### THE STRANGE CASE OF "DR." WILLIARD McINTYRE

It is more in sadness than in anger that we bring you a "Saucer Drool" exclusive, regarding the MARCEN organization, and in particular, its personable director, "Dr." McIntyre.

In the most recent issue of the MARCEN Journal (Vol. 2, No. 3), it is stated that the organization's membership stood at 7,010 at the time the issue went to press. This, we might note, is an astonishingly large membership, considering the short period of time MARCEN has been in existence. Even more amazing are the results of a supposed computer study of the membership, in which it was found that 2,684 members hold a total of 2,796 doctorates. There were also 4,014 Masters degrees!

In regard to participating (as opposed to sustaining or honorary) members, the magazine states: "We can say that the average member is a 42 year old male with an average of 3 academic degrees above a bachelor's degree. (Emphasis ours.) He is probably a college professor teaching in the physical sciences, has a military background as a commissioned officer, and probably has current hobbies of photography, flying, and scuba diving in addition to his interests in unconventional phenomena."

To us, it is utterly amazing that the MARCEN membership should be so unusually literate; but at first glance the above description of a "typical" participating member does seem, at least, to apply quite well indeed to the director, "Dr." McIntyre. He apparently has a background as a Naval officer, and seems to work currently as a photographic consultant to various firms. In the past he has, by his own admission, done consulting work for the CIA - but not on UFO-related matters, he says.

Unfortunately, however, "Dr." McIntyre's doctorate is in serious doubt - in the fine tradition of "Dr." George Hunt Williamson, "Professor" George Adamski, and of course "Dr." Morris K. Jessup. Philip J. Klass, in his relentless quest for Truth, wrote to the publishers of "Who's Who in the East", where McIntyre is listed as having obtained a doctorate in communications from the University of Missouri in 1978. Klass received no reply from the publishers, but through correspondence with the University, he learned that McIntyre was not known there, and that the main campus at Columbia does not even have a communications division. This, in spite of the fact that McIntyre used to have, on the wall of his MARCEN Headquarters, a framed diploma from Missouri, pictured further on in this issue (and taken by a photographer who wishes to remain anonymous.) In looking at the picture, you will notice that friendly Space People have sent

at least 5 small Thought Discs in an attempt to block off the writing on the diploma and thus save "Dr." McIntyre - but alas, most of the writing is still visible!

Klass presented to McIntyre the results of his correspondence with the University of Missouri, and invited the good "doctor" to defend himself, which he did, in a letter to Klass dated Nov. 6th, 1979, of which we have a copy. Unfortunately, this rather astounding letter raises more questions than it answers. We quote the letter in part:

"Your information is accurate. The biography in 'Who's Who' is totally incorrect in the information you cite and other areas....

"Over a year ago....a group of us decided to start MARCEN. This effort went through three distinct phases. During the first phase, we just wanted to collect sightings and information during the period that NICAP was inactive or being reorganized. During the second phase, we decided to test the gullibility of Ufology - mainly as a test instrument for my book, and would try to see how rapidly we could build a fairly sizeable base of an organization, without utilizing the out-and-out fraud we already found so prevalent in the field, but stretching a few facts out of proportion and utilizing the best PR we could muster to make ourselves attractive.

"During the third phase, we realized that we had obtained all of the necessary information on gullibility, and now had a growing organization of sincere people wanting to do something, so we decided to go ahead and try to continue building a large organization which would study and investigate anomalous phenomena with open-minded skepticism and report the results - whatever they might be - in a scientific and scholarly manner. This third phase continues very successfully today, and if we have not fully met all of our own goals yet, we have managed to shake up much of Ufology - which was not and is not one of our goals.

"Anyway, during the second phase, puffed-up biographies, in some cases complete fabrications, were prepared to find out how many people would even want them and how many of these people would then check on them. The answer to these questions was few and none. In the case of my bio, a more prestigious school was substituted for The University External College, which actually awarded me my doctorate and which sounds like a diploma mill even though it is not. (Emphasis ours.) One of my cohorts even purchased (for \$50 I believe) a phony doctorate from Missouri which looks impressive and was hung on the wall with considerable other accurate puffery designed only to be a pretentious display.

"During the bedlam prevailing at our basement 'headquarters', the bio request from 'Who's Who' came in, and a zealous volunteer figured it would be easy to fill it out from existing bio sheets and save me some time. I was not aware of this until the book actually came out and nothing could be done about it. If a proof on the bio came back, I did not see it and no one else recalls seeing it, so when no corrections came back, the publisher had to assume that everything was correct and printed it. I can assure you that it will be corrected in future editions...."

We at "Saucer Drool" have to ask: Just what was this peculiar "second phase" at MARCEN? What Great Truths will "Dr." McIntyre's book reveal? Was the recent wave of ufological hoax letters (discussed in previous issues) part of MARCEN's "second phase" activities? And, does McIntyre really have a doctorate at all, even from "The University External College", which he admits sounds like a diploma mill. No one has yet checked further into any of this.

It is certainly no difficult task to prove that ufologists in general are gullible, nor is it unusual, unfortunately, for saucerers to exaggerate their educational qualifications. (In fact, we're currently working on an expose of another nationally-known club-head who has apparently misstated his credentials.) Nevertheless, it is disappointing to find that our deepest suspicions are true - and that MARCEN is based at least partly on deception! A pleasant personality is no excuse for deliberately adding to

the hopeless confusion that already exists in our field!

Very recently, "Dr." McIntyre has apparently sold his home in Silver Spring, Maryland, and moved to another location nearby but further out in the country. There, apparently under the influence of the notorious Robert Spencer Carr, MARCEN will have a UFO landing field on the property. Fine and dandy, but is this science? As the late "Professor" Adamski used to say, "Only time will tell."



#### MISC. RAVINGS:


