

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
IMPORTANT ADDITION TO "SAUCER SMEAR" STAFF

The Alien Autopsy Film Exposed

In a posting entitled "Alien Autopsy - Game Over", famed British ufologist Philip Mantle attempts to finally close the lid on this ludicrous offshoot of the Roswell Incident.

It was 1995 when England's Ray Santilli came out with his "Alien Autopsy Video", purporting to show footage from the New Mexico desert in 1947. The original film was said to have been obtained from an American military photographer long after the event. Rumor had it that there was a scene showing then-president Harry Truman peaking into the autopsy tent; but alas, that scene was not in any of the versions we saw. What we did see was a hand-held camera crudely photographing a spectacle which, if authentic, would have been one of the most sensational events in

human history.

The details of this new expose are far too long-winded for our format, but we can say this: After it became evident a few years ago that the film version sold to the public was not of 1947 vintage, Santilli claimed that the original film had deteriorated so badly over time that it had to be "re-shot". We now see clearly, through various recent confessions, that there never was any original film. The whole thing was a money-grubbing fraud!

The autopsy video, like the Roswell Incident itself, has been exposed and re-exposed so many times that we can't really believe this is the end of the line. (For more info., see www.outtahear.com, Alien Autopsy Information section.)

Our favorite memory of the alien autopsy syndrome is from the time, somewhere in the late 1990s, that we attended a UFO conference at a large convention hall in Mobile, Alabama. The video was playing continuously on a TV set in the lobby, and perhaps fifty chairs were available to an ever-changing audience. There is one scene where a "doctor" is scooping up the insides of the alien's belly with some kind of blunt instrument. All you could see in the black & white image was thick, dark goo of some sort.

We had bought a bowl of chili at a vending stand near the TV display, and decided it would be fun to eat it during that particular scene. The chili did look a great deal like the guts from the dead alien's body. Several people seated near us moved away in horror & disgust while we were eating. The chili was very good, by the way!...

Well-known UFO/paranormal investigator Stan Gordon (best known for the long-ago Kecksburg, Pa. landing case), has come up with a really strange story from West Virginia.

The unnamed witness was driving on a two-lane rural road at 8 a.m. around October 1st of last year. He slammed on his brakes when he saw, just a few yards ahead of him in the middle of the road, a giant bird feeding on a possum or some similar road-kill.

The bird was at least four feet tall. Its head was higher than the roof of the car, according to the witness. It had a long, somewhat crooked neck, and was covered by dark brown or black feathers. The head had no feathers, and was separated from the body by a very dominant yellowish-orange collar of plumage. The chest area was very distinct and well formed.

The most outstanding feature was the incredible wingspan of this bird. Stan Gordon returned with the witness to the exact location of the encounter and measured the distance across the road from edge to edge. What amazed the witness was the fact that the wingspan turned out to be at least as wide as the road, = 21 feet or more! Said he, "The wings were attached like the arms of a human. There was a very muscular upper torso."

Upon seeing the witness, the giant bird had taken off with a very awkward gait and disappeared from view. The whole incident lasted no more than 10 to 15 seconds.

There were no other witnesses nor was there proof of any kind. Could this be West Virginia's legendary Mothman again, bigger and better than ever? As is so often the case, we will probably never know for sure....

In sending us this item, Vince Ditchkus comments at the top of the page, "If this isn't 'Smear' worthy, I can't think of what is."

You have probably heard of Val (short for Valiant) Thor (the Norse god of war?) He sounds like a comic book superhero, but actually he is a supposed extraterrestrial - captain of a star ship which has apparently been in the vicinity of Earth for quite a long time.

We always assumed Val was the fictional (?) star of the book "Stranger at the Pentagon", published by ufologist Frank Stranges in the late 1950s. This has been Dr. Stranges' most successful book, and for the past few years we have awaited confirmation from him that it is going to be made into a major motion picture - possibly starring John Travolta. So far, there has been no such confirmation.

Meanwhile, a 77-year-old woman named Patti Jeanne Spencer has just come forward, claiming that in 1950, when she was "a nineteen year old virgin", she met Commander Thor and actually married him at a "celestial bonding covenant" on July 17th, 1950, at Onomea Bay, Maui, Hawaii. This union was sealed by a priest of the Polynesian Religion. Patti adds that rumors of Val having another wife on Venus are untrue. (This we definitely believe!)

The reason Patti is upset at this particular time is that she fears "sex scenes" of her & Val will be used in Stranges' movie, for profit. It is not clear why these alleged sex scenes were preserved and now about to be stolen, but Patti fears that the good Doctor will be making extra money by enhancing his movie with these scenes. Even though she is old and broke, Patti does not want to be exploited in this way, and we can't blame her. However, we do know that 1950 is years earlier than Stranges' claims to have heard of Val Thor. Apparently the good Commander was getting around our planet quite a lot before Stranges became aware of him!

