



OBJECT AT VANCOUVER, B.C. CENTENNIAL MUSEUM: John Green writes 26 Aug. 1972: " The object pictured is in the possession of the Vancouver, B.C. Centennial Museum, having arrived from Lillooet, B.C. in 1947. I haven't been able to find out any more, as the anthropologist (1 only) is on holidays, but presumably it was found broken in the ground. Note how long the toes are on top and how short on the bottom, with the 'double ball' effect resulting from very heavy webbing, just as Sanderson hypothesized so long ago. It cannot be a bear track, since it plainly had a very big 'big toe'. I shouldn't call it a track at all, as it seems to be a carving of a foot. I have no explanation for the pattern



on the top, but everything else seems to be an attempt to reproduce a natural object. The tips of the toes are bent down and the nails appear to be represented just at the top of the curve, pointing more down than forward. I would say from the toe shape that the last bone of each toe points down, except that that would mean the nails are back near the joint instead of at the end, so I don't know. The amount missing at the heel is a problem. There is quite a bowl shape to the bottom of the foot and this is complete in the fragment, leaving one to wonder where the shape would go for the rest of the foot. Also there is what could be part of a terminal curve on the little toe side, which would suggest that nearly the whole thing is there. I could not tell whether this curve was the original shape or the result of breakage. The pattern on top would suggest it needed quite a bit more heel to be symmetrical, but maybe it wasn't, and in any case it seems doubtful it was as long as a Sasquatch foot. But what else could it be?

" I saw this thing years ago, when I donated the cast pictured beside it (Gerry Crew, smoothed out for reproduction by Titmus) to the museum in 1958 or 1959. However I only saw the top, it being in a case, and since anyone can carve a foot any scale he likes I did not feel it likely that it had anything to do with our subject. A Miss Hilary Stewart (who drew the far-too-thin artist's impression of the Patterson film for Dave Hancock's article in Weekend Magazine after they both attended the UBC showing) recently sent me a picture of the underside, so I went to see and photograph for myself. "

"BIGFOOT BED" INVESTIGATED IN NO. CALIFORNIA: Considerable excitement was occasioned recently by the finding, in northern California, of what was believed to be a Bigfoot bed, or lair. With Rene Dahinden I traveled to the scene of the finding and made an examination of what was there. Here, for MN, is my report.

FINDER...three US Foresters from Orleans Range, Orleans, Humboldt Co.

AREA...about 800 feet above the upper end of Scorpion Creek, which flows into Bluff Creek, in Del Norte County, northern California .

DESCRIPTION OF AREA...steep hillside; principal growth Douglas Fir; undergrowth, Rhododendron and Madrone.

SITUATION OF "BED"...on the ground, in a level place made so by the growth of a large Douglas Fir. "Bed" was built against the fir tree.

SHAPE...rounded, slightly elongated, like a misshapen bird's nest.

SIZE...six feet long, four and a half feet in width.

MATERIALS OF CONSTRUCTION...leaves, sticks, some moss, rhododendron shoots from the top ends of rhododendron bush branches, and bear grass.

FINDINGS...In the bed, 27 hairs, black, some with brown tips, all less than $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length. Much curling "underhair", short (less than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch), soft, black or brown in colour. Faeces, one small pile, in rhododendron bushes five feet from edge of "bed", shape and substance similar to that of common Black Bear, weight 5 ounces. Very small, thin scratch marks in bark of Douglas Fir to

a height of 18 inches. Large, deep scratch, or claw marks, in bark of madrone tree, eight feet from "bed" to a height of 9 feet.

OPINION...The finding has every appearance of being the nesting bed or lair of a female bear of the species *Ursus americanus*, i.e., the common American Black Bear. The small claw marks in the lower part of the fir appear to be those of newly born cubs. The deep scratches in the madrone are most probably those of a mature bear; they are typical of the territorial "declaration" of the Black Bear. The hair appears to be bear hair. The faeces is very bearlike in shape, size and contents. The teeth markings on the stems found in the "bed" indicate the impressions normally made by the incisors of bear. (In breaking these stems the bear uses only the incisors and the stems are broken off with a single upward or vertical snapping movement.)

