


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
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


During the coming decade computers will create even more options for life and leisure

Looking '80s into the 80s

- Buy a thrill ride to the edge of outer space.
- Go to work without leaving home.
- Plot your vacation from your living room computer—checking tourist density, ocean temperature, nightclub entertainment, restaurant menus—and make all your reservations by push button.
- Going out Saturday night? Don't worry about the kids. A robot will baby-sit.

The Eighties are here. The technology is in place—designed, tested and ready for use—to make these years exciting and challenging. "We're on the verge of an information revolution," says Tom Mandel, policy analyst for Stanford Research Institute International. "There will be as profound a change in our lives as

the automobile caused—only it'll happen much faster."

Mandel is one of a dozen planners, theorists and futurists who contributed ideas for this report on what's in store for most of us in the Eighties and beyond. His company, S.R.I. of Menlo Park, Calif., is not alone in the future-prediction business. Literally hundreds of reputable research organizations are involved in that task in one way or another, analyzing data of the present and the past to forecast the future. "We're not terribly prepared for what's ahead," says Mandel. "The message of the Eighties is arm yourself, learn how to get information and make choices."

It's going to take money to buy the hardware for this new age of options. Education—and re-education for pre-

1980 adults—in the use of computers is essential. Those without the means of access to information will be the new proletariat, the knowledge-poor.

The Eighties information era comes to us via the microprocessor—the brain on a chip. This little bit of Seventies technology calculates and manipulates information faster than whole computer rooms of 25 years ago. Computers that were as big as cars now fit into cars, as well as living rooms and classrooms. In the computerized Eighties you will be awakened by a robot, wear a phone on your wrist, drive your car on an electric trolley line, monitor your health, watch international TV, and settle back into bed again, safe in the knowledge that a robot is guarding the house.

Housing

Where will your house be?

Underground, advises Dr. Helmut Landsberg, researcher into urban environment and climate fluctuations. "The caveman was hellishly smart," says the University of Maryland professor. "He was never too hot or cold."

Burrowing in offers natural protection against nature's violence. Tornadoes and hurricanes pass over rather than rip apart. A "catacomb" of dwellings could replace the "neighborhood." But, says Charles Schwing, president of the American Institute of Architects, "I rather doubt we'll go completely underground. Mankind doesn't want to live like a mole."

Those who think burial comes soon enough in life may look for compromise housing solutions other than going underground. Like saying good-bye to the American dream: a big white house in the suburbs and a little land.

"With 1.7 kids, families will move to the cities," says Joseph Coates, a researcher formerly with the U.S. Congressional Office of Technology Assessment, a research group for Congressional committees.

In fact, cities are going to come to the suburbs, according to James Shuster of Framingham State College in Massachusetts. "There will be a push to bring city services to the suburbs. You'll be able to live there without ever going to the city."

Nationwide, population shifts will continue on a large scale: New York to Florida, Pennsylvania to California, Ohio to Arizona. But while cities lose in numbers, they will gain in the number of wealthy people who live there. "Forty-eight percent of all families in the U.S. are two-income families," says Coates, who now runs his own futurist research firm in Washington. "There will be an explosion of prosperity among these families. They'll move to the city, and it will be the city's renaissance."

Families fleeing the suburbs will have to forsake space for location. Forget a living room, dining room, bedroom, den. Knock out partitions. Put the mattresses in a loft and the dining table on wheels. Create a con-

versation pit. *Voilà*—the illusion of space where there is little—the "Great Room" of the Eighties.

Robots

No matter what size the living space, there will be room for that space-age marvel, the robot. "Companion" is not as cute as Artoo-Deetoo and he won't win your heart like the bashful hero of *Star Wars*. But he has one advantage over his celluloid counterpart: You can buy him today for \$18,995. Quasar Industries Inc. of Rutherford, N.J., introduced the first home robot last year. According to Mark Ladd, administrative assistant to the president, Companion:

- answers the telephone and takes messages;
- plays grid games such as chess and checkers;
- monitors all doors and windows against intrusion;
- senses smoke;
- dials the police or fire department automatically after determining trouble;
- opens the door at the sound of your voice whether you are inside or out.

But mostly, Companion is just that—a friend in the house, a kind of space-age pet who never needs to be walked. In fact, Companion can't walk. The 5-foot, 2-inch, 200-pound conical robot stays put on installation. That immobility is no drawback if Companion is serving as a restaurant maitre d', hotel doorman or assembly-line worker. But clearly,

Americans think of robots as fully mobile, and that's what Quasar is working toward.

"The company was founded 12 years ago by a husband and wife dedicated to being the first to design a totally mobile household computer," says Ladd. "Right now we have a robot capable of moving, but we have to refine it before we can safely put it in a house."


The Companion of the future will be the complete housewife or house-husband, according to Ladd. He will vacuum, wash, carry heavy objects, cut the grass and maybe cook your steak. He'll be the perfect party host, answering the door, taking coats, serving drinks, playing games—even letting the guests win now and again.

Companion II will be a playmate for the kids by day, and at night, a baby-sitter programmed with your voice to soothe your child to sleep. And even while his charge sleeps, the robot won't: He will monitor the child's vital signs.

Entertainment

Whether you choose to live underground or in a skyscraper, there will be little reason to leave home for entertainment in the Eighties. One hundred years ago the best choice you had was a good book or good conversation. The proliferation of choices for home entertainment will tax the most decisive of us.

Venture into the entertainment room of the Eighties and you can dial a British sit-com or a Broadway play;





scan the day's headline news stories or closing stock quotations; video-shop through the classifieds; or project your favorite X-rated film on a giant screen.

Television will remain the cornerstone of the home. But S.R.I.'s Mandel believes, "We are fast approaching the end of broadcast TV as we know it." And we know TV now as the "mass media aimed at everybody, the lowest common denominator."

Dr. David L. Fishman of Arthur D. Little consulting firm in Cambridge, Mass., sees "a lessening desire to see the same program at the same time as everyone else...." Choice is what Americans want and choice they'll get as the interlocking systems of television hardware move into the home. "The Box" won't look so radically different, but what goes in and what comes out will change the viewer from a passive consumer of network shows to a video participant—without leaving his easy chair.

Within four years, high-fidelity stereophonic audio will join large screen TV to surround a person in sound while he watches almost life-size figures. Advances by inventor Henry Kloss and others should bring down the cost of a 6½-foot projection system to about \$2,500 while doubling picture brightness so room lights won't need to be dimmed.

Videodisc players will be on the market. Discs looking like an LP record will be played on a machine

with the size and look of a record player. But the needle in this case picks up both audio and video. Today you go to a record store to buy your favorite opera or show soundtrack. Tomorrow you'll go to a videodisc store and get the sight and sound experience at a mass-produced price. Choose "A Chorus Line," the Super Bowl or Kiss Live in Concert—the selection will be limited only by demand and government regulations on who can sell what to whom.

Nightly news shows sent afternoon newspapers reeling in the Seventies, and computers may soon deliver the knockout punch. No more pacing the porch waiting for the sports section while your paperboy loses a few quarters at the local pinball parlor. Up-to-the-minute news is at your fingertips under the Teletext system launched five years ago in England and being tested now in St. Louis.

"Teletext is a one-way transmission from a TV station to the home over regular TV during an unused part of the signal," explains Stuart J. Lipoff, electronics specialist for Arthur D. Little. "News Flash" over your regular program alerts you to an important story. You tune in the story by pressing your computer keyboard. What you read will be selected just as it is now in a newspaper, except that you'll see it minutes after an event happens and seconds after the story is written.

Computer-TV games, born in the

Seventies, will mature in the Eighties. Arthur D. Little president John Magee offers one example: "Rather than just reading a book about a famous historic event, you will use computer TV to project yourself into the key role." A computer detective story, for instance, will let you be the sleuth, directing the main character through the prescribed murder plot according to the options you choose, guessing at the end the guilty party.

