CLIPPER GEMS

From Baltimore, Md., Sun., Oct. 27, 1958--Phillip Small and Alvin Cohen reported two UFO over a bridge at Loch Raven Reservoir last night as they were driving along Loch Raven Road. They reported seeing a round, white, egg-shaped object floating or suspended over Bridge No. 1. They said the object appeared to be about 100 feet long. As they approached to within 75 feet of the bridge the motor of their car and all the electricity went off. They got out of the car and observed this object for about 45 seconds to one minute, after which the object glowed very intensely and threw off a lot of heat. The object then shot straight up in the air with a loud clap or the sound of an explosion. The object then disappeared within five or ten seconds. Small said after he got back in his car the motor started immediately and the lights turned on. He also stated the heat was so intense he believed his cheek on the left side was burned.

From Frederick, Md., News, Oct. 20, 1958 -- Allen Etzler, 26-year-old cabinet maker and former radar operator of Laytonsville, said he was driving home from work about 9:30 one night when he glanced off to one side of the road and saw what looked like a "glowing ball". When first sighted, he said, it was only "about as high as a silo", but within a few seconds shot upward into the night at a startling speed. It was soon out of sight overhead. His story of the "glowing ball" comes shortly after several other residents of this section of the state had reported a bright-flaring light in the sky.

From Garden Grove, Calif., Daily News, October 23, 1958 -- Richard H. Osterloh, 34, of Anaheim, Calif., said he saw a UFO over Disneyland. "It was the size and shape of a blimp, surrounded by a halo glow and with three or four brightly shining colored lights in the center. It had a tail about three or four times the length of the object itself, with a bright light shining at the end. It was about 12:30 a.m. when I first saw it. I was driving home from work. It seemed to be about 300 yards over Disneyland parking lot. I drove along slowly and watched it for about two minutes. Then it took a sharp dive and disappeared in a bright flash as it neared the ground.

A UFO photograph taken by a youth in the same area last year aroused considerable interest throughout the nation and was picked up by investigators from the U.S. Air Force for study.-- Thanks to Dr. Buchli.

LIFE ELSEWHERE IN THE UNIVERSE?

From New York Times, November 16, 1958--Dr. Melvin Calvin, University of California chemist known for his pioneering studies of the chemical processes of photosynthesis, stated in a lecture at the University of Washington last week that "given the original physical conditions of the primordial earth, the genesis and evolution of life, including complex forms like man, have followed virtually an inevitable pattern".

Dr. Calvin based his reasoning upon knowledge that has been built up in recent years in many chemical laboratories, including his own, about the primordial earth and its atmosphere and the subsequent evolution of inorganic into organic (carbon-containing) molecules of growing complexity, which led to the development of structures having the characteristic of life.

Predictable pattern: Chemical knowledge, Dr. Calvin said, is now great enough to propose with some certainty that the evolution of chemicals up to and including a living cell occurred in a predictable and inevitable pattern. With higher forms than the cell, however, determinism prevailed under broader conditions. Thus, he said, it could be expected that plants and animals would develop, but that their precise form would not be predetermined.

Observational scientific evidence, he added, suggests the existence of life--including plants and animals-- widely throughout the universe. The plants and animals might not look like those on earth. But having a comparable environment, they would have similar sense organs, such as seeing and hearing organs. There would, in Dr. Calvin's view, be living forms--capable, like man, of thought.

An implication of such a concept, he said, is that life is a major cosmic phenomenon, rather than a trivial accident on an insignificant planet, and that thinking creatures may be altering their environment throughout the universe even more profoundly than man has altered the earth.

As man launches his machines and himself into space, he continues, he will transform other planets in the same way that he transformed the surface of the earth.

Man's venture into space, he concluded, is not a mere demonstration of his strength; it is an inevitable and necessary aspect of evolution, which depends upon each organism's developing its every potential to the greatest extent.

Plenty of refreshments were made available by the ladies. Cookies were in many sizes and colors. Were the little green ones supposed to be for the "little green men"?


This affair took place in the basement of the Kansas City Museum. This small banquet room has an excellent kitchen facility attached and provides a fine meeting place for smaller crowds.
