Space Alien Baby Found Alive,

Say Russians

At 8 o'clock on the night of July 14, a UFO exploded and crashed in the rugged mountains around Frunze, Russia — but before the spacecraft blew up, the doomed aliens on board ejected a baby to safety, say Soviet scientists.

The egg-shaped capsule containing the weird-looking child landed safely in a clearing ... and for 11 weeks, medical specialists at Frunze Medical Institute fought desperately to keep the alien baby alive.

Tragically, they did not succeed.

A Soviet rocket engineer first tipped off The ENQUIRER to the astonishing close encounter.

At a face-to-face meeting in Moscow, he told our reporters that villagers who witnessed the UFO explosion had reported seeing a "cloud of fire" in the night sky.

"A squad of police in a helicopter equipped with searchlights was sent to investigate. They found still-smoldering wreckage and called in the air force," said the engineer, who's assigned to the Salyut-7 space program.

"Everybody assumed at first that it was a plane crash. But instead they found an extra-terrestrial craft.


"About 24 hours later, a man phoned the Frunze police and said he had found an egg-shaped metal capsule. Inside was a baby. It was airlifted, still in the capsule, directly to the Frunze Medical Institute."

One of the institute's doctors confirmed the rocket engineer's incredible story. "The capsule was sort of egg-shaped, about three feet in length with a hinged lid on top.

"The capsule had legs on which it was resting, and underneath it was a small rocket which slowed its descent. Inside, the baby was lying on sponge-like material. There was an oxygen system in the capsule to sustain life.

"I would estimate the baby is about 1 year old, by human standards. X-rays show that its body is like that of a human, with the exception of a slightly larger heart. The brain waves are normal, except for increased alpha wave activity. This means that telepathic and telekinetic (moving objects with mind power) abilities may be possible."

A nurse — one of 12 assigned to the alien baby around the clock —

The capsule had a hinged lid on top and a small rocket underneath, reported the doctor. "The baby was lying on sponge-like material," he said.

by monitoring his pulse and respiration rate — but his eyes remain open day and night.

"The baby has made no attempt to walk or even crawl, and no attempt to talk, laugh or cry. He has made no vocal sounds at all that I have heard.

"The only real emotion I have seen him express was when I tried to feed him mashed spinach one day. He spit it right out.

"Right now he is perfectly healthy. But the doctors are worried because he has no natural immunity to human diseases. They are afraid even a simple cold could develop into a massive infection that could kill him."

And the doctors were right, as ENQUIRER reporter Henry Gris sadly learned when he later called to check on the alien child's condition.

"The baby is dead," the doctor told

Gris. "It was just as we feared. Acute and massive infection. The baby went into shock in a matter of hours.

"We tried everything to save it, but nothing worked ..."

V-shaped flying object spotted in area

RHINEBECK — An unidentified flying object appearing as six lights in the shape of a "V" was seen Sunday night in northern Dutchess County, a Mid-Hudson UFO specialist reported Tuesday.

State police, however, identified the object as a large airplane that had left its landing lights on.

Gary Levine, New York state director for the Mutual UFO Network of Seguin, Tex., said between seven and nine individuals reported seeing the object near the Kingston-Rhinecliff Bridge and the Dutchess County Fairgrounds.

Levine, a professor at Columbia-Greene Community College, said none of the observers saw a solid object or reported any noise. Instead,

they reported a series of six lights in a "V" shape that was seen moving south near the bridge at about 8:30 p.m., according to Levine.

He said additional sightings put the object over the fairgrounds at about 8:45 p.m., where it remained for about seven minutes before flying east.

State police at Claverack said a sighting by Trooper L. E. Moore was entered in the barracks' blotter. The report by Moore, who was not avail-

able for comment, said the object was an aircraft with its landing lights on.


A Rhinebeck woman, who asked that her name not be published, said she saw several bright lights in the "V" shape moving south toward Rhinebeck at about 8:45 p.m. The object, she said, headed east from Rhinebeck toward Pine Plains.

Levine said "V" shaped objects were common in many UFO sightings.

City man fights for E. T. bodies

Three circular objects, each containing three tiny men, crashed in New Mexico in 1950, according to an Air Force mem-

orandum to J. Edgar Hoover.

Thirty years later, according to another Air Force memorandum, Air Force employees at a base in England said they saw a glowing triangular object with a pulsing red light on top and a bank of blue lights below maneuvering through the trees, illuminating the surrounding forest with a white light.

The government has not made details of either of these events public, and its silence has propelled an Alexandria man into a quest for documents giving details of these and other UFO sightings.

Larry Bryant, a writer who works for the federal government, says the government is involved in a "cosmic Watergate," and he wants to crack the case.

He claims "maybe dozens" of UFO crashes involving extraterrestrial beings are being hushed up by the government.

The government's "paternalism" is one reason for the cover-up, Bryant says. Also, he adds, "the realization that we are not alone is frightening to some people."

During the past 10 years, Bryant has deluged the CIA, FBI, State Department, Army and Air Force with Freedom of Information requests for documents relating to UFOs.

He says "thousands" of documents have already been obtained, but he hopes to force the government to release classified documents that have so far been withheld.

"It's just a matter of time before we are going to get some reliable information," Bryant says.

If the technology of unidentified flying objects is superior to ours, as Bryant claims, why do so many UFOs crash?

"It's all speculation at this point," says Bryant. "I don't know if we've had any crashes since the '60s."

But UFOs are still landing, he says.

Bryant is director of the Washington branch of Citizens Against UFO Secrecy, a group claiming about 100 members worldwide. The group recently held a convention in Lincoln, Neb.

Bryant says no one in the group has ever seen a UFO.

Military personnel are forbidden to discuss UFO sightings, Bryant says, but he hopes that some, "stricken by conscience," will contact his group.

Bryant's crusade is keeping him busy this fall.

On Nov. 17, Bryant asked the State Department to send him all cables, letters, memos, reports, photographs, videotapes, audio recordings, radiation readings of the UFO landing

site, radar-tracking recordings and intelligence analyses relating to a 1980 UFO sighting by the Air Force in Britain.

Bryant says he learned of the sighting from an Air Force memo obtained in a previous FOI document request.

The memo Bryant says he obtained from the government says that about 3 a.m. on Dec. 27, 1980, three Air Force security men saw a glowing, triangular metal object about 7 to 10 feet across and 7 feet high.

A pulsing red light was on top and a bank of blue lights underneath, and the UFO "illuminated the entire forest with a white light," the memo says.

When the men approached, the UFO "maneuvered through the trees and disappeared."

The next day, the memo says, impressions in the ground were found where the objects had been seen.

In another case, Bryant said he will take the FBI to court for allegedly refusing to divulge information about a 1950 crash landing spoken of in a memo purportedly written on March 22, 1950, to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover by an Air Force employee.

That memo says an Air Force investigator said he been informed three circular objects, approximately 50 feet in diameter, had been "recovered" in New Mexico.