There will be no need to go out and shop on a wintry evening in the Eighties: just turn on the computer. Viewdata in England, launched six years ago, allows "window-shopping" at home. Look at the ads, press a button and buy.

Work

If home is the new base for entertainment, it may also be the office of the future. Architect Schwing envisions "a mixed use of buildings—living in them, working in them, being entertained in them."

Coates figures "half of the work force is involved in information—handling it, storing it, regurgitating it, teaching it. Half of that group doesn't have to work at 'work.' Payment will be for work delivered, work done rather than time put in. It's almost back to the post-industrial piece work." He sees the computer moving out of its first toy stage to be the basis for a home work-study center. Mom and Pop work there during the day, the children study there at night.

Travel

Everyone will have an easier time arranging where he wanders. According to John Thomas, director of tourism at the Hudson Institute in Croton, N.Y.: "The travel agent will tell you not only what hotels are available, but he'll show you pictures of the actual rooms. He'll tell you surfing and fishing conditions or the weather virtually anywhere in the world." Then that information will come into the home. "It's quite possible," says Thomas, "that with a home computer you can punch in, 'What's the best way to get to Hawaii?' You

hit the appropriate button and bang, you get the information. You can reserve a car, plane and hotel room. You could even ask about tourist density. The computer might say, 'London's too crowded. Go to Paris.'"

Tourism pollution is a threat to many areas of the world, not to mention the sanity of the traveler on his precious two-week vacation. Coates says it's obvious "America is going to become the world's greatest tourist attraction." A.D.L. vice-president Martin Ernst believes "traveling will be much more unpleasant, so crowded...people will pay to make sure nothing goes wrong."

Destinations once denied the well-traveled tourist will be hot spots for the Eighties—China, Tibet, the outlands of Russia. The Trans-Siberian Railroad used to cater only to hunters. Now the genteel tourist is sightseeing along the way to Inner Mongolia. And adventure tours can take you in comfort to Antarctica or the Amazon.

When you've done it all on land, go skyward. Engineer Robert Truax is building Volksrocket X-17, a reusable space vehicle built mostly from junkyard scrap. The former Navy captain may just best NASA in the "shuttle-people-into-space race."

Former Apollo astronaut Philip Chapman, now with A.D.L., says, "I have no doubt someone will finagle a ride on the shuttle in the Eighties, but it won't be common until space industrialization begins."

Down-to-earth travel will continue to boom. "You could have televised multi-member conferences without leaving the office," Thomas says. "But there won't be a decrease in business travel because in reality it is pleasure. People like to travel."

And they'll spend to do it. "Presently about one in five discretionary dollars goes to travel. It will be one in three by 1990."

Thomas is bullish on that white elephant of the Seventies, the Supersonic Transport. "The Concorde was an economic disaster," Thomas admits. "But the new SST will cruise at 1,800-2,000 mph, be fuel efficient, carry about 500 passengers and be quiet. The first million-pound plane isn't far off either," he says. "By comparison, planes now weigh about three-quarters of a million. They'll have a carrying capacity of 1,000 and be great for China trips."

Automobiles

Although what the fuel of the future will be is conjecture, the automobile

is a safe bet as America's vehicle of choice through the Eighties. As to what that car will look like, though, there will be very little choice. "The ideal aerodynamic shape," says Donald Hurter, auto trends expert for A.D.L., "will become standard."

Ford touts the Probe I as that ideal shape, the ultimate and typical car of the late Eighties. It's a gasoline-powered, four-seat, four-cylinder car rated at 39 mpg. Chrysler's Electric Test Vehicle I goes 65 mph top speed with a 120-mile range at 35 mph. GM says that in five years battery technology will improve the electric car's range so that the American public will "go electric."


Coates foresees the electric car as "an in-town runabout." You'll drive the car to an electric line similar to a trolley line, hop on and use the power from a central station to get to work. The electric car combines freedom of choice with economy of rail."

Coates also predicts a booming age of car rental. "There will be a great change in the nature of car ownership, owing to maintenance, cost of the car, battery recharging."

Mandel isn't so positive about the coming of electric cars. "Nothing compares to the Japanese and German compacts, and now some made by U.S. manufacturers. Even if electric cars increase their range by 1985, it will be another five years before they are produced. It takes a decade to change the car industry. And there's no energy advantage to electric. The only thing is the option of fuel to make the car run."

Smaller cars, whatever their fuel, don't mean fewer options inside. As the auto makers downsize to the ideal shape, the competition shifts to the creature comforts and information systems inside. The forecast:

- Keyless entry: use of an ID punch code on the door to open the car;
- Computer games will keep the kids amused in the backseat;
- A trip planner will map your vacation route;
- An emergency warning system will guide you around accidents or bad weather;
- Gas gauge: When the road sign



reads "Next gas 45 miles," the computer will tell you how many miles of gas you have left. If it isn't enough, the computer will read out what speed to slow to in order to make it;

—Self-diagnosis: In the event of car trouble, the computer will tell you what's wrong. Even if you can't fix it yourself, you will be well-armed for a trip to the repair shop.

—Phone link: Gridding of communities and satellite beaming will allow long-distance phone transmission from your car all the way across the continent.

The intelligent car will be matched by a more intelligent roadway. Coates' research shows that "the average driver spends one day of each year waiting to make left-hand turns. We're going to see traffic signals responding to load rather than some arbitrary setting.

"But one of the most exciting things is the interactive highway," adds Coates. "Let's say you're driving past the Washington Monument. A signal imbedded in the road will be activated and you can hit a button in your car and get a two-minute spiel on the monument through your radio."

Food

Restaurants in the future will cater more to women. A.D.L. food specialist William Hale says, "Working women's income is growing more rapidly than men's. Women will have more to say about when and where to eat out. The décor of restaurants will change from the all-masculine steakhouse style to lighter designs," including brighter colors, more delicate furniture, smaller meal portions.

The cost of food you take home from the supermarket won't be any easier to bear, but the food itself will. You'll buy dehydrated foods and rehydrate them at home.

"More foods will be packaged for one person," forecasts Ernst. The family sit-down dinner will give way more than ever to eat-on-the-run meals by Mom, Pop and the kids. But the ultimate fast-food meal—a food

pill—won't make it in the Eighties. "We eat for a number of reasons, including sensual enjoyment," says Hale. "Pills just don't have that."

Feeding the world's billions will become easier as man better controls the harvest environment. "Growing in water is one way," Hale says. "Or you can build large facilities and control the temperature. And the deserts will be better utilized. But what would really feed the world is simply implementing good agricultural practices everywhere."

Carl Hodges directs the University of Arizona Environmental Research Lab in Tucson where shrimp grow in salt water tanks, melons under a plastic bubble in the desert and lettuce in a space air drum. According to Hodges, the earth's 2,000 square miles of desert will someday feed a billion people.


Education

"Schools will survive," says Dr. Christopher Dede, president of the Education Section, World Future Society. "But things that can be taught by machine—like reading and math, limited response courses—they'll be taught at home."

The new age of smart computers will lead the way to home education. "In the Eighties, computers will go beyond questions which involve simple choices," Dede says. "It was hard to foster creativity in a student when the computer could only list choices for an answer. The next generation computer will give an interesting situation and the student will respond. The computer will interpret that response and come back again with a question."

New "branch programming" carries the student through his workload according to how well he's doing. The computer measures the accuracy of an answer as well as the time taken to make it. If your kid's a genius, he won't have to sit through 10 more multiplication questions. It's on to the world of sines and cosines.

Computers could make books and magazines obsolete. Encyclopedias will be copied into them, as well as texts and work manuals. "You could



eliminate now all paper used in education and it wouldn't make much difference," Dede says. "Publishers may soon choose to print some books only on computers."

