
"There are objects coming into our atmosphere at very high speeds. The way they change position in formations and override each other would indicate that their motion is directed." Adm. Delmer Fahrney, U.S.N. Ret.

Dear Member:

One of the strangest UFO incidents in many years occurred in the state of Texas on the night of September 3. Chief Deputy Billy McCoy and Patrol Deputy Bob Goode of the Brazoria County Sheriff's Department were on routine patrol a few miles south of Damon on Highway 36. Shortly after midnight, on a moonlit night, the two deputies sighted a huge UFO which they estimated to be 200 feet long and 50 feet thick in the middle, tapering off toward the ends. There was a radiant purple light on the left, and a blue light on the right. As they watched the object through binoculars, it became alarmingly apparent to the deputies that the UFO was moving toward their car at a high rate of speed. The object cast a brilliant light on the ground and, according to officer Goode, when the huge disc was about 150 feet from the patrol car he had an impression of heat and light on his arm which was out the car window. At this point, the two officers panicked. They raced back to Damon at speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour. Shortly thereafter, the two officers returned to the scene of their encounter with the strange flying object and once again the huge UFO swooped down on the car, causing the deputies to panic and make a quick exit from the area. They did not return for a third try.

The excitement of the officer's experience soon turned to deep mystery. Prior to going on patrol, Goode had been bitten on the left index finger while helping his son move an alligator, and the wound had been badly swollen and bleeding profusely. After the encounter with the object, Goode discovered the pain and swelling were gone and the wound was no longer bleeding. This was the hand that was exposed to the light and heat radiating from the UFO. A short time later, the incident turned from mystery to sheer intrigue. Goode reported that two men came to the Sheriff's Office to see him after the incident, but he was out. The two men contacted Goode at a West Columbia area restaurant. The men told him exactly what the object looked like before he had an opportunity to describe it to them. The Deputy reported that the men then told him the UFO operates on magnetic rays. They suggested that if he was contacted by such an object again, to try and cooperate with any being that might be on board and to keep to himself any conversation he might have with these beings. The incident was investigated by Major Laurence R. Leach, Jr., assistant director of operations of 2578 Air Base Squadron, Ellington AFB. Major Leach concluded that after his investigation, he could not arrive at any explanation for the unusual incident. "Both officers appeared to be intelligent, mature, level-headed and persons capable of sound judgment and reasoning. Chief Deputy Sheriff McCoy holds a responsible position in the department requiring the supervision of over 42 personnel," the Major concluded.

And then there was the fantastic experience of Betty Valine on October 4. Betty was outside at night with her 12-year-old son when they observed a large UFO, complete with a crew of three. According to Mrs. Valine, the object was round, like a plate and had a dome on top. She

said she could see three people at its windows. Robbie was the first to see the object over Rio Vista, California. It was in the glare of a searchlight and was in view a short time. Mrs. Valine said that when she first sighted the object "it looked as if it were moving toward earth, but I don't know about the speed. It looked pretty close to me." Nobody, including the Air Force, could or would explain Mrs. Valine's experience, and she never has been known to be prone to imaginings. On September 21, two teenagers fired several shots at a large UFO near Rio Vista.

"I was going to knock one over and try to grab it, but then I got scared." That's why James Townsend, 19, radio announcer for station KEYL in Long Prairie, Minnesota didn't bring back one of the "things" he says he encountered on a highway near Long Prairie on October 23. Townsend said the creatures resembled tin cans, stood on tripod legs and had two "arms" about the size of matchsticks projecting from their sides. Three of the "things" were standing under a "rocket ship" when he first spotted them. "It was about 7:15 p.m. and I was coming back from Little Falls on Hwy. 27 when I rounded a bend. All of a sudden my engine stopped, my lights went out and my radio stopped playing. I let the car coast and then I put on the brakes because I saw this thing in the center of the highway. It was like a rocket ship. It was about 30 feet tall and about 10 feet in diameter. It was sitting on fins. Then I saw them. They were standing in a big circle of light under the ship. I jumped out of my car and was going to try to knock one over but then they came at me. They came right up to the car. There were three of them. They had no eyes or anything. Just those tripod legs and those matchstick arms. They were like tin cans. The size of a beer can. I was going to grab one but then I figured that if they could stop my car and put out my lights they could do something awful to me. So we just stood there looking at each other and then they turned around and scooted under the ship. The light was so bright I didn't see where they went. Then there was a high pitched humming sound and the ship took off straight up. It went up about a quarter of a mile, stopped for a moment and then disappeared. When the light on the bottom went out after it was in the air, my car radio and lights came on--and my engine started without having to touch the starter. I drove 90 miles an hour back to Long Prairie to report what I saw, but I wondered if people would believe me. I was sure of two things--the rocket (it towered above the trees along the road) was a spaceship of some kind and the three objects that came out of it were creatures like nothing else in the animal world I have ever seen. They definitely were not people as I know them." The landing site was investigated by Long Prairie Police Officer Lavern Lubitz. "The only thing we found were three strips of an oil-like substance on the road. They were about a yard long and four inches apart, all parallel with the road. I don't know what they were but I've looked at a lot of roads and never saw anything like them before." Three youths who had been hunting coons in the same area reported seeing "a light in the sky" at the same time Townsend said the object took off.

