STRANGE STORY FROM IRELAND--A UFO LANDING IN 1922--"Sir,--The existence of flying objects that carry people from other planets is highly probable and not a laughing matter. I would like to tell of an incident that happened many years ago, before people accepted the fact that from time to time we have unearthly visitors in our midst. It was on an April night, the year 1922, the place County Donegal in the Irish Republic. A civil war was raging at the time and the army that I belong to was fighting scattered rearguard actions--mostly in the mountains. One evening, tired and dispirited, I laid down in the entrance to an old cave. In the fading twilight I noticed that practically all the gorse bushes and grass that grew around the entrance to the cave were scorched and burnt. The only occupants of the cave were sick and wounded men who were unable to walk. The six able-bodied soldiers who were looking after them told me a strange story which, at the time, seemed very far-fetched and unconvincing.

"It appeared that early that morning they were awakened by a whirring noise from outside. Thinking it was an enemy armoured car, they immediately opened fire. In the darkness before the dawn it was hard to see the object they were shooting at, but after a brisk fusillade of shots, the object retaliated by firing jets of flame at the cave. The defenders had to withdraw in face of the fierce heat. All the undergrowth was now ablaze and the smoke was billowing into the cave so it was a case of facing the flame throwers or suffocating to death which was a hard choice to make as it meant death either way. The urgent need for fresh air made them choose the latter course. When they ran out of the entrance they saw the flame throwing object beginning to ascend into the sky. It was clearly visible in the first light of dawn--circular in shape and bright in appearance as if made of aluminium. I daresay some of the men who saw this strange phenomenon are alive today and can vouch for this story. For myself I can only vouch for the scorched and burnt undergrowth. Still it is another bit of evidence in support of the theory that flying objects do exist..."

November 2, 1964--Pescadero, California, U.S.A.--Maybe it wasn't a flying object, but it was a flying something or other and four residents of the Pescadero area swear that it was as real as life. A thoroughly flabbergasted Rudolph W. Huizen said the object, making a white light bright enough to illuminate the entire Butano Canyon, hovered over his home last night, blinked its lights in response to a signal from his flashlight, and finally dived towards him and his wife and two friends before disappearing over the hill. "It gave me the creeps," Huizen confessed. "I used to laugh at people who said they saw flying objects. But I won't laugh at them anymore, I promise you." Huizen said he debated at first whether he should report the incident to the sheriff's office. "People would think I'm some kind of a nut," he explained. Ray Cavallero, assistant ranger in charge of the Division of Forestry station at Pescadero, talked with

Huizen and his wife, Henny, and their friends, Duane and Diane Myers, shortly after the eerie object was seen. They were sober, Cavallero announced, putting to rest the most obvious explanation likely to be offered by skeptics. Sheriff's Deputies William Ganley and George Rist also talked with Huizen and the others and were convinced of the sincerity of their report. Huizen, who is caretaker at the Girl Scout Camp in Butano Canyon, said it happened around 8 o'clock. Mr. and Mrs. Myers had come over to play cards, he said, and he and Myers had gone out to check when his dog started barking. They walked about 100 yards from the house across the road and, finding nothing, started back. "I commented about how bright the stars were," Huizen said, "and then I saw one was moving, fast. Myers said it must be a satellite but I said it was going too fast for that, and it was swaying, from left to right and back again." Huizen said he playfully pointed his flashlight at the object, which was going in a northeast direction, and flashed an "SOS" signal. The object, which appeared to be the size of a silver dollar, suddenly turned to the right, circled around and came back to where he and Myers were standing. It then stood still, blinked its lights, "on and off, on and off, like we did." Huizen said they couldn't make out the shape of the object because of the bright light coming from it. "It looked like a big piece of crystal," he said. "It came down and settled over the trees about half a mile away and moved back and forth. When I flashed my flashlight at it again it lit up the sky like a full moon. It was about as big as a football."