The unnamed informant said each UFO was occupied by three bodies of human shape about 3 feet tall, dressed in metallic cloth. Each body, said the informant, was bandaged in a manner similar to the blackout suits used by speed flyers and test pilots.

Last July, Bryant filed a suit in U.S. District Court in D.C. to recover the bodies of extraterrestrial beings he claimed were being held by the Air Force. The case was dismissed in September.

Lt. George Jamison, an Air Force spokesman, said that after Bryant filed for the writ of habeas corpus on July 27, "We checked all of our units and determined that we were not holding the bodies of any aliens."

Bryant hopes Congress will eventually create an Academy for Extraterrestrial Studies to promote "cultural exchange between aliens and people here on Earth."

Although members of Citizens Against UFO Secrecy have different views on where the aliens come from, Bryant says he thinks they are "possibly former inhabitants of the Earth who left about 20,000 to 30,000 years ago, who were able to perfect space travel and set up colonies, and once in a while they check on their progeny here on Earth."

Bryant, who was born in Newport News near Langley Air Force Base, says he became interested in UFOs at an early age. He writes a column for the Mutual UFO Network's journal.

I hid in terror the UFO seemed to be looking for me

VERA PERRY'S vivid description of a mysterious triangular UFO has won the \$50 first prize in GLOBE'S Share Your Great UFO Experience contest. But that 1975 sighting is only one of several encounters she's had with UFOs in the last 20 years.

"I became very sick while trying to avoid one that chased me through a field, and I lost an hour I can't account for while viewing another," Perry told GLOBE.

"But, since the contest required authentication and I didn't report these sightings, I didn't use them as contest entries," she explains.

But Perry's sighting on Nov. 1, 1975, as she drove out of a shopping center in Vermilion, Ohio, was authenticated by other witnesses

and reported on radio and in several newspapers.

"I was able to follow the object during most of my trip

home, which took about 15 minutes," she says. "I first saw it as a huge, reddish-orange light. Then I noticed a pale yellow light beneath the red-orange light.

"As I drove on, I got a full side view, which revealed that the craft was triangular and about the size of a jet. The lights flickered off and on along its entire length. The main body of the object seemed to be dark gray.

"As I watched, the widest end tilted upwards, and it began climbing. Then it dis-

appeared." Perry's first and most dramatic encounter came during the fall of 1962.

"I was walking my dog in a field behind my home when suddenly, out of the west, came this blinding white light," she reports. "As I stood there, the glow lit up the area as though it were high noon.

"When the light touched my face, my skin began to tingle, as though an electric current were dancing over the surface. A moment later, it was off again, toward the end of the field.

"I ducked behind some bushes, expecting it to leave. Instead, it returned, circling several times, apparently looking for me. After a few minutes, it took off toward the west again and just winked out.

"I tried to go to sleep, but couldn't because I felt nauseous. In the morning, my eyes burned for hours, so that it was difficult for me to look at any bright lights."

Perry's second encounter took place in 1974. Again she was walking her dog, this time in her backyard. A bright, pink, disc-shaped object appeared, throwing off rainbow-hued arcs of light.

"But the light lit up only the upper portion of the plants," she says. "I saw the lights had also caused a bright crescent to appear on several bushes.

"I started to investigate, but the next thing I remember was the object suddenly vanishing. Shaken, I went into the house and got an even greater shock. The clock showed I'd been outside more than an hour, although I was sure it couldn't have been more than 10 minutes."

A chilling secret at Langley?

Is the Peninsula hiding a deep, dark secret? Is there something over there a bit more intriguing than Buckroe Beach, a dry dock or two in Newport News, Saturday night in Phoebus?

Writer and researcher Larry W. Bryant of Alexandria thinks so.

He was here not long ago, dropping hints about long-dead creatures from outer space packed in ice and hidden somewhere deep inside Langley Air Force Base in Hampton.

If it is true, here is the biggest news story since Burger King switched to Pepsi.

Bryant, director of the 5-year-old Citizens Against UFO Secrecy and a native of the Peninsula, has been making a pest of himself as far as the U.S. government is concerned. He recently sued the Air Force in federal court in Washington, D.C., demanding that the government surrender any and all extraterrestrials it has found in crash landings over the years.

While poking around Hampton, Bryant told me, "The Air Force quite literally has skeletons in its closet — the remains of UFO occupants retrieved over the past 37 years."

Nonsense, said a spokesman for the Air Force at Langley. Since 1948 the Air Force has investigated 12,618 sightings of UFOs and explained all but 701.

Bryant insists that the Air Force is stonewalling.

He said, "I'm waiting for somebody in the Air Force to come out of the closet and say, 'Hey, look. I'm tired of keeping this secret, and I want to share it with the world.' Langley Field has long been rumored as a way station for hardware

and bodies of creatures recovered from alien spacecraft."

Langley Field captured the interest of the Citizens Against UFO Secrecy three years ago when a book written by Charles Berlitz and William L. Moore ("The Roswell Incident," Grosset and Dunlap publishers) came out. The authors quote a former Air Force Officer who said he saw the remains of nine aliens at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio seven years ago.

On page 96 is written, "The nine deceased aliens were preserved under deep-freeze conditions in well-lighted, thick glass enclosures. The officer described the bodies as short in stature, about four feet in height and what appeared to be grayish skin. The officer had been informed that alien spacecraft were being kept at Wright-Patterson, McDill Air Force Base in Florida and Langley Field."

Creatures short in stature with grayish skin? Sounds like somebody's in-laws.

Bryant said he has a gut feeling that rumors of aliens in crash landings are true.

"I believe in the Langley connection," he said.

Bryant would have us believe that the Air Force at Langley was keeping things — scary things — from as long ago as 1959. Maybe it is just a coincidence, but that was the year when a 15-year old schoolboy, Mark G. Muza, saw a flying saucer over Poquoson ("it hovered over my head") and fired two blasts from his 12-gauge shotgun into it.

Really?

"Yes, I did," Muza said after I tracked him down in Newport News where he is a police detective. He remembers the UFO as a queer-looking thing with a black body and silver trim.

Muza never saw it again. He remembers the sighting as if it happened yesterday. "I have no idea what I saw," the man said.

Bryant asks, "Can you dismiss reports like that as a bunch of baloney?"

He calls the UFO cover-up bigger than Watergate.

"Give us bodies, give us hardware," he asks the Air Force.

Give us creatures.

The Air Force will never do that. Imagine the impact. *Creatures from outer space reach Earth!* The stock market would collapse. People would fall out into the streets in a panic. Children would sob. Women would faint. Men would run for the hills. And you would never be able to get a plumber when you need one.

America's most spectacular UFO show

Valley UFO sightings spark interest

MARCH 1983 will go down in history as the month when America experienced its most spectacular UFO display ever.

And it didn't occur in some backwater town to be witnessed by uneducated people.

For 14 days between March 17 and 31, residents in Westchester County, New York, were treated to a dazzling spectacle of UFO aerobatics, according to top investigators on the phenomenon.

Hundreds of witnesses reported seeing a half-moon shaped object that hovered quietly in the sky while it emitted a multicolored aura of light.

