MORE UFO SIGHTINGS OVER WASHINGTON, D.C. AREA--Unidentified flying objects continue to ride over Washington skies, according to observers. Fourteen residents of the Manassas-Nokesville area reported last week that they saw "unexplainable" things in the sky. Manassas Park was buzzed by two pulsating red globes three nights in a row, they said. First to spot them was Harold M. Lawrence, 17, high school student who is in the Naval Air Reserve. He described them as a "deep reddish-orange, as big as a house, going too fast for a plane." They pulsated evenly--two seconds on, one second off. They flew in formation, side by side. Then one dropped lower, paused over Manassas Park, picked up speed and went east into a fog. They reappeared three more times in the next four minutes, finally going out of sight to the southwest. At Nokesville, six teen-agers witnessed a high-speed flight of a circular silver UFO about 6 p.m. last Sunday. It swooped across the horizon, flashing two bright white lights as it went. Among the observers were Joseph Burke, Robert Hawkins, and Carol, William, Robert and Candy De Wald, ages 13 thru 19. Last Tuesday night, ground observers on Maryland's Eastern Shore watched a jet chasing a mysterious bright light. The light "went out", the jet disappeared, then the light "came back on", hanging silently and alone. On Jan. 29, a housewife, near Wheaton, reported a mid-afternoon performance by five high-flying discs which "glowed with pearl-like luminescence." They were in sight for several minutes, then moved off. A civilian engineer employed by the Army in Washington was driving north on the Washington-Baltimore Parkway early last Monday. He had just passed the Baltimore Tunnel turn-off when his eyes were drawn to four shiny disc-like objects up over the highway, bright enough to be seen clearly thru an overhanging mist. MUSICIANS SPY ODD OBJECTS IN THE SKY NEAR KENT, WASHINGTON--Two strange objects in the sky that moved in crazy patterns were seen over the Benson Highway at 6:15 o'clock last evening by a group of musicians. William E. Bolson of Maple Valley said he and his companions first spotted the objects over the highway at about S. 184th St. while traveling from Kent to Renton in an automobile. The objects traveled together and seemed to be connected by some invisible rod, he said. Bolson said the objects looked to him like a flying dumbbell. "They moved back and forth across the landscape," Bolson said. "Then they flew off and almost disappeared from sight. But they came back and seemed to hang over some high tension wires. The original color was white, like a glowing light bulb. Then the color changed to red, then green and back to white." VISIT ABOARD A SPACESHIP--WATSONVILLE, CALIFORNIA MAN'S ADVENTURE--A

Watsonville television repairman told today of a two-hour visit, and a brief ride, aboard a spacecraft that came from a world "a long ways, a terrific distance away." Sid Padrick, 45, said he was invited aboard with assurances that the nine-man crew was "absolutely not hostile" and that the craft spent most of the time perched on a hillside not more than 10 minutes' ride from his beachside home. He brought back little in the way of specific information about the other world or the means by which the spaceship operated. "But I asked if any other person, with more scientific or technical background, could have gained more knowledge," he reported. "The answer was 'absolutely no.'" Padrick said his strange adventure occurred about 2 a.m. on January 30, when he was taking a customary night-time walk on Manresa Beach, about 1,500 feet from the house where his wife and three sons lay sleeping. He heard a "humming" sound, he related, and then became aware of the ship some distance above him. A voice assured him, before and after it landed, that the craft was friendly. At the invitation of a person whom he assumed to be the commander--a Mr. "Ziena," as best he could spell the name he heard only once--he entered from ground level through a large, square door.

Inside, he said, the ship consisted of at least two levels, and possibly a third which he didn't see. There were 14 rooms or compartments. "The crew was dressed pretty much alike, in two-piece suits of bluish-white," Padrick related. "The color was almost that of the light inside the ship, which was indirect and seemed to come from the walls." The crewmen appeared to be normal humans, of average size, wearing short dark hair that seemed never to have been cut--"as though that was its normal length." "Ziena spoke English," Padrick said. "He told me they could speak any language among them, but he was the only one who could speak mine. They seemed to communicate between themselves with hand-gestures and perhaps facial gestures. He told me where they were from in terms I did not understand. I don't know much about space. I wouldn't be sure their world is in the solar system. He said they had been here before, but not how many times, or when their most recent visit was. He did say they would come again."