Huizen and Myers ran into the house, fetched their wives Henny and Diana. The four watched the object for a while, signalled once more. Then it moved towards them. They fled into the house. "If you were standing in my shoes, you would have run too," said Huizen. The four peeked out of the doorway, saw the light back away, grow dim. "Then it took off," said Huizen. October 21, 1964--South Gate, California, U.S.A.--An unidentified South Gate lady is wondering today about an unidentified, disc-shaped object she says she and her husband heard and saw flying over their neighborhood early this morning. "I'd sure like to know if anyone else besides my husband and I saw it," she said in a phone call to the Daily Signal. "We both heard it about 12:13 o'clock this morning. We got out of bed and saw it going from south to north--it appeared round, but it may have had two white lights and two red lights, possibly whirling around to give the whole thing a round appearance. "But the sound--we never heard anything like it --sort of a low, loud groan that got higher and higher--and fainter as it approached--then lower and louder again when it disappeared. September 15, 1964--Baton Rouge, Louisiana, U.S.A.--Ryan Airport authorities said today that "unidentified flying objects" seen here last night were created by refraction of light by a haze cover over the south Louisiana area. Joseph Carroll, chief of the Federal Aviation Agency and Tower Communications Station at Ryan Airport, said similar sightings were reported practically all over the south Louisiana area. Numerous sightings were reported in New Orleans, Houma and Baton Rouge, Carroll said. One resident, Louis Moore, in Villa Del Rey, reported sighting as many as seven of the moving objects. State Police Troop M in Des Allemands reported to the

East Baton Rouge Parish Sheriff's office that officers on U.S. Hwy. 90 had spotted the object. The State Police in Baton Rouge were informed by the 32nd Air Control of the Civil Air Patrol, Montgomery, Alabama, that Strategic Air Command aircraft in the area scrambled and were attempting identification. The first Baton Rouge call was received by the sheriff's office from James Warren on Core Lane, just off Jorr Road. Warren said he was awakened by a noise and saw an object go over his house at treetop level. He said the object, which kept moving, had red and green blinking lights. Sheriff's deputies who answered the call also reported seeing the object. And at midnight, airport tower personnel reported seeing at least two of the unidentified objects. The first call on the UFO's came to the sheriff's office at 10:40 p.m. They were spotted east of Ryan Airport. A Denham Springs resident said today she saw a helicopter release some objects from the side of the aircraft about mid-afternoon yesterday. The resident said the oblong, silver objects seemed to be headed westerly. Airport authorities had no knowledge of any helicopter activity or operations in the area yesterday. September 14, 1964--Shreveport, Louisiana, U.S.A.--There may be more than heavenly bodies in Louisiana's night skies. Strange objects have been reported aloft locally. Mrs. Marie Stallcup, wife of Clyde Stallcup, director of Shreveport's Park and Recreation Department, said she has been doing much studying of late about the stars and thought she must have been dreaming. But she went to the window and said she saw a strange object--which looked like a salad plate--crossing the sky toward the southeast, after being awakened about 4:45 a.m. by a droning noise. She described the noise as sounding like "vrooom, vrooom." Mrs. Stallcup--a staff member of the under-construction Shreveport Planetarium--said she aroused her daughter, Patty, 14, who watched the object with her. The object seemed so close, "I felt I could reach out and touch it," she said. The noise continued for as long as the object was in sight. Apparently, whatever it was that Mrs. Stallcup and her daughter witnessed was spinning around and had depth and thickness. Sometimes more of the flying object was visible than at other times. Mrs. Stallcup also reported there were rays of light radiating from the object. Mother and daughter said they watched it for some 15 minutes before it passed out of sight. September 14, 1964--Near New Orleans, Louisiana, U.S.A.--A shapeless, absolutely-still object, sighted over Lake Pontchartrain has State Rep. Charles G. Smither baffled. And it may herald the unofficial opening of the "Unidentified Flying Object" season, which comes and goes with the speed of light. Rep. Smither said last week he spotted the object Monday morning about 11. "We had been to the Michoud plant and were returning to the city," said Smither. "I looked out of the bus and saw what appeared to be a metal object over the Lake. Going to the plant, we had seen some jet airliners coming in. I said to my seatmate, Alfred Moran, 'well, there's another one.' I kept waiting for it to take the shape of a plane. But it didn't. It had no tail or wings. I pointed it out to Moran and he saw it, too. Alfred turned away, but I looked at it for at least three minutes. It never moved, and had no definite shape. I glanced around in the bus and when I looked back, the object was gone." Later Monday night scores of Louisianians said they saw "unidentified flying objects" moving slowly across darkened skies. September 14, 1964--Near Brunswick, Missouri, U.S.A.--(Special report to N.I.C.A.P.)--"On Monday night Sept. 14, about 9:30 p.m. my 10-year-old son and I were returning home from a school meeting. We live 8 miles NE of Brunswick, Missouri. We were about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles out of town on a blacktop road when we saw an orange object coming down slowly from the sky. I told my son, 'there is a falling meteorite.' He said it looked like it was landing behind the hill. A little further down the road, my son yelled 'Look Mom, there is that Orange Thing again' and I looked to the right and, there was the Orange Object. It looked like it was going about the same speed as our car as it stayed directly to the right of us for the next 5 miles; then as we were going to turn to the east, this Orange Object started to rise up, and up, and then like a bullet shot to the north until we could no longer see it. My son said 'Mom, was that a spaceship?' Of course, by seeing it raise, it did make we wonder. Needless to say, I was terrified. Then, just $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from home, we saw this same Orange Object coming out of northern sky and coming down at such tremendous speed and at such an angle, it looked like it was going to land directly in front of us. I even applied my brakes as I didn't think I could possibly get by a certain point without running directly into IT. When it was just a little way from us it turned directly and sharply to the east and stopped in a position directly east of our house. My legs were shaking so hard, I didn't think we were going to make it home. My son ran in and got my husband who was baby-sitting with our two younger sons. He came outside and we all watched this Orange Thing to the east. We wanted to call neighbors, but since it was 10:00, knew they would be in bed.

