

STRANGE LIGHT IN SKY.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ARGUS.

Sir,—I witnessed a phenomenal occurrence in the north-western sky at Gordon at about 10 o'clock last night. A light which resembled a remarkably luminous planet of extraordinary size appeared to travel through space from north-west to south-west, and disappeared without leaving any trail of vapoury cloud. As it passed across the sky it shed a brilliant radiance towards the east. I viewed it for about five seconds, and it certainly was a most unique occurrence. It reminded me of an exploding meteor I had seen on December 25, 1919, at 11 a.m., but in points they were totally dissimilar, the former appearing as a shaft of electric light and leaving a trail of smoke visible for a long period, while the latter appeared in the shape of a large planet leaving no trail.—Yours, &c.,
