

RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

A SURVEY OF 322 UNITED STATES UFO REPORTS

In the past few months DATA-NET readers have been able to study a number of excellent surveys of landing reports. These "prime case" studies piqued my curiosity. I wondered what some of the results would be if a fair sampling of the general UFO activity throughout the continental United States were compared with some of the statistics resulting from the prior samplings of "prime" cases.

Selecting the four year period from 1967 through 1970 produced a mixture of 322 cases, all of which have appeared in the pages of the DATA-NET REPORT. The cases that were obviously questionable were not considered. Only those reports where the observer felt he needed a more satisfactory explanation were tabulated.

A. GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION


An initial surprise resulted from the map showing the distribution per state of the 322 reports. I had assumed that UFO activity moved in a curve across the continent, peaking in the Central states and decreasing in the West. In December 1969 I began mapping the distribution by state of the sighting reports that had appeared in the DATA-NET REPORT. These maps indicated that the majority of the general UFO activity since September 1969 did occur in the central states.

While this appears to have been true for the entire four year period, the surprise is that the three Pacific Coast states, Washington, Oregon and California, show the greatest amount of activity in relation to the area covered; a total of 81 reports.

Even though Nevada and Utah show none, the Western sector of the United States produced 100 reports.

Compared to the West Coast states, we find that the 14 states along the Eastern seacoast reported only 66 cases.

The four Central states with the highest number of reports per state were Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas and Illinois. Their total, 69, still falls below the total for the three Pacific Coast states although the area covered is approximately the same. No concentration of activity is apparent in those states bordering the Great Lakes, nor those bordering the Gulf of Mexico. It seems that those who theorize that the oceans and other large bodies of water are concealing UFO bases might begin by investigating the Pacific Ocean area.

## B. ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION

The obvious dip in the number of UFO reports that reached DATA-NET in 1968 seems odd at first. Did 1968 rate low in UFO activity or was public interest in reporting UFO sightings at an ebb? Actually, we are unable to verify either speculation since DATA-NET did not subscribe to a clipping service until 1969. Our clipping service has been the major source of gauging general UFO activity since first-hand reports from members are rare. Even so, more reports were received for 1967 than for 1968.

The wire services do not pick up and circulate local UFO sighting reports and few people realize that the puzzle is still with us. Even those directly involved with the news are uninformed regarding the current status of UFO activity.

Harry Reasoner titled his May 11 "Reasoner Report," carried over KGO radio, "Where Have All The Saucers Gone?" According to his check of the newsroom, no flying saucer reports were carried over the wire services in the last two years. Reasoner said that if there was a reason why five million people said they have seen them, there must be a reason why they are not seeing them now. And that reason, he said, "is because the mass media killed them off." The public is super-sensitive to the media, which presented all reports "tongue in cheek."

One reporter told Reasoner that people just "got tired of seeing them." While I am not so sure about that, it may be true that many people have lost interest in reporting them.

The monthly distribution produced some interesting comparisons with some of the previous UFO studies that have appeared in the DATA-NET REPORT.

The month of April accumulated only 8 reports, the lowest number recorded for the four year period.

The highest number of sightings, 57, occurred in October. Both these observations, the low and the August-October peaks, correlate with Dr. Vallee's preliminary tabulation of 1970 United States landing cases as noted in the May 1971 "Research in Progress" column, D-N Report #47, p. III.

The months of August through December 1968 make up 47% of the total number of landing cases from the Ballester and Vallee study of 100 Spanish landings, with August at the peak. January, February and March of 1969 also show a high percentage of landing cases. (See D-N Report #47, May 1971, p. 36.) While the Iberic peninsula had a 1968 landing flap our figures indicate that 1968 was low in general UFO activity in the United States, in spite of our limited source material. But, in the following year, the United States showed a similar increase in general sighting reports from August 1969 through March 1970. Another upsurge occurred during the latter half of 1970.

September and October registered the highest number of reports on Ted Phillips'

report on traces found at alleged UFO landing sites (D-N Report #48, June 1971). This is consistent with the October peak noted above.

D. DAY OF THE WEEK

A sampling of general UFO activity in the United States produced results similar to those reached by Saunders and Keel regarding the most active day of the week. DATA-NET records show 55 UFO sightings occurred on Wednesday. Both DATA-NET and Keel record a minimum of activity on Sunday. Saunderson's minimum occurred on Saturday.



