

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~~X~~ DO UFOs USE RADAR: an experiment for future UFO observers.

Dr. Ingalls of Cornell University reportedly has proved that people can "hear" radar. He came to this conclusion when he noted that people reported "hearing" meteors. He argued that what we hear are electromagnetic signals since meteors travel faster than the speed of sound. Later experiments proved that when people were in close proximity to radar that they could hear a high pitched buzz. Blocking their ears did not keep out the sound but when the area above their foreheads was shielded (ears exposed) they heard nothing. Apparently radar directly stimulates the brain.

By applying these conclusions to the subject of UFOs, there arises several possibly interesting similarities.

Accepting the following reported features of UFOs as "fact", we can then proceed to examine the correlations: 1) Oftentimes portholes, domes, and the like are not observed on UFOs, 2) Silence is reported in most sightings of medium or distant range, 3) Low whines, hums, buzzes, and other noises usually are contingent on close approaches of UFOs, 4) Although cars are reported stalled in the close proximity of a UFO, sometimes the car is not in any way affected even if the UFO is still in the air.

Fact #1 suggests that UFOs would need radar or something similar, since most do not have "windows". Then assuming UFOs do have radar, facts #2 and #3 coincide perfectly with Dr. Ingall's discovery that noises, created by radar, can be heard when in close proximity with the object (containing the radar). And finally, fact #4 would mean that UFO propulsion is not necessarily electromagnetic and that the E-M effects would be caused by radar using intensive electromagnetic waves.

Thus, to conclude, we face the possibility that UFOs do need radar, seem to have it, and use it in other ways besides those for which we use radar.

NOTE: to all future UFO witnesses--- if you do hear a noise from the UFO you are observing, first cover your ears, if you can still hear it as distinctly as before, then instead cover the area above your forehead and note if the sound is blocked out or indistinct.

Reprinted from ANOMALY no. 1, May 1969 by John A. Keel. Following Mr. Keel's suggestion UFOARB is adopting this system of data collection. We believe we are the first to do so and urge all other UFO news media to do the same.

THE DRS PROCEDURE:

1) DATE: The first two numbers in the DRS code are the year and the numerical date of the sighting (date's numerical order within the year.).

Example: "April 16, 1969" in the DRS code would be 69-106.

2) TIME: The third number in the DRS code is the exact time of the sighting written in military style.

Ex.: April 16, 1969 at 10 p.m. would be: 69-106-2200.

3) LOCALE: The fourth section of the code is the locale of the sighting by state. Following the state is the quadrant on a given map (RAND McNALLY ROAD ATLAS).

Ex: If the sample sighting took place in North Carolina in the G9 quadrant, then the code would read: 69-106-2200-N.C.-G9.

4) DIRECTION OF OBJECT: Using the following code letters:

N = North

H = hovered

E = East

M = maneuvered (assorted motions)

S = South

C = circled

W = West

A = ascended

L = landed

CG = color changes seen

D = descended

LX = contact claimed

O = occupants seen

PL = object exploded

B = beeping heard

RK = witnesses physically effected

V = markings or debris

(burns, amnesia, paralysis, etc.)

found at site

For our sample case, let's assume the object was first seen hovering in the north (HN). It then gyrated up and down (M) and finally disappeared eastward. The code would be HN-M-E. Our full DRS code for this sighting

now reads: 69-106-2200-N.C.-G9-HN-M-E.

5) TYPE OF OBJECT: To describe the object in the DRS we use Dr. Vallee's classification system for the four basic types. These are:

I = An unusual aerial object, spherical, discoid or other complex form, manuevering close to the ground or even landing.

II = Cigars and cylinders, also strange cloud - type formations such as self-luminous elongated structures apparently gaseous in form.

III = An unusual object ~~with light pulsating or flashing or moving in a zig-zag~~ spherical, discoid or other complex form, ~~without pausing or performing excessive maneuvers.~~ remaining stationary in the sky during most of the observation.

IV = An unusual object or light pursuing a course across the sky without pausing or performing excessive manuevers.

If our sample case best fit the type III description, the final code would be: 69-106-2200-N.C.-G9-HN-M-E-III.

MYSTERIOUS MOON PHENOMENA

The first known sighting of a strange object on the moon came in 1611. In that year a cross was seen on the moon from France and England.

In the 19th century Sir John Herschel saw bright, strange lights on the moon. This occurred when the moon was darkened by an eclipse.

In 1838 meteorologist Edward J. Lowe observed four images flying near the moon.

There was a sudden eruption of mystery lights in regular patterns, causing an investigation in 1869. Most of the lights were seen in the Mare Crisium. They appeared in circles, triangles and straight lines and their intensity varied. By 1871 nearly 2000 sightings of these lights had been made. Records were kept because they were thought to be signals, but they couldn't be deciphered. Several dark objects were also seen over the moon's surface. (Ed.: possibly shadows from objects flying over the moon.) The lights ceased to appear in 1871.

A perfect square, enclosed by walls was discovered near the crater Fontnelle in 1876. It was sixty-five miles in length, one mile in breadth, 200 to 300 feet high and artificial in appearance. The astronomer Maedler was one of the persons who saw it.

Aristachus is the largest crater to have dark bands. These bands stretch from the center of the crater to its walls and even beyond.

In 1954 an amateur astronomer, John O'Neill, discovered a bridge crossing the same crater. It was seen by many others after the announcement. Photographs were taken.

In November 1966, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) released a photograph taken by Lunar Orbiter II. The photo shows shadows of domes which have been seen since 1958. The domes are on the edge of the Sea of Tranquility. The size of the domes were calculated by their shadows. There were seven objects in ~~the~~ ^{an} area approximately 750 by 500 feet. The largest proturbance is 50 by 40 feet and the smallest 25 by 5.5 feet. One shadow resembled the shadow cast by the Washington monument.

Conclusion: the moon is not dead !

Each year Norman Beal, extension agent, receives phone calls from excited home owners who have spotted a white mass flying through their yards. The white mass, says Beal, is not harmful to humans, but may be fatal to plant life. Particles in the mass are aphids, an insect which ranks among the top three destroyers of local plant life."
