People ask your Editor this question all the time:

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Greetings once again, fellow saucer fiends!

As we write this editorial in late January, UFO sightings are continuing all around the world, probably at a faster pace than ever. So why do we print so few of them in our zine?

It's because our focus has shifted slightly. Very few recent or current sightings have enough detail or even half enough detail to prove any sort of mysterious origin. And we all know that photos or even videos no longer have much hope of being authentic, due to modern technology. So why print material just because it is current?

There are many great classic sightings from the 1947-1980 period, and there is still a valid UFO mystery, which will probably be solved someday quite a long time from now.

Meanwhile, there are other Fortean mysteries, some of them connected to UFOs and some that are probably not. These still excite our curiosity, and we try to bring a few of them to you - such as the "Miracle" of Fatima item in this issue. We have little hope of holding your interest unless we write about things that really interest us....

For those of you still hoping to locate ET's home planet, there's good news in a new generation of powerful, extremely sophisticated telescopes. One, called Kepler, is designed specifically to look for inhabitable planets around distant stars.

Telescopes coming on line in 2009 will let researchers see farther and more clearly than ever before. They will open new windows on the heavens by using different technologies and different wavelengths of light. They will be able to see things in the far ranges of ultraviolet, infrared, or radio waves that are invisible in the narrow band of optical light.

One of these is the Allen Telescope Array, a set of 42 radio telescopes that will be listening for extraterrestrial messages from possible civilizations around other stars.

The International Astronomical Union, an organization of about 10,000 professional astronomers, has named 2009 The International Year of Astronomy. This is in honor of Galileo, who was accused of heresy by the Roman Catholic Church for insisting that the Earth moves around the Sun...

Man declared dead says he feels good

Thanks to Vince Ditchkus, we have on hand two lengthy tracts of unusual interest, each in its own way.

The first is a 76-page effort by MUFON entitled "Special Research Report - Stephenville, Texas", regarding the now-famous UFO seen visually and on radar on the night of January 8th, 2008. Apparently a very large unknown object was involved, but the sad fact is that there is no clue whatsoever as to its design, purpose, or origin. MUFON has, however, done a tremendously painstaking amount of research, and should be sincerely commended for this effort.

The second item, 41 pages long, is really weird. It is written by one Andrew D. Basiago, President of the Mars Anomaly Research, P.O. Box 2311, Vancouver, Washington 98668. This tract is called "The Discovery of Life on Mars". It involves a sophisticated analysis of a publicly-released NASA photo, which has the number PIA10214. It was taken in November, 2007.

Basiago gives a detailed written analysis of various sections of the photograph, and includes about 75 illustrations based on PIA10214. We are supposed to see statues, humanoids, and all sorts of animals large and small. However, all your editor sees are blurry blobs of various sizes and shapes. Either we really need new glasses, or else we are being subjected to the well-known "faces in the clouds" phenomenon. We assume Basiago is sincere, but that's about all we can say in his favor.

We have only one copy of each of these tracts, and we do not intend to make more. We will send the MUFON item to the first person who mails us \$20 for it, and we will send the Mars item to the first person who mails us \$15 for it. 
Pat enclosed a thought-provoking item about a classic UFO case we have read about before, in more detailed form. It is a quote from a very old item from Bob Ripley's "Believe It or Not": "In October, 1956, Harry Sturdevant, a night watchman at a Trenton N.J. construction firm, became the first person to receive Workman's Compensation as a result of having been 'assaulted by a UFO'. On the evening of October 2nd, Sturdevant spied a distant red light in the sky hurtling toward him. Sturdevant was overcome by a vile odor and collapsed with acute stomach pains. A New Jersey Workman's Compensation referee ruled that this extraordinary claim was legitimate and true!"

We do remember this story from long ago. The only problem is that the Compensation Board did not endorse the legitimacy of the UFO event. All they admitted was that the man had really been injured by something while on the job, and thus deserved payment...

From Greg Bishop's "UFO Mystic" blog we have an item called "The World's First UFO Crash!" We don't know, of course, whether or not this is literally true, but it is nevertheless an interesting though obscure bit of world history.

