Mind you, your Editor sees nothing legally, morally or spiritually wrong with the Mile High Club, but it is amusing. The problem is that it does not mesh with the hoped-for image of a Serious Scientific Society (S.S.S.) investigating an offbeat subject. There could even be ridicule from silly sensation-seeking elements of the press, (S.S.S.) - such as is happening in a mild form right here!

Let us, however, tell you about the more conservative side of Mr. MacDonald. His background, at age 65, is as a long-time pilot. No wars are mentioned. A long-gone researcher named Todd Zechel made an issue of this, and the requirement was soon abandoned.


Before being promoted to International Director, MacDonald worked (for free?) for MUFON as a member of the Board of Directors; Kentucky (not Ohio) State Director; Assistant Director of Investigations; STAR Team Administrator (related to UFO investigations); and the guy testing new field investigators.

Impressive! Many years ago, your editor was briefly a regional MUFON director for Monroe County, Florida, where we live, and we also miraculously passed the field investigators test - though we never actually investigated anything. Nevertheless, we at least pretended to believe that we were helping to save the Florida Keys from alien invasion! And indeed, there were no alien landings or even close sightings here during our reign. (There were some earlier incidents worthy of interest, however.)

Finally, we should tell you that neither the FAA nor Robert Bigelow's still-existing UFO organization has offered any help to MUFON, in spite of MacDonald's obvious connection to the airline industry. You can send your sighting to Bigelow's "EAAS" (?), but they state "our policy does not allow us to provide any information on case numbers or investigations". **JAMES "THE AMUSING" RANDI IN THE NEWS AGAIN;
HIS LONG-TIME PARTNER PLEADS GUILTY TO PASSPORT FRAUD!**

Ever since James Randi (pictured below) tried to sue us many years ago, we don't print anything negative about him unless we have seen it already in print somewhere else.

Thus - the most recent issue of England's wonderful offbeat zine "Fortean Times" (undated, #288), has a headline that reads "'The Amazing Randi' has a new 'Million Dollar Challenge' - bailing his partner out of jail".

The "Million Dollar Challenge", as most of you know, refers to a reward for proof of the supernatural, or whatever. In our humble opinion, the offer is structured so that no one can possibly win.

The main thrust of the article is in regard to a man named Deyvi Pena, who arrived in the U.S. from Venezuela under a student visa in 1984, and has spent his time in the U.S. under the name of Jose Luis Alvarez. He is a painter and an assistant to Randi.

Since Randi recently publicly admitted to his well-known homosexuality, after denying it all these years, it is reasonable to assume that "Alvarez" (or Pena) is a sexual partner of his.

During a famous tour of Australia in 1988, Randi and "Alvarez" successfully hoaxed the press and public with a complex act in which "Alvarez" pretended to be a discarnate entity named "Carlos". The purpose was to demonstrate how easily people can be duped by claims of the paranormal.

Pena's long-term identity switch only came to light in 2010, when the real Alvarez (a teacher's aid from New York) tried to take out a passport, and federal authorities then realized that someone had already done so, using Alvarez's name, date of birth, and social security number!

Police arrested Pena in September 2011 at the home he shares with Randi in Plantation, Florida. He was released on \$1 million bond in October 2011, aided of course by Randi. The question remains unanswered as to how much Randi knew all along about this identity theft. Pena's sentencing will take place this month (May, 2012)...

many times over the years. The current issue contains contributions from famed ufologist Jerry Clark and also by our olde pal Timothy Green Beckley, who raves on about the classic Long John Nebel radio show of yesteryear. Naturally we are mentioned - favorably!...

Another recent arrival to our mail box is the Volume 34, Number 2 issue of IUR, ("International UFO Reporter"), founded in 1976 by the late, great Dr. J. Allen Hynek. The current editors are Jerry Clark, George Eberhart and Mark Rodeghier.

Unfortunately, due to the rise of the internet & other factors, this is to be the last print issue of this prestigious zine, which has been devoted entirely to high-class contributors, with at least a semi-scientific background. Thus it is not surprising that your "Smear" editor has probably not been mentioned there very often - except once as the focus of a very long review of our 2002 book "Shockingly Close to the Truth". The review, written by editor Jerry Clark, was not at all favorable...