"Of course, the next day when we were telling them about it, they all wished we had come or called and got them out of bed. We watched this Orange Object for 2 hours, it didn't move but just enough that you could see it wasn't completely still. This Object was close. My husband has witnessed this same object in the sky twice before, once in July. He tried to wake me up to tell me he saw a space ship. Of course, I didn't believe him enough to even open my eyes. He said this Orange Object moved in all directions in the sky. He said, too, it would stay in one place awhile and then shoot off like a bullet. The next time we see this, no matter what time of night it is, we are definitely going to get our neighbors up to verify this, but 3 of us did very definitely see this and whatever it was come so close to the road, that I will not go to town by myself again at night as I was completely terrified. There is no doubt that this was not a falling star or a figment of our imagination." /S/ Mrs. W.S., Brunswick, Missouri.

September 11, 1964--Near Ulysses, Kansas, U.S.A.--Know what will really shake you up? Be driving down the road and meet a flying object. Mrs. Karen Campbell says it happened to her about 5 a.m. last Friday at the west edge of Ulysses, Kansas. Enroute to Ponca City from Denver, Colorado, she had slowed down upon entering a 40-mph speed zone when the lights of her car suddenly picked up this "thing" skimming down the highway toward her. Appearing to be about three feet above the roadway when she first saw it, it started climbing and banked sharply to avoid colliding with her car, Mrs. Campbell said. Traveling at a "tremendous" speed as it went past, it made a noise like a rushing wind. There was no sound of a motor. Mrs. Campbell described the object as circular in shape, about four feet high and a little farther across than the width of a lane on the highway. It was a dull copper color and no lights were visible on it. There was an oval bubble on top, and when the object banked a centerpiece could be seen on the underside. "It all happened in a split second," Mrs. Campbell said. "I was scared and my main thought was to get away from there. So I stepped on the gas and must have got up to 90 before stopping at a cafe about a

mile down the highway. "I was shaking and couldn't even talk at first. I ordered a cup of coffee and a glass of milk, and was shaking so that I spilled the milk down the front of my dress. I stayed about an hour, until it was good and light, drinking about 15 cups of coffee and smoking 20 or 30 cigarets. I started to tell one man what I had seen, but he acted like he thought I was drunk or something." Leaving Ulysses about 6 a.m., the 22-year-old blond mother of two small daughters had an uneventful drive home, arriving here about 1 p.m. "But my hair was standing on end the whole way," she declared. Mrs. Baker confided that her daughter slept with a light on in her room Friday night. And she definitely doesn't plan to make the Denver trip again other than in daylight. She called the encounter with the flying object the "biggest shock of my life. I had never witnessed anything like it." Source: The News--Ponca City, Oklahoma --9/15/64.

August 23, 1964--Nine Mile, Montana, U.S.A.--(Special report to N.I.C.A.P.)
--"There is an underpass at Nine Mile. Near this underpass there is an island, a river, tracks, 2 houses and the main highway, a night club and steak house. Just before approaching the underpass this object appeared to be along the tracks or on the island. It was so big--I would estimate 20 or 30 feet in diameter. It was so bright that surrounding it, it was all lit up as a fluorescent light would be. As I entered the underpass and started up a hill, this object was coming up at a slant. It appeared over my truck. It looked like a whirl wind or spinning top going up. It also looked like it had a black tail on it as it spun around. It also was cracking and popping on its way upward. It reached a certain height in the sky and then appeared as a full moon. I also noticed high up in the sky, right above me, there was another object similar to a ship. It was moving east the same way the other object and I were going. It followed me 16 miles into Missoula directly in front of me in the air. I live at the foot of a mountain called Mt. Jumbo. When I parked my truck and turned off the lights in front of my home the object shot over the mountain like a bullet...It left a vapor trail behind it as it disappeared over the mountain." /S/ Louis J. August 15, 1964--New Freeport, Pennsylvania, U.S.A.--The county's first report of an unidentified flying object in several years occurred early Saturday morning. The report was made by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bissett, one of the best-known and highly respected families in the area. According to the Bissett's, who had four other people watching beside them, the disc-shaped object appeared about a half-mile from their home near New Freeport at about 12:15 a.m. Their son, Robert Bissett, 35, first noticed the object on the skyline and thought it was the moon appearing over the hill. He was watching through a large kitchen window and immediately shouted to the rest of the family when the object suddenly moved. Mr. and Mrs. William Babcock, daughter and son-in-law of the Bissett's who are vacationing from Scranton, also noticed the object and Mrs. Babcock grabbed binoculars and watched the UFO for several seconds. The only thing she noticed with the aid of the glasses was a hollowed out space on the top of the disc, she commented. Barbara, 16-year-old daughter of the Babcock's, also watched the UFO on the first of three occasions that it appeared during the night. She said the object had a luminous red color and moved parallel with the ground. Seconds after it disappeared the first time, the family noticed a bright glow at the front of the house and soon spotted the object again. Two cars drove slowly pass and seconds later turned around and drove back for a closer look. It made a third pass seconds later and