Glimpse


The first man to glimpse the weird, unworldly object was Bill Hele, a skilled meteorologist.

He was stunned by the appearance of the space vehicle that he estimates as being up to 3,000 feet wide. He watched it as it hung silently 3,000 feet above the Taconic State Parkway.

The giant object remained motionless for more than two minutes before it began moving slowly to the north, picked up speed and finally disappeared.

Then scores of local residents began to report sighting the boomerang-shaped object.

And a team of UFO investigators affiliated with the Center for UFO Studies in Evanston, Illinois, launched full-scale investigation of the phenomenon.



... Occurred in N.Y.

Heading the group was famed UFO scholar, Dr. J. Allen Hynek. He was aided by Phil Imbrogno, a local science teacher, and George Lesnick, his co-investigator.

Using a sophisticated computer for cross checking, the team began to interview witnesses to the reported sightings.

Some were stunned when the giant UFO appeared to join a picket line in Brewster, New York, when it hovered silently above the strikers.

Problems

Problems for the team arose when residents of five nearby Connecticut towns reported sightings as well, but claimed that the objects they saw made noises similar to airplane engines.

Skeptics claimed that the sightings were a hoax created by single engine planes piloted by members of a local flying club.

Investigator Imbrogno disagreed.

"Single-engine planes can't hover soundlessly, make 90-degree turns or shoot down dazzling beams of lights," he says.

A probe into sightings of unidentified flying objects in the Maple Valley area has yielded interesting, but inconclusive results, according to a researcher of aerial phenomena.

Dale Goudie, director of Puget Sound Aerial Phenomena Research, said the organization began optical research of the area from a twin-engine aircraft in early 1983. Numerous sightings have been reported in the vicinity in the past few years. The researchers concentrated on areas over electrical substations, he said.

Using a 35mm camera with ultraviolet filters, the researchers recorded scenes from the air, then later analyzed the film. Following one expedition, the researchers discovered the image of an object coming off of a transformer at the Covington substation, Goudie said.

Moments later, as they traveled east along the line, they detected an image that "looked like smoke, but took on a definite form." Using photo enhancement techniques, the

researchers discerned what "looked like a domed object speeding over the countryside. We're not saying that's what it is, because we don't know. It could be a natural phenomenon, but it doesn't seem like a natural phenomenon would have taken on such perfect form," Goudie said.

PSAPR also has been investigating a reported sighting in Tacoma in which a videotape of the object was recorded. Goudie said a freelance producer was dining with friends at a restaurant overlooking the Port of Tacoma on Aug. 13, 1982 when they spotted the object about 10:45 a.m.

The producer ran out to his car for his equipment and recorded the image from the parking lot, Goudie said.

Goudie said the researchers first attempted to link the image to some natural phenomena, but after 14 months of study, have been unable to prove the object was not real.

"What it might have been was an electrical disturbance," he said, "but for it to be an electrical disturbance, it would have had to travel in a linear path and also the shape of the object would not be consistent."

The object did not, however, follow a linear path, he said, and the domed shape of the object was consistent throughout the film.

Researchers further studied the videotape using a new technique called Video Negative Photo Analysis (VNPA), as well as photo enhancement techniques, he said.

"What (VNPA) shows us seems to be two lines coming down from the dome, which would make the object a lot smaller than we thought. It would take the shape of a bell-shaped object," he said.

Goudie said there also appears to be six portholes going across the face of the dome and two protrusions coming from the dome's top, one in the shape of a question mark and the second, its mirror image.

"Basically we have come to the conclusion that the object is real, but it's still unidentified," Goudie said.

PSAPR is sending information on both sightings to other organizations involved in UFO research, Goudie said, including the Center for UFO Studies in Illinois, Mutual UFO Network in Texas, and the North American UFO Federation in California.

Ships report UFO off Essex coast

ESSEX coastguards are puzzled by reports of strange green lights flashing across the sky early yesterday morning.

The crew of Harwich fishing boat Alison Theresa radioed Walton-on-the-Naze coastguard after sighting a green light flashing across the sky. "It was definitely not a flare" a crew member said.

A little later the coastguards received another radio message from the dredger Arco Thames working about 20 miles off the Essex coast. The message read, "With a UFO in mind we are reporting a strange green light which crossed our bows and then accelerated at high speed away to the southeast."

Dover and Shoreham coastguards also received radio reports of a similar incident.

But lights reported by two ships off Essex on Monday night still remain a mystery.

Sightings

Suffolk UFO investigator Mr. Paul Hermon said that he was intrigued by Monday's sightings.

"I have heard reports that two ships 15 miles apart out to sea saw a green light which took about one minute to pass between them and that a similar light had been seen and reported by various people along the coast."

Coastguards at Walton on the Naze said they had received reports from two ships saying they had seen a mysterious green light early on Tuesday. They had received no further reports.

USAF Bentwaters confirmed that there were no exercises off the coast on Monday night.

Flying saucer sighting claimed

A DEWSBURY man claims to have seen an Unidentified Flying Object seven times in the last three weeks over the Shaw Cross and Gawthorpe area.

Mr. Victor Mitchell (54), of Bywell road, Dewsbury first saw from his window what he describes as a saucer shaped light on October 14, hovering above land between Owl Lane and Wakefield Road.

"The light comes in over Ossett, looking like two car headlights at first," said Mr. Mitchell.

"It comes about 4 a.m. and stays still until daybreak. It has a green light on top when it's stationary."

Mr. Mitchell watched the UFO for over an hour on the first sighting and has seen it since on October 20, 26, 28, 29 and November 6 and 7.

"I have watched it through binoculars, and once it appeared to change into different shapes, from a saucer into a fish, a triangle and an arrow.

"There were another three lights with it one night. I think there must be a mother ship somewhere, with these lights coming to find out about life here," said Mr. Mitchell.

"I used to have an open mind about UFOs, but I'm not an expert, it's not my hobby. I've never seen anything like it before though."

Mr. Mitchell phoned the police on the first sighting. Two officers came up to look, but a police spokesman later said the light was on their records as a bright star.

UFO sightings

A number of residents say they saw unidentified objects flying over Ossining High School last Sunday night. The sightings were reported from a number of places including the Taconic State Parkway and Route 9 in Ossining. The strangest call was from a motorist who said he spotted the objects from the Garden State Parkway in New Jersey. How about that?

3 more report seeing UFO Sunday night

Three more Ossining residents today joined those who say they saw an unidentified flying object at about 8 p.m. Sunday. Reports from Stewart International Airport in Newburgh suggest the "object" was a close formation of three planes, but at least one Ossining resident challenges that report.

Tim Slominski of Cortlandt Place said he observed a V-formation of five lights in the sky after turning off the Taconic Parkway near Ossining. The object was too high to have been a propeller plane, Slominski said. It appeared to be flying at an altitude equal to that of Strategic Air Command jets, he said.

"I'm just looking for a rational explanation," Slominski said. "I don't really believe in UFOs or anything."