But video terminals are not so surely the heir apparent to the ballpoint pen and the quill. Simple reason: expense. While computers continue to be the anomaly of American business by dropping in price, what becomes affordable in the home will still be too costly for every school desk in the near future. Holographic projection, for instance, could bring the 3-D experience of the Grand Canyon or Gettysburg battlefield to New York City students. But as Dede says, it would cost less just to drive the students there.

Health

It also turns out it might be a little easier to stay healthy in the Eighties. Leukemia and hypertension may be cured; lungs and livers transplanted; exploratory surgery and blood samples tossed aside as old medicine. But the biggest revolution is not in

treatment or diagnosis of disease. It is prevention. This decade health care will come out of the doctor's office and into the community and home.

"There will be health stations equivalent to the old tuberculosis centers," predicts Dr. Charles A. Sanders, general director of The Massachusetts General Hospital. "People will come in and essentially have their oil and water checked."


Ultrasound will replace X-rays as the standard diagnostic tool. The cancer-detecting CATscanner heralds the age in which simply "by placing the patient under a machine, you get a diagnosis." And further along in the Eighties, diagnosis and treatment will fall to the individual in his home, and that means more health hardware at his disposal than just a simple thermometer. Sanders foresees a biofeedback device to help people control their heartbeat, and perhaps a pulse meter to stimulate certain nerves and block pain sensations going to the brain from other nerves. And a general metabolic indicator could tell if your metabolic state is good, bad or otherwise for the day.

When the reading is positive, you're at your best to win friends and influence people. And if the dial says you're not your old self today, then start tinkering with your insides. Add a little vitamin E and just a pinch of potassium and iron. Let your health monitoring machines tell you when your body chemicals reach just those proportions which you know indicate the most efficient you. It's like tuning your car—every morning.



Whether driving, eating, playing or working, the Eighties hold something new for you. But new doesn't necessarily mean better. Coates foresees counterculture retreats springing up to give people relief from the technological society. A week's vacation may be spent trying out the "old way of life," such as that of a woodsman or farmer.

No futurist will predict the world economy, linked as it is to politics, war and uncertain fuel supplies. What they *will* say is that even if a depression sweeps over the world in the Eighties, new inventions and ways of doing things will only be delayed, not denied. ☽

In EB: 6,1 (Jan. '79) we reviewed Major Colman S. Over the past few months, many members of the SBI have written us in reference to an "alleged" new scientific discovery they have read about. This new modern invention is a mini-version of the psychological stress evaluator (PSE) machine that is used to determine stress in the human voice if someone is telling a falsehood.

The machine, promoted by TELESTAR, Inc., is advertised in hundreds of major magazines and newspapers. It is propoganded as the "truth machine" and a copy of one such ad

appears on the following page. Basically, the old adage of "what you see is what you get" does not apply to this ad.


When the "truth machine" was first introduced in August of 1979, we wrote TELESTAR inquiring about the product. After several more correspondences by letter and telephone, the SBI negotiated a very intriguing deal. TELESTAR would send us three of these machines---free of charge---in hope we would give sort of a good housekeeping seal of approval. We were to inspect, utilize and document testing of these machines for a period of 90 days, after which a full report would be sent by us. During the 90 days, the SBI put these machines through extensive usage and at the end of this specified time we evaluated the machines from our findings.

The SBI found that after using said machines for 165 separate cases of UFO variety, the machines did not perform up to par with more expensive models of the same caliber. It was found that the accuracy of the machines evaluation on determining stress in a person's voice left alot to be desired to one's imagination. Further testing showed the machines LED read out to literally jump from number to number when asking the same witness the same question three consecutive times. This proved inconclusive on indicating a person's truthfulness against lying. On still yet other occassions, the machines would simply malfunction altogether; registering numbers when not even asked a question or stopping dead when essentially needed.

There were many excellent ideas that went into building this type of machine like its light weight structure, its compact size, its computerized LED digital read-outs (instead of graphical indications), its shatterproof attaching case and its low cost price. However, the bad points superseded the good points which made the machine not practical for usage in any type of investigatory work. Some of these faults, besides the ones already mentioned, were: a complicated system of out-put jacks in order to attach a tape recorder, microphone or any other equipment to the machine itself; a short order warrantee in the event of servicing the machine; poor calibration of a person's normal voice pattern; an included but difficult to comprehend instruction manual; its system in determining truthfulness merely by "yes" or "no" type of questioning; and its dependence for operation solely on electricity.

This poor attempt at a lie-detctor machine sold for a ridiculously low price of \$149.00 each. According to TELESTAR this price could be made because of the minaturization

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on the model as compared to the more expensive large models, the deletion of a tape recorder and other needless components, and due to a large volume of sales.

This may all be so, but, the SBI found that TELESTAR purchased these machines from a company based in Texas called, Micropotics, Inc. Micropotics built these machines and sold them to TELESTAR; who in turn, sold them for a profit. We further examined TELESTAR's 30 day unconditional guarantee of using the machine and then returning it if not all satisfied. It was found the return check or money order would be returned, but not after going through some hardship and inconveniences.

In our final analyses we forwarded TELESTAR our conclusions and reasons for these conclusions. Diplomatically, we told TELESTAR we could not recommend this product in our SBI REPORT or any other magazines for usage in scientific investigations. 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
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A SPECIAL REPORT

Being an SBI Field Investigator, I recently submitted a new suggestion to the SBI's Board of Officers. Hopefully, this article will inspire other members of the SBI to not only submit their own suggestions but, to offer their comments on the suggestion submitted here.

I proposed that it would be a good idea to have victims of Close Encounters, primarily those of the third and fourth kinds, that require some sort of medical attention, to undergo a process called "electro-encephalogram" (EEG). By this process, it's possible to show slight brain damage due to strong "electromagnetic effects" (EM effect); or even possible to show indications of forced mental destruction or reprogramming.

Who knows? This may be the key to what the French are looking into. Readers of this REPORT, may or may not know, the French are the only country to conduct experiments and study data on such phenomena as: parapsychology, UFO's, EM effects and many other controversial subjects. ELECTRONICS & BRAIN CONTROL

*We are learning more about
our gray-matter computers*

IT IS TIME that we closely examined brain control, now that scientists are actively seeking to unravel the mysteries that shroud that miniature bioelectric giant known as the human brain. Elements of brain control can already be found in anti-collision radar technology involving birds. It has also been substantiated that, by pumping energy in the gigahertz range of frequencies through human heads, subjects can suddenly "hear" without using their ears.

Much remains to be done to correlate and sift out concealed facts. We still know very little about the all-important coding events that take place in the brain's neuron-synaptic complex. How can we measure and reinforce such significant human capacities as love, will, and character? Does uncontrolled electromagnetic pollution affect the brain? These and other questions remain to be answered as scientists delve deeper and deeper into the human brain with the help of electronics.

What Is the Brain? The theory that the brain is a true electronic machine has often been proposed. To a point, the theory is true. As Dr. Wilder Penfield demonstrated some years ago, the electrical stimulation of brain tissue during skull surgery triggers

lucid audio-visual recalls of past events in patients. The patient "sees" and "hears" complete increments of true life experiences, all in correct sequence.




Fig. 1. Neuron/synaptic mechanism in the human nervous system.

But consider Fig. 1. Studies are enormously complicated by the fact that the human brain contains an estimated 10 billion nerve cells called "neurons" and another 100 billion of a second type called "glial" cells. The fluid bath in which these cells are suspended is a vital element in their electrochemical interactions. Is it here where emotional components and memory are stored and where we have susceptance to microwave and other electromagnetic frequencies?