appeared to just skim over the ground before disappearing for the final time, the family said. "It was very eerie," Barbara said, "and it was rather unusual too, that the dogs never barked." The teenage girl admitted in a telephone conversation Sunday evening that she was still excited over the incident. All six who watched it on three occasions, agreed that the object was disc-shaped, glowed red and moved very, very fast. The reflection from the disc glowed "like fire" they said. August 12, 1964--Yakima, Washington, U.S.A.--A glowing object, large and fiery in the western sky about 9:30 last night, brought calls of inquiry to the Yakima Dailies. An airport control tower attendant reported that the object glared red like a fireball for a prolonged interval as it passed to westward. Source: The Herald--Yakima, Washington--8/13/64.

July 29, 1964--Binghamton, New York, U.S.A.--The "flying object" situation in the Southern Tier developed along these lines yesterday: A prominent Triple Cities businessman offered a detailed description, with a new twist, of an aerial phenomenon similar to others that have been spotted by hundreds of Southern Tier residents this week. The new twist is that an airplane apparently was following the unidentified flying object. The local businessman, who asked not to be identified, told this story: "I went out a few minutes after 10 p.m. Wednesday and a moving object caught my eye. It was almost directly overhead heading west-northwest. It's hard to tell how fast it was going, but it was moving at a pretty good clip. I don't know how high it was. It was a large object, bright at either end with a faint glow in the middle. At first I thought it was perhaps a low flying airplane, but there was no sound and the more I looked at it, the more I realized it wasn't. After seeing other airplanes at night, I could tell it just didn't look like an airplane. Seconds afterwards I noticed another craft which appeared to be following this. I am sure the second craft was an airplane. Its blinking red light was clearly visible. I picked up sound with the second craft. The sound was very faint, which made me think it was up pretty high, because it was a clear, still night. This gave me the impression that this 'thing,' whatever it was, was huge. The thing had lights at the ends, not flashing, just steady light. It was brighter at what I assumed to be ends than in the middle. When I first looked at it, it looked like it had a V or a couple Vs or a W or M of light in the middle. I couldn't be sure. It was just weird." July 29, 1964--Binghamton, New York, U.S.A.--Reports of strange phenomena in the sky continued to pour in today from children and adults throughout Broome county...Phillip Budine, chairman of the Observing Section of the Astronomical Society of Broome County, made observations last night from his home in Broad Acres..."At about 9:40 p.m. I saw a yellowish object going from the east to the southwest through my telescope. It seemed to be moving rapidly. It was the only object I couldn't explain." Source: The Press--Binghamton, New York--7/30/64.

TWIN CITIES UFO'S DRAW POOH-POOH BY AIR FORCE--Those flying objects sighted in the skies over the Triple Cities for several nights late last month weren't spaceships or spacemen, as far as the Air Force is concerned. The Pentagon in Washington, D.C., yesterday released the official results of