Padrick said the ship's motive power came from "energy transferred through a light source known to them. I didn't know what he was talking about," he admitted frankly. "I was frightened--very much so--all the time. Wouldn't you be?" He said the commander allowed him to go outside when the ship landed on the hilltop, and he walked about for a few minutes hoping to see a landmark for identification. No one accompanied him outside. Once, when he was in the ship, he was shown a diffuse glass-type plate on which the image of a "navigation craft," somewhere far above, appeared. But Padrick declined to describe the appearance of either ship, beyond saying the one he boarded was about 50 feet long and 30 feet high. "The Air Force asked me not to discuss it in detail," he explained. He made a report of his adventure to Major D.B. Reeder at Hamilton AFB, and the data has been forwarded to the Unidentified Flying Object Center at Dayton, Ohio. Padrick said the commander told him the visit was for "exploratory reasons only. But I think it was more than that, truthfully," he added. "There was a religious facet which I was unable to decipher." Two other reports of sightings of unidentified flying objects were made in the Watsonville area about the same time. A crew of Santa Clara County park rangers reported "a disc-like thing" over the Hecker Mountains east of Watsonville on December 28, and Monterey Mayor George M. 'LITTLE MEN' SPOTTED, SAY STAUNTON, VIRGINIA BOYS--A Staunton teenager told police that he and six friends saw "three little spacemen" near here Tuesday night, and that a companion may have succeeded in getting a photograph--as well as a swat on the head--to prove it. Police checked, found nothing, and admitted they were skeptical of the story. The youth, Steven Houffer, 16, said he and his six friends were driving in Brands Flats, east of here on U.S. 250, when he saw "what looked like a man walking" toward the road from a field, but thought nothing of it until the man sat down near the road "and seemed to be studying the cars passing by." Houffer said it suddenly occurred to him that the man might be from one of the flying objects reported in this area. They stopped the car, got out and ran toward the man who dashed over a hill, Houffer said. Then two other little men appeared and also ran away. "They left us way behind," the boy said. The figures, Houffer explained, were about 3½ feet tall, and were wearing a one piece, skin tight garment that was silver in color. They couldn't find any footprints in the muddy field where the figures were seen, he said. Their report to Staunton police brought 16 reserve policemen to the scene, and a photographer, Charles Weaver. A police search at 9 p.m., an hour after the reported incident, failed to turn up anything and the officers left. But Houffer said he and Weaver stayed to search further.

The two came upon a "glowing" aluminum barn that looked odd and decided to investigate it, he said. Weaver entered the barn, Houffer said, and apparently was hit by something. "The whole left side of his face was blood red and his eyes had a peculiar red glow," the youth said. Houffer said he and the photographer started to run away but that Weaver turned to take a picture of the barn as they left. As the camera's flash bulb went off, Houffer said it's light showed one of the little men standing by the barn. Augusta County Sheriff John E. Kent said he thinks it's a practical joke and Staunton Police Chief R. Ruff Cline said he believes the whole thing is a hoax. Weaver could not be contacted Wednesday night for questioning about the story--or how his film of the "little man" came out. Young Huffer was unavailable for comment this morning, but his mother said the camera contained color film and will have to be taken to Roanoke for developing. She said her son and some friends plan to make the trip Friday afternoon. Mrs. Huffer described her son as a "hard working boy" and unlikely to make such an experience. She said she was awakened by her son when he returned from the Brands Flats area, and "he was white as a sheet." UFO REPORTS CALLED DANGER IN AUGUSTA COUNTY, VIRGINIA--Staunton, Va.--
Reports of unidentified flying objects throughout the state but particularly in this section of the Shenandoah valley--"have gotten completely out of hand" and are now "dangerous to county residents," Sheriff John E. Kent of Augusta county said Thursday. Kent's remarks were prompted by a complaint to him Thursday that several persons in the Brands Flat area of the county armed themselves Wednesday night and went looking for creatures which were supposedly landed there last week by UFOs. Sheriff Kent said, "Anyone can go out at night and see some sort of reflections in the sky." Even if these reported creatures were from outer space "who's got the right to mow them down?" he added...While the situation commands a certain degree of humorous respect today, someone apparently is taking it seriously. The youth who believes he "captured" a small creature on color film Tuesday night in the Brands Flat area could not be reached for comment late this morning. A