APOLOGIES TO GEORGE F. HAAS: In the first issue of Manimals Newsletter I stated concerning Haas' discontinued Bigfoot Bulletin: " Haas felt the Bulletin was too much trouble for the information he was receiving in return, and that much of what he was receiving should not be published in the Bulletin because people who wished to kill a Bigfoot/Sasquatch might use the information to accomplish that end. The resultant lack of pertinent news in the Bulletin probably caused many recipients to lose interest in submitting news. "

George F. Haas has written 1 Sept. 1972 stating these statements are erroneous. He says he greatly appreciated the information he was receiving, which enabled him to build up one of the largest collections of Bigfoot material extant, but felt the time, energy and money going into the Bulletin could be better spent on personal and field research. George Haas recently returned after 2 months, 8 days in northern California searching for evidence (finding none) and plans many more such jaunts. (Had we been able to carry on normal communications during this summer project my misconceptions would likely have been corrected before going to press.) Haas also says my implication the Bigfoot Bulletin was censored is wrong; information not printed was either confidential or excluded for lack of space. (The same problem will likely confront this editor.)

My sincere and humble apologies to George F. Haas.

MISCELLANEOUS REPORTS:

Russell Gebhart writes 6 Sept. 1972 he investigated the 27 Mar. 1972 sighting report near Tamarac, Idaho where a Polaroid photo of the creature was allegedly obtained. He has sent a photo of a footprint cast taken there and an enlargement copy of the photo of the creature which looks curiously similar to the drawing in Ivan T. Sanderson's Abominable Snowmen: Legend Come to Life (hardback), plate 40. Gebhart says he was not impressed with the authenticity of his findings.

Ivan Marx appeared in an interview, along with a film he said he had taken of "Big-foot", on the television program "You Asked for It", viewed by the editor on KCRA (Channel 3, Sacramento) 2 Sept. 1972. The creature was light in color, and seemed to move rather clumsily and stiffly through about knee to mid-calf depth snow during a snowstorm. "You Asked for It" also interviewed Dr. Geoffrey H. Bourne, Director of Yerkes Regional Primate Research Center, to whom they had brought the film for his comment. He said, in effect, the creature seemed to be a man in a costume .

FREE LOANS OF INVESTIGATORY EQUIPMENT: Diligent contributors to MN will qualify for free loans of equipment from the editor for investigatory purposes. Currently available are: (1) Argus model 810 super-8 movie camera; (1) 16mm Bell & Howell Filmo 141-B cartridge movie camera, spring drive; (2) Panasonic casset tape recorders; (8) flash cameras for use with trip lines. New additions to this list will appear in MN. Loans should be arranged in advance.

PHOTOCOPY SERVICE: It has been the editor's practice, as with most manimals investigators, to provide free photocopies of articles to his regular correspondents. However, due to the increased correspondence workload and increased demand as a result of MN he cannot continue this policy without remuneration. MN goes out to about 300 persons, agencies, societies, libraries, etc., with about 200 copies reserved as back issues. Printing cost for 500 copies is about \$70.00 and postage on gratis and foreign subscriptions will run \$10 to \$15 per issue. Therefore a cost-plus policy is being instituted for copy service.

Copies of newspaper articles listed in MN may be obtained at 10¢ per page. The editor lives a mile from a good 5¢ photocopy machine. The "profit", after postage, will be divided 50-50 between MN publication costs and acquiring investigatory equipment for loaning out, as above. Copy cost and a brief abstract (Ab.) of, or statement regarding (Re) each listing will be included, as well as a clarity rating (0 = original, G = good copy, F = fair, P = poor, VP = very poor). Minimum order is 30¢, and all orders should include an unstamped SAE . Arrangements may be made for copying other materials.


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