Finally, the very recent arrival of "UFO Magazine" tells us that this publication is still out there somewhere. It has indeed been a long time since the last issue, though there is no clue therein to tell us just how long this has been. A year, maybe?

Our long-time complaint about "UFO" has been the fact that some (not all) of their regular columnists are semi-incoherent or worse. This also goes for Colin Bennett, a highly-educated British gentleman whose feature article in the current issue makes us want to reach for the LSD jar.

The other feature article is by famed Roswell icon Kevin Randle, author of a new semi-autobiographical book called "Reflections of a UFO Investigator", reviewed in our February issue. The book was reasonable, as is his article in "UFO", but it baffles us as to why the magazine's cover shows a smiling Lt. Col. Randle in uniform, sitting with a rifle across his legs. Has he discovered a heretofore unknown link between UFOs and the U.S. military presence in the mideast? The caption reads, "In service to country and to research".

Although Randle's military career is barely mentioned at all in his recent book or in his "UFO" article, we are treated to various interesting photos, including one showing the author "sitting in Saddam's chair", in the Iraqi presidential palace after the fall of Baghdad. MORE ABOUT FATIMA

Contributing Editor Curt Collins has kindly passed along to us a very interesting book called "FATIMA PROPHECY - A psychic channels the controversial prophecy of Fatima for the New Age".

The author is one Ray Stanford, whose ufological activities go back to the 1950s. In 1964 or thereabouts he wrote a well-known book about the classic UFO landing in Socorro, New Mexico.

The present little paperback book was published by Ballantine in 1991, but its main focus is on five very long channeling sessions (over one hundred pages of it!) from 1971 and 1972. We of "Smear", for better or worse, simply have no Faith in channeling. Our first problem here is how the Fatima prophecies, which could not be very long in their original form, could give rise to such long-winded commentary and interpretation by Mr. Stanford. Frankly, this part of the Fatima story is purely a religious matter, and therefore is of little or no interest to us.

What we are interested in are the physical manifestations at Fatima on the afternoon of October 13th, 1917, and in particular the unique celestial scene which (forgive us!) seems to involve some sort of UFO - which is weird enough without invoking God Almighty as the cause of it!

In addition, the three children together there saw and heard a female figure who is assumed to be the Virgin Mary, though she appeared to be only three to four feet tall. What we didn't know till we read Stanford's book is that there were very similar visions of Mary (?) led by small groups of young children in Beauraing, Belgium, Nov. 29, 1932 till Jan. 3, 1933, and also in Garabandal, Spain on June 18, 1961 and thereafter. There were also somewhat differently structured visions in Zeitoun, Egypt (very near Cairo) starting in April, 1968. These were apparently seen by thousands of people, off and on, over a period of months. There are a number of photographs which prove nothing.

As for Stanford, from this book he seems to be a deeply religious person of some sort.

We have only met him once, in the early 1980s, when we witnessed a scene in which he freaked out on an all-night radio show in New York City, and stormed out of the studio, with violence. At that time he did not seem very spiritual at all!

We have by now read several versions of the "sky show" at Fatima on Oct. 13th, 1917, and we want to conclude this essay with a long quote from Stanford's book. This quote is attributed to one "reliable witness", who is named but not further described. It seems to be a full, relatively objective presentation of the "show" that was seen by most (but not all) of the many thousands of people assembled:

"...At that moment the rain ceased and the clouds seemed to be pulled apart, revealing...a disc with a sharp rim and clear edge, luminous and lucent, but not painful to the eyes. The comparison of the sun to this disc of smoky silver does not seem to be apt. It had a clearer, more active and richer color, as changeable as the luster of a pearl.... It was not round, as the moon is; it did not seem to have the same character or the same light. It seemed to be a burnished wheel cut from the nacre of a shell. The phenomenon should not be confused with that of the sun shining through a slight fog...because the sun was not opaque, diffused or veiled...

