## MISCELLANEOUS RAVINGS:

A sensational new witness, named Gerald Anderson, has come forward very recently to state that as a five year old child, he witnessed the alleged UFO landing near Roswell, New Mexico, in July of 1947. # Gulf Breeze

This is the second of a two-part review of the events of 1990.

Politics and more UFO controversy dominated the second half of 1990 as the November election neared, and opinion was divided as to the authenticity of the UFO photographs taken by Ed Walters. Television film crews milled about the Gulf Breeze area, interviewing key witnesses and reenacting events. The brouhaha refused to die as WEAR Channel 3 TV reporter Mark Curtis appeared on his station's evening news to show photos he had taken using a model similar to the one found in Walters' former home. Tommy Smith, (who later in the year passed a lie detector test), said in an interview with Duane and Dari Cook that Walters' UFO photos started as "a big gag." Walters continued to deny any fakery, and by year's end no conclusive evidence had been found to prove or disprove the truth of Walters' story, and interest in the subject seemed to wane.

The summer brought more national attention to Gulf Breeze, when six AWOL soldiers were arrested in Gulf Breeze and turned over to the CIA and FBI. It was first believed that the group might be in possession of sensitive military information, but the six claimed they were in the area to attend the "Rapture" which they believed would take place in October on Pensacola Beach.

Several months ago, Bill Moore was kind enough to send us a (free) "pre-publication draft" of an onerous new book he and Jaime Shandera have come out with, called "The MJ-12 Documents: An Analytical Report". This book contains about 110 pages of single-spaced text and a number of supplementary exhibits, and it concerns not just the well-known MJ-12 documents, but approximately ten other alleged official documents which Moore & Shandera have been involved with in recent years. Regarding these, Moore concludes that some are genuine, some are clever forgeries, and some "too close to call".

Obviously a tremendous amount of work has gone into this book, and even to read it thoroughly and review it knowledgeably is beyond our scope here at "Smear". Our offhand opinion is that it has a similarity to the infamous Warren Report - too long and detailed to enjoy reading, and tragically, reaching the wrong conclusion in the end.

A brief, superficial, and very negative review has been prepared by CSICOPer Dr. Joe Nickell and a co-author named John Fischer. This can be obtained by writing to Dr. Joe at: 568 N. Broadway St., #16; Lexington, Ky. 40508. There either is or is not a nominal charge for this review.

## Apology to Mr Stanton Friedman and Mr Harry Harris

ON the 19th October, 1989, Stockport resident Ms Jeany Randles, the Director of Investigations of the British Unidentified Flying Object Research Association, wrote to the Manchester Evening News concerning a forthcoming lecture shortly to be delivered at Radcliffe on the subject of UFOs by American nuclear physicist Stanton Friedman. The lecture had been organised by local Sale solicitor Harry Harris.

As a consequence of receipt by the Evening News of the letter, one of the paper's reporters interviewed Ms Randles at her home. Ms Randles has accepted that her letter was defamatory of Mr Friedman and Mr Harris in that it described Mr Friedman as a "fanatic" and suggested firstly that he and Mr Harris were

"cultists and crackpots," secondly that they were not bona fide investigating ufologists and thirdly that the lecture which Mr Friedman was about to present to the Manchester public was composed of outrageous tripe, distortions, bogus documents and deceit.

Ms Randles also accepts that during the interview with the Evening News reporter she led the reporter to believe that Mr Friedman and Mr Harris had adopted a ridiculous belief that the United States government had made a pact with aliens for the abduction of human beings to another planet. Ms Randles accepts that Mr Friedman and Mr Harris never held

these beliefs. As a result of Ms Randles' letter and of its subsequent interview with her, the Evening News published on the 29th October, 1989, in two different editions of that newspaper, an article based on the views of Ms Randles.

The Evening News now with regret recognises that those articles were defamatory of both Mr Friedman and Mr Harris and wishes to apologise to both Mr Friedman and Mr Harris for any distress and embarrassment caused by its repetition of Ms Randles' views.

