

'The UFO cover-up'

Document details recovery of aliens' bodies

A document that purports to be a British government paper claims that the bodies of four aliens from a crashed flying saucer were recovered 40 years ago. The document was obtained recently by a British researcher.

A bitter debate is now likely to develop among UFO experts over the existence of a mysterious committee, code-named Majestic-12, which is supposed to have examined the aliens.

The top-secret briefing paper claims that then-CIA Director Adm. Roscoe Hillenkoetter reported that "although these creatures are humanlike in appearance, the biological and evolutionary processes responsible for their development have apparently been quite different from those observed or postulated in homo sapiens."

The document, which the London Observer obtained from Timothy Good, Britain's leading UFO researcher, purports to be a briefing paper for President Dwight D. Eisenhower on Operation Majestic-12, also known as MJ-12. Good, in his book *Above Top Secret: The Worldwide UFO Cover-up*, to be published this year, claims that MJ-12 was a committee of senior U.S. officials that investigated and then covered up news of flying saucer crashes.

"I obtained the document two months ago from a reliable American source who has close connections with the intelligence community. I am convinced of its authenticity," Good said.

UFO writer Barry Greenwood, however, has suggested that the document is just a sophisticated fraud.

"There are some things that look wrong with the White House memo. For example, it is unsigned. It is just possible that it was manufactured by someone wanting to prove the existence of MJ-12 and then inserted into Air Force intelligence records which had recently been opened up to the public," he said.

"The hoaxer could then have ordered a copy from the National Archives which would carry the official declassification stamp. MJ-12 may well have existed, but more research is needed to authenticate the documents."

The Eisenhower briefing paper, dated Nov. 18, 1952, claims that the MJ-12 committee had been formed by his predecessor, President Harry S. Truman, on Sept. 24, 1947, as "a top secret research and development/intelligence operation responsible directly and only to the president of the United States."

The 12 members of the group are said to have included Hillenkoetter, Defense Secretary James Forrestal, Air Force Gen. Nathan Twining, leading U.S. atom bomb scientist Dr. Vannevar Bush, biophysicist Dr. Detlev Bronk, and astronomer Dr. Donald Menzel. All 12 are now dead, and none of them ever spoke publicly about the recovery of aliens.

The document reports that on June 24, 1947, "disc-

shaped aircraft" were sighted in the United States. "Little was learned about the objects until a local rancher reported that one had crashed in a remote region of New Mexico, about 75 miles northwest of Roswell Army Base (formerly Walker Air Force Base).

"On July 7, 1947, a secret operation was begun to assure recovery of the wreckage of this object for scientific study. During the course of this operation, aerial reconnaissance discovered that four small humanlike beings had apparently ejected from the craft at some point before it exploded. These had fallen to Earth about two miles east of the wreckage site.

"All four were dead and badly decomposed due to action by predators and exposure to the elements during the approximately one week time which had elapsed before their discovery," the Eisenhower briefing paper claimed.

"A covert analytical effort by Gen. Twining and Dr. Bush acting on the direct orders of the president resulted in a preliminary consensus (Sept. 19, 1947) that the disc was most likely a short-range reconnaissance craft. A similar analysis of the four dead occupants was arranged by Dr. Bronk.

"Dr. Bronk's team has suggested the term 'Extra-terrestrial Biological Entities,' or 'EBEs,' be adopted as the standard term of reference for these creatures until such time as a more definitive designation can be agreed upon.

"Implications for national security are of continuing importance in that the motives and ultimate intentions of these visitors remain completely unknown. In addition, a significant upsurge in the surveillance activity of these craft beginning in May and continuing through the autumn of this year has caused considerable concern that new developments may be imminent.

"It is for these reasons, as well as the obvious international and technological considerations and the ultimate need to avoid a public panic at all costs, that the Majestic-12 Group remains of the unanimous opinion that strictest security precautions should continue without interruption into the new administration."