Dr. Stranges has warned us that the motion picture may be fictionalized a bit (!) to make it more appealing to the masses, but he never mentioned (slurp, drool!) any Sex Scenes!

Patti is writing her own book about all this, though we won't hold our breath till its publication. In it she tells the whole story, including her visit to Val's small Scout Ship and to his much larger Command Ship, where she was introduced to the crew.

Only Short goes all the way back to the 1950s-1970s period when George Van Tassel's annual conventions at nearby Giant Rock were the hottest thing in ufology - with contactees galore, good drugs, and lots of fun in the wide open spaces!

Your editor attended three times, once with the legendary Gray Barker. This trip led to one of his endless soft-cover books, called appropriately "Gray Barker's Book of Giant Rock".

As some of you may know, the "Integratron" was built by Van Tassel with donations from his many fans, but it was never finished. The blueprint came telepathically from the Space People. It still stands isolated on the desert, with a round dome looking like an astronomical observatory from the outside. We saw the inside once, in the old days, and it is empty. Yet it is nevertheless still considered a sort of "fountain of youth", and many people report cures & health improvements of various sorts, etc...

"Interview with a Snake"! This is the title of a short article in the March 2008 issue of Fate Magazine - an offbeat periodical that has been grinding along for almost 60 years. However, in all that time, we have never read anything quite like this.

It seems that editor & publisher Phyllis Galde has recently adopted a five-foot red-



tailed boa constrictor that had somehow been abandoned in an apartment for a month, without food or water. The interview with this snake was done by an "animal communicator" named Cathy Malkin-Curree, who apparently earns a living from this sort of thing.

Although it is mentioned that snakes have a brain "the size of a grain of sand" (this sounds even worse than reality!), this particular boa speaks very intelligently in the interview. The snake is female. Her main thrust is that humans should be more tolerant of snakes, respect their intelligence and their need for freedom, etc. Says the unnamed snake: "I feel that I am extremely intelligent and capable of taking care of my needs, which has nothing to do with brain size."


Raelians Rocket from Clones to Clitorises: The Raelian UFO cult always seems to come up with a new activity somehow involving Sex, which is a central theme of their pseudo-religion. One remembers awhile back when they claimed to have cloned the first human baby. In spite of much media interest, this claim was never substantiated.

Now they are attacking a barbaric custom, mainly practiced in Africa, in which the female clitoris is deliberately mutilated. Their clinic will do clitoris reconstruction; but it is clear that the cult does not have the facilities to help more than a very few women at a time.

The Raelians have recruited a woman named Marci Bowers, who runs a thriving sex-change clinic in Trinidad, Colorado, and has been called the "rock star" of transgender surgery. Bowers is a "post-op transsexual" herself.

Surgeries to reverse African-style genital cutting have become fairly common in Europe as African immigrants become more westernized. However, few doctors go the extra step - not just dividing the sewn-together skin, but also constructing a new clitoris.

Greg Bishop calls attention to a post by Mac Tonnie of "Posthuman Blues", commenting on the 1967 abduction of patrolman Herbert Schirmer of Nebraska. (This case is #20 on the list of the all-time top 100 UFO sightings, published in our last issue.)

Schirmer saw what looked like a disabled truck near the side of a highway. It was actually an oval object with red lights shining from inside, hovering about eight feet above the ground.

The incident seemed to last about ten minutes, but there was "missing time" of almost an hour. Famed abduction researcher Dr. Leo Sprinkle regressed him, and it was then learned that three 5-foot-tall human-looking beings had approached Schirmer. The apparent leader had spoken with him and given him a brief tour of the interior of the craft. The ufonauts all wore tight-fitting uniforms with an insignia depicting a winged serpent.

This weird incident eventually ruined Schirmer's life and his career in the police department. More details on

The "punch-line" of this case is that one of the beings Schirmer talked with left him with this admonition: "We want you to believe in us, but not too much."


Moving on - Kimball has created a new system for rating ufologists whose opinions he considers "Looney Tunes". Inspired by a particularly absurd rant by exopolitics extremist Ed Komarek, Kimball's new system is somewhat similar to those created by Jacques Vallee and J. Allen Hynek to classify UFO sightings and encounters.

NEWS BRIEFIES

Long-time Cleveland ufological researcher Rick Hilberg continues to publish two quarterly zines and to occasionally come out with one of his \$9 special booklets on some interesting aspect of the UFO mystery.

His latest \$9 tome is called "A Significant Ufological Year - 1966". Indeed, that was the year of the still-remembered Michigan "marsh gas" flap, as well as several other classic cases - such as the long-forgotten Brazilian "lead mask" double murder which had very strong ufological overtones.