Such questions guide us into the subject of "synaptic" transmission. The term "synapse" is derived from the Greek phrase "to clasp" and was introduced in 1897 by a Dr. Sherrington who used it to describe the junctional region between two nerve cells. In many cases there is a gap or cleft across a synapse. (In other cases, as in fish, a synapse is a real physical joint.)

One big neuron might have on its surface as many as 10,000 points of contact (synaptic knobs) with other neurons. When the latter are stimulated, some of the millions of ribonucleic acid (RNA) molecules inside them give orders to the glial cells to manu-

facture new proteins. The nature and pattern of these proteins contain an imprint of something that has been perceived and apparently gives rise to a molecular "en-gram."

We also find electrical dipoles in synaptic mechanisms which, when oriented and arranged in a large array, apparently can produce an electric field strong enough to drive positive ions over the junction barrier of the postsynaptic membrane (in a manner similar to that in a transistor) and thereby initiate excitation or produce depolarization. So, one comes to believe that the nature of synaptic transmission is essentially electrical, be it mediated by electrical or chemical transmitters.

By inference, then, the possibility arises of human brain control by electromagnetic forces directed at it from the outside. If such radiations can be suitably coded to elicit a synchronous response in the neuron-synaptic complex, the brain will trigger motor functions which, in turn, cause man or animal to execute a programmed act. Here we have some fascinating experiments that hold great hopes for the immediate future.




Fig. 2. Microwave susceptibility area in brain.

In the case of hearing, for example, we have been taught that our auditory system can respond only to acoustic energy. This "fact" is far from correct. Experiments con-

ducted by Dr. Frey and others clearly indicate that the audio sense in man—and probably in animals, too—can respond to electromagnetic energy in at least a portion of the r-f spectrum. Data shows that, at very low power levels (to preclude biological damage) in tests like that shown in Fig. 2, there are audio sensations at frequencies as low as 200 MHz and at least as high as 3 GHz. When low-level energy was directed at them, the test subjects reported "hearing" a buzzing sound. However, they found it almost impossible to match r-f sounds to a sine wave. The apparent source of the buzzing, clicking, knocking, or hissing sounds is described as being within or immediately behind their heads. This localization persists no matter how a person rotates or twists his head in the r-f field.

It was during these studies that a profoundly important discovery was made: deaf subjects often had the ability to hear r-f sound. The clinical criterion was that, if a given person could hear audio above 5 kHz either by bone or air conduction, then r-f sound could be heard as well. This and related work has resulted in the manufacture of r-f type hearing aids for the deaf, one of which is made by Listening, Inc., 6 Garden St., Arlington, Mass., and is known as the Neurophone Model GPF-1. It operates at 100 kHz and employs crystal control.

These observations tie in with the fact that some individuals can detect radio programs through the fillings in their teeth. This phenomenon was technically verified by interposing shields between respective people who exhibited it and the modulated r-f sources. When the lower half of the head was covered, including the maxillary dental area, the r-f sound was perceived. The sound ceased upon covering the top half of the head. While the mechanism responsible for this phenomenon is only imperfectly understood, it can be assumed to be the result of direct cortical nerve fiber stimulation.

We also have another form of hearing sensations that come about when the human head is placed between two large capacitor plates that are excited by varying electrostatic potentials. "Electroponic hearing," as it is called, apparently acts on the ear's tympanic membranes in a quasi-mechanical manner. It is useful as a new research tool in specialized psycho-physiological studies on the auditory or vibrotactile system.

Unavoidably, data of this sort begs application. Pilot studies are under way to apply effective electrodynamic brain control to animals and man himself. Consider, for example, the brain-wave proposal based on ideas put forth by the late Dr. Norbert Weiner, the acknowledged father of cybernetics.

According to Weiner, a sheet of tin suspended from the ceiling of a room and connected to a 10-Hz electrostatic generator can cause unpleasant sensations in human subjects. With a field strength of 1 or 2 volts per sq cm, the oscillating field roughly coincides with the human brain's alpha-rhythm frequency but attempts to lock it to a fixed frequency—that of the generator. Electronic sleep machines employ similar principles, with currents of fixed amplitude and pulse width (usually square waves) being fed by conductive face masks through the cranium and brain.

Brain Control of Birds. Radar technology is now being used to deal with the problem of birds getting in the way of fast flying aircraft. The idea is to trigger a flying bird's (or a whole flock's) brain into motor functions to initiate collision avoidance by having the bird(s) veer off the flight path of the plane. This area of research was triggered by the staggering incidence of plane/bird collisions that result in equipment damage estimated to be in the millions of

dollars each year and the human lives that continue to be lost as a result of such collisions.




Fig. 3. Microwave test carousel to determine reactions in live birds. Only one cone is active; all others are dummies. (Courtesy National Research Council of Canada)

The work being carried out by the National Research Council of Canada bears much promise in bird-brain control. The NRC's test system takes the form of a carousel of bird cages containing live chickens. (Fig. 3) Only one of the many cones suspended above the cages contains a microwave antenna. The program, headed by Dr. Alan Tanner, aims to evolve microwave brain-control systems that will have the greatest possible effect on birds while at the same time deploying the least amount of power.

When exposed to microwave radiation, birds in general exhibit escape reactions. This fact became clear during World War II. Investigators also found that in each case the microwave field through which birds were flying was of very low intensity—too low, in fact, to account for confusion and escape reactions on the basis of heat generated in the animals' bodies.

Different species of birds have different behavioral patterns. In the laboratory, a few seconds after the microwave field has been initiated, the given bird's wing outside the field of radiation became collapsed and the opposite wing became extended. Similar phenomena were observed with the legs. Sometimes the birds heeled over to the outside of the field. In the turning reaction, the outer side of the bird becomes paralyzed. In short, the microwave beam interacts with the nervous system of the test birds. Seagulls and pigeons reacted similarly,

though the gulls are more inclined to initiate flight.

It is interesting to note that a bird's feathers appear to play a much greater role in the sensory complex than has been realized before. Defeathered chickens, for example, give little or no reactions to microwave fields until the twelfth day, at which time new feathers start to grow and tips protrude from the surface of the skin. In the case of fully feathered chickens whose tail feathers were exposed to microwave radiation, the bird immediately ceased exploration of their cages and exhibited mounting signs of distress after a period of 10-20 seconds. When the microwave field was switched off, the birds responded by fluffing their body feathers and active preening.

The Canadians believe that the physical properties of quill tissue—particularly the piezoelectric properties that are fundamental to living tissue—suggest mechanisms that have heretofore been overlooked. However, work carried on by Dr. Tanner and his staff as well as research conducted elsewhere should in time yield a microwave beam of the proper wavelength and modulation to cause birds to activate collision avoidance with all possible haste.




Fig. 4. Cazzamalli's brain-wave detector of some years ago is illustrated here.

Brain-Wave Detection. Some 40-odd years ago, university professor F. Cazzamalli

started publishing papers on the subject of brain-wave-detection and implied that he had detected radiations from the mind. As shown in Fig. 4, he placed subjects in a shielded room (or Faraday cage), emanated vhf radiowaves through their heads, and claimed to have recorded "beat frequencies" obtained with an untuned receiver consisting of a galena crystal or diode tube, a fixed capacitor, an antenna, and a sensitive light-beam galvanometer.

The trouble is that Cazzamalli never mentioned transmitter power in his somewhat unprofessional papers. His oscillograms meant to show variations of the "beat" when his subjects were emotionally aroused or engaged in creative tasks when they were in the Faraday cage. Later, he told an astounded world that his subjects would hallucinate when under the influence of his "oscillatori telegrafica," its frequency being about 300 MHz at the time.

