

Cellarman Coming Here After 'Goodwood'

ADELAIDE, Monday. — Win or lose it is almost certain that Cellarman, the crack South Australian sprinter dubbed locally the "Flying Saucer," will have his last start in Adelaide in the Goodwood Handicap.

Because of increasing weights here, Cellarman will be sent to Melbourne, where his future programme will be mapped out by Mr Arthur Sayer, who races him in partnership with Mr W. Hill Smith, of Adelaide.

Cellarman is a hot favorite for the Goodwood Handicap, to be run at Morphettville next Saturday, but his price is bound to ease a little if it is decided to run Beau Gem. I think Beau Gem is certain to start, with Reg Heather as his rider.

Mr George Badman, owner of Beau Gem, has told local pressmen that he has not yet decided about the Goodwood as he had some ideas of running the four-year-old in the Adelaide Cup next Wednesday week.

However, both his trainer, George Jesser, and Heather are against running the brilliant chestnut in the two miler and their opinions probably will influence a decision to start him in the Goodwood only.

As Beau Gem and Cellarman are the fastest horses racing in Adelaide everyone,

man are the fastest horses racing in Adelaide everyone, and the SAJC in particular, hope they will clash in the Goodwood, in which Beau Gem has 9.8 and Cellarman 9.4.

Even if Beau Gem runs he will not start favorite, according to local bookmakers.

"Cellarman has become the glamor horse of the State, and everyone will want to back him on Saturday," said one today.

FOR DOOMBEN?

It is more than likely that Cellarman will tackle San Domenico, Phoibos, Bernbrook and others in the Doomben £10,000 in Brisbane in July.

It would be a supreme speed test for him and his local admirers claim he would not be

found wanting even against such formidable opposition.

Mr Sayer for some time has been keen to race a small but select team in the United States and if Cellarman happened to win the Doomben

opened to win the Doomben £10,000 a trip across the Pacific for the gelding would become a distinct possibility.

Mr Badman told me today that Beau Gem would be entered for the £10,000 race and provided he continued to do well during the Cup meeting in Adelaide, probably would be started.

Beau Gem has hung out in most of his races in Melbourne during the past 18 months, but he was a different fellow in winning the new Pullman Select Stakes at Port Adelaide on Saturday.

Acting on Heather's suggestion, Jesser used a Carpathus bit on Beau Gem and Heather said it worked wonders as he was "always in the paint."
