

U.S. TO USE JET PLANES TO HUNT "FLYING SAUCERS"

SAN FRANCISCO, Mon.

The Army Air Force has added jet planes to its force of standard fighters which are standing by in the hopes of chasing and explaining the mystery of the "flying saucers" which has intrigued the country for 12 days.

Mr. David Lilienthal, chairman of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, said the "saucers" had nothing to do with atomic experiments.

The Army and Navy have also entered positive disclaimers.

The saucers, according to observers, are shiny, round, metallic discs which are racing across the sky, singly or in groups.

While United States military aircraft hunted the skies over Pacific Coast areas without result, "flying saucers" were reported over Canada for the first time.

Residents at Wallaceburg, in South-Western Ontario, asserted they saw two large formations of the illuminated discs swing over a wide arc in the sky on Saturday night.

A National Guard pilot, who was in the air, was ordered by radio to "run down" a silvery disc with a short tail, which a resident of Sioux Falls had reported having seen shoot across the sky a few minutes previ-

across the sky a few minutes previously.

The pilot flew in the direction of the reported disc but radioed he could not find it.
