

DR. WILLIAMSON TO RETURN

Dr. George Hunt Williamson is scheduled for a return engagement Sunday, August 2. Rather than the usual time this lecture will be held at 7:30 o'clock in the evening. Dr. Williamson has returned to the United States from Bolivia and Peru and has all new material. This lecture is entitled "City That Existed Before the Moon," and is fully illustrated with color slides.

Dr. Williamson is the anthropologist who lectured for us April 12. He gave us two very fine lectures that day and we expect this to be another outstanding lecture in the field of ufology.

Dr. Williamson served with the Army Air Corps during World War II as Radio Director for the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command. He received the Army Commendation Award from Brig. Gen. C. W. Lawrence for his outstanding record of service. He served as an instructor in anthropology for the United States Armed Forces Institute.

He attended Cornell College, Eastern New Mexico University, the University of Arizona, and took a special course at the University of Denver. He majored in anthropology in the northern part of the United States, Mexico, and Canada. He is an authority on Indian dances, music and ceremonial costuming. He is listed in "Who's Who In America" and "American Men of Science". He is presently head of the Department of Anthropology at Great Western University, San Francisco, and director of the Andean-Amazonian Field Station, Peru, South America.

Dr. Williamson is the author of a number of books, including "The Hopi and Zuni Indians," "The Saucers Speak," "Other Tongues, Other Flesh," "Secret Places of the Lion," and "Road in the Sky."

All went well for Bob through the convention. He made his recordings, talked to the contactees, made special tape interviews and gained all the material he needed for his report again this year in book form.

But Monday was another story. He had started his trip to Waterloo, was on the highway some four miles east of Willow Springs, Mo., when the rear tire blew out. He was scooted or dragged about 75 feet. His back was scratched extensively, he received a hole in his side, a deep wound in his head and a hand was mangled to the extent that the leaders were showing.

Yes, this was a dark hour for a rugged individual. But it was not to remain dark for higher authority had played a role. Through hunches, intuition, or whatever you term that guiding force, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Hensevelt had felt a strong impelling force that urged them to delay their departure, and they did. This placed them several minutes behind Bob, so that shortly after it happened they came upon the accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Hensevelt brought Bob to their home in Lexington for the night, then made the trip on to Waterloo the next day.

Needless to say the relationship established between the Hensevelts and all of Bob's relatives was wonderful. Needless to say such an action as this found the gold in someone else's heart.

We know you have been paid, Mr. and Mrs. Hensevelt. Paid in a portion of something money cannot comprehend. We know you will receive more such payment.

To you, Bob Young, man of fortitude, man with a cause, get well, real soon.

CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

Several persons of this area attended Buck Nelson's Spacecraft Convention at Mountain View, Mo., June 27 and 28.

A number of those present camped out at the convention site and enjoyed the camp fire atmosphere as they listened to speakers on Friday and Saturday nights, June 26 and 27.

Tape recordings of the convention were made by several people and will be available in the club's tape library.

One of the highlights of the convention was George King, chairman and founder of the Aetherius Society of England. He spoke relative to his communication with masters of other planets and urged universal peace through abandoning our atomic and hydrogen bomb tests. He also told how space people are helping us, such as: maintaining satellites to provide energies, charging mountains as New Age power centers, alleviating radioactivity, easing conditions, continuing the teachings of Jesus, and preparing the way for a forthcoming avatar.

Another high interest spot was Jim Velasquez (Ethe), of Santa Ana, California. He spoke of his psychic experiences with the "Lords of Light of Etheria," passing on information conveyed to him via a question process used by space people during subsequent telepathic contact. With a word directed especially to the contactees he made a plea to them to "clean up their ranks." He also explained music he has been given corresponding to the vibratory rates of colors, which he has on disc recordings, and told of forth coming volumes of New Age Proverbs which he has received and is putting into print. About 2,000 people attended the convention of the Amalgamated Flying Saucer Clubs of America, held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles, California, July 11 and 12. Host of the convention was Gabriel Green, director of the Amalgamation, and president of the Los Angeles interplanetary Study Group.

The entire second floor of this hotel was reserved for the occasion. Careful planning and much work by Mr. Green and his associates brought about a new approach in spacecraft conventions. About 50 speakers participated and six lecture halls were used simultaneously. This allowed the spectators to choose the speaker they wished to listen to at the particular time.





SUPPORT YOUR CLUB