Ossining Village Patrolman William Paterson said he was driving across the Tappan Zee Bridge when

he saw a V-formation of red lights over the Hudson River north of the bridge. The red lights turned a bright white, then red again, Paterson said. Paterson's wife, a passenger in the car, saw the lights, as did a number of other motorists on the bridge, Paterson said.

"Everyone on the bridge was slowing down and looking," he said.

Police throughout Rockland, Orange and Ulster counties received reports that a mysterious object was aloft Sunday night.

An Ossining village employee who resides on Eastern Avenue said she saw the unidentified object Sunday night as she was about to enter her house. The lights were white and green, in a V-formation, she said. A humming noise was audible, she said. The woman said she was convinced the object was actually planes flying in formation. — **Steve Bennett**

UFOs are terrorizing America's Air Force

A SERIES of frightening UFO appearances are terrorizing an entire nation.

Already shaken by the landing of an alien-piloted UFO near a Royal Air Force (RAF) base in December 1980, Englishmen have since been treated to alien visitations vivid enough to frighten the most stout hearted Britisher.

The area around the huge airfield at Woodbridge, England, is being buzzed repeatedly by what appears to be a fleet of alien space vehicles, and local residents are gripped by fear.

The latest encounter involved strangely shaped craft that hovered above the tiny village of Hollisley for a mind-boggling 20 minutes.

As eerie white lights flashed in the sky outlining the craft, anxious villagers peered upward, squinting their eyes in an attempt to identify their unwelcome visitors.

After hanging silently above the village for what seemed like ages, the craft suddenly zoomed off, making a weird whining noise that was, according to witnesses, "nothing like an air-

plane or any helicopter."

The incidents began in earnest in 1980. Despite numerous eyewitness accounts concerning at the time, however, U.S. and British military officials were able to engineer a successful coverup.

The incidents came to light when a Connecticut police chief forced open Air Force files with a demand made under the Freedom of Information Act.

Stunned Englishmen


learned that an American Air Force general, Gordon Williams, confirmed numerous UFO sightings in the vicinity of Woodbridge on December 17, 1980.

It was revealed that 200 U.S. and British officers observed the explosion of a huge red ball in the sky.

"Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noted in the sky," U.S. Lt. Col. Charles L. Hall said in the official report.

"The objects moved

rapidly in sharp, angular movements and displayed green and blue lights."

According to Hall, he and other officers watched a dazzling display of UFO aerial acrobatics for almost three hours.

Meanwhile, a group of British and American air force personnel sent to investigate other sightings suddenly found themselves gaping at a UFO that plopped down in their midst without warning.

According to one witness: "There were beings on board."

The latest sightings have stirred up a heated controversy, as residents of the area demand that government officials tell them what's going on.

"If they're experimenting, then we ought to be informed," villager John Button told an interviewer at the scene.

"We froze," said one witness when describing his neighbors' reaction to the latest sightings.

"The talking suddenly stopped, and all eyes looked skyward. The lights were in a triangle and remained perfectly still," said baker Ron Maero.

"Whatever was in the sky, it flew over us. The lights beamed down on us, and we heard a high-pitched whine. It wasn't an aircraft. I know the sound of jets and helicopters."

Officials at the air base declined comment on the incidents.

tion, depicting an alien takeover of a small town in New Jersey, was mistaken as the real thing at the time by an estimated 1 million people and set off a nationwide panic.

"Additionally, the power outage lends credence to the idea that UFOs use power lines as sources of energy," UFO expert Dr. Harland Stochsell told the EXAMINER.

Dover police confirm that they received a number of reports of an unidentified flying object, one of which was turned in by one of their own patrolmen.

"I couldn't believe it ... I've never seen anything like it before in my life," says Sharon Dube of Dover.

"People think you're a crackpot when you see these things. But once we saw it, we knew what it was," she adds in a shaky voice.

"I've never seen an aircraft that moved like this thing did, and it never made a sound except for a faint whirring noise. I don't want to

Rochester says she saw the craft hovering over a local mall.

And a Rochester patrolman who was able to shine his spotlight on it says the craft appeared oval in shape and was covered with lights.

The sighting was also reported by Jean Thurston, an employee in the University of New Hampshire Space Science Program.

"If it was a plane, it wasn't shaped like one ... and there was no loud engine roaring, just a high-pitched whistle," she says.

Thurston says the craft seemed to be squared off on both ends. She claims she saw what seemed to be windows, with the silhouettes of people standing behind them.

Carolyn d'Entremont of the Public Service Company says the cause of the power outage appears to have been a routine fault that caused a short-circuit at the power station.

The movie is about a 1939 broadcast on CBS radio of Orson Welles' production of H.G. Wells' classic, *War of the Worlds*.


Orson Welles' frighteningly authentic produc-

UFO sightings common

in '83

Low level sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) led the list of strange phenomena reported by residents of Pennsylvania during 1983. Other strange occurrences reported included Bigfoot, black panther and mountain lion sightings, unexplained sounds and physical disturbances, unearthing of strange artifacts, fireball sightings, and even a poltergeist.

This information was provided by the Pennsylvania Association For the Study of the Unexplained (PASU), which is based in Greensburg. PASU is an all volunteer, non-profit research unit, comprised of individuals from scientific, technical and medical fields, who donate their time and equipment to investigate such occurrences. The position of PASU is

to look into these reports with an open-minded attitude and, if possible, attempt to find a logical explanation for what is reported.

Those cases which remain in an unexplained category are exchanged with other reliable research organizations and investigators worldwide. PASU, which serves as a statewide clearinghouse for such incidents, works closely with the Mutual UFO Network (MUFON) of Seguin, Texas, which is the largest international UFO research organization. All UFO reports from Pennsylvania received by MUFON or the National UFO Reporting Center in Seattle, Wash., are passed on to PASU for follow-up investigation.

PASU was organized by Stan Gordon, a radio communications specialist, who has been in-

vestigating phenomena for over 24 years. The past year was very active with various types of reports, with the majority of incidents reported as UFO sightings. Many of the UFO sightings were found to have a logical explanation, yet others still remain baffling. Interestingly, many of the UFO sightings were not just of lights in the sky, but were observations of very large structured objects

observed at close range. Another aspect of PASU's research are the mystery animal sightings which fall into two categories.

Category 1 covers unknown or as of yet unclassified creatures such as Bigfoot, the hairy anthropoid creature that has been recorded in the history of Pennsylvania since at least the 1800s, yet has been frequently seen in more recent years.

Bigfoot made appearances again in 1983.

Category 2 covers what are known as "Out of Place animals", which defines actual animal's such as black panthers and mountain lions which are reportedly seen in geographical locations that is not their normal habitat. Black panther and mountain lion sightings continue to be reported yearly in Pennsylvania. The Mountain lion has been officially extinct in the east since the late 1800s. The black panther reports are more unusual since these animals are not common to this part of the world. PASU attempts to send trained field investigators to the scene of occurrences which require followup. The researchers obtain any physical evidence for laboratory testing as well as obtaining first hand information on the occurrence.