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On October 28, Townsend reported he had not been contacted by the Air Force. He said the Air Force had called his parents at Coon Rapids, Minnesota and said for them not to talk about their son's experience-- "TO KEEP THE LID ON." Since Townsend's experience, other sightings on the night of October 23 have been reported throughout Central Minnesota. Several hunters in the Long Prairie area claimed to have seen a strong light above them that lit up the ground all around them. Other hunters reported seeing a lighted object circle around and around over their farm. A housewife in the area claims she heard a loud hissing sound as if a fast-moving object passed over her house. Three Sauk Rapids persons reported seeing a UFO about 9:15 p.m. "It appeared as a bright light, shaded from orange to white in color. We couldn't distinguish a shape, just a bright light. Sometimes the trees got in the way, it was so low." An object similar to Townsend's was seen hovering over a home in Seattle several months ago. On October 6, a long silver object with "fins on the bottom" streaked across the sky above Mt. George near Napa, California. An unidentified housewife reported seeing the object fly about 1,000 feet above Mt. George, then turned and came back over the same general area. The object made a sound like rushing wind.

Censorship of UFO news is not confined to the United States. On September 16, a large UFO landed on a main highway near Pretoria, South Africa. Two patrolling police officers reported seeing the object, about 30 feet in diameter, shortly after midnight. One of them, Koos de Klerk, said the shiny copper-colored object resembled a giant spinning top. As the two men approached the object, it took off silently at great speed with flames shooting out of its underside. Scientists who examined the spot where the object landed found a six-foot-wide section of the tarred road had been badly burned. Grass on either side of the highway was scorched. The next day, the lid of censorship came down. In a carefully-worded press statement, the news medias were told that: "At the request of the police, three research officers of the C.S.I.R. inspected the scene where the witnesses said the incident had taken place. It is the opinion of the officials concerned that the dark stains and heat marks on the tarmac could have been caused by the ignition of an inflammable liquid--such as petrol. There were no signs of any blast effects such as could be caused by a rocket motor or jet exhaust. In view of the above, the C.S.I.R. has, at this stage, nothing further to contribute towards explaining the observed phenomenon and is not in a position to speculate on what created the phenomenon." Senior police officials have issued firm instructions to all policemen at Silverton police station not to talk about the sighting. One official, when asked to comment, burst out laughing. The two officers who witnessed the landing are stationed at the Silverton police station. On the afternoon that the press statement was released, it was disclosed by Mr. & Mrs. D.J. Voster that they sighted a large UFO hovering over Silverton on September 15, about eight hours before the landing took place.

Recently, N.I.C.A.P. endorsed the claim of Joao de Freitas Guimaraes, 55--a wealthy, respected professor of Roman Law at Santos' Catholic University, Brazil--that he had experienced contact with beings from another world. Let's go back to the summer of 1956 for a short summary of the professors experience. One warm night, the professor was out for a walk on the beach at Sao Sebastiao when a huge disc-shaped craft--about 60 feet in diameter--landed on the beach. The disc was about 18 feet high, and rested on a pawnshop-type landing gear of three balls. Two 6-foot-tall men got out of the disc, and Guimaraes tried to communicate in English, French, Spanish and Italian without success. Then the two visitors communicated with him through telepathy and invited him aboard. The two men had blond hair, green eyes and were wearing yellow shoes. The

