FLYING SAUCERS OVER INTERNATIONAL HEADQUARTERS IN CONNECTICUT

Flurry of Sightings After Formation of IFSB

WASHINGTON, D.C. — During July and August there were unusual reports from our Capitol that saucers were picked up on the radar equipment at that location. The Air Force ordered jet planes up to chase these objects that caused "blips" to appear on the radar screen. No satisfactory solution has yet been decided upon. One scientist claims to have formed flying saucers in a test tube—but that's not definite yet, either.

NEW YORK CITY, N.Y.—Sightings were reported over midtown Manhattan after the news of the radar discovery in Washington, D.C. Persons seeing the objects claimed that they were of an orange color and oval shape. Within ten days sixty reports were made. All this took place in the latter part of July, but reports have still been coming in.

LOS ALAMOS, N.M.—An unidentified object was sighted over major atomic installations at Los Alamos. It was shiny and metallic, made a 360 degree turn and appeared for about 30 minutes. Jet fighters pursued but with no success. Occurrence August 2, 1952.

LANCASTER, CALIF. — Over the Mojave Desert—Two round reddish white lights were reported moving in the sky shortly before midnight. Jets investigated with no results. August 2, 1952.

SEATTLE, WASH.—Large meteorite object burst over Seattle, and after it fell apart there was an explosive roar. This happened during July.

MIAMI, FLA. — Eight saucers sighted by airline pilots over Chesapeake Bay. They were 100 feet in diameter, moving at 1000 miles per hour, and glowing like red hot coals. July 16, 1952.

BRIDGEPORT, CONN.—It seems that the flying saucer occupants know of the formation of the IFSB and its purpose. Since the formation of the society numerous objects have been sighted over Bridgeport and surrounding towns. Previous to this there were no sightings. It may be only a coincidence but the officers of the IFSB do not consider it to be such. The occupants of the saucers may be looking for friends and have found them in the IFSB.

In Bridgeport alone a couple riding in their automobile in Seaside Park sighted a round ball-like object traveling about 3000 feet up and at a rate of approximately 200 to 300 miles per hour.

One of our own club members sighted an orange object, round in shape with a point in front. It came from the west and she lost sight of it in the sun. She sighted this object before she became a member of the IFSB.

In Milford, Connecticut about eight miles from Bridgepo , the police and thirty residents sighted a bright silver ball over Long Island Sound.

Silver objects that hung in the sky were observed in New Haven, Connecticut by aircraft ground observers.

The President of the IFSB is losing sleep nights hoping that he will get to see one of the saucers. If they decide to contact anyone he wants to be on hand for that occasion.

The President announces that branches of the IFSB will soon be in operation in England, France and Brazil. People have been contacted there and have shown wide interest. We hope to also have branches in Mexico, Italy, and Australia. We are already formed in two Canadian Provinces, Ontario and Quebec.

MAYFIELD, KY. — Strange object sighted by twenty persons. Bright orange and yellow color, 100 feet long, and with round nose and pointed tail. August 31, 1952.

DENVER, COLO.—Objects moving at 3000 m.p.h. were reported by a veteran airlines pilot over Denver. They seemed to be controlled objects of yellowish tinge. They had no light or glow. Occurrence—July 19, 1952.

CLINTON, IOWA—Three fishermen sighted an egg-shaped object, very bright, which moved in a whirling clockwise motion. It disappeared and reappeared before taking off. August.

SEOUL, KOREA—Crew members of United States bombers sighted mysterious objects over Korea. They were globe-shaped, bright orange in color and emitted an occasional flash of bluish light. July, 1952.

DAYTON, OHIO—In two weeks over sixty reports of strange objects were reported. June 17, 1952.

DODGE CITY, KAN. — American Airlines pilot sighted "bluish-white" star-like object. It was traveling at about 500 to 1000 m.p.m. This was sighted in August.

MADRID, SPAIN — Several hundred residents sighted three round, shiny objects traveling at tremendous speed. The objects left vaporous trails. August, 1952.

SALEM, MASS.—A Coast Guard photographer claims to have snapped a picture of three flying saucers in formation. The photo was printed in all leading newspapers on August 1, 1952.

LANSING, MICHIGAN — Yellowish-orange "things" hovered in the skies over Lansing. The objects varied in size from cigar-shapes to saucer shapes. July 29, 1952.

OGDENSBURG, N.Y.—Three silver-objects sighted in the sky about 20 minutes. Shape seemed to be round and in three sections. July 25, 1952.

WEST PALM BEACH, FLA.—Scoutmaster and three scouts encountered strange object in wooded area. Tried to investigate and were blasted by ball of fire. The object was shaped like a half-a-rubber ball, about three feet thick and high enough in the middle to permit a man to stand. He claims he knows what the object was, but that it was better for him not to go any further with his knowledge because it might cause panic. The Scoutmaster said that his hair was singed off and tiny holes burned in his cap. The grass and growth around the area was burned. Army is investigating. August 23, 1952.

ANCONA, ITALY — An object blazing as bright as the sun crashed into the sea off the Adriatic Coast. August 2, 1952.

FT. WORTH, TEXAS — A noiseless fast-moving form with a fiery tail, sighted near Ft. Worth. August, 1952.

CHEYENNE, WYO.—Two air base airmen reported seeing a large "flying saucer" object coming out of the east as a tiny dot, it grew larger and threw off a blinding light. It hovered over the base about 30 seconds and then took off to the west. August 9, 1952.

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK—A Lt. Comdr. of a ship claims to have seen a bluish-glowing triangle. Speed estimated at about 932 m.p.h. in southeast direction. Sept. 14, 1952.

SUTTON, W. VA.—A housewife and six boys investigating a report that a flying saucer had landed on a farm, were confronted with a 10-foot tall monster, with a bright green body and a blood-red face. The monster gave off an overpowering odor that made all of them vomit. The group ran off, they were so frightened. Investigation proved that only the odor remained—but what was it? Sept. 14, 1952.

EDITORIAL

MY THEORY

ARE SAUCERS HERE TO STAY?

I started reading Science Fiction nearly twenty-five years ago. Anything that might possibly happen such as a visitor from another planet, or galaxy, I would be reasonably well prepared for. Don't get me wrong. I wouldn't be too surprised . . . but I sure would be as excited as a palsied Mexican jumping bean with the seven-year itch. Therefore, when in 1947 the saucer story hit the headlines I guess I more or less greeted the news as something I had been looking forward to for a long time, like greeting an old friend.

The many books and articles you see now concerning strange objects in the sky have caused quite a flurry of excitement to a lot of people, especially to those who have never discovered Science Fiction. Apparently a lot of the skeptics are gradually coming around to a point of asking a few explanations.

The Government has a lot of us wondering whether it is trying to protect the public or stick its head in the sand. Unless the Government has something new it can't talk about, but does know something about the saucers, I believe the time is about right for that little bit of information.

One of the most recent reports is the very interesting phone interview with Bill Squire by Frank Edwards, radio commentator. Bill lives in Pittsburgh, Kansas, and was going to work early one morning at radio station KOAM when he spotted this thing beside the road. Apparently it was hovering about ten feet above the ground.
