### A TRIPLE METEOR.

SIR,—On the morning of the 4th instant a man named Cahill told me he saw a strange light in the sky, in a south-easterly direction, during the previous night (he is not certain about the time, but it was after we had all gone to bed). He described it as three balls of fire, travelling together, in the shape of a clover leaf. I did not take much notice of the matter until I saw the enclosed account of something similar having been seen near Singleton. A remarkable meteor is said by the *Singleton Argus* to have been observed in the southern sky on the evening of the 3rd instant. After travelling for a few seconds at no great speed and nearly parallel to the horizon, at an altitude of about 45°, it burst into three distinct pieces, which travelled on in nearly the same plane for a brief space. Two of the fiery balls then vanished, whilst the third seemed to continue its course about half as far as it had originally travelled, and then gradually died away.