Tom Jaski, a noted science writer and engineer, duplicated some of Cazzamalli's work with a modern low-power oscillator that was swept from 300 MHz to 600 MHz. His subjects could not see the dial. They were told to sound off as soon as they felt something unusual. At a certain frequency range—varying between 380 MHz and 500 MHz—the subjects repeatedly indicated points with exact accuracy in as many as 14 out of 15 trials. At these "individual"

frequencies, the same subjects announced having experienced pulsing sensations in the brain, ringing in the ears, and an odd desire to *bite* the experimenters. The oscillator's output power was only a few milliwatts, while the oscillator itself was located several feet away from the subjects.

The Conclusions. Considering the ingredients of the few sample discussions presented above, it appears that both humans and animals have brains sensitive to r-f energy. The correlating mechanisms are only imperfectly known, but they apparently reside within the neuron-synaptic complex. Nor will we know how this susceptance

affects our longevity without proceeding with a great deal more research.


Just how electromagnetic radiation affects our social structure has led to a great deal of speculation in the past. For example, the late Dr. Goldman once insisted that r-f energy allows the id, or primitive brain, to take control over human affairs. Such considerations might open a Pandora's box when applied to an explanation of our sharply increasing crime rates and decline of social fidelity. So, before we rush pell-mell into electromagnetically contaminating our environment, it would serve us well once and for all to discover what adverse effects, if any, it will have on our lives. ♦

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PARLIAMENT TAKES UP THE SUBJECT OF FLYING SAUCERS

It will always be to me a memorable occasion when I introduced a debate on Unidentified Flying Objects on January 18, this year, in the House of Lords. A unique occasion in deed, and the first time in the 700-year history of that prestigious place that the UFOs had been debated there.

What pleased me about the debate was that the matter was taken seriously and not ridiculed. It seemed to me that there was not a single facetious contribution made to the debate, and those who held views either for or against expressed them most seriously.

For about four weeks prior to the debate, a big TV, radio and press campaign was in action. I was interviewed by all sections of the media and made several TV appearances. Australian and Italian press people came to see me because of recent New Zealand sightings and also those in North Italy. By the time the great day arrived, public interest was very high indeed. This can be confirmed by the fact that during the debate the public gallery was jam-packed.

Before putting down my motion for the debate I had done some lobbying among my fellow peers to see who was interested in taking part. To my surprise, I found quite a number, and indeed there were some fourteen speakers in the debate.

Many distinguished people took part. Amongst those who supported me were the Earl of Dimberley, the Liberal party spokesman in the Lords on aerospace; Lord Rankeillour, who had read one of my books; Lord Gainford who stated that he had seen a UFO; Lord Davies of Leek; the Earl of Cork and Orrery; Lord Gladwyn; a very distinguished scientist, Lord Kings-Norton, and another well-known scientist Lord Halsbury.

Those who opposed were Lord Trefgarne; Lord Hewitt, and Lord Strabolgi, who wound up for the government. Viscount Oxfuird made a very good maiden speech but did not really take sides, which is what you would expect, as in your first speech to their Lordships you are not expected to be controversial. The Bishop of Norwich also spoke. He, too, was neither for or against, but was more concerned with certain cult aspects among some ufologists which might lead them away from Christianity.

This was my motion -- to call attention to the increasing number of sightings and landings on a world-scale of unidentified flying objects (UFOs), and to the need for an inter-governmental study of UFOs; and to move for papers.

In my opening speech, as I thought that many of the listening Peers might not be well-briefed on UFOs, I gave a quick run-down on characteristics, such as shapes, interference by UFOs with anything electrical -- such as causing motor cars to cease functioning -- and that they had the same effect on aircraft, tractors, motorcycles and other machines. Then I discussed types of witnesses and gave their Lordships a few good sighting reports.

I then went on to discuss the attitude of governments, including the cover-ups in the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R.

FRANCE LEADS THE WAY TOWARD RECOGNITION

Next, I discussed the attitude of one country that has always been known for its independent line of many matters, and the UFOs were no exception. As you may appreciate I was referring to France.

You see, in February 1974, Monsieur Robert Galley, then French Minister of Defence, was interviewed on France-Inter radio station by Jean Claude-Bourret. He stated that UFOs existed but did not know where they came from or all the answers. Never the less he was telling quite frankly the French people that UFOs were being seen, and those listening to him did not rush like lemmings into the sea.

Monsieur Galley also said that the French Ministry of Defence had a unit in it which had been collecting UFO reports since 1954, and that they were sending some of these down to the National Centre for Space Studies in Toulouse (the French equivalent of the American NASA). There is a unit in that Centre scientifically investigating UFOs under the direction of Monsieur Claude Poher, who was one of the creators of Concorde.

Some time after Monsieur's interview on radio, I heard some unconfirmed news about this UFO unit in Toulouse, so I put down a question for written answer in the House of Lords. You can do this as well as ask a verbal question in the chamber, and like the verbal question and answer, a written answer is also published in Hansard (the "Congressional Record" of British Parliament) the next day. The question I asked was whether the unit in Toulouse investigating UFOs was under French government sponsorship.

Lord Donaldson of Kingsbridge kindly confirmed in his written reply that this was correct. The initials of the unit were GEPAN, and he stated that it was under the sponsorship of the French Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Artisans. So the French government have been taking the whole UFO business quite ser-

iously, and have been openly telling their people about it. In my opening speech I asked Lord Strabolgi if our Minister for Defence could give a broadcast interview on TV or radio as his counterpart did across the channel. I pointed out that with sightings and landing reports increasing all the time there might be open landings at any moment. Then, if the British people had not been prepared by our Government, there could well be panic.

THE ATLANTIC BALLOONISTS STALKED BY UFOS

The Earl of Kimberley made a splendid speech in support of the truth that UFOs existed and that there was a cover-up not only in the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R., but here in Britain, too. He stated that the three United States Balloonists who crossed the Atlantic recently were followed for up to 12 hours by UFOs. They were ordered by the United States Government agents not to discuss them!

(But one of the three heroes did talk to a French reporter, Pierre Fouchard of Paris "Matin". I don't believe his paper published the story but the word did get around in Paris, and "People" published it in their Oct. 8, 1978 issue here in the U.S.A: "The UFOs appeared when the balloon was on its third night out from the U.S.," confided a French informant.

("Two of the men were dozing but were quickly awakened by the third when a strange lighted object approached silently from the south. It was closely followed by three other such objects. The leader of the UFO pack came so close to the balloon that the men could feel a rush of warm air. The balloon was buffeted wildly and the gondola was rocking as if a giant hand had tipped it. The men had to hang on tight to keep from being dumped over the side into the icy sea.

(After the first pass the lead UFO reportedly rose 500 feet above the drifting craft and shone a laser-like beam in its direction. The beam struck the top of the balloon. The occupants thought they heard a crackling, as if the fragile material were about to break or burst into flames. Panicky, the three adventurers quickly decided to deflate and take their chances in the choppy seas. But as they prepared, the UFO beam went off and the spacecraft retreated.

("However, the four UFOs regrouped some distance away and kept pace with the slow-moving balloon all during the night. They maneuvered above, below and off to the side of the balloon at various times. They kept blinking lights from the interior as if in some kind of code. One of the balloonists attempted to reply in Morse code with a flashlight, but there was no acknowledgment from the aliens. They must not understand Morse Code. Meanwhile the three men slowly lost their fear. If there were

going to be an attack surely it would have occurred sooner.

("Attempts by the men to notify authorities of their plight by radio failed as the UFO evidently put up some kind of electronic shield to keep signals from reaching out. The UFOs finally buzzed off as the Double Eagle II drifted within 50 miles of the Irish coast. According to the French source the balloonists elected to play down their close encounter.

("They had not been hurt, and they feared that publicizing their meeting with the UFOs would detract from the historic value of their flight. They soon learned that their government felt the same way! They hoped to examine the top of their balloon where the UFO's ray had struck. This would be solid evidence, if there were scorch marks. But the French crowds tore the balloon into little shreds and the proof disappeared.")