Inquiries at the National Archives, the archives of Truman and Eisenhower, and the National Security Council archives have not managed to authenticate the briefing paper.

There is, however, new evidence that a group called MJ-12 did exist. This is a White House memo to Twining informing him about an "MJ-12" briefing for Eisenhower. It was declassified Jan. 12, 1987.

If the White House memorandum is genuine, this proves the existence of an MJ-12 group whose responsibility could have covered UFOs. This would then strengthen Good's view that there was a cover-up.

An Air Force spokesman denied any knowledge of MJ-12 and said that investigations into UFOs had ended in 1969.

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UFO probe found humanoids: expert

LONDON (Reuter) — The United States held a top-secret investigation into unidentified flying objects after World War II and found the bodies of four humanoids from a crashed flying saucer, according to Britain's leading UFO expert.

The Observer newspaper Sunday quoted UFO researcher Timothy Good as saying a U.S. government committee code-named "Majestic-12" examined and then covered up news of UFO crashes in the late 1940s.

According to Good's book *Above Top Secret: The Worldwide*

UFO Cover-Up, to be published in July, the MJ-12 committee was set up by President Harry Truman and checked reports about unidentified aircraft sighted in the United States.

Following a report from a local farmer, the committee launched a search for a crashed UFO in a remote area in New Mexico in 1947.

They found the bodies of four humanoid creatures, Good said, quoting what he says is a briefing paper by then Central Intelligence Agency Director Roscoe Hillenkoetter for Truman's successor,

Dwight Eisenhower.

"Four small human-like beings had apparently ejected from the craft at some point before it exploded. These had fallen to earth about two miles east of the wreckage site. All four were dead and badly decomposed due to action by predators and exposure to the elements," the document said.

The Observer said it had seen the briefing paper but inquiries in several U.S. archives had failed to authenticate it, and it could be part of an elaborate hoax.

UFO ABDUCTION MEMORIES STILL VIVID

Charles Hickson and his friend Calvin Parker had a strange encounter with extraterrestrials on October 11, 1973 and their lives have not been the same since that time.

Both men were workers at a shipyard in Pascagoula, Mississippi. They decided to go fishing along the Pascagoula river after work that fateful evening and caught more than they had bargained for.

A large football-shaped craft descended from the sky to hover near the boat dock where the two were fishing. A door opened and strange robot-like creatures came down to take Hickson and Parker inside the craft where they were placed on an examining table.

The event was terrifying. A device resembling a huge eye scanned their bodies for some unknown purpose. After the examination, Hickson and Parker were dumped back onto the dock and the craft flew away.

The days following the abduction were filled with emotion-filled activities, interviews, examinations and

media probing. Parker gave up the ship building business and moved into seclusion in another state. Hickson persisted in his quest to survive after effects of the event and remained at the shipyard.

Drawings of the creatures and their craft were developed from descriptions given during regressive hypnosis sessions. All of the testimony was carefully recorded for historical purposes. Now it is being made available to the public in the book "UFO Contact at Pascagoula." Several report spotting UFO in Mexico City

MEXICO CITY (Reuter) — Mexico City International Airport received dozens of calls reporting an unidentified flying object over the capital Tuesday, the official Notimex News Agency reported Wednesday.

The multi-colored object was making a faint buzzing noise as it rapidly circled the city before shooting off at high speed, witnesses said.

There was no word on the object's shape or on how long it was visible.

Notimex said the crew of a Pan American Airways jet also reported having seen the object briefly.

The agency said an unidentified flying object was seen at the same time and place on Nov. 2, 1973.

Search for fiery night visitor fails

A red-glowing light with a tail that flared across the sky in the Southeast prompted searches in several states for traces of a possible meteor or other space object, but nothing was found, authorities said Tuesday.

The light was spotted about sun-

set Monday over parts of Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi as it streaked westward.

Aviation officials said the light probably was a meteor. Maj. Walter Chipchase, a spokesman for the North American Air Defense Command, said it was not believed to be a disintegrating rocket or satellite.