fellow employee at the service station where Charles Weaver works said a government vehicle came by earlier and the local amateur photographer went off with the car's occupants, apparently to Washington. IF YOU SEE LITTLE MEN YOU CAN SHOOT 'EM--There apparently is no state law making it a crime to shoot little men who might land in the state from outer space, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Button said today. Button was asked for an opinion by a Fredericksburg justice of the peace, John G. Goolrick, after the sheriff of Augusta county warned citizens there that even if they spotted some little men from outer space, they had "no right to mow them down." Some Augusta citizens had taken arms in search of the little men, reported to have landed amid a flurry of sightings of unidentified flying objects. "Since I am justice of the peace (I might add that I am also a newspaper reporter), I am requesting an opinion from you as to whether any citizens could be charged under Virginia law with a crime if he shot or otherwise physically molested one of these little men without first being harmed by such visitors or invaders from outer space." The attorney general replied that he knew of no section of the Virginia code "that fits this situation. Title 18 of the code, referring to crimes and offenses, frequently uses the word any 'person' who does such and such is guilty of the specified crime, the implication is that it must also be a 'person' against whom the crime is committed." Button said he did not know of anyone who has seen little men "sufficiently close to be able to specify whether or not they are 'persons.'" But he added: "Possibly some member of the Legislature from your area, if he has sufficient scientific knowledge to back up his beliefs, can have a definition added to our code as to whether these 'little men' are 'persons.'" POP GOES THE UFO OVER ANCHORAGE, ALASKA--An odd, piercing white light which seemed to descend from the sky and erupt like an explosion was reported today by Anchorage residents. Mrs. Ed Ray reported she, her daughter and a visiting friend, saw the mysterious light about 10:30 p.m. An Anchorage attorney, Burton Biss, who watched a similar light through a spotting telescope at about the same time, said he believed the light might have been caused by a star and ice fog which was in the area at the time. The Air Force at Elmendorf Air Force Base said the sightings, and similar reports of unidentified flying objects sighted in the sky early Monday morning were under investigation. A spokesman said "further information will be released at a later date." The object, or lights

reported sighted Monday evening were in the sky south of the city. Mrs. Ray, her daughter, and a woman friend were seated in the living room of her home when they saw the strange light which had the intensity of an arc light. The Ray Home is located on a bluff overlooking the Westchester area and the living room has large picture windows with the view to the south. Mrs. Ray said she thought she heard a noise "like a buzzing sound" just before the light was seen. "Suddenly it was just blinding," she said. It was up high--we all looked up--coming down into the trees. Then it flashed through the house and just before it went out the kitchen window there seemed to be an explosion, or flare, of great intensity. It was brighter than looking right into a 1,000-watt bulb. We thought there might have been an explosion. We called the police but they didn't know anything about it." UFO REPORTED SEEN NEAR WILLIAMSBURG, VIRGINIA--Two men traveling in separate cars reported seeing unidentified flying objects near here Saturday. The object was reportedly seen at Lightfoot, about five miles west of Williamsburg, by the two men. One was a Richmond real estate executive who asked that his name not be disclosed to the public and the other man did not identify himself, police said. State police and the county sheriff's department investigated the reports and turned over their findings to the Air Force at Langley Air Force Base in Hampton. A spokesman at Langley said the base will continue the inquiry. Both men agreed in their description of the object, according to Walter Dutton, James City county deputy sheriff. They told him the object was tall, aluminum-colored, shaped like a cylinder and about 75 feet above the ground. There were green lights on one side and yellow lights on the other, according to accounts given police. Both men reported the motors of their vehicles died out during the few seconds the object was in view, but that their cars restarted promptly afterwards, according to State Trooper R.D. Ferris. A Ft. Eustis spokesman said that two helicopters were in the Lightfoot area about 8:45 a.m. when the object was sighted and that either, if viewed from a certain angle, could be mistaken for the object described to police. TEN-YEAR-OLD ROCKY HILL, CONNECTICUT BOY REPORTS SEEING FLYING OBJECT--Robin Burgess, 10, of Rocky Hill reports he saw a flying object Friday afternoon at 3:10 over his house toward Glastonbury. He said he saw a round-shaped white object, ringed in