In the Iberic peninsula landing study by Ballester and Vallee a survey of 1054 non-Iberic landings indicated that the majority of the landings had occurred on Friday. The 81 Iberic landings peaked on Sunday. Since DATA-NET shows a Sunday low of 29 and a Wednesday high, no consistent correlation seems to exist here. The only obvious point that again emerges is that UFO sightings are not strictly a "weekend" malady.

E. THE "LAW OF THE TIMES"

A significant discovery that has resulted from this survey of DATA-NET records is that Dr. Vallee's "law of the times" holds true for an overall picture of UFO activity, as well as for studies of landing cases.

The law of the times became evident in 1962 when early computer studies of Type-I landing cases revealed that these events followed a fixed time distribution. During daylight hours UFO activity is very low. It rises in the evening and reaches a maximum between the hours of 8 pm and 10 pm.

There were 138 DATA-NET cases, where the time was specified, in which the sightings occurred between the hours of 6 pm and 1 am. These cases represent 43% of the total number of reports. One-fourth of the total number of sightings occurred between the hours of 8 pm through 10 pm.

In many UFO reports the time is not specified but witnesses have indicated that the event took place either during daylight or at night. In an additional 13 cases "day" time was noted, while 51 additional reports specified "night."

We also note that 17 early risers were greeted with unidentified flying objects. One viewed an object which exhibited an unusual or erratic light pattern, seven witnessed objects that were stationary or hovering in the sky, and nine watched objects in continuous flight. Four of the cases involved multiple objects, and in five reports the object's physical appearance altered.

#### F. CODING METHODS

Since 1967 I have maintained a card file of the UFO reports appearing in the DATA-NET REPORT. The cases are coded according to the behavior characteristics exhibited by the UFO as described by the witnesses.

The coding begins with one of five major type headings. Each case is further defined with certain classes and sub-classes. The result is a preliminary coding method that has been useful for compiling primary statistical studies of UFO reports.

Unbiased studies of UFO phenomena have been in progress for many years. At DATA-NET it is our hope that perhaps one day we will begin to understand what UFOs are, where they come from, and why they are here.

#### G. SIGHTING REPORT INDEX

The index of 322 UFO sighting reports is listed in chronological order. Each entry notes the day of the week and the local time reported, the coding used, the location, witnesses names if known, and references the DATA-NET REPORT number in which the case was reviewed.

### TWO CANADIAN LANDING REPORTS

June 1954 - Bengough, Saskatchewan (x/1000) - (1-.\$)

R.F. (name confidential), a farmer for over 17 years, sighted a flying object one day when he was in the middle of his yard pumping water. "I could hear this thing coming, and it sounded just like one of those Hondas (motor bike) that you hear nowadays." He kept looking around and "all of a sudden this object came over right between the house and the shed; about 15-20' high (altitude), 50-60' around (circumference), I'd say. It looked to be something transparent, you know, metal of some type, or plastic, with two men sitting in it with their helmets and goggles on. There was a kind of stick shift in the middle like today's cars which you see. As for a propeller, I never actually noticed that, but it sure sucked the ground when she went over, just like a big whirlwind or big vacuum. Actually made the hair stand up on the back of my neck -- I couldn't believe it. I would think it was going about 80 miles an hour - 90 -; it wasn't that terrific a speed at all. But, as I say, there was no variation in motor rhythm. It sounded just like a Honda, you know, going down the road, not too loud. Just like a big whirlwind, kind of an uplift to it. It wasn't a downdraft, it just

seemed to be a suction upward, or a creation of air swirling. Something that if you didn't see it you wouldn't believe it."

He couldn't recall which direction the air (dust) was rotating. As he said, "That was the farthest thing from my mind when it passed over." It flew from north to south in no time at all but the sound of the motor was constant. "The thickness looked just like the lid of the old washing machine type, with a windshield on the front, something like a speedboat that you see in pictures, only in-a-one-piece windshield."