a survey conducted two weeks ago by two airmen from Griffiss Air Force Base in Rome. The "official determination" implied a "pooh-pooh" attitude about the hundreds of reports of unidentified flying objects that poured into newspaper offices and the Federal Aviation Agency tower and the U.S. Weather Bureau at Broome County Airport from July 28 to August 4. THE STRANGER IN THE PHOTOGRAPH--On the lonely marsh beside the Solway Firth, Jim Templeton pressed the trigger of his camera. In front of him was his five-year-old daughter Elizabeth. And in the distance the Chapel Cross atomic station and a NATO radar-tracking base. Jim, a 44-year-old Carlisle fireman, sent off his color film for processing. Back it came with a note: "Your best picture has been spoiled by a man in the background." "I don't know anything about spacemen, but there was definitely nobody in front of my camera except Elizabeth. There was nothing in sight for half a mile--except for my wife and my other daughter. And they were behind me. There wasn't even a tree or anything on the skyline which could have caused a reflection. The firm which made the film assure me that it must have been perfect." Behind Elizabeth the picture showed a "spaceman" in a white padded suit and helmet. He looked about 7ft. tall. Jim said last night: "I took it to the Carlisle police. They were amazed. The photograph was so good and clear I don't think it could have been a technical fault." Carlisle police experts studied the pictures, Detective Chief Superintendent Tom Oldcorn said yesterday: "At first sight we thought it was a double exposure. But it's not. The picture shows someone in white, but Mr. Templeton says there was no one else about. It is very puzzling. We're not taking it seriously. It must be some sort of freak picture." FACT OR FANTASY AT FELLING, NORTHUMBERLAND, ENGLAND?--Flashes...loud buzzes in the night...little green men chasing each other around haystacks... egg-shaped flying objects...No, the leprechauns aren't loose and it's no Irishman who is telling this tale--just the good people of Felling. For stories are going round Leam Lane Estate that flying spacemen are using the area for manoeuvres. So persistent are the reports that a full-scale investigation has been launched by one organization. Centre of the activity is Hopedene Avenue where most of the residents have heard a loud buzzing noise, and so far, no one has come up with a logical explanation for them. One person who has seen the flying object is 13-year-old Keith Bell. He said last night: "I was looking out of the window late one night when there was a terrific flash in the sky. Then a flying object, egg-shaped and giving off a bright glow appeared. I saw it twice before it flew off." Keith's mother refused to believe him at first, but later saw the same flashes herself which lit up the whole of their front room. "I was terrified," she said. And the little green men? They were seen by 14-year-old David Wilson. He said: "I saw several small green creatures, about two feet high running around a haystack on a farm near the estate." Investigations are being carried out by the Tyneside Unidentified Flying Objects Society who issued an interim report last night. Mr. J.T. Otley said: "While we appreciate that this thing has snowballed until there is a vein of pure fantasy involved, we nevertheless believe that these lights and the buzzing sound heard by so many people are somehow connected. Our investigators have found that many sensible people heard this noise and young David Wilson is described by his parents and friends as a truthful boy who would not invent anything of this nature." June 2, 1964--Hobbs, New Mexico, U.S.A.--An eight-year-old Hobbs boy was seriously burned here yesterday afternoon by a mysterious flying object which sent police and medical authorities here into a so-far fruitless search for the cause of the burns. The burned youngster, Charles Keith Davis, son of Mrs. Joann Hughins, told police that a flying object burned him. He was listed in good condition at Lea General Hospital here this morning after being treated for second degree burns which covered his face and left him bald. Exactly what caused the burns had police and doctors baffled. Police said no clues as to what burned the youth have been found. The boy's attending physician said the burns were caused by some sort of open flame. Young Charles said he was burned by a fire which came out of the sky. His grandmother--who was standing about three feet from the youngster when the incident occurred about 4 p.m.--said she heard a strange sound and then saw Charles "covered in black with his hair standing on end and burning. Charles was just as black as he could be...his hair was standing up on top of his head. I grabbed him and tried to smother out his hair, which was on fire," related Mrs. Frank Smith, the boy's grandmother. The strange incident occurred at the rear of the DeLuxe Laundry.

Charles was standing just outside the rear door of the laundry. Mrs. Smith was just inside the door. "I heard this sound, like something whizzing by real fast...and then I heard Charles screaming and I turned and saw him," she continued. Mrs. Smith said that after her efforts to smother the fire failed, an employe of the cleaners poured water on the boys head and extinguished the fire. Charles' grandfather, Frank Smith, took the youth to Lea General Hospital. Questioned by police, doctors, and relatives, Charles said only that he saw something coming toward him out of the sky from the south of the building. His grandmother quoted him as saying the object was black. Mrs. Smith said she did not see the object and questioning of persons in the area turned up no other witnesses to the phenomenon. However, police said there was absolutely no trace of the fire or what caused it. There were no ashes found in the area, nor were there any scorched marks around the building, according to Mrs. Smith. Mrs. Smith added that there are no electrical or gas connections near where the youth was standing when the incident occurred. "There was no loud sound when it happened, just a sort of whoosh," Mrs. Smith added. This apparently would rule out the possibility of lightning, although light thundershowers were nearing Hobbs at the time. "There's nothing...not one clue as to what it was," Mrs. Smith asserted.