Back in 1783, fifty thousand cheering citizens of Paris, France watched a 12-foot diameter unmanned rubber-impregnated silk balloon, filled with a weird gas, rise to a height of three thousand feet and disappear into the haze.

It landed fifteen miles away, in the village of Gonesse. The uneducated people there had no knowledge of the goings-on in the big city, and they approached the wreckage with dread. Some assumed the object came from

another world. Others, more sensibly, thought it was a monstrous bird. A few of the crowd approached it for an hour by gradual steps, hoping that in the meanwhile the monster would take flight. Eventually they summoned enough courage to rush forward with pitchforks, which caused a gaseous stench. Finally, they tied the object to a horse's tail, who galloped across the country, tearing it to shreds!

In those long-ago times there was no Homeland Security to protect the masses from such an outrage. We are ever so much more fortunate today...

THE "MIRACLE" OF FATIMA: We are indeed grateful to UFO researcher/contactee Tom Benson for the loan of a three-volume set of books about the exceedingly strange events near the little village of Fatima, Portugal, in the year 1917. These books were published starting in 1982 (65 years after the events!), and are translated from the Portuguese language. They run over 700 pages in all, so not even a proper summary is possible here.

The important thing is that, possibly for the first time, the "miracles" are pursued in an objective manner. These events are not "mass hysteria" or hallucinations as the skeptics would insist, nor are they supernatural events of a religious nature. Indeed, they seem to be UFO/paranormal events, similar to many other occurrences around the world during later years. In fact, Fatima is sometimes called the first major UFO case of the 20th Century. It is amazing that it has received so little attention from ufologists, while Roswell, which is far less documented, has received so much!

The story begins on May 13th, 1917, when three peasant children saw an apparition in an oak tree of a humanoid being they took to be the Virgin Mary. The only trouble is that the creature was little more than three feet tall, and looked like a female child about 15 years old. That's not your typical Grey, but it's not the Virgin Mary either!

The creature stated that similar "miracles" would occur at the same place on the 13th of every month until October, at which time it would reveal very important information about World War I and the future of mankind. The "13th of every month" prediction turned out to be absolutely accurate, which is amazing in itself. The three political well-publicized predictions were complex and obviously heavily burdened by Catholic dogma by the time they were revealed to the public. One simple prediction made on October 13th was that World War I would end that same day, but this did not happen. (That war ended in late 1918)

On the morning of Oct. 13th, 1917, 60,000 to 70,000 people of all political and religious persuasions assembled in Fatima. In the early afternoon, apparently everyone present saw something very weird, though the details of their descriptions vary. It was the "Sun", doing things absolutely impossible for the real Sun to do. We quote:

"Phase One: Spinning upon itself, wherein the stabilized object showed a dull silver, metallic color; Phase Two: Rotation on its periphery, wherein the object showed iridescent borders of dark red, purple, and even black; Phase Three: Oscillation (sudden movements or tremors), tied to its rotation, wherein the object descended toward the ground and rose again, producing a color sequence; Phase Four: Return to the stabilization achieved during Phase One." The whole apparition lasted about ten minutes.

There had been heavy rain, but when the object descended below the clouds, many people claimed there was enough heat to dry their clothes. Yet, unlike the real Sun, this object could be looked at directly without injury to the eyes.

The three peasant children were relatives named Lucia, Janita, and Francisco. All three saw the "Virgin", but strangely only the two girls could hear her speak. Apparently members of the crowd near the children could also see the "Virgin", and it seems that she descended from the craft overhead (= the "Sun") by means of some sort of ladder, and then returned to it the same way. Other religious entities were also seen by some, and these appeared similar to our concept of St. Joseph and the baby Jesus.



Lucia was the leader of the three children, and was responsible for the predictions. She very soon became a nun, and all of her statements during her very long life thereafter were carefully controlled by the Church. The other two children died of natural causes within three years of the "Miracle".

Forewords to the three volumes are written by famed ufologist Dr. Jacques Vallee; UFO reporter Jim Marrs; and (ugh!) William Birnes of "UFO Magazine" and Roswell fame. These books are not perfect, but they represent a sincere well-researched effort to find an objective solution to a very complicated series of events...

