

## ***"Flying Saucer" Seen Here***

*A "flying saucer" was seen in Newcastle by Mr. A. Armstrong, of Lambton Road, New Lambton, on June 28.*

It was about the size of a dinner plate orange in color and travelled from north to south, spinning as it went.

This is the first report of a "flying saucer" having been seen in the Newcastle district.

"I paid no attention to it at the time, but when I heard that "flying saucers" had been seen in Sydney I said, "Gosh, that's what I saw," Mr. Armstrong said today.

He said he was at the New Lambton Oval to see the West-Lakes United Rugby League match and just before the game commenced he noticed his companion gazing up at the sky.

"Looking up, I saw this thing about

the size of a dinner plate travelling across the sky at about the height at which airliners usually fly.

"It was orange in color and appeared to be spinning—just the way a saucer does if thrown backhand. It was going from north to south at a fast pace and was visible for only a short time.

"Just then the football match began and I forgot all about the incident until I heard that "flying saucers" had been seen in Sydney."

Mr. Armstrong said that there had been no mention of "flying saucers" at the time and he had not paid a great deal of attention to what he

had seen or attached any special significance to it.

**SYDNEY.**—Fewer “flying saucers” are supposed to have been seen in Sydney last night. One man claimed he saw a round object of “indeterminable size” crash in Centennial Park.

The “saucer,” he said, fell to earth at great speed, throwing off a “silvery fluorescent glow.”

From Manly came a report that a “saucer,” after flashing across that suburb, fell into the sea about a mile from the beach.

Other reports of having seen “flying saucers” came from Darlinghurst and Newtown.
