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PROPHETIC BLOOD

Joyous cries of the multitudes, ringing of bells and fire-works erupted from Naples, Italy recently at the announcement from the cathedral the blood of its patron, Saint Januarius, had liquified - a day late.

The blood of the martyred saint should have liquified on Saturday, May 1, according to tradition as it has usually done so since the middle of the 15th century. Whenever it fails to liquify at the traditional time (three times a year - the most prominent time being at the anniversary of his death, September 19) great calamity has befallen Naples. Even a delay such as was experienced this time is considered an ill omen.

After the blood's failure to liquify after hours of prayer on Saturday, Marcello Cardinal Mimmi, arch-bishop of Naples, urged the people to continue praying Sunday. The people assembled early in the morning at the cathedral, attending mass and continued praying. The more exitable even screaming for their patron saint to deliver them from evil and harm.

By 10:30 a.m. more than 10,000 weeping, praying people had gathered at the cathedral and continued to pray

until the evening announcement by Msgr. Guiseppe Cattano, custodian of the blood, that the blood had finally liquified.

St. Januarius (B. April 21, 272 - D. Sept. 19, 305) patron saint of Naples and, according to legend, bishop of Benevento, flourished towards the close of the 3rd century. On the outbreak of the persecution by Diocletian and Maximian, due to his tendencies towards the christian religion, he was brought to Nola to appear before Timotheus, governor of Campania. Here, according to history, he was forced to walk through a fiery furnace from which he emerged unharmed. Thrown to the lions, which were expected to tear him asunder, the beasts became docile. He was finally beheaded by the very judge he had previously healed of blindness.

The relics of the saint were cherished by the Neapolitans as a safeguard against eruptions of Mt. Vesuvius.

A pious matron is said to have caught his blood in two phials at his execution and these two phials are now preserved in a chapel in the south aisle of the cathedral and are said to liquify when they are brought near the head of the saint. It is a sign of good omen if the blood moves briskly in the phials and appears a clear red in color, while if this does not occur it is regarded as being a prophecy of ill omen to the country.

Only three times in the past has it failed to liquify on schedule before the prayers of the multitudes. In 1527 the failure was followed by bubonic plague that wiped out almost half of Naples' population. It again failed to liquify in 1884 and was followed by an epidemic of cholera. The last failure was in 1944 when Vesuvius erupted with such dire calamity.

A delay of several hours in 1940 was followed by Mussolini's disastrous declaration of war. And now this year with a delay of 24 hours in the liquifying of the blood of its Patron Saint, what does the future hold for Naples?

Are intelligences from other worlds visiting us? If so, what will this mean to the Earth and its people?

"It is important that we study flying saucers from the viewpoint that their coming need not be catastrophic," points out Carrol Mickey, assistant professor of sociology at SUU.

Supposing saucers were interplanetary, their pilots would be much farther advanced technologically than we. This means they might be able to destroy us at will. Hope for survival would lie in cooperation with our visitors. Fear of catastrophe could produce catastrophe.

Iowa has seen saucers! At 8:30 pm, January 20, 1951 Capt. Vinther investigated a "very bright light" above the Sioux City airport.

The light dived nearly head on at the plane, then passed silently and at great speed 200 feet above. The pilots wrenched their heads to keep it in sight. In that split second it had reversed and was flying parallel to them nearby.

The night was clear. "It was bigger than a B-29 and had a cigar shaped fuselage," they later reported. A small wing

was noticed. Neither an engine nor exhaust glow was visible. A white light appeared recessed in its bottom.

After a few seconds, the saucer lost altitude, passed under them, and disappeared. A civilian passenger confirmed their story.

Prof. John H. Russ has reason to believe saucers are real. Russ, head of the engineering drawing department at SU1, was fishing in Yellowstone Park in 1947 with two friends and an 11 year old boy. They were isolated from the sounds of civilization. Early one morning, a loud noise moved rapidly overhead. Rushing to a clearing, they glimpsed four saucers speeding faster than sound.