We would be glad to hear from any "Smear" readers who have meaningful comments on the above. We have already heard from Martin Kottmeyer, who doesn't seem to believe in UFOs.

**The molecule of life: an unfathomable technology**

Is the molecular architecture achieved in a DNA molecule—containing all the information necessary for a being to grow, reproduce, eat, metabolize, and interact with others—due to the evolutionary processes, the divine creation of a superior intelligence, or even, as some suggest, the result of a genetic manipulation by advanced extra-terrestrials? While mankind has managed to draw a map of this tiny universe, the meanings and purposes behind its various components still remain an elusive mystery.

Several months ago a gentleman named John Cork, from a Hollywood outfit called "Cloverland", came to Key West to interview us in conjunction with the very recent re-issue of the 1951 20th Century Fox science fiction classic "The Day the Earth Stood Still".

Cork and his film crew were very courteous, and we raved on camera for at least two or three hours. Eventually Cloverland mailed us a copy of the resulting 2-disc DVD set, one of which includes a history of UFOs as told by your humble editor and many other alleged experts. A lot of the "Usual Suspects" are there.

Cloverland did a fairly good job, though we (naturally!) have a few complaints. (1) Not enough of Moseley! We are limited to a few very short segments, where we sound/look old & burnt out, which we are! (2) Far too much Roswell, with excessively long input by our friendly (?) enemy Julie Shuster of the International UFO Museum, plus additional dialogue by the daughter of Roswell non-witness Walter Haut.

Worst of all, the infamous UFO non-crash at Aurora, Texas in 1897 is the very first case presented, as it is the oldest. This incident is almost universally acknowledged by leading ufologists as a hoax, though other sightings of that same era are probably legitimate. No less an authority than Jerome Clark, whom we almost always try to believe, has declared this to truly be a hoax. Cork should have checked with us or others.

But of course, it is still the film "The Day the Earth Stood Still" that is the main focus of the DVD set, as it should be.

Paul Kimball's notorious annual "Zorgy Awards" for 2008 are now out, and it doesn't look very good for your "Smear" editor this time!

We were in the running again for "Top Troublemaker", but came in a distant second to David Biedny of "The Paracast" internet interview show. We have an update on two vaguely UFO-related cults:

The first is the Raelians, who claim 70,000 members worldwide, but have their largest presence in Quebec, Canada. The founder, conveniently named Rael, claims to be a contactee, and to know that the human race was created by space aliens about 20,000 years ago. The Raelians are athiests (as are the Space People, apparently,) and one of their main beliefs involves Sex and the pleasures thereof.

Recently, but before the current Israeli war, the Raelians planned a Sex Fest in Israel on "International Orgasm Day", which is their way of seeking to promote world peace.

However, it had to be called off because of threats made by conservative citizens of that country. We, however, have no quarrel with their basic tenet: "Make Love, Not War"...

Then there is the Sub-Genius cult, based on the idea that whereas not everyone can be a genius, each of us can be a Sub-Genius.

This year, the end of the world will supposedly take place on Sunday, July 5th. From July 1st to 5th they will hold their annual outdoor convention in a wooded area of upstate New York. They do this every year, and every year the world fails to end - but the cult gets over the disappointment (?) and goes on!

What keeps failing to happen is that a fleet of flying saucers arrives to destroy the worldwide Conspiracy against the Church, at which time all ordained SubGenius ministers will be rescued by escape vessels piloted by the Alien Sex Goddesses, also known as the Xists (whatever that means).

The whole thing is openly tongue-in-cheek. Anyone (such as your humble "Smear" editor) who sends in a few bucks can become a minister, of whom there are said to be about 100,000 worldwide. Currently there is a recruitment drive, aimed mainly at the people who refuse to conform to the norms of society, including disbelievers, blasphemers, pranksters, rebels, hackers, pornographers, geeks, and outcasts. Your editor qualifies in several of these categories.