"The two objects, or men I presume, you could see their helmets and goggles quite distinctive, but it looked to be just like a luminous material. I couldn't say what kind of material it might be." There was no color. "Actually their goggles were a darker color, and the helmet, but as far as the rest, it was just like transparent. There was no color to their clothing and there was no color to 'it,' looking into the machine from the ground, either their luminous uniforms or clothing." There was nothing to indicate color, size, or anything else. "But, when you've seen one, you don't forget you've seen one. It was a fairly clear day, it was very calm. There was no mistaking the motor sound."

"The sound was coming from the north, with 'no variation in speed or revs, just a drone.'" It sounded like a Honda and did not resemble a helicopter which has a "different choppy sound." This was quite smooth, and was heard longer than he could see it.

The object was below the roof of the house which stands about 22 feet high. About 10 to 12' above his head. The distance between the house and the shed he estimated to be about 75'. If the present power pole had been there at the time, it would have crashed into it. It was perfectly round with a slight basin in the bottom and a clear cockpit area protruding out to the front in a curve covering about 8-12', more or less straight up and down, with a control, like a stick shift, in the middle between the two figures. Nothing appeared to be attached to the stick that he could see, but it "had a cross bar, like a scooter handle." "Looking up, verything is more or less that transparent look, whether its made that you can't see through it, I don't know. Or a certain type of metal or plastic that's illuminous or transparent or something -- I don't know."

He had never seen anything like it before or since. He has read items in the paper but that's all. He figured it had to be under control otherwise it would have crashed into the house or the shed. But he couldn't understand why it didn't follow the road route instead of coming through his yard which gave him a kind of "hair-raising experience." He had not mentioned it before "because I figured, well, you know what people think. They'd figure I was just another kook. And, why bother? I say there's no use kidding yourself. When you see one, you see it, and whether its 15 or 20 years ago, it doesn't have much bearing on what you've seen. You may never see another. I'm sure you can't convince the ones that see it that they didn't."

The most distinctive things about the sighting for R.F. were the two figures with their helmets and goggles, and the motor noise. "Steady, no variation in motor speed. A kind of a muffled sound, but very distinct, distinct enough that you can still remember it. It didn't even sound like a high-powered motor."

The first time he mentioned the incident was about 14 years after, when some friends claimed they had seen "one" and were trying to convince people they "weren't gone hairy." He knew them, and knew that they were not stretching their imagination. (First-hand by D. Clausen, SASKATCHEWAN UNIDENTIFIED PHENOMENA RESEARCH (SUPR), Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada) (Cr: L. 25 May 1969 - Bladworth, Saskatchewan (Sun/1425) - (1-.)#

B.T. (12) and his father W.T. (names confidential) were planting potatoes on a very sunny afternoon. B.T. was on top of the truck giving directions when he noticed "a funny kind of round thing in the sky." He called to his father, "It looks like a flying saucer."

B.T.: "It was a very reddish color. It was sort of spinning around, had a funny oval top. It went down. About five minutes after, I looked again for this thing, it was going up and across, and it went down in the distance and it looked smaller and smaller and it disappeared. It was the size of a penny held at arm's length. It

lasted for about five minutes. We went back to planting potatoes. My mother came out of the trailer and said that she heard a funny humming noise, and then I told her what we saw. She said that we should report it to someone.

I reported it to the store proprietor. Then we went out to investigate it, and we found this funny kind of -- the grass had been taken away (at one spot) and these funny kind of findings (animal droppings?) at another spot.

The object revolved clockwise; I could see it was turning when it was on a slant. It looked round in shape when seen on a slant, from every angle, I think. I think it was a solid object. I saw it for about 5 seconds, my dad saw it for about 5 seconds, it took 10 seconds then it hovered for a while and then it went down. It hovered for about a second or so. It was a sort of a silvery color when it went up again. It went behind some bushes, and kept on going on an angle and up. There was about a 45 mph wind from the north-west. The sun was at about a two o'clock angle. Sunlight seemed to reflect from the object when it was a silver color. I don't think that it touched the ground; it didn't leave much proof. I think that I saw a UFO. I have been interviewed by Mrs. M. L. Guenther of Saskatoon later that day.

My cousin said that he saw one that looked exactly like mine, the same night about one o'clock. He said it was coming from the same direction. It was a bright reddish color, and silverish after, something like that."

