The Scope of Ufology

Ufology is a new science. One might say that it is an embryonic science. At best it is an infant, not out of its diapers. The word is derived from the initials U-F-O, standing for Unidentified Flying Objects, which has been contracted into a short word: Ufo.

Originally, a few years ago, Ufology referred solely to the sighting of Flying Saucers, and the tabulation and study of the sightings. Ufology was then only an observational science and not an anatical one.

Since the beginning, however, it has become increasingly apparent that a study of flying saucers was not not complete without much consideration of the underlying background of scientific and cosmic knowledge which would be necessary to make flying saucers, or Ufos, possible.

The mysterious elements associated with Ufos and thier observed actions have led many people to assign various degrees of divinity to the Ufo and to any beings who might inhabit them or use them for transportation. This is a very risky view to take, especially since we still lack acceptable proof of the reality of such beings or entities. It seems rather obvious that any entities using Ufos or flying saucers much have intellectual development comparable to our own, not too much greater nor too much less. There is no need to attribute godlike characters to them.

On the other hand, we do seem to have ample proof that there are other worlds of intelligence than our own, and that spirit intelligences do exist in space regions which we know next to nothing even though these may exist in the same regions of space and time with our own.

The more one studies Ufology, the more one is forced to realize that, if the Ufos are to be understood, we must investigate not only all of human knowledge in its far-flung fields, but we must also probe the borderlands of knowledge in all directions. This means investigating the extremities of physics, astronomy, the earth sciences, archaeology, and the sciences of antiquity, anthropology, and all phases of the psychic. In all of these borderland areas, however, we must exercise the greatest of care that we do not over-extend ourselves and say things which we may be sorry for.

The dangers lie especially in the occult and metaphysical fields. In these areas there are many schools of thought, each led by one or more "masters" who claim to have direct revelation from higher sources of knowledge and intelligence. Unfortunately no two of these report the same things from the world beyond, and their statements can neither be proved nor disproved. By announcing their beliefs and opinions as facts, sometimes divine facts, these leaders obtain large followings. There is probably a grain or two of truth in each of these beliefs, and something might be gained by synthesizing them into one

comprehensive whole, but much of that which each group believes deserves the most rigid skepticism, and in much of it there is downright chicanery or hoaxing.

So, in Ufology, let each of us tread warily. There is much to be learned and the job of integrating this new knowledge into the framework of human experience is a tremendous task. The task can, however, be made very confusing and frustrating by being gullible and repeating everything one hears without being objective about it. The endless and cyclic repetition of nonsense in countless magazines devoted to Ufos, flying saucers, the Occult, the metaphysical, and the psychic is doing vast harm. So----let's be careful what we say and what we publish and remember that there have been very few cases where there has been an adequate substitute for the wisdom engendered by age and experience in all fields.

Watch---wait---be careful---but watch.

The UFOloger does not necessarily take on the views of the opinions expressed in it by others. We are completely partial to any side, and will print the theories of anyone who wishes to have them printed in The UFOloger.

However, we do wish to make one comment in regard to Mr. Jessup's article. . . . he seems to refer directly to this magazine when he writes about "the nonsense in countless magazines. . ." We cannot understand why a person would write an article for a magazine and then denounce it in the article. Any comments?

THE CROSSING OF A FRONTIER

Back in the early days we had pioneers who flew in balloons called free-flying balloons, and dirigible balloons. The free-flying balloons were those filled with hot air and allowed to float in space; the dirigible were filled with gas and carried motors and were able to steer a course wherever they were intended to go. Captain Thomas Baldwin was a great pioneer in this form of aerial locomotion. His story is one of the most fascinating in the annals of aeronautics. And we had the airplane invented by the Wright Brothers and by Glen Curtis.

It was also the time when Thomas Edison gave us the telegraph and then novel facilities for human progress which depended upon electricity for their motion. Alexander Graham Bell, at the same time, gave us the telephone and Marconi and the American Lee DeForest gave the world the radio. These were the days that are probably known to the readers of The UFOloger chiefly through history books and historical articles. I lived at the time when all these things came into being. I knew the men themselves who were responsible for giving them to the human race. I wrote about them in the annals of current history - the newspapers. It was also my curious fortune to have personally known them all, including every President from Cleveland to Eisenhower. This included Cleveland, Harrison,

McKinley, the first Roosevelt, Taft, Wilson, Harding, Coolidge, Truman, the second Roosevelt, Hoover, and Eisenhower. All of these men had their impact on history.

