When he came to the United States he became a Baptist minister and pastored for some time the First Baptist Church of East New York. Later he became an independent minister and evangelist not affiliated with any denomination. He has been pastor of Fellowship Tabernacle-World Church in Des Moines for some five years. It is an independent, autonomous church, incorporated with the state of Iowa.

Dr. Parsons says that he has been having contacts with the space brothers since October, 1957, and is still having them. He claims to have several mementos of his contacts but cannot promise to bring them as he says he has to have "permission" first.

SOUTH AMERICAN NEWSPAPER TRANSLATION

Society in Buenos Aires Affirms That Inhabitants From Venus, Jupiter and Mars Will Come to Earth This Year. By Alfredo Margenat.

"El Mundo"--(San Juan Puerto Rico News), March 5, 1959.--The "Association of Universal Metaphysics" that has its headquarters in Buenos Aires, Argentina, announces that during the course of this year 1959 inhabitants from Mars, Venus and Jupi-

ter will launch on the Earth with the purpose of interviewing men of science, professors and newspaper men and explain their purposes of fraternity and peace with earth people.

This is what the president of said association, Mr. A. Millan, who lives at Alsina 1645 G, Buenos Aires, Argentina, South America, tells in a letter to EL MUNDO (Newspaper).

Regarding the desired trips to the Moon, the president of the universalists of Buenos Aires says the following:

"With due respect and admiration for the North American, German, Russian and English scientists we must tell you that such a launching will be impossible. The missiles will not be able to come in because as soon as they get close to a certain zone in the atmosphere or surrounding rings of those planets, they will be disintegrated without being able to send any warnings.

The leader of the association of Flying Saucers brings out the point that only very highly developed beings, or the inhabitants of those very planets can enter those planets."

He warns that only those who come with the purpose of fraternity, peace and love can enter the moon or other planets from the Earth.

Mr. Millan sends various newspaper clippings, among them some from EL MERIDIANO (the Meridian) edited in Cordoba, Argentina. In them are various reports that "soon we will again see the wonderful and flashing space ships through Cordoba, Buenos Aires, Mendoza, Salta, LaPampa, San Luis and San Antartico, and that several of these ships will be of a purple color.

In these space ships will come beings from other planets as peace ambassadors and they "will also come to bring scientific progress and spiritual progress attained in their worlds to cooperate with the earth's progress."

In El Meridiano newspaper it is announced that showers of meteors will fall on Earth to announce the great events of interplanetary nature that is drawing near.

The metaphysicians from this Group of Flying Saucers announce that the first ones in arriving here will be the inhabitants from Mars, Jupiter, and Venus. Among their purposes in coming here to Earth is the one of warning the earth people of the great danger that is involved in using atomic energy in atomic tests, hydrogen bombs, uranium and also those launchings to the moon.

The metaphysicians from Buenos Aires want to impress upon us the idea that those inhabitants from other planets will not come with aggressive ends to Earth but "with the only interest in fraternizing with the inhabitants of our planet."-- Contributed by Neal Pinkerton--translated for him by a friend (original clipping in Spanish). MYSTERIOUS LIGHT INTRIGUES HUNDREDS

For more than eight weeks viewers by the hundreds have gone to a place on Sac River some 10 miles east of El Dorado Springs, Mo., to watch a mysterious light that moves about the area almost every night.

The light has appeared in different places, and in different patterns of performance. Also it refuses to conform to any time pattern as it may appear early one night and late the next.

These are findings from interviews of a number of people in ElDorado Springs, April 1. Among those interviewed were Mr. C.A. Hendricks who operates an insurance agency there; Mr. Clarence Parsley, a printer, his wife and daughter, Beverly; Mr. Noble Carter, a grocer; Mr. Evans of Evans Drug; the high school principal, Mr.

Royce, and high school students, Charles Spicer, Sharon Boswell, Danny Gann, Raymond Flieschman, Jim Dislon, Laurel Mays and Richard Jackson.

Mr. Hendricks reported, "I was out there a week or ten days ago and there were probably 40 or 50 people watching for this light they had seen in the past, and about 10:15 the light did appear close to the river at Vilhower's Bluff. It appeared to be about 18 feet in the air. It was blinking at regular intervals. It was a bright red and it was on for approximately 10 to 15 seconds and it blinked about 6 or 7 times. It seemed to have traveled about half a quarter of a mile in that length of time. It appeared about 5 minutes later going in the opposite direction and it blinked about 3 times and went out. It blinked at regular intervals and was bright red. It looked something like a beacon light. It was below the timber line and appeared to be hanging there in mid air, blinking and traveling at a fast rate of speed."