Mr. W.T.: "That thing come from the east when I seen it, and I figured it was an aeroplane or a helicopter, and I never pay much attention. And then he was hollering flying saucer is coming. When it was coming down I saw a bent tail like this. And we wait for awhile, and then it went up like this (spiral hand motion). That is what I seen, and what was it? I want to know myself what is it. I have started thinking now, what was it? That thing was on my land."

Mr. Clausen and Mr. Coulthard interviewed the two persons on the following Saturday. They were guided to the location, -- rolling land, scattered bushes and trees, summer-fallow and seeded land. The spots were briefly examined. Dean Clausen obtained two dropping samples. The droppings had the appearance of dried berries. Mr. Clausen and Mr. Coulthard did not pursue the investigation further, due to Mrs. Guenther's previous work. (First-hand by D. Clausen & D. #### 15 June 1971 - Tucson, Arizona - DR. McDONALD, 'EXPERT' ON UFOs, FOUND DEAD

Dr. James E. McDonald, well known for his controversial stands on unidentified flying objects and the supersonic transport plane, is dead at age 51.

Dr. McDonald, a University of Arizona physics professor, was found dead in the desert north of here. Pima County Sheriff's deputies said he was the victim of an apparent suicide.


McDonald was an outspoken critic of an Air Force report that claimed almost all reports of UFOs could be explained as natural phenomena or government projects. He maintained that some could be from other inhabited worlds.

He reported six months ago that the Supersonic Transport plane indirectly may cause cancer. He explained that chemical reactions to exhausts from a fleet of the big jets could cause 10,000 cases of skin cancer a year. (Los Angeles Herald-Examiner, 15 Jun 71)

### CLIPPING THE NEWS

5 Jan 71 - Penrith to Windsor, NSW, Austr. (Tue/2200) - (1-A-) - FOLLOWED BY A UFO

Mr. John Clucas, 37, an insurance salesman of Wahroonga, was driving home from work. Just outside Penrith he noticed a light in the rear vision mirror. "It came up very quickly and I soon saw it was much bigger than any car light. When I slowed down, it would not pass me. When I speeded up it would catch up in a flash," he said. For most of the 13-mile trip it was either a few feet off his back bumper bar or about a quarter of a mile behind. The 3ft diameter blinding light "illuminated the whole inside of my car and blinded me when I looked in the rear vision mirror." It disappeared when he stopped his car just outside Windsor and stood ready to meet it with his car spotlight. (Melbourne, Vict., Austr., Sun, 15 Apr 71)

18 Jan 71 - Quincy, Illinois (Mon/1900) - (1-A-) - WOMAN FRIGHTENED BY UFO

A Quincy woman (name confidential) (25) and her 3-yr-old son were both "quite frightened" by a UFO. They were driving east on Spring after crossing Twelfth when her son pointed out "those bright lights over the trees." An object to the left was running parallel to them. The woman said the craft looked like it was only about 30 feet off the ground. She saw 14 windows in a narrow, boxy-shaped compartment at the top of a generally globe-shaped object, which seemed misty and cloudy around its base. As she made a U-turn at Fifteenth and Spring to park in front of her mother's house, a very bright shaft of light came from one of the windows, focusing on the brick walks at her feet. Frightened, she ran into the house and got her mother who confirmed the sighting. The object seemed to hover over a house at 1411 Spring then it moved away to the west-northwest. (Herald-Whig, Quincy, 24 Apr 71) (Cr: W. Andrus)

Mar 1971(?) - Greenhill, NSW, Austr. (Fri/2200) - (c-\$) - UFOs AND A STRANGE FACE

A 34-yr-old man told his wife he saw a strange, small saucer-shaped face at the kitchen window and that he was drawn out through the glass by some unknown force. His wife, 26, heard glass breaking in the kitchen and ran outside in time to see his legs and hips disappearing, horizontally, through the top half of the bottom window. The man said he went to the kitchen for a drink of water. He didn't turn on the light. He tipped his head back and saw this little face pressed up against the window. It had no hair and it looked like a small saucer. It had features but he did not describe them. He doesn't remember much about going through the window. He said he was sucked out by some force. He fell at the bottom of the steps on his back. He wasn't even stunned, but jumped up and ran like hell down to the gravel stockpile near the house. He was crying and shaking. He was taken to the hospital where they stitched a cut in a finger and then to the lock-up for the night. His wife said he had been drinking early in the evening but was not drunk.