Those old days were great days for pioneering. We oldsters all did a lot of pioneering in various ways. We were personally responsible for a lot of innovations which are too numerous to enumerate. The youthful readers of this periodical should derive some benefit from the experiences of us oldsters.

At that time I sincerely thought we were then crossing the last frontier; but now, in the 77th year of my life, I find I've lived to cross another frontier - that which leads into the apparently illimitable area of space.

In this conjunction these experiences should be of some benefit to the youthful readers of this periodical. It brings to mind the Kasidah written in Arabic as a genuine Arab poem from ancient times by Sir Richard Burton, one of the great students of the Arabic civilization. There are four lines in this classic which appear to be exceedingly fitting to be quoted here:

"Do as thy manhood bids thee do
from none but self expect applause
He noblest lives and noblest dies
who makes and keeps his self-
made laws."

To me, this is one of the most extraordinary compressions of a life's philosophy that I've ever encountered in my rather extensive reading. These great lines will stand, for all time, on a firm foundation as they did when I was young.

SAUCER SIGHTINGS.....Hugh Fireball In Sky Narrowly Misses Plane

Denver, Oct. 10 (AP)--A hugh fireball, described by some as large as a house, streaked across Western skies narrowly missing a Navy transport plane with 20 persons aboard.

An official of the CAA here said that the object undoubtedly was a meteor. (hah!-ed.) It crashed near Myton, Utah. Dr. La Paz of the University of New Mexico said he was sure the object was a stray fireball from the Giacobinid Comet. ----Wash. Post.

The CAA. and the US Public Health Service are trying to determine the source of mysterious chunks of ice reported to have fallen from the sky in Pennsylvania. The cakes of ice weigh from 20 to 100 pounds. No definite conclusion has been reached. -----Wash. Post

On Monday, October 7, Ken Barrett, of 649 Lakeview Drive, Falls Church, Virginia, and his wife Patsy, looked out of their window at 2:45 am, and saw a white light moving over Washington, D. C. in an erratic manner and in unconventional patterns. It finally sank down beneath the trees. However, at 3:00 a.m. they saw 4 lights NNW of Falls Church at an altitude of about 70 degrees above the horizon. It was very bright, moving with short bursts of speed, then turning and moving

back the way it had just come. It also moved in small circles. They estimated it to be very far away because the clouds were between them and the lights. The colors changed from light green to light blue. It was the second sighting that he has had. The other was over Pheonix, Arizona several years ago. ---Courtesy Wash. Saucer Intelligence.

N.Y., Oct. 18, (AP)---It seems that the Venusians are going to make token landings in November. At least, that's what Bob Ewing, who is associated with Enett Brady, who will be here in DC soon. Bob Ewing says he has tape recordings of conversations with Venusians. Some of the things they say are:

1. That they have 8 large space platforms circling the earth at 10,000 miles above us. We cannot see them because the light rays are bent aside. (con't. next page..)

2. That for 4 years Venusians have been observing us in scout ships, which they call ventlas, and in mother ships, hovering above the earth at 15 miles.

3. That the Venusians are built the same way we are, but are much more highly developed. Their life span is 400 to 500 years.

4. Their purpose is to prevent the pollution of space by radiation from our atom and hydrogen bombs.

5. They are benevolent, and will not allow an Atom war. But they won't take sides, either.

6. They can transfer thought at the rate of 50,000 words per minute.

These messages are coming chiefly from Hamamatra, and also from Cymatrali, both from Venus. Enett Brady, through whom these messages come, appeared on TV in Portland, Maine, and on that show, predicted that they would do some funny things to the satellite, such as deviating it from its orbit. This was told several days before the satellite actually did begin to change orbit. It is recorded on tape.

Enett Brady may be on local radio or TV shows in the area when she arrives.