For your "Smear" editor, 1966 was the year when we leaped from total obscurity to a (temporary) near-celebrity status, as a nation-wide college lecturer and very frequent guest on radio and television in New York City. It was also apparently the year that the late, great Dr. J. Allen Hynek started to doubt the validity of the Air Force's totally negative stance on the UFO subject.

In our last issue, we questioned why none of the "top 100 UFO cases of all times" has occurred within the past twenty years. In a very informal poll, some people have told us that it's just nostalgia, or else the fact that abductions have somewhat taken the place of 3-D close encounters.

Now, after reading Hilberg's opus, we think we know what the real answer is: These days, very few saucer sightings are close enough to the observer to be totally unambiguous. Reading this book about 1966, we see again and again structural details of the craft, detailed descriptions of lighting, size and shape, etc. Thus, the event must be deliberately made up or else true as reported. There is no room for interpretation or honest mistakes.

Even more interesting is the fact that the more details there are, the more these details vary from case to case! If we are looking for a composite, typical UFO, there just isn't any. It really seems that some Force out there is simply playing with us! Some day hopefully we may find out who is doing this and why.



Dreaded skeptic MICHAEL DENNETT writes:

"Many thanks for another informative issue of 'Saucer Smear'. Your newsletter always brings a delightful mix of data and entertaining silliness. However, I feel you should be challenged on an item in the most recent issue:

"You use the word 'artist' too casually. Calling David Huggins an artist is a stretch. I hope this doesn't come as a surprise, but the 'painting' shown in your issue is awful. Real artists don't have to add words ('Whoa Ladies?') to tell the viewer what's happening. The 'Mona Lisa' doesn't say 'I am mysterious', nor does Edvard Munch's painting 'The Scream' need a caption. Edward Hooper's much-copied 'Nighthawks' doesn't use dialogue balloons for the people in the dinner.

"Actually, you prove my point. In your description you say 'the alien ladies indicate without words that they want to have Sex with Huggins.' This is not what it looks like to me. The 'lady' on the right clearly has her arms crossed. I don't know what your experience with the fair sex might be, but crossed arms are not an indication a woman wants sex. And, CHRIS ROTH writes as follows:

"...I appreciated the extensive write-up of Stephenville, Texas, in the latest 'Smear'. I suppose Stephenville has now entered the lore as a major flap. I also enjoyed the write-up on Scientology. I have always been curious to know the exact nature of the UFO beliefs that lie secretly at the center of that cult. Hubbard's early relationship with Satanists may or may not be relevant to it. Discussions of UFO sects often focus on Unarians, Raelians, etc. However, Scientology and the Nation of Islam are two more or less mainstream groups, of which everyone has heard, that have saucer beliefs at their core - though they avoid the topic in their publicity..."

"I think I may have mentioned this already, but Martin Kottmeyer's first book has come out, published by Anomalist Press. I helped him with parts of it and got a complimentary copy. It's called 'An Alien Who's Who' and is an alphabetical compendium of named alien entities from contact and abduction lore (Orthon, Aura Rhanes, Semjase, etc.) It is fleshed out with a couple of interesting essays - one on whether Aleister Crowley's drawing of a bald mystic named 'Lam' was in some sense the first Grey; and another on why it is that Venus looms so large as a home to aliens in contactee lore despite the near impossibility of life existing there..."

Our old friend GEORGE EARLEY, one of the very few sane columnists writing for UFO Magazine, writes us as follows:

"In ancient times, kings killed messengers who brought bad news; We are more sophisticated today. We merely denigrate the observer if we don't like what he claims to have seen. And so it is with Robert Sheaffer, who employed hearsay and innuendo to try to discredit a UFO sighting witnessed by former Arizona governor John Fife Symington III.

"Had Sheaffer bothered to investigate, he would have learned that Symington never wrote a book about the financial accusations that led to his resignation from office. But such a book - 'Impeachment: The Arizona Conspiracy' - was written and privately published in 1988, by one-time Arizona governor Evan Mecham, following his impeachment earlier that year for financial improprieties.

"Privately published books do not get the promotional attention that major publishing houses do. If the author wants sales, he hits the road, flogging his book at every possible venue. So that 'pathetic little man' Sheaffer saw over a decade ago was very likely Mr. Mecham, not Symington. But then, knowing that, Sheaffer couldn't flange up an honest reason to disbelieve Symington's sighting (which, as we all know, was but one of many, many sightings in Phoenix that night), could he?"

However, Symington is a "nut case", having staged the ridiculous anti-alien press conference scene pictured on the masthead of our January 10th issue. - Editor.