Lord Kimberley went on to ask Lord Strabolgi, "Whether he will tell your Lordships why the Ministry of Defence has not informed the public of 18 contacts from 23rd May 1977 up to 22nd February 1978, numbered K5634 to K5651 inclusive. Further, what do the classification numbers 5,3,20,16,6,8 and 23 mean for those 18 contacts? Moreover, does the noble Lord realise that 13 out of these 18 contacts were seen during the hours of daylight?"

Lord Strabolgi winding up for the Government did not answer that question. As it happens, I have got a copy of the document referred to by Lord Kimberley. This is the tip of the iceberg! It is proof of a cover-up in England on UFOs, probably playing along with the U.S.A.

A BIG INVESTIGATION IS GOING ON

We are continuously being told that there is no cover-up, that there are only two clerks in the British Ministry of Defence collecting UFO reports, and that there are no funds for Governmental UFO research. Yet this document lists places all over the country, and also it has been sent to all sorts of Governmental security departments both here and overseas. It is obvious that a very big investigation is going on, and that we have been told blatant lies.

What did the UFO debate achieve? The main thing was that the subject got an airing in such a distinguished place. The debate also, as stated earlier, got tremendous public interest.

I did not succeed in getting our Minister of Defence to go on TV to talk about UFOs to the British people. However, I did suggest in my opening speech that we should keep the UFO subject permanently in front of Parliament from now on, and that one way to do this was to form a House of Lords UFO Study Group which could meet a few times every year, and could possibly be addressed by well-known ufologists like Dr. J. Allen Hynek, Claude Foher and others. Since the debate, several Peers have indicated that

this idea should be carried out.

Finally, to add emphasis to the public interest, the day after the debate more Peers than usual asked for copies of the Hansard containing the speeches. The Printed Paper Office in the House of Lords ran out of copies of Hansard. Normally, when that happens they order some more copies from H.S. Stationary Office in High Holborn, London, W.C.1. Well, that is what they did. However, H.M. Stationary Office had sold right out. You see, members of the public had bought them all up! This was an unprecedented event to seal a most unique and historic debate. Unique and historic indeed! Once the available data on Flying Saucers has been carefully and impartially examined, and their reality publicly acknowledged, then the Secretary General of the United Nations can prepare for interplanetary ambassadorships. He or she can then go publicly to John F. Kennedy Interplanetary Airport on Long Island to welcome the arrival of official Visitors from other planets, other Systems. The Secretary General can personally greet them as they descend from their landed Flying Saucers in a designated area, escort them to waiting limousines, and ride with them before crowds of cheering thousands down the long avenues from Long Island to downtown New York City and United Nations headquarters. Remember, the minds of millions of people have already been conditioned to such an event by several episodes in that most popular television series, Star Trek.

President Eisenhower passed up an opportunity to make his place in history by preparing us for such an event, as have the Presidents who succeeded him, including the present one. The Goldenbergs have sent us some copies of a new borderland magazine, "Second Look". The May 1979 issue contains an article by former CIA agent, Victor Marchetti: "How the CIA Views the UFO Phenomenon". He agrees with Lord Clancarty that there is a massive cover-up of UFO evidence by the major governments of the world, "an international conspiracy to maintain a workable stability among the nations of the world. . . and retain institutional control over their respective populations. . . (This is why) Mr. Carter would act exactly the way he has (about his own UFO sighting). He is neither smart enough nor tough enough to override the pressures of the Establishment. . . "

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




Why do you spoil a perfectly delightful fruitcake of a magazine like Omni--which, one gathers from your material, is slanted toward the lollipop and looney-bin fringe--with a serious treatment of cattle mutilations by Harry Lebelson in your January 1980 issue? I'm glad to see, however, that Lebelson was instructed to "treat the issues lightly." Lebelson did treat the material lightly, didn't he? I mean, he wasn't really being serious, was he? Because if he was, then he is either one helluva naive nitwit, or the latest in an endless battery of noise resonators activated by the Cult of Chickens presently running our Barnyard Bureaucracy.

Lebelson states: "Thus, the federal government's inability to step in at this point has given the mutilators a license to kill." According to a letter we received and published from Idaho Senator James McClure (See EDEN Bulletin, July 1976) the Senator states: "I have been contacted by John V. If you want "explanations," Lebelson, go talk to your APRO consultants. They'll give you a new list every month. That's why I say Lebelson just can't be serious. Because only one hypothesis can be correct in explaining all the known facts, which must include: (1) Surgical procedures beyond terrestrial knowledge; (2) Unidentified Flying Objects that fly rings around our pursuing military aircraft; (3) The inability of state and federal agencies to stop the murders; (4) Radioactive and other metallic residues (in combinations foreign to man's technology) found both on the cattle and upon the ground at the mutilation sites; (5) Cattle reacting to UFO-lights with frantic learned behavior. (Who taught them, APRO consultants?); and (6) The increasing appearance and activity of Bigfoot at or near mutilation sites (documented by Wolverton in his book, Mystery Stalks the Prairie, written by Wolverton and Roberta Donovan.)

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

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POLICE OFFICERS REPORTING UFO SIGHTINGS-- Courtesy:Eden Bulletin

It is rather ironic to note a newsclip from the Mt. Vernon, N.Y. Daily Argus (8/2/79) headlined "COUNTY COP SAYS HE SIGHTED UFO."

Twenty years ago, the Daily Argus carried 3 consecutive front-page stories telling how an English teacher, one Jerome Eden, was suspended & subsequently fired from his job for daring to discuss certain "extraneous subjects" with his junior & senior highschool students-- among those tabooed subjects was UFOs. (See View From Eden.)

Now, twenty years later we note the above headline detailing how a Westchester policeman, Officer William Shaughnessy, spotted a UFO at 1:35 a.m. & again at 1:47 a.m., appearing as "a large ball of white light traveling in a southeasterly direction. At one point the object stopped & made a complete right turn & headed in a westerly direction." Officer Shaughnessy said his radio jammed during his observations.

Then, from the Yorktown Heights, N.Y., News (8/14/79) comes an article by Nancy Gerbino which ties in with the Shaughnessy sighting: "Something is going on in the north county," writes Gerbino, "and that 'something' is only happening to police officers. Saturday, at 6:15 pm, a UFO shaped like a spoon was spotted 'floating' across Somers.

"Observed by Westchester County corrections officer Keith Jorgensen & his wife Connie, the UFO was described as 'floating' handle first towards Connecticut over the Goldens Bridge shopping center."

Said Jorgensen, "The front of the craft was the 'handle' & the spoon area had a bubble-like appearance. The forward portion had a set of small wings. Off those wings came what appeared to be a large antenna system with 2 or 3 spherical objects attached. The rear portion or 'spoon' area" Jorgensen noted, "had a similar set of wings & antenna system, but much larger." Gerbino then refers to Shaughnessy's sighting (above) noting that Officer Shaughnessy's radio had been rendered inoperable by the UFO in his vicinity--so much so that he "had to report his sighting by using a pay phone. The interference lasted for 45 minutes."

And in Mississippi--According to the Jackson, MS Daily News (9/11/79) Flora police confirmed a UFO sighting early today shortly after a motorist said she saw the object hovering in the sky over Mississippi 22 between Canton & Flora.

"I just don't know what it was," said police officer Percy Whitehead. "It looked like a big old bright light. Then it looked like a big old red ball of fire shot out of it, it moved a little distance & disappeared." Whitehead said he & his partner, Ronnie Posey, sighted the object at about 2 a.m., about the same time Gladys Jefferson reported seeing a reddish-blue funnel-shaped object. She said her car radio quit playing. Police said their two-way radio also quit.