An Argus reporter who went to the home came away puzzled by the bizarre incident.

The 5'3" man was standing at a sink about 18" wide. His wife insists that he was in a horizontal position going through the window and that he was not "struggling or thrashing about at all -- just going through like that, straight out." The pane of glass is 4'6" from the ground. His leap would be impossible from a standing position and he went through a glass pane 32" wide and 10" deep, touched nothing on the sink in front of him and tumbled 7'2" to the bottom of the back steps. The light was not on in the kitchen and no light was reflected from the bedroom next door. The moon was in the first quarter and there was a light cover of cloud. The man was terrified, yet could not run from the object of his fear. He went to it. The incident came a few hours after a number of Kempsey people reported sighting a strange, bright light in the area between 6:10pm and 6:30pm.

(Fri/1810) - (1-a--.) - Mrs. Ina Murray of Gabriel Avenue, her son David, daughter and nephew Ric Cooke saw a bright light, reddish in color with purple overtones, in the northwestern sky. It travelled low and its brightness fluctuated like a twinkling star. Mrs. Murray's son watched it through binoculars and saw a smoke tail behind it. Then it descended in "a controlled and deliberate descent" somewhere near the hospital and disappeared. The light was too bright and too big to be coming from a helicopter landing.

About the same time Mr. Arnold Nelson of Taylor and his sister-in-law, Mrs. Cyril Adamson saw a reddish light descend slowly into the Macleay river between the West Kempsey reservoir and the hospital. Nelson said the light was very low and appeared to be about 4' in diameter. He saw a smoke trail following the descent.

Mrs. A. Andrews, who lives opposite Mr. Nelson, said that about 6:15 pm she and her husband were driving over the Bloomfield Street bridge when Mrs. Andrews noticed in the southwestern sky a bright light between two heavy black clouds. It was "a beautiful red light like a setting sun," she said. She called her husband's attention to the sunset and he remarked tersely that the sun sank in the west, not the south.

Mrs. Richard Blight and her children, who live on Ronald Wixted Avenue, also saw the light for about 15 seconds. They thought it might have been a flare or an airplane landing. Inquiries indicated that there was no night flying and no civil defense exercises in the area. All agreed that the light was brilliant, beautiful--and strange. (Kempsey, Austr., Macleay Arus, undated (approx) Mar 71)

2 Mar 1971 - Castlemaine, Victoria, Austr. (Tue/2015) - (5-BC) - STRANGE AERIAL SIGHT

One of many who contacted the "Mail" regarding a strange sight in the sky was Mr. Jim O'Donnell. He said that a white cloud appeared under the moon almost half way to the earth. A bright orange light appeared below the cloud about half the size of a basketball. It glowed for about 30 seconds with a greenish tinge around the circumference. A white vapor trail appeared immediately below this light and headed straight towards earth. A bright ball of light gradually changed color to a hazy white and finished as another cloud similar to the one above, three minutes after the light first appeared. The vapor trail gradually spread to the same size as the other two clouds making a total of three. At 8:30 all clouds gradually became extinct and the moon was some distance to the left of where the cloud first appeared. (Castlemain Mail, 4 Mar 71)

13 Mar 1971 - Lowgap, North Carolina (Sat/1900) - (2-A-a) - DOMED DISC

Jim Barber and his son Blair, Jr., 11, observed an object through binoculars. It appeared to be about the size of an automobile at a high altitude and flashed purple, green, blue, orange and white lights. It had four windows, was disc shaped with a bubble dome on the top and gave off yellow and purple colored lights. The craft circled the car and followed it part way home from the Lowgap Wildlikfe Club before it shot straight up in the sky and disappeared in the distance. They reported the incident to George D. Fawcett of Greeneville, Tenn. (Mt. Airy, N. Carolina, News, 13 Apr 71)

16 Mar 1971 - Exminster, England (Tue/AM) - (5-C) - 'SAUCER' IN THE SKY?

Mr. Philip Abbott of 68, Gissons, Exminster was gazing through the window of his home in the direction of Kennford when he noticed a long vapour trail, grey in color, going straight up from the horizon. It was "like a searchlight in reverse," he said.
