Hewes, who has been a leading UFO researcher for many years, is now investigating Close Encounters of the Fourth Kind (Gee, I thought we invented that term!), which means sexual contacts between Earthlings and aliens. Hewes, obviously influenced by Von Daniken and others, believes that Mankind is the result of genetic experimentation by Aliens throughout the centuries. Could well be true!

Speaking of Sex, the latest issue of Laura Mundo's "Mundo Monitor" contains a 2-page article by Laura called "Sex and the UFO". She talks, among other things, about "countless reports of Earth women being raped by space men, some voluntarily". She goes on to discuss the good old days when she was "an attractive glamor girl" and none other than George Adamski made a few passes at her. In 1954, he kissed her in his Detroit ho-

tel room in front of another woman; he "accidentally" put his hand on her bosom as he helped her into a car, and another time he rubbed her knee under the table at dinner. Also present was a woman named Kay McCulloch, and long-time ufologist Courtland Hastings. Candy announced that beginning September 20th, she will take over an earlier time-slot (thank god!), from 10 p.m. to 1 a.m., as opposed to the present one, which runs from midnight to 5:30 in the morning. This should mean a much larger, more nearly sober audience. It's a well-deserved break for Candy as well as for her stable of semi-regulars such as yours truly!

One of our non-subscribers has kindly sent us a newspaper item which relates that 77% of all children born last year in Grenada, the Western Hemisphere's smallest independent state, were illegitimate. What has this to do with UFOs? Probably nothing at all; but we mention it because Grenada's prime minister, Sir Eric Gairy, is the loudest voice at the United Nations in favor of that body undertaking an official study of UFOs. Incidentally, another non-subscriber has provided us with photostats of a somewhat hilarious series of letters written to Gairy by a New York ufologist named Major Colman VonKeviczky. The good Major was apparently invited by Gairy's delegation to attend a U.N. discussion on UFOs this past July; but the invitation was retracted at the last minute at the urging of Jacques Vallee and Dr. Hynek, who obviously thought VonKeviczky's presence would be embarrassing to them and to the subject. VonKeviczky is a sincere but pretentious individual who is the American equivalent of Sir Gairy, in regard to his ufological zeal, though he lacks any official status whatsoever.

On the evening of September 11th, your "Saucer Stone" editor received a phone call from the Mysterious John A. Keel (JAK). John sounded fit as a fiddle (whatever that means), and denied the persistent rumor that he has recently been Put Away. Keel used to write or phone us frequently, but neither we nor anyone else had heard from him for many months, till now. Our best wishes go out to him. Anyone who can correctly identify us as "a boil on the ass of ufology" can't be all bad!

On the back page of this issue is a diagram of the U.S. Intelligence Community, which has been kindly supplied to us by Philip Klass. It relates somehow to his dispute with Todd Zechel over whether the National Security Agency is a civilian or a military outfit. We are printing it here in the Public Interest.

Meanwhile, the feud between Klass and non-subscriber Todd Zechel drones on, with Zechel now threatening to take Klass to court. We, as well as a handful of other ufologists on their "white paper" mailing list, have continued to receive the charges and counter-charges by mail and telephone. Zechel accuses Klass of a politically improper relationship with a Soviet intelligence agent; of using the facilities of "Aviation Week" to grind out his anti-Zechel material; and of having received then-classified information about a military UFO sighting in Iran, which occurred in September of 1976. Klass answers all these charges adequately, but fails to address himself to what we would consider the most important issue: What WAS the object seen by two F-4 crews over Iran on the night of Sept. 19th, 1976? Klass himself has sent us a 2-page summary of the debriefing of one of the F-4 crews, in which U. S. Air Force officers participated. This document is simply fascinating. The incident includes evasive action by the UFO;

the "Mother Ship" phenomenon, with a second object leaving and returning to a UFO; deliberate interference with the instrumentation and communications of a F-4 while in pursuit of a UFO; an attempt by a F-4 to fire a missile at a UFO; and a UFO landing! Space does not allow us to give all the details here, but it's quite a case. Come on, Phil: What did all these people see???