black, about four-feet in diameter with one window in the center. His attention was attracted to the object, as he was playing in his yard, by a whistling sound overhead. By the time he ran inside his house to get his brothers, the object had disappeared, he said. Two Staunton girls, Jody Smith, 16, and Carol Billings, 15, called the station about 4:45 p.m. and said the UFO was flying slowly over the city at that moment. FLYING OBJECT SPOTTED IN HARTFORD, GLASTONBURY, CONNECTICUT--A playful flying object was spotted Wednesday over Hartford and Glastonbury. Mrs. Maria Bennett, widow of an Air Force major, and her two children saw it at 8 p.m. in the southeast sky from the children's bedroom window. Mrs. Bennett said it was disc-shaped, had an aluminum luster and was rimmed with blue flame. It appeared to be about the size of the bedroom, which is 11 by 14 feet. An artist who works at home, she was letting a maid out after putting the children to bed when Edmund, 8, shouted: "Oh, mother, look! A shooting star!" Mrs. Bennett said that in the ensuing 10 minutes, she and Edmund and Elizabeth, 10, watched the object swoop down and back up several times. On its second dive, it went sideways from right to left. It made no noise, she said, and finally disappeared straight up, getting smaller as it rose. Mrs. Bennett, who had never seen a flying object before, said she is aware of the disbelief that results from sighting reports but she called Hartford police "on the spur of the moment. Anyway," she said, "I was born in Ireland and I guess I'm stubborn. The Glastonbury sighting was made by Sally Barton, 10, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles K. Barton. Sally saw an object like a soup dish on its side in the southwest sky at 3 a.m. She said it had flashing blue lights and went up and down. Mrs. Barton, upon hearing this Wednesday morning, thought her daughter had dreamed it all. She notified The Times today after hearing about Mrs. Bennett's experience. WAYNESBORO, VIRGINIA MAN CLAIMS HE SAW SPACEMEN--A Waynesborian has reported being confronted by beings apparently from outer space. The witness, a local industrial worker who asked not to be named, said he was at the Augusta Archer's archery range at Brand's Flats on Tuesday, chopping wood for a group of archers who were to practice that day. He said he saw two noiseless, unlighted flying craft, one about 20 yards across, one about 80. He did not see the crafts land and does not know if the smaller one came from within the larger; when he looked up they were both at rest on the ground some distance from him. According to the report, three beings debarked from the smaller ship and approached to within 12 yards of him. He said he froze, a double-edged axe in his hand. The beings were from 35 to 37 inches tall, in his estimation. They were shaped very much like humans, except that one had very long fingers. In addition, the witness remarked about the beings' eyes. "They seemed to look through you," he said. He said they uttered sounds which were unintelligible to him, then turned around and walked back to the craft from which they had emerged. A door opened, according to the report, and the three entered. The door closed and the opening "seemed to mold itself to the ship"--there was no evidence of a door after it had closed.

The witness said the beings carried no weapons and did not appear hostile. He described them as dark in color and wearing cloths the same color as the "vaguely" disc-shaped vehicle. The vehicle he described as "shiny looking," of a highly polished metal or glass. He said there were no exterior lights, but as the crafts took off, there seemed to be a glow from within them. The witness said he is "not a brave man"--he simply froze when he was approached. He estimates the duration of the confrontation as about 35 minutes, beginning at about 5:40 p.m. "I am sure I didn't have an hallucination...I didn't used to believe in these things. This made me a believer." The witness was reluctant to reveal his experience because of the effects it could have on other persons. He emphasized that the beings carried no weapons and made no hostile motions. His recollections were revealed from memory this morning. He reports

that immediately after the confrontation he wrote the experience up and mailed it to himself in a sealed envelope, to be opened only for confirmation if someone else reports a similar experience. Reports of unidentified flying objects have flooded area news for the past few weeks, but this is the first record of any inhabitants of such craft revealing themselves. SIGHTER WON'T SAY U.S. HAS CLAMP ON STATEMENT--The Waynesboro industrial draftsman who told the News-Virginian he saw three, yard-high, human-shaped beings emerge from a disc-shaped vehicle on January 19 would say only "no comment" when asked if the United States Government has asked him to remain silent about his reported experience. UFO SPOTTER HELD SILENCED--An official of a national committee which investigates unidentified flying objects (UFOs) reports interviewed a local man Wednesday who said he had a bizarre encounter with a