During 1983 PASU conducted dozens of on-scene investigations. PASU encourages those who may have had a strange occurrence to contact them by writing to PASU, 6 Oakhill Ave., Greensburg 15601, or call the UFO hotline number at 412-838-7768. All names are kept anonymous, and callers will not be ridiculed.

Some highlights of 1983 include:

Jan. 2 (Greensburg). Two men observe two huge, hairy, Bigfoot creatures in a field for over 20 minutes during daylight hours.

March 19 (Armstrong County). Over 20 people witness a Bigfoot creature walking out of the woods and approaching as close as 30 feet from some of the observers. Police arrived at the scene at short time later and found the witnesses very frightened.

March 30 (Pittsburgh). A mechanic working on a car was frightened by a black panther that leaped over a fence, and landed six feet away from the witness. Several other people saw the animal before it disappeared back into the woods. This incident led to a massive search by Pittsburgh police with dogs who were unable to locate the creature. There were no similar animals missing from the Pittsburgh Zoo.

June through October (throughout western Pennsylvania and other sections). A massive wave of UFO sightings was reported during these months. Many reports were explained as misidentifications of planets and stars, yet many other cases are more baffling.

Aug. 30 (Derry). A giant, round metallic gray object drops out of the sky and hovers 40 feet over a car. The driver of the car accelerates away from the object, but it moves ahead of the car, and twice hovers low over the road forcing the car to pass underneath the object.

Oct. 15 (Blair County). A woman traveling on Route 220 reports that a large silver object making a loud sound passes over the right side of her car, causing one side of the car to be lifted off the ground for several seconds. There was no damage to the vehicle, yet the driver, since the incident, has lost hearing in one ear, suffered a spinal injury, and has had constant headaches.

Oct. 19 (Westmoreland County). Near Pandora, a bright light passes over a car, at the same time the car headlight changes color, and there is interference with the car engine and radio. Within a few seconds several round lights seem to fall from the sky just ahead of the car, and hit the road, just disappearing upon impact.

UFO investigators report local sightings


"On Aug. 19, 1983 my cousin Marion Hillaker and I were sitting on the patio visiting. We were discussing the sighting of a UFO by my husband, George and I, which occurred on Aug. 10, 1983, at 1:10 a.m. We had placed our chairs so we could look west toward a tree line and cornfield. We were watching this area because that is where George and I first sighted the object.

Suddenly, there just a few feet above the tree tops, a light came on. It was approximately 650 ft. from where we were sitting. Marion and I saw it at the same time. The object was not moving at all, it was just hanging in the air just above the trees. There was only one white light shining, bright but not glaring, nor did it hurt our eyes to look at it. There were also red lights, but there was no definite pattern that I could see. The red lights seemed to be reflecting on the bright metal or whatever the craft is made of.

The craft started moving slowly north toward where we were sitting. We jumped from our chairs and started running south toward it. The lights seemed to be getting larger as it came. I said to Marion, "Get the guys, Marion. They will want to see it. I'll keep watching it."

We stopped running and Marion was about to turn back to the house to alert the men. All of a sudden, another light came on and whipped sideways (I will call this a 90 degree turn) and headed east. The men had already heard us and were coming from the house. They saw it moving toward the east and it went from our view behind some trees. The thing was only about 25 to 30 ft. above the ground. There was no noise or any sound that we could hear. As it moved east, we could see the red lights reflecting off the shiny metallic finish. The total time of the sighting was approximately three minutes. When the object went behind the tree, I checked my watch--it was 11:20 p.m."

George and Shirley Coyne can tell stories that are out of this world--stories of UFO (Unidentified Flying Object) sightings right in the Flushing area.

Since Aug. 10 when Mrs. Coyne experienced her first UFO sighting, the Flushing couple have become deeply involved in researching this phenomena.

They now serve as UFO investigators for Genesee County, having been appointed by the state director of MUFON (The Mutual UFO Network), a national organization founded in 1967 and dedicated to the study of UFOs.

The above account details the second sighting Mrs. Coyne experienced on Aug. 19. Between Aug. 10 and Sept. 23, she reported five UFO sightings and her husband three.

"Unless you see this yourself, it is hard to believe," Mrs. Coyne acknowledged. "A lot of people who have had similar experiences with UFO sightings don't talk about it because they think people will make fun of them."

"It is easy to think that someone is just 'spreading it on rather thick'," her husband agreed. "A fair share of reported sightings turn out to be a star or a manmade hoax--but these cases were different."

"The things I saw were definitely not hoaxes," Mrs. Coyne stressed, adding that she has no fear of UFOs and believes in life on other planets.

"To me, it is a normal and natural thing that there would be life elsewhere," Mrs. Coyne remarked. "It is rather mind-boggling, but I am comfortable with it--I have no fear. It's like you wait and wait and there it is!"

Her husband also acknowledged his belief that other life forms exist in the universe.

"Why should we be so egoistic to think we are the only ones around?" he questioned. "Everytime I see the UFO, I try to free my mind in hopes of receiving some form of communication. Our goal, and the goal of MUFON, is basically information. We want to get answers as to why they (the UFOs) are here and what they are looking for."


Both the Coynes stressed their

belief that the humanoids (the term for life forms operating the UFOs) are not interested in harming the human population.

"If they wanted to do that, they would have done so years ago," Coyne said. "It appears that they are so far advanced compared to our capabilities. I believe we could learn a lot from them, if we could establish communication."

The Coynes became involved with MUFON after their Aug. 10 sighting at their home on River Road, between Elms and Beecher Roads.

"I remember seeing a UFO as far back as 1968, but I never saw another one until this summer," Mrs. Coyne reported. "George and I knew our neighbors had seen something in July, but we did not anticipate seeing something ourselves. It was Aug. 10 and we were sleeping in our motorhome because it was so hot inside the house. It was between 1 and 1:10 a.m. I had been reading and sitting on the edge of the bed looking out. Suddenly, I saw lights along the tree line. I thought, 'what is a car doing in the cornfield?' The lights

just started rising approximately 10 to 12 ft. off the ground. They came over the trees, hesitated and slowly began floating down. Then they started moving at an angle toward our house. I thought it had landed behind our barn. So, I woke George up, and we went outside. We ran out behind the barn and could see nothing--no evidence of the lights."

After that sighting, the Coynes contacted Dan Wright of Lansing, the state director for MUFON. They knew about MUFON because the organization had made contact with the woman in their neighborhood who had experienced the previous UFO sighting. He came and talked with them about their experience, and helped them to write up reports. Then, picking up on their interest, he asked them to be investigators for Genesee County.

Coyne noted, as investigators, he and his wife are not trying to supercede the responsibilities of law enforcement agencies or airports.

He has written to these agencies in the Genesee County area to inform them of his role as investigator and to offer to

handle any investigation of sightings, thus relieving the law enforcement agencies of such work.

"We are not trying to take over their position," Coyne stressed, "but we want to be helpful."

The Coynes have been trained by MUFON in methods to use in investigation reported sightings.