Basically, the convention is dedicated to nudity, sex, drugs, and music. Sadly, we have never been able to attend in person, but it sounds like good clean wholesome fun - or whatever. (Our thanks to geek Chris Roth for these two items)...

Maybe this guy is a SubGenius! Famed British computer hacker Gary McKinnon has now signed a written confession in a last-ditch effort to avoid extradition to the United States. However, he denies having actually damaged any U.S. government computers during his very long search for evidence of alien encounters.

This 42-year-old man from North London faces a sentence of up to 80 years in prison if he is found guilty in an American court of hacking into and damaging a total of 97 U.S. Navy, Army, NASA, and Pentagon computers. He was caught in 2002 as he tried to download a grainy black & white photograph which he believes was an image of an alien spacecraft. McKinnon was easily traced by the authorities because he used a personal e-mail address!

McKinnon has stated: "What I did was wrong and I accept that I should be punished. But I am not a member of al-Qaeda. I believe my case is being treated so seriously because they are scared of what I've seen"...

Here's another little-known story from the "Golden Age" of the UFO contactee movement. It was written recently for the Net by someone named Shawn Lindseth.

Gloria Lee was a flight attendant turned UFO contactee. In 1953 she began receiving mental transmissions from an alien entity called "J.W.", who lived on Jupiter - a hot homeland indeed! These transmissions, via automatic writing, were the usual stuff about achieving world peace, etc. There was also information as to how to design a space station.

Lee began writing books about the spiritual teachings of "J.W.," and she founded a group called the Cosmon Research Foundation in order to further spread his superhuman wisdom. Membership in her organization rose sharply as a result of regular advertisements in Ray Palmer's "Fate" Magazine (which still exists with different owners). She also hit the UFO lecture circuit and attracted considerable public attention, though your "Smear" editor never knew her.


In 1962 Gloria Lee went to Washington, D.C. in an attempt to get some government money

JOHN CORK writes re the recent UFO documentary we participated in, in regard to the re-release of "The Day the Earth Stood Still":

"Good to hear from you. Glad you got to see the documentary. Sorry you weren't in it more!

"We tried to talk Fox into letting us expand it into a feature length doc, but we could not drum up the interest.

"You mention Aurora, Texas. Yes, we knew it was a hoax. But it was the one with the most arresting newspaper clipping. I frankly consider all the 1890s airship stories to be hoaxes, but I respect your opinion to the contrary. The point of including it was simply to say that these stories have been around for a long, long time.

"Roswell, as you note, is a hornet's nest! If you can establish that the crash didn't happen one day, well hey, here's another one for you!

"But there were so many stories left behind - so much stuff from you and others that just wouldn't fit in the 35 minutes we had!

"I do hope we get a chance to see each other again, with or without a camera. I loved meeting you and hearing your stories. I am also thrilled to hear that there is a doc on Gray Barker! Please let your readers know if 'Shades of Gray' is going to be available on DVD..."

Crisman and Stranges were also, on paper at least, business partners at one point. When I asked Stranges whether he remembered Crisman, he told me rather tersely that he did not recognize the name and did not want to hear anything more about it!

"Most or all of this historical information is in Kenn Thomas's book 'Maury Island UFO: The Crisman Conspiracy', though, since that fine piece of work sadly lacks an index, I am working mostly from memory. Stranges' secrets, I am sure, went to his grave with him. I am sure they were more interesting than the laughable tall tales he sold to the public as his own UFO experiences..."

for her crusade. Not surprisingly, the politicians were largely uninterested. To call more attention to her ideas, she began to fast in her hotel room. She told her followers that she would eventually lapse into a coma-like state and then wake up, super-charged and ready to roll. Her food-free protest lasted 66 days, and then she died. She was only 37 years old.

It is not clear why no one (apparently) attempted to talk Lee out of her self-destructive path. However, very shortly after her death, several contactees claimed to have talked to Gloria Lee in her new spiritual existence. These included a then-famous contactee named Yolanda of Mark-Age.

Was it all self-delusion, or was there really some sort of entity calling itself "J.W." out there somewhere? This is the aspect of the contactee movement that we may never fully understand.