"I ran the wrong way and didn't see them," Russ laments. "The noise was like the rush of air created when 75 or 100 ducks land on a lake." One of the others said the terrific rush of air resembled a hurricane in a ship's rigging.

A few minutes later, the saucers returned, headed at a 90-degree angle to the earlier flight. Again Russ didn't spy them, but learned they resembled two inverted soup dishes. Their color was that of a newly-minted half dollar. No vapor trail was visible. There was no exhaust or motor noise. The ships appeared farther away later. They flew in formation each time.

"Those weren't light reflections!" Russ declares.

Most saucer reports can be explained by known natural phenomena. Many scientists are likely to do this. One of their theories involves light reflections.

"It can be assumed that any 'saucer' reported by only one person or group of persons must be a spot of reflected light of some sort," contends C. C. Wylie, SU's noted meteorologist. Many other phenomena, such as birds, balloons, airplanes, or celestial bodies are called "saucers".

Radar is full of "bugs" and picks up certain light reflections. However, Wylie admits that if two or three sets show the same blip, it would most probably be a solid object.

Saucers flew over Washington, D. C. nightly from July 19 until August 4, 1952. They eluded pursuers. At least once, a radar triangulation was obtained on them at a time when the temperature inversion in the air was too small to cause reflections. Ground observers spotted them, too.

Saucers have been spotted all over the globe, and governments in all parts of the world are concerned about them. Allied military leaders will meet this summer to discuss the disks, rumor has it.

What are those green fireballs? Thousands of persons have been amazed by the huge things. Dr. Lincoln La Paz, leading meteorologist, declares fireballs are not meteors.

Because of their different shade of green, lack of noise, disregard for gravity, and because they don't explode, as meteors do.

Carrol Mickey, quoted earlier, thinks contact with beings from other worlds would be "extremely interesting from many angles."

"People have become used to scientific developments and are increasingly taking them in their stride," he reports. Our calm reception of the h-bomb news is an example. What are prospects of interplanetary war? "We are disposed to be antagonistic toward anything strange," Mickey regrets, but hastens to add that this doesn't necessarily imply viciousness or hostility on our part.

"Neither Protestants nor Catholics need fear going against church doctrine in accepting the possibility of life on other planets," Dr. Lampe of the SUI school of religion, assures church-goers. He thinks contact with space men would make religion more interesting, and that the clergy would accept new facts of religion revealed by space visitors. However, new and conflicting knowledge might "knock the props" from under someone who had long clung to orthodox beliefs.

John Anderson, of Iowa City, a WW II pilot and member of the air reserve, relates the experience of a fellow

war prisoner that led to his crash and capture. He flew into a 40-foot-wide shaft of shadow between the vicinity of the sun and the ground. Upon entering the shaft, all electrical equipment in the plane failed, and it crashed.

Anderson saw an aerial "something" on Sept. 21, 1953. About 8:30 p.m., he glanced at the sky near Mercy Hospital. He saw a condensation trail over the moon that led behind a tree. Soon, from behind the tree, a star-like thing appeared. The strange object was one and a half times the size of Jupiter at that season.

"It was the biggest and brightest thing in the sky", he recalls.

After 15 or 20 seconds, it diminished in size as it disappeared, changing slowly from blue-white to pale pink. Because it vanished high above the horizon, Anderson calculated it was 12 to 15 miles high. He proved it was not a plane, and it was going too slowly for a meteor. Nevertheless, when he called Wylie about it, the professor stated flatly, "That was a meteor".

The implications of what one Alaskan flyer told Anderson are jolting. Anderson refuses to identify his informant, and the reader will know him only as "X". This story is twice-told, and could be exaggerated - but only slightly.

X claims Mantell was only the first one to be killed

while chasing UFO's. (he himself chased them often, but never got close to one.)