"Hopefully, we have proven ourselves capable of conducting an objective investigation, which includes contacting police agencies and airports to confirm if there were any sightings," he said.

The Coynes fill out a questionnaire on each sighting, describing the environmental situation, the object seen (size, changes of direction, light pattern, noise, etc.). They also take soil samples, measurements and photographs of the area and talk to as many people as possible who experienced the UFO sighting. They then send this information to MUFON's state headquarters in Lansing.

Since August, the Coynes have been called on one UFO sighting in Grand Blanc Township.

"We think this is really exciting," Coyne said, adding they would like to hear from anyone in the county who has had a sighting or anything unexplainable.

According to Coyne, 85 to 90 percent of the reported sightings have been around water, and UFOs have also been reported near power lines. Mrs. Coyne was able to place a shape on one of her sightings and described the craft as being shaped like two inverted pie tins, one on top of the other, with two tri-pod struts underneath the craft.

"The lights were like big headlights--very bright but not glaring," she said. "It didn't hurt your eyes to look at them."

And never in any of the five sightings (which all occurred near their home on River Road) did she or her husband hear any noise from the UFO.


Even though the couple has experienced no sightings since Sept. 23, Mrs. Coyne said she is still looking.

"I can't get her to go to bed until after 2 a.m.!" her husband smiled, referring to the times of the previous sightings. "She wants to stay up all night watching for the UFO to return!"

'Moving dragon' spiralled across the sky

At 4:08 in the morning, they saw something strange flying in the east sky. The object looked like a shining disc, but was dim in the center. It moved flutteringly in the sky for about half an hour.

Then it flew suddenly toward the south, making an occasional dive, at amazing speed. It did not produce any sound at all.


The students took a photo of what they had seen and the Peking Evening News developed it for them.

As a result, China finally had its first UFO photo. The picture showed that the main body of the object was an oval-shaped structure.

Cases that involve a UFO "mother ship" have been reported all over the world. China is no exception.

I have seen a report that on April 13, 1981, a huge fiery object as big as a basketball was seen in the southern sky of Huan-ren County.

The ball had red-and-white lights with a misty, cylindrical tail about two meters long. The fiery ball continually dispatched small fireballs.

These small balls were orange in color, and they followed the large fireball toward the northwest. After two minutes, the whole array disappeared.

A month later, Shih Bo, assistant editor of The Journal of UFO Research, sent me an illustrated report about some UFO sightings on the same date as the report I had on file.



When I studied the illustration, I could identify a "mother ship" image clearly.

Shih Bo had received seven reports that recorded direct encounter with the object on the same day. The object flew from the north to the east, across two provinces before it disappeared.

It apparently carried seven small saucers, which were seen returning into the mother ship.

During the last 12 years more than 160 reports of a UFO that rivaled the sun in brightness have been recorded. In all these cases, a huge red object has been seen to ascend in the sky and travel extensively.

In 1980, Li Rong, a resident of Dailian, a port in North China, saw a huge red

wheel in the sky. The center of the wheel was dark red. The color became lighter toward the wheel's edge.

sunlike object moving from the west to the east.

The UFO was not going very fast and appeared to drag a red and yellow tail. The object illuminated Li Rong's yard with reddish light. After two minutes, it disappeared.

A chemist, Lin Ya-Bo, of Xiang Xin city in Hunan Province reported that one day in 1978 he saw a big round

It flew from the east toward the west, in a clockwise direction. According to Lin, the object looked like the rising sun in the morning but it was much bigger, more transparent, and its light was less painful to look at. He said many other people also saw the object that evening.

UFOs shaped like Saturn, with its well-known ring, have been seen in many places around the world, including China.

Professor Tu Deng-feng, of the Jiangsu Mineralogy School was talking with four other persons on June 17, 1980. The sky was clear as two machine-shop teachers, Jiang Zong Li and his wife, ran to the group and cried out loud: "Look, look, flying saucer, flying saucer."

Deng-feng looked toward the northwest where they pointed. Not far away from a star was a flying object five times brighter than the star. It was flying from northwest to southeast, spinning in a clockwise direction.

It had a clear ring around it which looked like the ring of Saturn. After five minutes it disappeared.

UFO reports from the Gobi Desert make up 6.5 per cent of the total 3,000 cases on file with the China UFO Research Organization. Some people imagine that the desert may be a base for UFOs.

In 1978, a worker of the Karamay oil field headquarters reported that he saw an oval-shaped object, silver in color, moving up and down the grassland of the desert. It did not make any sound and it emitted no smoke.

Soon a group of soldiers

armed with anti-aircraft weapons moved at high speed toward the grassland, hoping to capture the object. When they arrived, they found it still there.

The soldiers and the armed oilfield workers then encircled it. But when they came near the object, it suddenly took off and disappeared into the sky.

In one shocking incident, a famous scientist mysteriously disappeared from the Gobi Desert. Peng Jin Mu was a research fellow at the Science Academy of Shanghai and the vice-president of the Xin Jiang Science Institute. In 1980, he led a research team deep into the Gobi.

One day he went out to look for water and never returned to camp. The government and the Air Force sent airplanes and soldiers to search for him. The search covered the area within a radius of 300 kilometers.

However, the only thing they found was Peng's footprint and a few candy wrappers at a spot where he rested. The government finally decided that Peng might have been buried by a sandstorm. This is a plausible conclusion.

However, some people suggest that Peng might have been kidnapped by a UFO.

ALIEN CRAFT FIRST SEEN BY THE CHINESE 1,000 YEARS AGO

EXPERTS have found more than 60 mentions of UFOs in ancient Chinese books.

For example, there is this astounding account in Peeping On The Sky, which was written in the Tang Dynasty more than 1,000 years ago:

"A celestial ship, over 50 feet long, was found and placed in the Ling De Hall. The ship gave out a metallic sound when struck, and was of very hard material which was rustproof.

"Li Deyu, the Prime Minister, cut over a foot of a slender long stick of the ship

and carved it into a figure of a priest. The figurine flew away and then returned.

"In the years of Emperor Daoming, the ship also flew away."

The so-called "celestial ship" may well have been either a spaceship carrying a visitor from outer space or an instrument of exploration

under remote control.

Professor Zhang Longqiao of the Chinese department of Peking Teachers College discovered this vivid account of a UFO from the ancient book Essays of the Meng Hall, by Shen Kua of the Song Dynasty, between the years 960 and 1127:

"A UFO as bright as a pearl often made its appearance over the city of Yangzhou, particularly at night.

"One night, a man living by the lakeside found a shining pearl close by while studying outdoors.

"The object opened its door and a flood of intense light like sunbeams darted out of it, then the outer shell opened up, appearing as large as a bed with a big pearl the size of a fist illuminating the interior in silvery white.

"The intense silver-white light, shot from the interior, was too strong for human eyes to behold. It cast shadows of every tree within a radius of 10 miles.

"The spectacle was like the rising sun, lighting up the distant sky and woods in red. Then, all of a sudden, the object took off at a tremendous speed and descended upon the lake like the sun setting."