And in Wisconsin--From the Monroe, WI, Evening Times (9/4/79). A pair of UFOs were reported by three Green County Sheriff's deputies over the New Glarus Woods early Saturday morning. The deputies said they saw 2 bright lights below cylinder shaped objects for a 24-min period at about 3:30 a.m. Saturday. The deputies said the objects appeared to be 150-200 ft above the woods. The objects reportedly disappeared when clouds & rain moved into the area.

Joe Trussell said he doesn't scare easily. But he admits he was scared Friday evening when he saw a UFO.

"It looked like a fireball with fire breaking off the tail end and falling down. It was scary and I don't scare easy," Trussell told The Town Talk. He also reported the incident to the Alexandria police.

Trussell, who lives at 1307 Louise St., Apt. F, said, "I've never seen anything like this in my life and I'm 54 years old. I haven't been drinking a drop and it wasn't my eyes playing tricks. I'm no nut.

"You better believe I saw it. It was real strange and I got a good look at it. As bright as it was, some-

one else had to see it too."

Trussell said he was sitting in his living room, looking out the window, when he noticed a bright light in the sky.

"It wasn't way up high. At first I thought it was a plane on fire but it didn't make any noise. It looked like a big ball of fire on the front and fire was falling from it. It wasn't a jet, I'm sure," Trussell said.

"All of a sudden, it disappeared. It wasn't a falling star because it had been going on a level flight."

He said he would report it to the UFO research center and hoped others who saw it would do the same.

"I know I've seen something but I don't know what it was," Trussell said.

Three spot possible UFO here

Stella Beener was working in her yard at 4228 Grace yesterday evening at dusk when she noticed the star.

It was a little larger than the other stars, so she said she noticed it. Then it moved.

"That caught my attention for sure," she said. "Stars don't move, planes don't stay in one place so long and neither do helicopters.

"I honestly don't know what it was that I saw."

By this time, the object had stopped moving and hung over the southeast horizon. Ms. Beener got two neighbors, Jim Smith of 1117 Maguey and James Cade of 533 Virginia, to look at it.

"I thought it was a meteor at first, but it stopped," Smith said. "Then I thought it might be a weather balloon, but it had a really bright light."

National Weather Service spokesman Jim Cole said no weather balloons had been released in the area last night. Naval Air Station weathermen said they had not released any balloons either.

"Brownsville released a weather balloon after 6:30 p.m., but it would take about four or five hours to get up this high," Cole said. "I don't know what it was."

"It moved pretty fast for a star," Cade said. "In about five minutes, it went down to the horizon and disappeared."

All three said the object was about as bright as a street light and about two or three times larger than regular stars.

None of them ever reported an unidentified flying object before.

Two See UFO in Potsdam Skies

POTSDAM — Judy Douglass, 19, of 47 1/2 Market St. who spotted an unidentified flying object Wednesday night, says she had never seen anything like it before.

"I still have no idea what it was," Miss Douglass says.

She and Lynn Fadden, 26,

Garden Street, and Valerie Frasher, 18, Star Route, spotted the object at 9:55 p.m. Wednesday on Route 72 as they were driving west toward Potsdam.

They sighted the object near Staffords Corners at the sharp turn in Route 72.

Miss Douglass, who was in the front passenger seat of

the car, says she saw an object in the southern sky above a field. A series of red and white blinking lights on the bottom of the object formed a "U". Miss Douglass says.

"I knew it was not a plane. The object came to the edge of the field by the road and hovered in the sky. The lights were steady when the

object hovered in the sky.

The lights on the bottom of the object were about the size of car headlights, she says, and there were three distinct groupings of lights.

The first series was on the rim, or edge of the bottom. The second series was in the center of the bottom in a large "U" shape. A third circular series was between the rim and the center.

But "there were no wonderful lights on the ground," Miss Douglass explains.

The shape of the bottom was a closed off "U". The silvery metallic object was about the size of a 20-foot boat, Miss Douglass estimates.

The two women stopped the car and got out to look at the object. It then banked and took off in an easterly direction toward Parishville Center.

The object "dropped down to about treetop level and all the lights went off except a red light...then it took off like a really fast jet, gone in seconds."

It left in a southerly direction. It made no noise.

"I've been getting a lot of teasing about seeing it," Miss Douglass notes. "But I was perfectly normal when I saw it."

Police chase a 'flying cigar'

A BRILLIANTLY lit cigar-shaped UFO was chased across Hertfordshire today by three police patrol cars. And four officers have filed reports about the craft which, at one point, hovered over Rickmansworth at only 500 feet.

A police spokesman said: "This is not a joke. We are convinced the officers did see something that can't immediately be explained. Their reports are genuine."

The chase started when the crew of a patrol car on duty at Rickmansworth at 3.25 am saw a large, brilliant light hovering over the town.

They radioed a description of the object to their headquarters and asked for other patrol car crews to scan the skies to confirm their sighting.

As the crew watched the cylindrical shaped UFO moved off slowly towards the village of Harefield. The patrol car crew radioed to their base that the object was moving silently and appeared to be only four to hundred feet up.

Hertfordshire police HQ contacted West Drayton Air Traffic Control centre which reported that there were no aircraft in that district at the time — and they had nothing showing on radar.

At the same time another panda patrol officer saw the craft over the Heron-gate area.

He radioed that he could clearly see the object. He described it as cylindrical with bright white lights along its side and a red light underneath.

Soon after the driver of another patrol car called up on the radio to say he could also see the UFO moving towards Oxhey. After a short time the craft disappeared.

Dozens of other police officers around Herts and North London listened to the UFO commentary on their radios.

One said: "You could tell they were not kidding by the tone of their voices. They sounded quite scared."

Today's sighting comes almost a year after a major UFO alert in the Heathrow area.

Police report UFO sightings

THE DEFENCE Ministry was today investigating reports by a number of police officers that they twice sighted a mysterious object flying through the night skies of Hertfordshire.

The close encounters first occurred at 3.25am today when a policeman and woman on patrol in a panda car at the Long Lane roundabout in Rickmansworth claimed they saw a large, brightly-lit object which appeared to be stationary some 400ft to 500ft from the ground.

According to the report

from PC Phil Moorecroft and WPC Brown the light appeared to remain stationary for about two minutes before it moved off without making any noise.

Police say that this sighting was confirmed by other officers who were nearby at the time.

Two hours later — at 5.30am — PC Moorecroft and WPC Brown, with two other officers, PC Gary Mahoney and PC Mark Crampton, saw a cigar-shaped object illuminated by numerous lights along its length, with a single red light with two more lights underneath.

Are islands host to visitors from space?

Alien beings have been paying regular visits to the sparsely populated Aran islands for centuries, experts believe.

A number of mysterious artifacts — including one showing a spaceship — have been found on the limestone islands just off the coast of Ireland.


These indicate that extraterrestrial visitors have been coming there for hundreds of years.

Legend says that a strange race, the Tuatha deDanaan who were magicians and "sorcerers," suddenly appeared on the islands but left after a few years as mysteriously as they had appeared.

The islands are composed of huge masses of rare limestone and are covered with prehistoric and early Christian ruins.

The islands have long been a source of mystery to scientists.

"I was going to call the police yesterday," one woman said, "but I figured they would think I was nuts."

The other callers also said they were wither too embarrassed to call the Bulletin or the police and they just dismissed what they saw from their minds.

Most persons contacted by the Bulletin described the object they saw as being "long" and "oval" and sightings were reported at different times. Most said the object was far away and high up in the sky.

Mary Thompson of 27 Arcadia Street, Norwich, was watching television when she spotted an object hovering over the house next to hers. "I saw a round thing hovering over the building next door. There were four lights blinking on and off. They had a redish, orange color to them," she said.

After seeing the object, she made a rough sketch of the object.

"I kept it to myself because I thought I was seeing things," Mrs. Thompson said. Her father showed her the article in the paper and then she contacted the Bulletin.