professor entered the disc, which immediately took off. An hour later the disc landed back on the beach and the professor departed from the spacecraft. For nearly a year the professor kept his experience a secret. After the story leaked out, reporters besieged the professor, and the Brazilian Air Force put a fighter cover over the rendezvous beach. The professor went on television but refused to elaborate on his telepathic talk with the occupants of the spacecraft. Guimaraes told reporters "It is wiser not to divulge it. The authorities know all the details." Summarized his faculty dean: "Everyone is entitled to his own convictions, but nobody can make me believe Guimaraes is a liar or insane." The UFOs continue their landings in South America. On August 14, Joao Do Rio was fishing near Sao Paulo, Brazil when he saw a small being about 28 inches tall with large luminous eyes. In perfect Portuguese, he told Joao he was from another world, a crewman from a flying object. As proof of his visit he handed Joao a piece of "unearthly" metal. The metal is now in the hands of the National Railway wagon factory at Cruzeiro where Joao is employed. In the past, many Ufologists have speculated that the beings controlling the UFOs might consist of many strange forms built around the element silicon instead of carbon as on earth. Dr. Cyril Ponnampertuma of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Ames Research Center at Moffett Field, California recently expressed the belief that "if life exists elsewhere, it will be very similar to ours, at least chemically."

Since the UFO landing at Cherry Creek, New York on August 19, there has been considerable activity in that area of New York state. On August 23, Terry Mara, 14, Donald Stormer, 14, Louis Howard, 16, and Leon Johnson, 69, saw a glowing object sitting on the ground near Kiantone. The four said they saw the object rotate on the ground behind the barn, then rise and disappear into the sky. The object was described as "a brilliant light, bluish-silver in color, forming an arc 20 feet in size." Mrs. Stormer said the object was also seen on their property about 9 p.m., August 21. About 9:30 the same night, Richard Butcher, 25, Harold Butcher, 16, and John Butcher, 11, spotted a large UFO, surrounded by a yellow light, near South Dayton. They said it seemed to rise out of a wooded area, hover and disappear. On the following night, a brilliant UFO was seen at Jamestown by Kenneth Johnson, 11, Mrs. Harold Nelson and her two sons, Gary, 12, and Kevin, 11. "It was a large, bright light, falling not too rapidly toward the ground. It appeared it was traveling toward Kiantone." On August 25, Melissa Frank and Marie Conti, both 13-years-old, observed another UFO over Jamestown. Miss Frank said "it was big and round and silver in color with white lights." South Dayton reported another visitation on August 31. Gladys Smith, 54, Loretta Noble, 31, Lynn Smith, 11, and his brother, Keith, 10, sighted a large UFO, reddish-orange in color. The boys claimed the reflection hurt their eyes. The Smith woman said that as it grew smaller it became bright blue in color. Daniel Abers and his wife, Bernita, observed a large UFO three times in less than an hour near Jamestown on September 23. At one time, the object--which Mr. Abers described as round and a dingy yellow in color --appeared to be hovering, almost motionless, close to the ground.

There has been a marked increase in the number of low-level flights by the small, monitoring UFOs--better known as the snoopers. On August 10, Mrs. Herb Johnson, of Woodinville, Washington observed a small, round glowing object about 11 p.m. near Woodinville. It appeared to be about 18 inches across and glowed like a light bulb. Speeds ranged from about 10-15 miles per hour to extremely fast. Mrs. Johnson said the brightly glowing object was coming "right at me about 20 feet in the air. When I turned off 228th the object took an abrupt turn and crossed the road until it was directly above my car. It wasn't until I rolled the window down and looked outside that it sped away. The object went straight up in the air