At the end of the last century, the famous painter Wu You Ru and hundreds of other passersby witnessed a fireball radiating red light in all directions in the sky.

The spectacle was painted by Wu in a picture called Red Flames In The Sky. He described what he saw:

"In the southern sky of Nanking City appeared a fireball, egg-shaped, red without light. It floated in the air, slowly eastward.

"It lingered for a period of a meal's time, fading into the distance little by little."

SECURITY surrounds a non-profit making Camberley magazine called "Viewpoint Aquarius"

The magazine delves into subjects ranging from flying saucers, to alternative forms of communication

Four people, all who claim to have seen UFOs, collate the information needed to produce

Mr. Rex Dutta, one of the four, helped set up the magazine almost 14 years ago. It all started from his first book called "Flying Saucer Viewpoint," when Mr. Dutta asked people interested in the subject to write to him.

Mr. Dutta, who declines to say how many magazines are

sent out each month, said he has not been in contact with the Aldershot man who is reported as having been invited aboard a spaceship.

The reason is that Mr. Dutta says there are about 200,000 UFO sightings a week.

"It is not epoch-making — it goes on all the time," says Mrs. Jean Coulsting, editor of "Viewpoint Aquarius."

Mr. Dutta still wants to hear from anyone who claims to have seen UFOs. He can be contacted on Camberley 21312 during office hours.

● Pensioner Alfred Burtoo claims that he was taken aboard a spaceship while angling at Aldershot. The "News" reported his story in October.

I was working nights in the AEI Division of Elliotts (as it was then). It was a cold dark night and there was very little other traffic on the road as I drove my motor cycle combination to work up the Chatham Maidstone Road.

Pulling over from the Medway Technical College side of the road, to filter into the



Rochester Maidstone Road, on the opposite of the island, I saw a bright light in the sky.

It was above the level of the line of the street lighting and seemed to be over the centre of the airfield. Stopping the machine, I removed my crash helmet and visor for a clearer view.

The light now appeared to be a collection of colours in bands, giving the impression of a child's musical spinning top.

A spot of orange, a band of darkness and an orange strip below

it, was parted from a band of individual rotating red blue and green lights, by another band of darkness.

Yet another dark band separated the coloured lights from a shorter pulsating light of a lighter, more yellowy orange base.

Although hovering in the same position for a few minutes the lights seemed to tilt about an axis at an angle of 90 degrees to me. The light at the top was rolling in my direction, as the one at the bottom rolled away almost out of sight. Both returned

UFOs or meteorites?

STRANGE blue lights have been spotted in the skies over County Durham and North Yorkshire.

North Yorkshire police received half a dozen reports on Monday night.

A spokeswoman today said most of the sightings were in the York and Scarborough area including Seamer, Selby, and Great Ayton.

Police in County Durham also received

some reports at Peterlee.

Teacher Donald Miller of Wingate reported seeing a blue flash like lightning followed by what appeared to be a rocket travelling horizontally which petered out to a pale blue lightish light.

But the mystery may be solved. A spokesman at Newcastle weather centre said December 12 and 13 are peak times for meteorite showers.

Did anyone else see this light?

I was reading The Journal on Sunday week when I came across 'Strange sight on Witches Night'.

Your reader wasn't seeing things!

My daughter and I were arriving home from music lessons. I reversed the car into the drive, we got out and locked our doors and suddenly my nine-year-old daughter said: "Look, Mum, that's a very bright star, it looks like a double one."

It was a UFO — witness

THE mystery of the North Devon lights deepened yesterday as a solicitor claimed they were a UFO.

The pair of wierd orange lights were spotted by scores of people from Bude to Hartland and Barnstaple on Tuesday night.

Yet coastguards, lifeboatmen and RAF personnel are all baffled.

And Mr. Michael Piercy, a senior partner in a 200-year-old law firm, is amazed by his own close encounter.

It happened as he was walking his dogs from Hannaford to

Grey's Holt Cross near Landkey at about 7.30 p.m.

"It certainly was not an aircraft — it was quiet and there was no sound except for the owls."

He added: "The lights were about 100ft. away and stationary for approximately 20 seconds before moving towards Landkey."

"I didn't believe in UFOs before but that's all I can think it was. Unless perhaps it was some secret military weapon."

Appledore Inshore Lifeboat, Clovelly Offshore Lifeboat, and a Hartland coastguard are among those who spotted the "extra-terrestrial" balls of light.

Man saw UFO 'come in from the sea'

A HOPE COVE man claims he spotted an unidentified flying object while walking his dog at dawn on Monday.

Mr Roger Leeming, who is retired and lives at Weymouth Park, claims he saw a brilliant white light moving slowly across the sky.

"I was in my garden walking my dog at about 6.45 am just as it was getting light. I saw this spectacular white light. It was travelling in from the sea towards Galmpton and was absolutely silent. It was quite incredible."

He said since he moved to the South Hams from

Cheltenham in June he had seen several similar lights but they had all been on the flight route to Exeter airport and were noisy.

Mr Leeming said he would like to hear from anyone who also saw the object.

Mr Eric Morris, a UFO expert from Plymouth, said: "We are very interested in this sighting because it is the latest of about four or five in the Bigbury area during the past few months."

He has appealed to anyone else who has made a sighting to contact him on Plymouth 369862.

UFO sightings have been reported from Filleigh this week.

Several children say they have seen strange flashing lights coming from a moving flying object.

They claim that it was travelling at "tremendous speed, faster than an aeroplane, and making a whizzing sound." There is parental support for the evidence.

One sighting at 8.30 p.m. was near to Aller Cross when two mothers were taking their children home from a cubs' meeting.

The lights went red, orange, and blue, followed by a big white explosion of light.

Another sighting happened at 8.15 a.m. the next day.

It was reported by a child near West Buckland who knew nothing of the previous sighting.

His friend also watched with him as they waited for the school bus.

They claim the object was as big as the school playground. They also saw colour flashes of light.

Those reporting sightings were Anna Pawlyn and her son David, Caroline Keane and her son Simon, Clive Hussell, Neil Bowler and Glen Davey.

UFO EXPERT SAYS: ALF IS TELLING THE TRUTH

AN international UFO expert has visited the spot where an Aldershot pensioner claimed he had a close encounter with men from outer space.

And now Mr. Timothy Good, Britain's leading lecturer on the subject, is convinced the story is absolutely true.

Mr. Good, an independent researcher, wrote and arranged a meeting with 77-year-old Mr. Alfred Burtoo after the "News" reported his experience.

He claimed he spoke to beings from outer space and boarded their flying saucer when it landed on the banks of the Basingstoke Canal, near to where he was fishing.

Mr. Good has a specialised knowledge of cases involving reported contact with the occupants of UFO — popularly known as close encounters of the third kind.

Consultant

And he said of Mr. Burtoo's story: "It is a very important case and quite exciting. I am convinced he is telling the truth and his was a genuine experience."

Mr. Good, who is a principal consultant to the House of Lords all-party UFO study group, spent a couple of hours talking to Mr. Burtoo at his home in Pegasus Avenue, Aldershot.