While in pursuit of a UFO, a pilot radioed back, "I'm going to open fire." Just then, ground observers were startled as his plane disintegrated. Very similar mishaps occurred at other times.

Base intelligence officers warned pilots to make no hostile actions when pursuing saucers. Fliers were admonished to keep saying into their mikes, "I am friendly. I will not fire." No one doing this was harmed.

Admitting the Ground Observers Corps can be of service to defense in certain cities at certain times, Anderson contends, "The GOC could do little to prevent attack. It is set up primarily for observation of UFO's.

The May issue of True magazine carries an article by capt Edward Ruppelt, who was in charge of Project Blue Book from 1951 to 1953. He concludes they are either interplanetary or do not exist, but there is not enough evidence for either opinion.

Earth's future may hinge upon the implication of a positive answer to this question: Are intelligences from other worlds visiting us?





RADIO AND SAUCERS

Much has been stated recently of "contacts" by radio with the saucers, and this article, we hasten to add, is not intended to infer any truth or doubt of these statements. This writer has personal knowledge of many strange and unusual "messages" heard by continuous wave transmission on the radio. The reason for not calling it "international morse code", is that this writer cannot conceive of many variations in continuous wave transmission that would not consist of the various dots and dashes that make up this earth's international morse code.

While these "messages" may consist of variously arranged dots and dashes, it does not necessitate that they are of a code of earthly origin. True, these "messages" have been interpreted by some to make sense in international morse code, though there is always the accompanying statement that parts of the messages were coming too fast to copy.

Much attention was given the message heard on 405 kc to "contact Alesandro Stockvet of Chicago". We do not know the origin of the message nor its intended destination, however upon checking in Chicago no such person or name was found.

Rolph Telano, well known to B. S. R. A. readers, writes the following possible explanation: "The messages are actually point-to-point messages intended for certain persons on this planet who are working with the operators of the flying disc - mostly their own people whom they have put here to live among the people of this planet, and act as observers. A directory check would be useless because they are not known among the Earthlings by the same name as that in the message. In most cases, the name mentioned is the actual name of the person, but it is often a name which would sound strange to the people here, so they assume one which will not arouse so much curiosity.

"The particular band was chosen because it is not as much used as others, and it is thus less likely that others would hear the messages. As an extra precaution, they are also usually coded. The 'CW' is not actually such, but merely a tape recorded message which happens to sound like it.

"The transmission is on a rather wide band (in frequency), but on a quite narrow band as to direction, being beamed directly to the person whom they wish to contact. If a radio set happened to be directly on the beam, it would be quite likely to pick up the message even if it was turned off, as it is quite possible for the voice coil of the speaker to

pick it up. by induction. Ordinarily however, the set is working on the fringe of the beam, and must be turned on and tuned somewhere near the right frequency."

We agree that the coil of the speaker could pick this code up by induction, however, there would have to be a cold solder joint somewhere in the circuit to act as a rectifier

Scientists have recently been interested in the high frequency radio signals being received from sources from outer space. many such signals have been found to be originating from "radio stars" which are actually clouds of hydrogen gas that exist in the vast spaces between the stars in our own galaxy. However there are many signals originating from space where no known stars or suns have been discovered.

Karl G. Jansky, of Bell Telephone Laboratories was the first man to detect radio signals originating from the moon. Where-as radio signals originating from the earth would be detected as originating above the earths surface, these moon signals have been detected as originating from beneath the surface of the moon. This would be a natural phenomenon to expect from a satellite with little or no atmosphere where its inhabitants, to exist, would have to live underground to

escape the varying temperature extremes that must necessarily occur on our "green cheese" satellite.

Recent developments in radio telescopes and the completion of the new Harvard radio telescope will no doubt help to determine if these radio signals are of an artificial source and even eventually may bring about any actual radio contact with outer space.

Upon writing the Federal Communications Commission in reference to the many statements being made as to government suppression of radio contact with Saucers and the actual radio signals the following letter was recently received and is herewith reproduced in its entirety:
