UNEXPLAINED TREMORS IN SEPARATED AREAS

The Texas Panhandle and Southeastern New Mexico were rocked by a tremor Feb. 10. Flagstaff, Arizona, was shaken by a mysterious jolt the morning of Feb. 11. On Feb. 12 mysterious rumbling blasts shook three Pacific Northwest cities at separate intervals about two hours apart. Seattle at 5:38 p.m.; Oregon City, Ore., at 7:28 p.m.; and Yakima, Wash., at 9:15 p.m.

Several persons in Seattle reported seeing a "red streak falling slowly into Puget Sound."

Houses shook and dishes rattled in all of the areas, but the strangest phenomena occurred in the Flagstaff area and the West Texas-New Mexico area.

In Flagstaff, drivers on their way to work said immediately after the tremor their windshields were iced over both inside and outside. The Associated Press teletype machine at the Arizona Daily Sun went on the blink, then returned to normal service a few minutes later.

The Texas tremor, accompanied by two distinctive blasts, shook an area from 100 miles northeast of Amarillo to Roswell, New Mexico, 200 miles southwest. Witnesses said houses swayed and they reported hearing unpleasant noises like trucks hitting buildings, horses galloping and gas explosions.

FALLOUT FOUND IN WHEAT

St. Paul, Minn.--Minnesota scientists have turned up a batch of northern plains wheat, grown between 1956 and 1958, that contained more than six times the supposed tolerable limit of strontium-90 produced by nuclear fallout.

The batch was one of 30 sampled from 10 areas over a 3-year period. The scientists said the strontium-90 average of all 1958 wheat crop samplings was $1\frac{1}{2}$ times the "safe limit" set forth by the Atomic Energy Commission. In contrast, the 1956 crop was barely over the limit.

Disclosure of the strontium-90 results was made by a Minnesota commission appointed by Gov. Orville Freeman to probe crop radio-activity over the 3-year period beginning in 1956.

"We did not expect to find as high quotas in the wheat as we did," commission spokesman Dr. Maurice B. Vissher, chief of the University of Minnesota medical school's physiology department, said.

"The situation undoubtedly will get worse if the world continues nuclear bomb testing," he said.

STAMPS IT, BUT NOT TOP SECRET

Mr. Henry Kramkowski, of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, head of the Canadian branch of the Aetherius Society of England, has an interesting way of stating his thought about radiation. He stamps each envelope he mails out with a rubber stamp. It reads: "Better be ACTIVE today than RADIOACTIVE tomorrow. Ban the Bomb Tests NOW."

SIGHTINGS OF INDEPENDENCE YOUTH

Mike Lyon, a young man of Independence, Mo., has seen some interesting UFO's the past three years.

His first sighting was when he and some friends were camping out. A pony had broken loose and he and his friends were catching him. TV switchboards were swamped with calls.