Mr. Hendricks' daughter had previously seen the light. She told him it blinked once up a ways, blinked again down close to the ground, then blinked 4 or 5 times while traveling parallel and went out. She said it blinked at steady intervals.

The term "blinking" was described as equal intervals of which it was visible and of which it was not visible.

Mr. Clarence Parsley, a printer with the Witt Printing Co., reported seeing it on two different nights. He said, "At first it was a bright light and it wasn't moving. Then after a while it turned to a bright red, and went to flashing on and off like a patrol car, and moving to the east." He said it disappeared for a few seconds and then re-appeared about half a quarter of a mile east of the previous position. Then it made another appearance to the south with the appearance of being some 2 or 3 feet above the ground and in the road."

Five days later, according to Mr. Parsley's report, he returned to the area and viewed it again. He also said a large group of people saw it that night. He said, "That time it was just below the timber line. It was going east across the bottom field toward Blackjack. Four fellows took out running and tried to catch it, but they didn't have any luck."

A little later this same evening it appeared about one-eighth of a mile from the watchers and drifted to the southeast until it got to the edge of the timber. It stopped for a little bit, started dropping and was flashing as it dropped. It gave the appearance of hitting the ground and went out."

Reports indicate the light or object was round and appeared about the size of a volley ball. It has been reported as a green light. Has traveled different speeds, over a wide area and all the way from close to the ground to tree-top level. On one night the report gave 5 lights at one time. Some reports gave lights that were steady and did not blink.

The people of El Dorado Springs are very cordial and cooperative. McFARLAND SIGHTING NEAR JEFFERSON CITY, 1957

Question: Mr. McFarland, I understand you saw an interesting light in the sky some two years ago.

Mr. McFarland: "Well, it wasn't exactly a light, it was a flying object of some type. I was coming back on my vacation. It was around the second week of October, 1957. We were pretty close to Drake, just a little bit the other side of Drake, between Mt. Sterling and Drake on Highway 50 East. I noticed it in the sky and told my wife, and asked what she thought it was. She said nothing but a cloud, so I continued on. So I got where you turn off to a little town there, I forget the name of the town. I pulled up to a little gas station, got out and looked up at the sky. It was about 4 or 4:30 in the afternoon. We all got out. My wife took a look at it and so did my two children. They both recognized it as a cigar shaped object with a reddish flame streaking out the back of it. It was, I'd say 5,000 to 10,000 feet high, I don't know exactly. Of course I don't gauge distance too well. It was about half a mile from us. We watched it for about 5 minutes and it was going at an enormous rate of speed because I could gauge it by the ground it was covering. And all of a sudden


it made a 90 degree turn and went straight up, and it disappeared. That's the last we ever saw of it. We went on into Jefferson City. We got there about 5:30 or 6, and reported it to the state patrol at the main office, to Highway Patrol Troop Headquarters, and they filed it, they said. That's all I ever heard of it. If you want to collaborate my statement you can get hold of my wife. I live at 402 North Ridgeway, Jefferson City, Mo., and my phone number is 65785."

He described the flame appearance leaving the object as being reddish orange, but the object itself being a silver color. Mr. McFarland operates a wholesale route out of Jefferson City for radio and television parts. (My apologies, Mr. McFarland, for failing to get your initials--Guess I became too interested in your sighting.) Thank you, Mr. McFarland for an interesting interview.


SLOW OBJECT OVER ELDORADO SPRINGS

On the evening of April 1, 1959, at 10 minutes til 7, three people watched an object go slowly over Eldorado Springs, Mo. They were Mr. Evans, owner of Evans Drug Store; Sharon Boswell, an employee, and Charles Spicer. They reported the object as being extremely high and moving in a southeasterly direction at a fairly slow speed. They believed it to be tremendous in size. It appeared as a bright star for about 5 minutes, then turned red for about 5 minutes, then back to white again for about 5 minutes. By this time it was diminishing and the three stopped watching it.

At the time this was taking place an interview was under way pertaining to the mystery light east of there. The interviewer returned to the Evans Drug Store immediately following this interview and was immediately informed of the sighting which had only a minute or two before ended.