The pensioner was over the moon to have an expert ear to listen to his story and was more than happy to once again go through the events of August 12.

That night he was fishing with his dog Tiny near the

Government Road bridge over the Basingstoke Canal in Aldershot. He said the flying saucer landed at about 1.15 a.m.

He said two forms, about 4ft. tall and dressed in pale green suits, came towards him. Dark visors covered their faces.

One of the forms beckoned to him and he followed them to the steps of the spaceship and climbed aboard.

Once inside he was asked to stand under an amber light and was then told: "You can

go. You are too old and too infirm for our purpose."

After hearing the story Mr. Good said there were many similarities between Mr. Burtoo's experience and other cases he had investigated.

Cases

"It strikes me that Mr. Burtoo could not have known many of the things he has told me. From the outset of the description of the craft to the occupants themselves there are

similarities with lots of other experiences."

Mr. Good, who lives in Beckenham, Kent, first became interested in UFOs in 1955.

He began his own research into the subject six years later and since 1967 has lectured throughout the United Kingdom.

He believes there are different groups of beings visiting this planet from other solar systems and documented sightings go back as far as 1955.

Many UFOs have been seen above military establishments

and he says that could be the reason why the craft seen by Mr. Burtoo was in Aldershot that night.

Mr. Good praised the pensioner for speaking out about his experience. He said many people were afraid of talking about UFO sightings for fear of ridicule.

He added that he would now be using Mr. Burtoo's experience in his lectures and discussing the case with other researchers.

Close encounters of the Norwood kind

IT MAY be reassuring to some that the Norwood skies are not cluttered up with strange flashing lights, flying saucers and little green men.

But Pam Kennedy of Vermont Road, Upper Norwood, has been hoping for 30 years to get a glimpse of a UFO.

For the past five years she has been the membership secretary of the 300 strong British UFO Research Association.

She has never come face to face with an extra terrestrial, and is not sure how she would react if she did.

"In the early days I would

have rushed over to have a look, but now I would be more cautious, I'd hide behind a tree and see what came out first. I would probably think what the Dickens do we talk about, if we do talk."

Destination

The most recent South London UFO sighting reported to the Association was in Morden at 5.30 am.

Whether Morden is a likely destination for intergalactic travellers is anyone's guess.

On this occasion a mother and daughter saw a tremendous white light in the sky, and three other white lights emerged from it.

"They stood and watched it cavorting around for about an hour. Then two jet planes roared over their house, as if investigating," Pam said.

The British UFO Research Association has its own investigators who carefully look into reported sightings.

Often they can be put down to things like satellites, unusual effects caused by moonlight through clouds, and apparently Venus is quite frequently mistaken for a flying saucer.

Pam Kennedy's interest started back in 1953 when she read magazine excerpts from a book called 'Flying Saucers Have Landed' whose effect, she says, was electrifying. It was written by George Adamski, who had been taken up in a spaceship after meeting some extra-terrestrials in California.

Soon after, she went to a meeting of a flying saucer club in a room over a pub in Hampstead, and was hooked.

"In those days you were very careful who you told that you were interested in flying saucers. But over the years it

has become a respectable subject. Today it is being investigated by scientific types all over the world."

She is not at all bothered by those who can't take it seriously. "They're entitled to their opinion. My friends sometimes say 'you're not still interested in that rubbish'."

'Batty'

And she says that aficionados do include the 'batty types.'

One stumbling block is the theory that nothing can travel faster than the speed of light.

"They say its not possible to do all that travelling, it would take them too long to get here. But in so many things with science, they have said such and such a thing is certain, and then 50 years later reverse their opinions. You just have to keep an open mind."

Interest in UFOs has led to interest in other subjects, ranging from astrology to ley lines. She also enjoys science fiction - "not too way out, like bug-eyed monsters," and

sci-fi films.

She liked 'Close Encounters of the Third Kind' but added: "I didn't like the creatures that got out of the space craft because they reminded me of worms."

UFO believers must obviously consist of all sorts. Miss

Kennedy to an outsider would seem just as much at home in the WI as the UFO Association.

She hasn't given up hope of her own sighting. "I still plod on. It's a very frustrating subject. Sometimes you get sick of it, but you can't leave it alone."

CLOSE ENCOUNTER 3129 FOR GEORGE..

A PAISLEY man claims to have spotted an unidentified flying object hovering over the town – and it wasn't Santa Claus on his rounds.

George Fisher, 41, first spotted the object as he got off a bus in Crookston Road on his way home from a dance.

He says the triangular object stayed with him through Ralston and past the Barshaw Park. But it had vanished by the time he reached his home at 55 Caledonia Street.

Mr Fisher said: "It was a clear moonlit night with a few light clouds."

He described the object as "a triangle divided into three smaller triangles". These were coloured red, yellow and green. In the centre there was a bright, crystal-like light. This was accompanied by three bright lights in triangle formation some distance from the main object.

"One of the lights disappeared. It appeared to go behind clouds. Then the other two lights went. But the main



UFO turns up again



'Weird' light seen in sky

"WEIRD and unexplained" were descriptions given to a strange green light reported flashing across the sky early yesterday morning.

"We cannot say it was a UFO because we have never seen a UFO" said Mr Ron Joslin, Walton coastguard station officer. He added that it might have been a meteor.

Walton coastguards received two calls shortly before 5 am yesterday.

One was from the Harwich fishing vessel the Alison Theresa which was near the Medusa buoy two miles off Walton.

The operator reported the strange green light flashing across the sky.

"It was definitely not a flare," a crew member said. "It was weird. I do not like to say it but UFO comes to mind."

The other report was from a ship by the Shipwash off Harwich and this report said the light was coming from a souther-easterly direction.

Coastguards checked with stations at Dover and Shoreham and were told they too had received reports of the light. It had also been seen at...

Close encounter over in seconds

A BURST of flame, a bright light, low in the early morning sky which then shot over the horizon trailing green flame... in seconds Terry Coleman's close encounter of the third kind was over.

He pulled over, a strange smell seemingly coming from his car. "I wound the window down and the smell was definitely in the air outside," said Terry. "It was sort of sulphury."

Milkman Terry was on his way to work in St. Albans at 5 am on Tuesday morning, travelling along the A509 between Olney and the M1.

"I thought it might have been a shooting star but it was too low," said Terry, of Whitsundale Close, Finedon.

"It was a burst of flame then it shot across the sky trailing a green flame it. It was definitely arcing, I thought it was coming down. It was so much lower than the stars.

"I thought, if I put my foot down, I am going to see where it lands." But Terry lost his UFO, when it disappeared over the horizon. "It all happened so quickly. There was no shape to it or anything."

"I'm not interested in UFOs but I was quite excited. The way it was going, someone else must have seen it, I feel sure."

Mr. David Abbott (39) a UFO investigator and former chairman of the Northants UFO Research Group, said: "My first reaction is always to look for a possible sensible explanation.

"I have got no immediate answer as to what Mr. Coleman saw."