Ms Randles now acknowledges that the lecture was sincerely and honestly organised and presented by Mr Harris

and Mr Friedman respectively. She accepts that they are committed and reputable researchers in the field and further acknowledges that the portions of the articles in the Evening News dealing with Mr Friedman and Mr Harris were totally untrue. Accordingly she apologises unreservedly to Mr Friedman and Mr Harris for the distress and embarrassment caused by her statements.

Both Ms Randles and the Evening News have agreed to pay Mr Friedman and Mr Harris undisclosed damages and costs in settlement of High Court proceedings for defamation which they have brought following the publication of the articles

# Mysterious symbol in Oregon desert

The first people to see the Idaho Air National Guard photos of the huge geometric design plowed into the southeastern Oregon desert couldn't believe it.

But it turns out to be a Hindu meditation symbol, precisely laid out and plowed into a dry lake bed on the Alvord Desert.

"We're talking a major engineering effort here," Capt. Michael Gollaher of the 124th Tactical Reconnaissance Group in Boise, Idaho, said Thursday. "Somebody

really knew what they were doing, and went to a lot of trouble."

The symbol, known as a sriyantra, measures about a one-quarter mile across, is oriented to true north, and is precisely laid out along a normal training run used by Air Guard pilots, said Gollaher.

"Nobody is really saying this is a UFO type thing," Gollaher said. "The word out at this time is that this is some type of manmade object."

"Most of the speculation is this is probably some sort of cult thing," he added. "Nobody can figure out why somebody would go to such effort to do

this out in god-awful nowhere."

The pictograph was first reported Aug. 10 by Lt. Col. Bill Miller, who returned Aug. 24 and photographed it from his RF-4C Phantom jet, said Gollaher. He said it's unlikely the design was built before the middle of July, because pilots would have spotted it.

"The people in the photo interpretation facility process the film and they say, 'What is this, a hoax?'" Gollaher said. "And we say, 'No, it isn't.'"

No one recognized it immediately, but one of the photo interpreters took a copy of the photograph home, where his wife,



Alicia Gloeckle, identified it in her series of Time-Life books on the occult, Gollaher said.

The design is a square with T-shaped appendages on all four sides. Inside are three concentric circles. Inside those are two concentric circles of lotus leaves. Inside those are nine graduated triangles, four pointing one way and five pointing the opposite, all overlapping. At the very center is another circle.

"It's a focusing device in meditation," said Gollaher. "This particular one symbolizes the continuing of generations. It's a fertility type of thing."





## More circles in the wheat

FOUR mysterious circles — up to 200 feet across — appeared overnight in wheatfields near Sibson airfield, Wansford, last week.

Now two more of the circular patterns which have baffled scientists have appeared in an out field at Wilderness Farm, Market Deeping.

And farmer Henry Steadman is convinced that he has not been the victim of a hoax after a painstaking search of the field for evidence of the culprits who had flattened his crops.

The patterns are similar to the phenomena which have been confounding some of the best brains in the country for weeks.

MISSIVES FROM THE MASSES:

CHRISTOPHER ALLAN, a leading British skeptical UFO investigator, writes as follows:

"Your remarks in the last 'Smear' about Bill Moore and Roswell show up the futility of this whole case. It is indeed ironic that Moore, so long the champion of Roswell, should now be at odds with two new Roswell proponents (Schmitt & Randle) who have taken up the matter. It is even more comic (or sad, according to viewpoint) that Moore's one time partner Stan Friedman should now turn bitter against him.

"Personally I think Moore thoroughly deserves everything he gets. I have not shown you his last very abusive letter to me, and won't bother now. He is obviously severely disappointed that his beloved Roswell (and MJ-12) have not 'caught on' as he hoped. His small band of followers will doubtless stay with him for awhile, but for how long?

"As for Roswell itself, we now have the situation where in the original book (see for yourself) there is one photo showing Jesse Marcel with the actual debris, and another showing the alleged substituted balloon - while Randle & Schmitt say there are not two photos but six, and that these six all show merely the balloon; whereas Moore & Shandera now claim that the same six show the real debris. How crazy and contradictory can it all get? It makes you wonder if any of this 'investigation' has any value at all!