and was out of sight in a split second." When the UFO hovered over her car Mrs. Johnson looked up and saw that the object was "glowing down" like it was going to land. Then she said she saw "a kind of X-shaped section near the back. It appeared that this is what powered the object." During the week of August 22, a resident of Wausau, Wisconsin experienced a close approach by a small UFO. "It flew so close that when we were standing by a tree we could see the reflection of the branches on the ground. It smelled like burning sulphur, and was about 17 by 20 inches in diameter." The woman did not want to be identified. Bob Iverson, 13, watched a snooper in action on September 22 at Ward Lake near Ketchikan, Alaska. Bob was the only one who saw the disc-shaped object that sailed past the Three C's campground but, his parents, his brother and a neighbor boy heard it. Bob described the UFO as small, about six or eight inches in diameter, and shaped like a discus, with convex top and bottom. It was of glittering, shiny metal, and moved along about 12 feet above the ground. It came within 15 feet of where he was standing, and moved deliberately. It traveled along the roadway as he stood in amazement, then disappeared among the trees toward the lake. His parents and the other two boys agreed about the sound. It was like a whirring or whizzing sound, not shrill or screaming, but like a whip lashing through the air. The sound seemed to fill the air--to be "omni-directional." A Bexley, Ohio woman who refused to give her name "because everyone will think I'm crazy," said a small disc-shaped object not only came close to her house, it landed and took off in her back yard on October 16. She described the UFO as "a perfectly round little disc, glowing with a yellow-white light."

Strange things reported in the sky over Warminster, England have prompted Bernard Harfield to recall an unusual experience on the road north of Reading, England on August 14. Following another car along the road, Harfield was aware of a series of repetitive noises which appeared to be connected with the side or wheels of the car. Both he and the other driver pulled up and the other driver told him it sounded as if someone was tapping on his roof. As they talked they both heard the noise further off. "Weird cracking sounds," and reports of UFOs have been reported from Warminster since December 25, 1964. More than 100 persons who live on the outskirts of Warminster said they were awakened suddenly by a "tremendous explosion" at 1:55 a.m. on September 7. About 30 residents, mostly men, ventured out in their nightcloths and reported seeing a 200-foot-high orange colored mushroom of smoke, with a glowing core in its center rise into the air. Residents who huddled under the safety of their bedcovers, trying to quiet screaming children, reported that an orange light flooded their rooms "changing night to day." Dozens of windows were reported shattered by the blast. One of the residents, Bill Curtis, said "Our house was like a ship rocking in a big sea." Residents who claim to have seen the "thing" say that it lights up, emits weird noises, attacks with "savage soundwaves" and described it as long and cigar-shaped and capable of hovering. On September 12, Mrs. Eleanor Blesener, wife of Seaside, Oregon police officer Duane Blesener, was awakened about 1 a.m. by "a strange noise followed by a propellor-like sound that seemed to be going off into the distance--but there was nothing in sight," Mrs. Blesener said. The incident happened not once but twice that night. The second time was after Officer Blesener arrived home. He said: "It was a sound like I've never heard before."

They're still seeing things in the skies over Mexico. At Coatzacoalcos, 100 miles southeast of Veracruz, a 14-year-old girl was reported to have fled screaming as a 24 foot diameter UFO hovered over her, whistling gently, at a height of 30 feet. The girl, her father and a policeman were among many local residents who described the object as having a ring of glowing lights slung below it, and who claimed after this daytime visit-

ation that it flew over the town again that same night. One of the most recent and talked about cases is that which had one of the UFOs hovering above the city's international airport. Control tower operators swore it shed red, white, and blue light, sometimes adding a bit of yellow. Traffic in downtown Mexico City practically came to a standstill by what observatory officials claim was a mild earthquake, but which, in the minds of many, was the result of an approaching UFO many swore they observed flying over the area at that time. Cuernavaca, the tropical resort town, suffered three consecutive power blackouts in the space of one hour. Electric company officials were unable to account for the phenomenon. UFOs were reported over the area at the time. Mexican's aren't the only people seeing objects over Mexico. Mr. Ray Kervin--Aero-Space Editor for The Gazette in Montreal, Canada--gives this account of his observations: "After dinner on September 25, we were sitting in the Maya Bar of the Hilton near the big glass door. As the clock moved past 7:30 the captain and his headwaiter kept coming around to take a look at the sky. 'What do you think they're looking for,' said my wife who is curious about a lot of things. 'Oh, flying objects I suppose,' I said. The captain heard me. 'Si, senor,' he said, 'and there he is.' He pointed to a position in the sky above and to the left of another hotel. We got up to look while the captain went across the lobby to the restaurant to borrow a short telescope, kept handy for just this purpose. There it was, hanging motionless in the sky like a too-bright star for about 20 minutes. Then it disappeared as though it had sped away from us at lightning speed. The captain had consolation. 'He'll be back,' he said. 'He always makes two or more visits, always between 7:30 and 8:30.' 'You seem to be quite used to this,' I said. 'You have seen this before?' 'Many times, senor,' he said, 'around Mexico City, he has appeared every night, in different positions, for 30 nights.' The captain was right about the reappearance. The UFO suddenly appeared again, this time lower and to the right of the hotel. Another quarter hour and it disappeared for the night, as suddenly as the first time.

"On September 29, the UFO appeared again, in the same area of the sky, but in three different positions, during the 7:30-8:30 period. I got my hands on the glass for awhile this time and saw a flat disc, seemingly illuminated from the inside but much less bright than the smaller view gained by the naked eye. It looked like the photo which was published in El Diario the next day. The Diario story makes the Kervin's look like pikers, with their one little UFO. 'Dozens' were seen around the city that night, says Diario, and 'a large number of people, skeptical or incredulous before, saw objective and indubitable proof that flying objects are a reality.'" Two days before, a respected architect in Narvarte County reported he saw a "platillo" (UFO) hovering just above ground not more than 13 meters--40 feet--away. Some of this activity is spilling over the border into California. On September 23, two Heber women reported sighting a flying object about 6:30 p.m. which hovered over a telephone pole. The Mexicali, Mexico newspaper La Voz de la Frontera said its switchboards were clogged with telephone calls on September 29 between 8:15 and 9 p.m. by persons seeking information on an object hovering over Brawley, California that moved southward cross the Mexicali Valley. The next day, a large UFO was sighted hovering over El Centro, California. A Senor Lemus and a Senora Arguelles said they saw the same object in the sky from Arguelles' ranch near Heber. The object was a luminous yellow and red, rather hazy, but that it hovered over El Centro before moving rapidly out of sight to the west. It's possible that the UFOs are making a close study of the earth's crust in Mexico. It's no secret that earthquake activity in Mexico has been increasing in recent years--especially in and around Mexico City. On November 19, the long-dormant Popocatepetl volcano, 45 miles southeast of Mexico City, began belching clouds of smoke. Keep an eye on this area of the planet.

Three photographs of a UFO, taken August 3 near Santa Ana, California by Rex Heflin, 37, an Orange County highway investigator, were officially branded by the Air Force as a fake on October 27. Major Hector Quintanella, director of the Air Force's Project Blue Book unit said: "We have classified it as a photographic hoax on the basis of extensive photographic analysis. Evaluation of the three photographs of an alleged UFO taken by Rex Heflin of Santa Ana is based on enlargements made from copies of the original prints. The camera was probably focused on a set distance and not on infinity, as the terrain background was blurred on all three photographs. The center white strip on the road, and the object, appeared to have the same sharp image. Therefore, it is believed that the object was on the same plane as the center white strip, and could not possibly be the size reported by Heflin. Using the width of the road in the photograph as a measurement factor, the size of the object was estimated to be "approximately one to three feet in diameter, and 15 to 20 feet above ground." "It comes as no surprise to me," Heflin said. "The Air Force has a policy of insulting every citizen who presents evidence they can't or won't explain." When the three photographs were published, Heflin said he was prepared to submit to a lie-detector test to prove their authenticity. I strongly suggest that such a test be held for both Rex Heflin and Major Hector Quintanella by the Santa Ana police department.

On August 21, James R. Peek, 47, photographed three UFOs over Cape Kennedy shortly after the launching of Gemini 5. Peek, a senior engineering laboratory technician, optics expert, and experienced amateur photographer, says he saw an object traveling at very high speed moving in a westerly direction in the vicinity of the launch area. "It looked like a sliver of brilliant green phosphorescent light just east of the contrail left by the rocket. It made a sort of S-turn in and around the contrail, became elliptical in shape as it turned, then changed into a clearly defined disc." Peek took three pictures with his 35mm camera and 135mm lens attachment. His first shot shows a light green blur across the transparency, but the second shows not one object, but three of them. Peek said the brilliance of the objects was not due to reflected sunlight, but came from the objects themselves. Peek saw only one object when he took the pictures. On August 2, photographer George Goodson of the Junction City, Kansas Daily Union took a picture of a sky diver parachuting to the ground. When the film was developed, the photo showed eight black oval-shaped objects. Goodson said he took a close look at the print and said it was plain that the spots were not caused by any technical fault. "These things are in focus but there are no details," he said. During the week of October 3, Gary Gillis, photographer for the Daily Breeze at Redondo Beach, California photographed several earth-type bathing beauties. When the film was developed, the picture showed a bright light moving across a clear sky. Gillis saw nothing while shooting the pictures. John Slivkoff, a student at George Fox College at Newberg, Oregon photographed a group of students playing football on October 12. When the film was developed the picture showed a dark, disc-shaped object hovering over the football field. No one noticed the object in the sky. An enlargement of the picture shows circular markings or portholes.

The Air Force is up to its old tricks again. One of its scientific advisers on UFOs, Dr. J. Allen Hynek, a Northwestern University astronomer said on November 7 that "UFOs exist as reports. This is all they are--reports. There seems to be a great fad to jump to the conclusion that just because something is unidentified, it must be the product of some other civilization. Any scientist would admit this is possible, but the probability is extremely small. What seriously puzzles me is that the reports persist, with the Air Force getting better than one UFO report a day--and not from crackpots, but solid citizens--even technically trained

men." Hynek said there is no pattern to the types or sources of sightings, which is a bare-faced lie. Hynek went on to say that "Some of the reports are utterly fantastic. You would think we must have a very sick society at times; but I have to rule out hoax in most cases because of the people who make the reports. I think it might be more to the point to study the people who make them than to study the reports themselves. I have recommended to the Air Force that a panel, including sociologists and psychologists, be set up to look into the growth of rumor--this new folklore of flying objects." I wonder if this study will include Air Force and airline pilots who report their sightings? In the future, N.I.C.A.P.'s policy will be: "TELL THE AIR FORCE NOTHING!" Even the Russians are getting into the act. Moscow radio recently stated that "mysterious objects in the sky are a myth created by the Pentagon for fanning the war feeling. An unexplained danger alarms people more than a realized threat. And if a supernatural danger is mentioned daily in the press and over the radio, it might be that even a sober person would see mysterious things in the sky." One of the stranger aspects about the UFO saga is when one authority knocks it on the head, another gives it credence. On October 18, N.E. Rowe, vice-president of engineering at the deHavilland Aircraft Company of Canada described his UFO sighting to the Canadian Aeronautics and Space Institute and its U.S. counterpart, the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics. Said Mr. Rowe: "I have always had a feeling there is something in this business of unidentified flying objects but when I was on holiday in England, I saw something that made me feel very much more certain...But if these are vehicles being flown and navigated away out in space then we clearly have a great deal to learn and there is still plenty to do in aeronautics."

On August 11, twenty five UFOs were sighted over Port Huron, Michigan. Jim Kipp, newscaster for radio station WTHH said he observed the objects at 1 a.m. On the following night Deputy Sheriff's, city policemen and groups of people in Port Huron watched a spherical object hovering over Lake Huron for 2-1/2 hours. At 3:30 in the afternoon on August 15, two Coast Guardmen sighted a large UFO over Portsmouth, Virginia. James Gilman and Claude Van Werry watched the object as it plunged out of the blue sky at high speed. The dull silver colored object--cylinder-shaped--stopped by a 340 foot tower of WYAH-TV. The object appeared to be 50 feet long and about 8 feet high. "It was not really hovering by the tower; it was just hanging there, stopped in the sky," Van Werry said. After hovering about 30 seconds, the UFO sped off and in a few seconds had disappeared. The next day, about 5:30 a.m., Steve Anderson, 17, was driving on U.S. 58 near Portsmouth. Suddenly, a silver cone-shaped object crossed the road about one-half mile in front of him. Anderson said his car stopped running, as did 10 other vehicles in the area. He said the cars were restarted without trouble about 30 seconds after they cut off. Anderson said the UFO was noiseless, had blue and red lights, was in a verticle position about 300 feet in the air and was about the size of the fuselage of a Piper Cub airplane. On September 27, Radney and Russ Trujillo, aged 12 and 14, respectively, sighted a "big silver disc" over Denver, Colorado. Two days later, the Denver area was shaken by 5 earthquakes.