"As the crowd gazed in awe, the 'sun' seemed to quiver in the sky. Now it appeared to spin on its axis like some terrible celestial pinwheel. Faster and faster it whirled, while from its rim fantastic streamers of light flashed across sky and earth, coloring the landscape and the faces and hands of the spectators with red, violet, blue, yellow, white - a montage of constantly changing colors....

"The 'sun' continued to spin very wildly for about four minutes. Then it stopped, as if to give the worried crowd a moment's rest, only to resume its spinning and the phenomenal display of varicolored light...Many people who had mocked those traveling to Fatima trembled, wailed, and fell on their knees in the mud, asking God's forgiveness.

"For a second time the 'sun' stopped its spinning. Then it resumed, throwing off varicolored light and spinning with increased ferocity. Suddenly it seemed to be torn from the heavens, as some reported, and came crashing toward Earth, sending out an intense heat that caused mounting terror....The 'sun', retaining its rotary motion, left the heavens and boldly advanced on the Earth, threatening for terrifying moments to squash us with its huge and fiery mass...

"Just when it seemed certain that truly, the 'sun' was coming to burn up the Earth, - that the fiery orb was about to crash into the crowd, - the disc retreated into the sky. When the shaken masses rose from their knees, they found that, although they had been soaked to the skin before and had been kneeling in the mud, they now, their clothes and the ground were completely dry."

This last part sounds a bit "over the top" to us, but we will print it anyhow; "Praises of God and the Lady from Heaven were heard all around, and the three little shepherd children were borne off triumphantly on the shoulders of the crowd. Joyfully, Lucia announced the coming period of peace."

Who knows what all this means. We don't.

A FEW LITTLE-KNOWN FOREIGN UFO LANDINGS FROM YEARS PAST:

Continuing our unofficial "Smear" policy, we are still ignoring current "lights in the sky" and concentrating on UFO cases that are so clearly detailed that they must either be legitimate incidents or hoaxes of some sort.

Back in 1954, there was a "flap" of saucer landings in Europe - particularly in France. Your editor had a foreign press clipping service at that time, and early issues of "Saucer News" published several amazing exclusives.

On the evening of October 9th, 1954, a group of three young children in the French village of La Cretive Pourroy observed "a brilliant machine" landing near them. It was a circular object about 2½ meters in diameter that stood on three legs. The object had black, yellow, and white lines on it.

A small humanoid emerged, wearing a black robe, similar to a priest's. In his hand he held some kind of flashlight, the brightness of which blinded the children temporarily.

The strange "man" spoke in a language they did not understand, and so the frightened children ran away.

It's interesting how many of these weird incidents involve children. On October 25, 1954, two 12-year-olds in Macerata, Italy, were tending their sheep in daylight when the dogs began barking furiously, and they then saw a small thin "thing" about two feet tall moving through high weeds nearby.

The little entity was of human appearance, but with a large melon-shaped head. This creature started running toward a strange dark object shaped like a large barrel. Presumably the creature managed to get inside it just before it started rising vertically, emitting a low whistle.

After going up about 20 meters, the "flying barrel" ejected a ball of fire, which exploded when it hit the ground, hitting the children with a violent gust of wind caused by the shock wave of the explosion. The UFO then disappeared from sight at high speed.

In both the above cases, the children's stories were partially confirmed by adult sightings in the vicinity. It is said that the alleged landing area in the Italian case was left with a mark (not described) that was still visible for many years!

We had not realized until very recently how many very close UFO encounters have occurred in Australia. An undated 1955 case tells of three men who, in broad daylight, saw a shiny object falling from the sky into a deserted area about two miles from them. They decided to make a thorough search for it, and after an hour or so, they came upon some "jagged shiny wreckage" and a figure moving nearby.

The figure was unusual even by ufological standards; It is reported that it was semi-human looking, but also "somewhat frog-like". It wore a loose-fitting green cloak that hung down to its knees. There was a curved horn on each side of the head, and its hands and feet were armor-plated. The creature soon "disintegrated" right in front of their eyes. Nothing is stated about what happened to the crashed spaceship!