UFO and its passengers sometime ago but since has been told to keep his findings quiet. Richard Hall, assistant director of the organization, said after an hour interview with the local man that "it appears that this man has definitely been intimidated." Hall came to Waynesboro after being told in a letter by another local resident that William Blackburn, who reported that he saw three beings debark from a UFO in Augusta county on January 19, has been told to remain silent about his experience. Hall said he was able to "elicit some additional information" on Blackburn's experience but that Blackburn had been instructed explicitly not to say anything and it was suggested strongly that some federal authority had told him this. Blackburn, Hall said, was told he could say only two things--"no comment" and that the silence order did not come from the General Electric Co., plant here where he is an industrial draftsman. "It was not his personal decision not to talk," Hall said. Hall, who has dealt frequently with federal authorities, said he intends to check further with Blackburn's friends to see if more information can be gathered and reason found for Blackburn's silence. "My main concern and reason for being here is to investigate the report that Mr. Blackburn was told by someone not to say anything," Hall said. Hall said he did find out that Blackburn "knew little or nothing" about UFOs before his reported sighting. "It's a very strange story and we are unable at this point to either discount it or confirm it. We are particularly concerned that persons are being intimidated," Hall said. OBJECTS SIGHTED IN NIGHT SKY OVER TAURANGA, NEW ZEALAND--Three unidentified flying objects were seen travelling north above the Tauranga Harbour at 2.50 a.m. today by Mr. A.J. Cresswell, a member of the Tauranga Harbour Board's watch office staff. Mr. Cresswell said he saw three large circular lights, one slightly ahead of the other two, travelling in line. They appeared to be moving quite slowly and took about two minutes to disappear from view. They were below the cloud formation, which at the time was at about 5000 ft. "I had time to grab a binocular and take another look, but the light was too bright to distinguish any positive shape," he said. One of the lights was ahead of the other two, then the other two accelerated and caught up to the leading object. There was no noise. "At

AIR FORCE PROBES "STRANGE OBJECTS" OVER TASMAN SEA--Wellington, New Zealand--Thursday--The Royal New Zealand Air Force is still probing mysterious objects spotted by a Qantas Airline pilot on his radar screen last night. The R.N.Z.A.F. Deputy Director of Operations (Wing Commander A.F. Tucker) said in Wellington today: "The sightings were made by an experienced aircrew. We must take it seriously." The unidentified flying objects were seen by the Electra crew about 8.50 p.m. New Zealand time when the aircraft was 300 miles from Auckland en route to Sydney. The objects were flying eastwards in a V formation at 45,000 feet. The sightings were confirmed also by radar observation by the New Zealand Civil Aviation department. The Deputy Chief of Air Staff (Air Commodore T.F. Gill) said the sighting could be due to sunlight catching ice crystals in high cirrus cloud. A Qantas spokesman in Sydney said Captain D. Shannon and his Electra crew reported seeing vapor trails 250 miles off the New Zealand coast. Captain Shannon, whose Electra was at 20,000 feet, said the trails appeared to be at 35,000 feet going west to east. STRANGE FLYING OBJECTS SIGHTED OVER WALLOP'S ISLAND, VIRGINIA--The Air Force was scheduled yesterday to begin an investigation of unidentified flying objects, which have been sighted recently in the Wallop's Island area. Dempsey Bruton, a National Aeronautics and Space Administration engineer, was in his driveway at Wallop's Station at 5:56 p.m., Jan. 5, when he said he saw a white object shooting up from the southwest horizon. "It appeared one fourth the size of the moon. The object was yellowish-orange in color, and it traveled from the horizon to directly overhead in just a few seconds," he said. Mr. Bruton said "it looked like an oversized comet without a tail. The appearance was generally round, but it glowed and was impossible to tell its exact shape. The disappearance was as eerie as its appearance." As it passed over Mr. Bruton's head, he said one side flickered or "twinkled" then disappeared instantly. Mr. Bruton said his brother-in-law, James Taylor, a mechanic in Salisbury, was driving to his home in Mappsville on Jan. 5. As he was just below Princess Anne, "he saw the object, bearing the same description as the object I saw," Mr. Bruton said. In the last week of October in the afternoon, another NASA engineer, Larry Rossi, and three technicians on the island, saw a triangular-shaped object come out of the north and make a sharp 90-degree turn east. They couldn't make any details, except that it had a delta wing. The rate of speed was exceptional. The speed seemed faster than any of our known jets or aircraft and the thing that made it unusual to the engineer was the sharpness of the turn.
