have already solved the problems of space travel. March 12, 1963 - Honolulu, Hawaii - Cleveland, Ohio - (LS) - On March 12, a crescent-shaped UFO was reported seen over Honolulu, Hawaii. Initial report telephoned to Look-See by Ricky Hilberg in Cleveland, Ohio, states that the object was pursued by an Air National Guard Jet.

On the same date as the above report, a square-shaped, silver colored UFO, the size of a quarter at arms length, was observed at 3:55 P.M. over Cleveland, Ohio. When the witness tried to get to a position of better view, the object disappeared. Further details will be made available as received. (SOURCE: Look-See. ##### UFOS OVER ISRAEL

Postfach, Germany = February 1963 - (LS) - The Editor of the publication of the Deutsche-UFO Studiengemeinschaft, a UUA member, received the following report dated September 27th, 1962. On this date there was an unusual appearance in Israel's skies - a glittering object, sighted in every part of the country. Some persons thought the object might be a meteor or satellite. The object crossed the sky with a fluttering motion, giving off an eerie yellow glow. The object was in view for approximately 15 minutes. (SOURCE: Translated from UFO Nachrichten).

##### MYSTERY OBJECT OVER HAWAII

Honolulu, Hawaii - March 12, 1963 - (UPI) - An unidentified flying object, traveling West at a "very high altitude and a high rate of speed", was sighted by hundreds of persons in the Hawaiian Islands. Two Air National Guard Pilots said they saw the object north of Kauai during a routine mission in jet fighters at an altitude of 40,000 feet. Honolulu newspapers and radio stations were flooded with calls. Witnesses in Honolulu said the object looked like a crescent-shaped-moon falling into the sea. They said it was bright, and some said it appeared to be on fire. (SOURCE: ROAP).

## EDITORIAL: MIRRORS OF PROGRESS

\*\*\* It has occurred to me that the reflection of the progress of UFOlogy throughout the world has been shown, over the years, in the publications on this subject.

\*\*\* Early UFO publications from the United States are usually poorly "knocked up" editions, in some cases half science fiction and half UFOlogy. Until recent years, there were virtually no such publications in Canada.

\*\*\* UFO publications today cover a wide range of size and quality. Generally speaking, UFO publications today are good, but a few specific publications are, we feel, worthy of mentioning as "classic examples" of what all UFO publications should and can be.

\*\*\* In the U.S. and Canada such publications as FLYING SAUCERS MAGAZINE and SAUCERS, SPACE, AND SCIENCE are worth mentioning. It should here be noted that some of the best and some of the worst examples of UFO publications can be found in America. There is great inconsistency in quality here, but improvements are continually being made, even on the poorest of publications.

\*\*\* In Europe, such publications as UFO NYT and UFO Nachrichten, to name only two, are of excellent quality. In Australia, THE AUSTRALIAN FLYING SAUCER REVIEW is an enjoyable, well printed, and well written magazine.

\*\*\* It occurs to us that publications in the UFO field that are good are not necessarily the most expensive or most elaborate. Some of the best, in fact, are done on a smaller budget than most of the worst. This seems indicative of one fact: it is the editor's judgment that determines the worth of a publication.

\*\*\* It also occurs to us that our publications are perhaps underrated in their influence. The public, who can only judge by what they see, often are reluctant to become a part of the UFO world, even if they are interested in the subject, because they happen to pick up a poor quality UFO publication and consider this an example of how the whole subject is organized.

\*\*\* We think our point should be clear to you by now; even the best publications could stand a great deal of improvement. ALL should be very selective as to the material that they publish, and ALL should make an effort to make their publication something that is representative of UFOlogy in its best tradition.

\*\*\* There is no doubt that UFOlogy needs improvement. Anyone thinking that UFOlogy is in the best possible condition is plainly and simply wrong. We need to improve allright, and maybe the best place to start is with the central organ of communication in all UFO groups, our publications.