"We also hear, from Randle & Schmitt, that a 500-foot-long trench was formed in the desert by the crashed spacecraft. I will offer you heavy odds that no photo of this alleged trench appears in their forthcoming book. Take me on? They are just piling absurdity upon absurdity, taking people's evidence at face value. Do you realize, by the way, that only about ten (to be generous) of the so-called 'witnesses' (out of some 200) are of any real use. The others are all 'hangers on', just friends and relatives, etc., who saw nothing first hand. And every one, without exception, was interviewed 32, and now even 42, years after the event. Yet this is the kind of evidence that Jerry Clark says will (he hopes) force scientists and Congress to take note of!

"Sure, people will make money out of this, but will science benefit? I am sure you can see the funny side, like me. CUFOS are simply making fools of themselves over Roswell. I would be quite happy to revise my views if they could turn up just one genuine official document on it, or better still, just one piece of real hardware they were searching for at the site. And if a USAF Colonel says something is 'not made on earth', then he obviously knows what he is talking about, even 32 years later, right? Clever people, these Colonels! This is exactly what Moore/Friedman and now Randle/Schmitt are accepting without question...."

The above-mentioned KEVIN RANDLE writes:

"Enclosed is an article that Don Schmitt and I wrote in response to John Keel's theory that Mac Brazel and friends at Roswell found a Japanese Balloon Bomb and couldn't recognize it as terrestrial, so they came up with the flying saucer crash. You'll notice that while Keel fails to name names or list sources, we do both.

"Based on the testimony of witnesses, the documentation available, and the information of sources at two New Mexico museums, we believe that

Keel's theory is in error.

"The big flaw in Keel's theory is that he believes the Fugo balloons were still a secret in 1947. If such was the case, then there might have been a reason to hide the real nature of the find from the public. But there were literally dozens of articles about them published before July, 1947. Without secrecy, Keel's theory is flawed.

"I hope the enclosed article has helped enlighten you on the subject of the balloon bombs. Believe it or not, Don Schmitt and I tried to put a conventional label on the Roswell find. We have yet to do it."

We must reluctantly agree that the article by Schmitt & Randle (too long to print here) seems to successfully refute Keel's Fugo hypothesis. Our sincere thanks to Randle for sending us this material. - Editor.

Jolly olde PHIL KLASS writes:

"While I have no wish to get involved in the new feud between Bill Moore and Stanton Friedman, I must challenge Moore's reference to 'Stanton's always over-inflated ego'. Anyone who has ever met Friedman or heard him speak knows that he is - beyond any doubt - the world's most modest, humble person. It's just that Friedman's philosophy is: 'When you got modesty, FLAUNT IT!'"

"Which recalls Winston Churchill's comments about Clement Atlee, whose Labor Party ousted Churchill after the end of World War II. Churchill observed: 'Atlee is an extremely modest man - and he has every right to be.' The same is true for Friedman!..."

JOHN BRYANT writes as follows:

"...There was a neat article in one of the foremost ufological/piffological journals, 'Weekly World News', entitled 'Incredible Chair of Death; which tells about this murderer who put a curse on his favorite chair such that anyone who sat in it would meet a horrifying death, and how 'scores' of people have sat in it and (naturally) met horrifying deaths. Famed British ufologist & author JENNY RANDLE writes:

"Thanks for your letter and copy of 'Smear'. Now I see what everyone gets so excited about. I don't have any problem with this sort of thing, and feel free to say what you like, when you like, if you think I deserve it. That's fine by me...."

You will note that it is dated Dec. 10th (1990), and apparently Gersten received it after he mailed his second letter to me.

"Now your slavering 'Smear' readers and you your slavering self, can read what I wrote. I have not heard from Mr. Gersten, Esq., since my letter of a month ago. Nor have I heard any convincing evidence from anyone that the Roswell material was created by mankind."


Unfortunately we do not have Space to print Maccabee's reply to Gersten, but in essence it amounts to a rejection of Gersten's "challenge". - Editor.

sical conditions are just right. Thus, over a vast period of time, trillions of universes may have been created in this manner.