Also, there is a "demand for control of outer space rockets"; "multi-million dollar crash program to beat Russia to the moon", and wry comments such as "The only thing left to do is to announce that the Flying Saucers are real and are ours."

The report is that Saucer Researchers are not worried. They say the history of Saucers shows them to be friendly, when chased they quickly withdraw. Saucers are plainly watching our planet from all over the world. Dear Sir:

I am very interested in reports of flying saucers and think that your publication is doing good work in spreading information on this subject.

What I would like know is whether there are any reports of such objects having been observed by means of a radio telescope. It is my understanding that space signals have been detected in the form of radio waves, as if coming from certain stars --- many of them invisible to the naked eye --- and that radio interference increases regularly when the Milky Way Galaxy passes directly overhead. Further, that radio telescopes exist in the Soviet Union and Great Britain and that the US will shortly have a radio Astronomy Observatory at Green Bank, West Virginia.

Could you please tell me if

radio telescopes could be used in communicating with visitors from outer space?

Dear Mr. Serrano:

As far as we know, there are no reports of having seen saucers on a radioscope. They have been observed often on radar, however. Several years ago, astronomer Clyde Tomough was searching the skies for some unknown objects in the skies. The subject of radio telescope is a relatively new one, but much research is being done in the field. I am sorry I cannot answer your question more fully.

As for communicating with radio telescopes, I do not think that this is possible, as a radioscope only receives very high frequencies, and does not send or transmit.

The Russians have recently announced that they had previously, in 1953, sent up a test rocket, and, completely by accident, the rocket went into an orbit around the earth for several days, before returning to the earth as a meteor of flame. Some people have postulated the theory that the U. S. or Russia has already landed on the moon, and is not telling us about it for "security" reasons. ----- J. V.

A few weeks ago, your editors wrote to the Colliers Reference Service, for information they might have on flying saucers. What follows is what they sent to us::

The Air Force feels a very definite obligation to identify and analyze things that happen in the air that may have in them menace to the United States and, because of that feeling of obligation and pursuit of that interest, the Air Force established an activity known as the Unidentified Flying Objects Program.

This program was established in 1947 when unidentified flying objects were being reported in various parts of the United States. The reports reached a peak of 1,700 in 1952 and dropped to a total of 429 in 1953.

From a survey of the volume of sightings received by the Air Force, it has been determined

that over 80% are explainable as being known objects.

The rest of the four pages comprising the document, which was released by the Dept. of Defense several years ago, goes on to prove just what was stated in the foregoing paragraphs. Anyone wishing copies of this may get them from UFOloger headquarters for 25¢.

SYMPATHETIC VIBRATIONS

I have long wondered why someone has not done a good article about sympathetic vibration. It is a great principle of Occult Science as well as modern science, that everything is in a state of vibration - everything has its

own rate of vibration, and is constantly manifesting it. Every mental state is accompanied by a vibration of its own plane: every emotional state or feeling has its own particular rate of vibration. These rates of vibrations manifest just as do the vibrations of sound which produce the several notes on the scale, one rising above the other in rate of vibration. But, the scale mental and emotional states is far more complex, and far more extended than is the musical scale. There are thousands of different notes, on the mental scale. There are harmonies and discords on that scale also.

Induction is, the principle upon which the law of sympathetic vibration operates. If you place two pans together, one of them hot, heat will be drawn from the hot one to the cool one, even though they do not touch. This is the principle of induction. It works in the same way with thought energy.

Definition of Induction: That inherent quality or attribute of energy by which the manifestation

of energy tends to reproduce itself in a second object, by setting up corresponding vibrations therein, though without direct contact of the two objects.

A well known writer on this subject has truthfully told us: "We all know how great waves of feeling spread over a town, city, or country, sweeping people off their balance. Great waves of political enthusiasm or war spirit or prejudice for and against certain persons, sweep over places and cause men to act in a manner that will afterward regret when they come to themselves and consider their acts in cold blood. They will be swayed by demagogues or magnetic leaders who wish to gain their votes or patronage; and they will be led into acts of mob violence, or similar atrocities, by yielding to these waves of contagious thought. On the other hand, we all know how great waves of religious feeling sweep over a community upon the occasion of some great revival, excitement, or fervor." (To be continued....)