Someone - possibly parapsychologist George Hansen - has said that these strange alien antics represent "theatre" in some sense. After all, can there really be intelligent creatures out there with an apparently infinite variety of different sizes, appearances, and "spaceships"? Perhaps the purpose is to slowly convince us that our environment contains mysteries beyond our understanding. Or, as one American contactee states, he was told by a supposed alien entity: "We want you to believe in us, but not too much."

Or maybe some of these creatures from Somewhere Else just want to be friends, but don't know quite how to go about it.

Of course we must close with a Sex & Saucers episode. (Gray Barker would be pleased with this!) The key paragraph, which we don't necessarily believe, reads as follows:

"A door opened and a tall, handsome man wearing a metallic green tunic stepped out; she felt compelled to obey him, and entered the UFO. Here he told her telepathically that she had been chosen to be the first Earth woman to bear a child by their race. He had intercourse with her, and then escorted her out of the ship, but she accidentally tripped over some kind of switch, causing a flash that burned her ankles. She passed out and then found herself lying in the field. When she returned to her friend's house she found that she had been gone for several hours. Later she was found to be pregnant."



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LETTERS TO YE OLDE EDITOR:

Distinguished ufologist KEVIN RANDLE writes as follows regarding distinguished ufologist Stanton Friedman:

I wonder why it is impossible for Stan to mention the mythical MJ-12 without directing a snarky comment at me. He wishes that someone would come up with a new criticism of MJ-12, but has failed to adequately address the issues that arose some 25 years ago.

There is no provenance for the documents and contrary to Stan's assertion that this is an argument in MJ-12's favor, it is a real stumbling block suggesting the documents are faked.

He rejects Peter Tytell's assessment that the Truman memo is faked, saying that Tytell made no formal report. Stan knows the truth here because he sent the documents to Tytell in the first place.

He ignores the contradictions in his own positions. A crash on the Plains of San Agustin is real, but there is no mention in the EBD. A crash at Aztec is real, but there is no mention in the EBD. If those were real crashes, then the document is bogus... and if the document is real, then these crashes must be bogus.

As for something new, the alleged crash in the El Indio - Guerrero didn't take place. The single source for this has been discredited, a fact with which Stan agrees, but he claims the crash is real. There is no evidence, other than the man's statement to suggest otherwise, and in this case absence of evidence is evidence of absence.

I do wish Stan would come up with something better for the lack of evidence than this. Besides, it is up to him to prove MJ-12 authentic, not up to us to disprove them, and without a provenance or some kind of independent evidence to support them, the only conclusion to be drawn is that they are faked.

Ace researcher CURT COLLINS writes as follows:

The new Saucer Smear was great. I thought you did a good job of wading through the Fatima stuff. Getting into religious territory makes for some sticky business. They can announce something and expect people to believe it just because they said. Sounds like something Friedman would say: belief by proclamation!

The President's Roswell remarks were good too, but I expected you to stir things up a bit more. Essentially, B.O. is saying that this UFO business, and Roswell in particular, is childish. He's losing the ET contingent. How can he possibly get elected now without MUFON's support.

I also liked the review and commentary on the Skinwalker book. I believe the experience there further convinced John B. Alexander that the phenomena is elusive and reacts to attempts to study it. Some old saying about a watched pot...

There was some other good stuff too, but what really got my attention was Stanton Friedman's letter ranting about Menzel and MJ-12. He sounds as if he is unaware of your efforts to get to the truth of the matter. I've enclosed a copy of an article from the Sept. 1987 MUFON Journal. Apparently Walt Andrus thought you were on the right track about Menzel's innocence and you "must be commended for taking the initiative".

As of this writing, Gene Steinberg is planning a re-hash of "the good old days" of ufology on a soon-to-be-heard edition of his internet radio show called "The Paracast". It's not heard nearly as far & wide as Long John's program used to be, but it's much better than nothing. - As for "Shockingly Close to the Truth", it received reviews that were nearly all favorable, but in all this time, since published in 2002, it has not sold very well at all. We also had in mind a follow-up book about grave robbing (= amateur archeology) in Peru, in the late 1950s, but sadly, this is not to be.