William Tedeschi of Scott Hill Road, Bozrah, said he sighted an object in the sky at the same time seven women at the Slimtique Figure Spa said they saw an object hovering above the sign atop the Norwich-Sheraton Motor Inn.

Tedeschi said he first spotted the object at 4:23 p.m. and said it appeared to look like a vapor trail behind a jet. Tedeschi was driving in his car and he said he got a clearer view of the object when his driving angle changed.

Three minutes later at 4:26 p.m., Tedeschi got another view and noticed a clearer shape taking place. His final view of the object is recreated by Tedeschi in the accompanying drawings.

Retired from the Air Force, Tedeschi said he is positive what he saw was not an airplane, helicopter, glider or cloud. He said it was possibly a weather balloon or satellite, or was a vision created by heat glare reflections.

Tedeschi, however, said he believed it was not a UFO. "From my experience, there is nothing that cannot be explained."

He said his experience in the Air



"It was very, very bright and it looked like it exploded and fell to earth," Mrs. Gauthier said.



County couple, UFO in 'close encounter'

An alien craft may have visited Shelby County early Sunday.

A county couple claims a glowing egg-shaped object followed their car along the Brandywine Road for about six miles, hovered outside their home for a few minutes and then shot off to the east.

Richard Sweet, R.R. 1, Fairland, called the sheriff's department at 1:16 a.m. Sunday to report he and his wife had a "close encounter" with an unidentified flying object that followed their car.

Sweet told Deputy Dennis Alyea of his experience and the deputy observed, "They were dead serious about it. They had not been drinking or anything. At this time, we have no reason to doubt their story."

A report on the incident will be forwarded to the Federal Aviation Administration, Alyea said.

The News could not contact the Sweets today, but Alyea related their story.

Sweet was driving his car southbound on Brandywine Road (200W) toward their home in Brandywine Lakes near Fairland about 12:45 a.m. Sunday when a glowing object descended out of the sky and approached their vehicle.

The object flew parallel to the Sweets' car from 25 to 50 feet above the ground with a side-to-side swaying motion. Sweet awoke his wife, who had been sleeping, so she could observe the object.

Sweet said that the object continued to keep pace with the car and that when he slowed the car down or sped it up, the object also slowed down or sped up.


Sweet said the UFO was between 10 and 12 feet tall and about 25 feet long. It was noiseless and pulsed with a brilliant white light. Two dim yellow lights marked the "front" of the object, he said.

The UFO followed the Sweets' vehicle to their home, where they got out of their car and ran to their home. They watched as the object hovered outside their home for a few minutes and then shot off eastward.

Alyea said he retraced the route the Sweets took as the UFO followed their car, but he saw nothing. No one else has contacted the sheriff's department and claimed to have seen the object, the deputy said.

"I don't know what to make of it," Alyea said.

Films: fantasy to fact

HAVE SEEN the future and it's called a screenplay. "Star Trek," the long-awaited feature-length story of the return of the starship Enterprise, a Paramount release, opens today. "The Black Hole" arrives Dec. 21, a Walt Disney Productions exploration into the world beyond G-rated movies about dogs, kids and cars. The title refers to a baffling concept, the theory that a star collapses into itself until all that remains is nothingness. After these a veritable galaxy of movies about stars, space and science will be hurtling toward Earth theaters.

One of the hotly awaited will be 20th Century-Fox's "The Empire Strikes Back," sequel to "Star Wars," due next spring. Warner Bros.' "Superman II" is in production now, with Christopher Reeve performing feats of superheroism in settings from Niagara Falls to the Eiffel Tower.

Dino De Laurentiis is making "Flash Gordon," with 6-foot-3 Sam J. Jones as the comic-strip hero. You don't know who Jones is? He was Bo Derek's bridegroom in "10," hardly a role to give him a chance to be noticed. Next De Laurentiis will bring another popular fantasy figure of novels and comic books to film, "Conan the

Barbarian," starring Arnold Schwarzenegger. Then De Laurentiis starts "Dune," adapted from a trilogy of novels about an interplanetary empire, to be directed by Ridley ("Alien") Scott.

In February, AFD, a newly formed company, is releasing "Saturn 3," with Kirk Douglas and Farah Fawcett as the entire population of a space outpost until a space roamer, Harvey Keitel, arrives. Stanley Donen will direct, a departure for this musical-comedy veteran.

"Lord of Light," planned by Barry Ira Geller Productions, will build its sets on 1,000 acres in Colorado, which will be the site of a science-fiction amusement park. Cannon Films has announced preparation for "The Apple," described as "a science fiction rock musical love story in 1994."

There is obviously more bandwagon than coincidence at work here, but sci-fi has been a staple of movies since movie time began.

One of the most notable examples came very early, Frenchman George Melies' 1902 "A Trip to the Moon," in which the cartoon man-in-the-moon got a rocket ship in his eye. Director Fritz Lang's "Metropolis," made in 1925 while he was still in Germany, stands today as a movie that has brought special meaning to its title, with its startling futuristic sets and its clash of workers against the

mechanization of their lives, incited by a robot revolutionary.

The 1936 British "Things To Come," with a script agonized over by H.G. Wells, was another giant step in sci-fi films. Director William Cameron Menzies' sets continue to be remarkable, from the Art-Deco, high-tech core city to the war-devastated outside world. In this movie, Man — and Woman — contemplate what human beings already were beginning to consider their destiny, the exploration and eventual colonization of worlds beyond theirs.

The American film industry became preeminent in science-fiction in the 1930s, in what might be called the Silly Season, a period remembered for serials about Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers, both played by Buster Crabbe. Today their special effects look like child's play and their heroics are laughable, but these serials still hold the ability to entertain. If they didn't, George Lucas never would have bothered to model "Star Wars" after them.

Moving along by decades, as chroniclers are wont to do, the 1940s seem to be a strikingly barren period for cinematic rocket ships and outer space, but with a World War and its aftermath gripping attention, present reality probably seemed enough for the time. However, there occurred in 1945 an event of utmost significance, the opening of a door which never could be closed again, the realization of the destructive force of the atomic bomb.

American movies' preoccupation during that period with radiation, mutants, flying saucers and colliding planets hardly stemmed solely from a desire to cash in on current events. No one in those days could avoid a sense of unease and even dread, with talk that nuclear explosions could knock the earth off its axis, that the Soviet Union was out to get us now that it had The Bomb and that every unexplained light in the sky was a potential enemy from outer space who could dominate us by sheer force of intellect.

In a way this could be called the Golden Age of sci-fi movies, resulting in some of the greatest, still held up as measuring sticks against today's products: "The Day the Earth Stood Still" (Stop fighting or you'll all die. *Klaatu barada nikto!*); "The Thing" (How do you kill a carrot before it kills you?); "When Worlds Collide" (Can money buy a seat on Noah's ark?); "Invasion of the Body Snatchers" (Don't you see we're all being brainwashed!); "The Incredible Shrinking Man" (Why is this happening to me?); "The Fly" (If only I hadn't tampered with genetics!). Even allowing for such movies as "Attack of the 50-Foot Woman," '50s sci-fi cinema can be seen as a period of soul-searching in which we tried to adjust to a frightening new world.

The decade turned with the Great Fallout Shelter Scare, after which a period of cynicism and insouciance was easily understandable. From one perspective 1960s movies seem to be dominated by miniskirts, but standing out like a promontory is Stanley Kubrick's 1964 "Dr. Strangelove," (which some people will contend is more truth than science fiction). Kubrick went from promontory to watershed in 1968 with "2001: A Space Odyssey."

Kubrick's story, a collaboration with writer Arthur C. Clarke, carried a theme of power and its responsibilities. From ape to astronaut the question was, what do we do with our knowledge and strength? The very next year, real life brought us something that made the world gape: Men landed on the moon.
